35 Years for Jealous Killing

John Bloxham shot his ex-girlfriend's boyfriend the night before the couple would have become engaged.

Ithough John P. Bloxham was sentenced Friday to 35 years in prison for murder, Todd Rogers' family, friends and fiancé ensured that it was Rogers' spirit that filled the Fairfax County Circuit Courtroom.

"This was the most comprehensive and moving testimony that the court has ever seen and ever expects to see," said Judge Charles Maxfield, holding notebook of reflections from those knew

Todd Rogers, 31, the best. "Todd Rogers was an accomplished wonderful young man who was on the brink of sharing his life with another human being."

More than 25 people, including his family, fiancé, best friend, co-workers, bosses, and church members wrote to the court to give a glimpse of Rogers.

"Todd was such a good person and brought great happiness to our lives," wrote his mother Carma Rogers.

"Todd was a very kind and gentle man," wrote his brother Mark Rogers. "He was always willing to serve, eager to please, and happy to share. ... He enjoyed serving in his church and community. In short, he lived righteously."

"I will miss his intellect. ... I will miss his culinary abilities. ... I will miss his compassion and service. ... I will miss his kindness and friendship," wrote brother Scott Rogers.

"I will never listen to his wry humor and hear him sing again. I won't see him get married and have a family with grandchildren that I would treasure," wrote his mother. "I won't see him smile, give him a hug, enjoy books and movies together and sing with him. Everything is broken because of his death, and I don't have any way to fix it."

TODD ROGERS PICKED up the engagement ring, planning to propose marriage to Carrie Johanson, the morning of June 30, 2007. He planned to propose the next day.


But John Bloxham, ex-boyfriend of Johanson, intercepted e-mail correspondence between Rogers and his fiancé-to-be, and knew the couple would be having dinner together at her house in Mount Vernon on June 30, 2007.

Around 10:26 p.m., Bloxham ended up in Rogers' car on the 2400 block of Phillips Drive in Beacon Hill. Bloxham shot Rogers



Supervisors Impatient for Answers

Quality of life throughout Fairfax County neighborhoods has been a prime concern of Lee District Supervisor Jeffrey McKay, both during his election campaign and since he joined the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors in January. He has argued for more stringent enforcement of laws against residential and commercial blight, drug blight and graffiti.

As he noted in Monday's board meeting, "one of my very first board matters in January asked staff to review enabling state legislation that provides localities with tools to deal with" those various forms of "blight." They diminish the quality of life in McKay's view. And, "quality of issues are paramount" to him and his constituents.

He wanted a report back from staff by April "so that when spring came and people spend more time outdoors ... we would be ready to respond more fully to the number of complaints that spike at this time of the year." He got only a partial report on Monday, well past his April response time frame, and that response only dealt with graffiti.

"This enabling legislation has been on the books for some time and the enforcement tools this legislation provides are not being used as vigorously as possible in Fairfax County. Meanwhile cases of blight continue to grow along with neighbors' frustrations," he stated

Now, he is tired of waiting. To get the staff response he requested four months ago, McKay moved that "the County Executive report to the Board" at their next meeting "with a report of review actions to date regarding commercial and residential blight."

McKay also joined with Mount Vernon District Supervisor Gerald Hyland in requesting that Chairman Gerald Connolly draft a letter to VDOT requesting them to investigate why two recent rain storms have resulted in road closures along the Route 1 corridor due to flooding.

"This is unprecedented. Even during the June 2006 storm that caused extensive flooding throughout this area and the rest of the County, roads along the Route 1 corridor were not flooded and closed," McKay and Hyland pointed out in their joint Board Matter.

They want to know why this is taking place now and they don't want to wait until the next incident. "Time is of the essence and the report should be provided to this Board within the next two months. We cannot continue to close travel lanes on this heavily traveled corridor," they said.

Citizen Common Sense Trumps Bureaucracy

Fairfax County's departments of Planning & Zoning and Public Works & Environmental Services were taken to the verbal woodshed Monday by Lee District Supervisor Jeffrey McKay for what he described as "sloppy staff work" resulting in severe damage to the "credibility of the Board of Supervisors."

What raised his ire and frustration was the approval of building a single family home on a lot bounded by three streets that, from his and other residents' points of view, was totally well beyond the required set back regulations. Even before the foundation was established, McKay informed the building inspectors that "the house was being built incredibly close to not one, but three public streets."

McKay first brought the matter to the attention of the two departments in February based on his personal observations and that of neighbors "armed with common sense." He was told everything checked out "okay" and the new construction was within boundary regulations. That occurred not once but three times.

He was also "assured that an engineering certification had been done and that this lot, that borders on three streets, was classified as a corner lot with primary and secondary front yards on Amherst Avenue and Highland Street." It was also explained that the sliver of land along the Backlick Road boundary line was a side yard. There was no rear yard, according to the various bureaucrats.

"How can a lot not have a rear yard?" McKay asks rhetorically

Letter Carriers Collect And Deliver

n this era of an economic one-two punch — rising food costs and rising demands on local charities to provide food for those in need — the National Association of Letter Carriers, with their annual food drive, once again helped to stop the cupboards from going bare.

Rising Hope United Methodist Mission Church, 8220 Russell Road, just off Route 1 in Lee District, received between one and three quarters and two tons of nonperishable food from the May 10 drive, according to Laura Derby, programs and office administrator, Rising Hope. "That amount of food should take care of our needs for about five weeks," she said.

"We didn't receive quite as much as last year but it was a huge help. Long term though we need a lot of food because we are getting a lot more requests for help," Derby said.

"In 2005 the Letter Carriers were able to give us

about six tons. But, donations are just down," she said.

United Community Ministries, 7511 Fordson Road, received approximately 5,000 pounds from the drive this year, according to Jose Fratti, UCM's food pantry manager. "That was down from 7,000 pounds in 2007," Fratti said.

Both organizations also rely on a wide array of community organizations, churches, and businesses for donations throughout the year. "The need for items from our Food Pantry has increased dramatically," Fratti said.

One of the primary organizations to benefit from the Letter Carriers Association efforts in Alexandria was ALIVE, Alexandrians Involved Ecumenically. ALIVE Executive Director Ken Nasser was not able to establish how much his organization received from the drive this year because they are supplied regularly from a variety of sources.

"But, there is one thing I can say, we were very pleased with the amount we received," Nasser said.

Party Like its 1827

After years of inaction and delay, preservation of Huntley Meadows mansion will begin soon.

ittle seems to have changed in re cent years at the Huntley Mead ows mansion, the crumbling old federal-style mansion that Fairfax County has owned for the last 30 years. Buttercups are in bloom along the hill where the boarded up old mansion sits vacant, and a deer trail has taken hold where the carriage road once offered passage to visitors. But the site will soon be transformed into Fairfax County's newest historic park, with a central passage furnished to interpret the height of its grandeur in 1827. The completed facility will have a visitor center and a gift shop with rotating exhibits on everything from the influence of the Mason family to the history of Hybla Valley.

"At this point, we are waiting for the phone to ring and let us know our site plan has been approved," said Michael Rierson, resource stewardship branch manager. "We are hoping to start construction in the late summer or early fall."

Although Fairfax County has owned the property since the late 1970s, the effort to create a house museum out of the old mansion began gaining momentum about three years ago. Since that time, Friends of Historic Huntley has been building support for the idea and steadily helping to raise funds. A 2004 bond issue added \$1.2 million to the cause, and voters will consider a

\$1.95 million bond for the project this November. Rierson described the house as a "learning machine," adding that the site will also include a storage building with a large brick ice well and a three-seat privy that will help visitors understand life in the 19th century.

"It's kind of bittersweet for me because I'll be retiring this July," said Reirson, who

helped Fairfax County acquire the property from a developer after the family sold the house to the highest bidder. "But we're all anxious to see this process start."

THE FAIRFAX COUNTY Park Authority began archeological investigations at Huntley Meadow in 1998, although the site yielded more questions than answers.

The evidence suggests the house was built in 1825 as a summer residence by Thomas Mason, a prominent Alexandria elected official who was the grandson of George Mason. Beyond that, much of what went on here is speculative. For example, the icehouse on the property is too

War Views

Congressional candidates in the Democratic primary speak out on the Iraq War.

First in a series articulating the views Democratic candidates for 11th Congressional District.

our Democrats are vying to be the Democratic nominee for Virginia's 11th congressional district seat. Physical therapist Lori Alexander, former U.S. Rep. Leslie Byrne, Fairfax County chairman Gerry Connolly and Iraq war veteran Doug Denneny will compete against each other in the Democratic primary June 10.

The winner of the Democratic primary will face local businessman and Republican Keith Fimian in November's general election. The current congressman, U.S. Rep. Tom Davis (R-11), announced earlier this year that he would not seek re-election.

All the Democrats in the race support drawing down the troops in Iraq and want the Iraqi government to take on more responsibility for safety and security.

Lori Alexander

Alexander would be supportive of implementing a plan put forward by one of her opponents, Denneny, if elected.

The plan calls for troops levels to be brought down to a split of 35,000 in Iraq and 35,000 in Kuwait by approximately July 2009. The United States would pull out the remainder of its support – with



the exception of Iraqi government advisors and those working with the United Nations – by 2011.

"I have actually spoken with Doug Denneny about this and I actually agree with his plan for the 'smart phase' withdrawal," said Alexander.

Alexander has concerns that an immediate withdrawal would result in what she saw and heard from people on a trip to Vietnam.

"I heard horror stories about what happened after the U.S. military just left in the middle of the night," she said, adding that she thought the killing in Cambodia was a direct result of those actions.

Leslie Byrne

Byrne wants to reduce the number of troops in Iraq immediately and devote more resources to diplomatic efforts, especially with Iraq's neighboring countries, she said.

"General Petraeus himself has said that there is no military solution, that it is a political solution," said Byrne.

The candidate emphasized her early opposition to the Iraq war. She signed a letter with other former congressman opposing the Iraq


invasion before it started in the spring of 2003. Byrne has also backed anti-war candidates, including former presidential hopeful Howard Dean and U.S. Sen. Jim Webb (D-Va.)


Byrne said there is no record of any of her opponents publicly speaking out against the war until recently

"It is one thing to say you oppose the war now that those difficulties are facing us square on. But where was your voice when it really mattered? ... It is not something that is new to me because I am running for Congress. It is something that I believe," said Byrne.

Gerry Connolly

If elected to U.S. Congress, Fairfax County Board of Supervisors chairman Gerry Connolly said he would vote against any plan to keep large numbers of troops in Iraq without a timeline for withdrawal.





Connolly had a 10-year career with the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee, where he partly focused on United Nations and Middle East policies. With his expertise on the Middle East politics, Connolly has long been opposed to the Iraq war, said campaign manager James Walkinshaw.

"He has been opposed from the beginning of the invasion," said Walkinshaw.

Doug Denneny

Denneny would call for a multiple-phased withdrawal from Iraq if he is elected to congress. The Iraq war veteran has worked for the chairman of the U.S. armed services' Joint Chiefs of Staff and the U.S. Senate Committee on Armed Services since the war started.



Denneny calls for a reduction of troops from 145,000 to 35,000 inside Iraq and 35,000 inside Kuwait by approximately July 2009. The candidate then says that all American support – with the exception of advisors and those working with the United Nations – should be removed by 2011.

"I am not asking for a total withdrawal in a short period of time," said Denneny.

As part of his plan. Denneny would pull back American soldiers who remain in Iraq from urban areas and palaces. He said the Iraqi troops would have to serve as the first line of defense for their owner country.

The candidate added that it is important to give "tough love" to the Iraqi leaders and to force them to step up and take control.

Vela Promoted To Regional Director

Continuity assured for the development of Jones Point Park.

ne of the most influential forces in shaping the future configuration of Jones Point Park has been named the new Southeast Regional Director for the U.S. National Park Service.

David Vela, who became Superintendent of the George Washington Memorial Parkway just two years ago, May 28, 2006, will oversee a region that contains 66 national parks in nine states, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. He will be one of seven NPS regional directors.

"David came up through the ranks, beginning as a frontline park ranger. His early field experience prepared him to be a great superintendent and now he will apply those same skills as regional director," said Mary A. Bomar, director, National Park Service.

"I always had my eye on the Southeast Regional Director spot and promised myself that if it ever opened up I would apply. I did and I just got the word that I had been selected. I officially started in that new role this past Sunday," said Vela, who will remain in his Turkey Run office for several more weeks.

With its vast expanse, the Southeast Region welcomes over 60 million visitors each year. It has a \$204 million operating budget and employs more than 2,600 people, including 174 employees at the Atlanta, Ga., regional headquarters.

"When I became superintendent of the George Washington Memorial Parkway, I wanted a complex park experience and the National Capital Area offered that. It also afforded me the opportunity to develop many friendships over the past two years," Vela said.

"These past two years have offered a wide array of challenges and exciting experiences everything from Jones Point Park to Dyke Marsh to the P.O. Box 1142 reunions of those who served at the secretive prisoner of war center at Fort Hunt Park during World War II," he said.

"I also want to assure everyone that there will be continuity in this position. Deputy Superintendent Jon James will become the new acting superintendent for the George Washington Memorial Parkway. He also served in that capacity after Audrey Calhoun retired and before I arrived," Vela

said.

"Jon has been my right hand and is keenly aware of all the various events that have taken place over the last several years. There will be uniformity and continuity with all the projects, including Jones Point Park," Vela emphasized.

"My promotion will have no impact on

the plans for the development of Jones Point Park. We are presently working on the design for the park, which is 60 percent to 65 percent complete. For all intensive purposes we are done with the configuration for Jones Point Park," he said.

James, a graduate of the College William and Mary in Williamsburg, holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in American History. Originally from western Missouri, he has been with the National Park Service for over 32 years, serving in 11

A 17 YEAR VETERAN of the Park, Vela began his career in 1981 as a Cooperative Education Student at San Antonio Missions Historical Park. Upon completion of that program he became a permanent Park Ranger.

He first came to Virginia when he was transferred to Appomattox Court House National Historical park in 1984 to serve as a Supervisory Park Ranger. In 1986, he moved to Independence National park in Philadelphia, Pa., where he served as a District Ranger.

Remembering on Memorial Day

Local families turn grief into service.

mi Neiberger-Miller of Sterling lost her brother, U.S. Army Spe cialist Christopher Neiberger, in August 2007 when he was killed by a roadside bomb while serving in Baghdad, Iraq. He was 22 years old when he died.

"He was wickedly funny and empathetic," Neiberger-Miller says, remembering her brother. "In many ways, I feel like I was just beginning to know the man he was becoming."

As we approach the seventh Memorial Day since the beginning of military operations in Iraq and Afghanistan, we recognize that here

in Northern Virginia, many local families bear the personal sacrifice that comes with the loss of life there. More than 4,075 U.S. military members have been killed in Iraq and more than 500 more have died as a result of operations in Afghanistan since Sept. 11, 2001.

Many local people have responded to their loss by reaching out and helping others. Since her brother's death, Neiberger-Miller has devoted herself to the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (www.taps.org), which provides peer-based emotional support and other services for families of the fallen.

Scott Kirkpatrick, 26, died on Aug. 11, 2007 in Arab Jabour, Iraq. Kirkpatrick, who graduated from Park View High School in Sterling, and also considered Herndon and Reston as his hometowns, was a champion slam poet. His father, Ed Kirkpatrick, wrote: "Those of us who are already struck by this loss must add the numbers of those who are wounded [to those who have died]. That far greater number and the pain associated with it goes unnoticed and yet it is the one that is most alive around us. My wife and I try to help those at Walter Reed through the Yellow Ribbon Fund (www.yellowribbonfund.org). It was my son's wish that we help the families and soldiers who come back wounded and we try to do all we can to honor him and his last wish." Many of Kirkpatrick's friends also work to raise funds for the Yellow Ribbon

Beth and Michael Belle of Vienna are mother and stepfather of U.S. Marine Lance Corporal Nicholas Kirven, who, at age 21, was killed in Afghanistan in 2005 during a firefight in a cave with insurgents. He enlisted while still in high school after 9/11. Beth Belle was notified that her son had died on Mother's Day. She also has a special bond with the mother of the soldier buried next to her son at Arlington National Cemetery; both mothers lost their sons on the same day. The other mother lives in Connecticut, so Beth brings extra flowers and tends to her son's grave, as well as Nicholas'. They also hold an annual golf tournament to raise funds for scholarships they distribute to remember Nicholas.

Xiomara Mena and Rafael Anderson of Vienna are mother and EDITORIAL brother of U.S. Army Corporal Andy Anderson, age 24, who was killed

by enemy fire during combat operations in Iraq. Rafael will soon deploy to Afghanistan with his National Guard unit (and with his twin brother Randy). Xiomara Mena is described as the unofficial "mayor" of the section of Arlington National Cemetery where her son is buried; she is at the cemetery

More than 30,000 soldiers have been wounded in Iraq and Afghanistan. More than a million soldiers have served in Iraq and Afghanistan in that time, with their lives forever changed by that experience.

Those serving in Iraq and Afghanistan are there because of their sense of duty to serve the rest of us, to put their lives on the line to defend the country. They join more than 24 million men and women, veterans, who have made great sacrifice in serving in the

A good place to start in showing respect for those now serving would be to provide them with the equipment and services they need while they are there, and the services they will need when they get home, including impeccable, first class health care, and an expanded GI Bill that will provide a college education for every veteran who is so

School Board Responds on Budget

By Dan Storck, CHAIRMAN AND PHILLIP NIEDZIELSKI-EICHNER, BUDGET CHAIR FAIRFAX COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD

member of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors was recently quoted as saying that whatever amount the county government transfers to the school system, "it is never enough,"

This view belies the financial pressures the School Board faces just to continue to operate an excellent school system that benefits all county residents by attracting and keeping businesses and a workforce that are the foundations of our dynamic economy and high property values.

It is true — as parents, students, and others have told the School Board in testimony, e-mails, and phone calls during the monthslong process which led to our final vote on May 22 — that many residents would prefer a school system that spends much more than we do. What parent does not want his or her child in a class of 18 students (the exception), rather than one of 25+ students (the norm)?

But Fairfax County Public Schools has prided itself for decades on its ability to provide an excellent education to a large number of children with widely differing needs at the lowest cost possible. We are nothing if not cost-effective, as any comparison of per-pupil costs with other comparable school systems in the region reveals: nearly \$1,300 less per student than Montgomery County, and over \$5,000 less per student than Falls Church City.

OUR STAFF and the School Board work daily to achieve the best value for the taxpayer. This means that we must sustain a high-performing and highly diverse school system for the least amount of investment. This year, we had made \$33 million in cuts before we submitted our budget to the Board of Supervisors, including millions saved by delaying a maintenance program for an aging infrastructure.

Federal and state unfunded mandates, and a shortfall in local resources, means that we must make further cuts, not in "frills," but in basic, ongoing costs. We will spend \$22 million, more than half the increase in school funding from the county, simply to educate the estimated 3,500 additional children who will arrive in our schools this fall. We have done

much to reduce demand for commodities to offset increasing costs; buses need fuel, however, and diesel prices are up 70 percent over last year. Fixed costs (such as state pensions) cannot be cut back. Reducing employee compensation below market rates could undermine our long-range ability to attract and retain employees who make excellence possible. It has been difficult to produce a budget that does not require that we "eat our seed corn" by making reductions that will make it more difficult to recover momentum in future years.º

EXCELLENT SCHOOL SYS-TEMS (like excellent companies)

do not sustain their high-caliber performance by standing still, and 21st century needs are different from those of the last century. Expansion of all-day kindergarten and elementary school foreign language to a few schools was intended to signal sustained commitment to these initiatives, similar to the County's continued funding of set-asides for new affordable housing and storm water management initiatives.

Even with advanced technology, education remains a people business. Eighty-seven percent of our budget goes to employee compensation. Significant reductions mean fewer employees or limiting compensation; next year's budget does both: reduces numbers of teachers and limits their compensation to below competitive levels. As attractive as our school system has been for the best teachers and employees, our competitive edge continues to erode as area school systems and other employers intensify their recruitment of these same personnel.

A more rigorous management system is in place, which is strengthening performance accountability. We have much more to do; for example, we will soon conduct a top-to-bottom program review of effectiveness and cost. As bad as this year's revenue situation is, next year's looks worse, but we cannot afford to lose our winning edge. The CEO of Volkswagen of America, which recently moved its headquarters to Fairfax County, identified our

large to suit the needs of a family. Why was it built? Does its presence there signify that the house was used for large gatherings, a sort of tavern in the woods beyond Alexandria?

"The wings of the house were built first," said Carolyn Gamble, site manager. "The central part of the house was built after the two adjoining wings, and we're not really sure why.'

Thomson Mason's involvement in Alexandria politics included five terms as mayor and three terms as justice of the peace. An 1807 graduate of Princeton, Mason was a strong advocate for "retrocession" of Alexandria from the District of Columbia to the commonwealth of Virginia. Six months before his death in 1838, he was named as the first judge of the new Criminal Court in the District of Columbia. Although Mason's primary residence was on Oronoco Street, a house known as Colross

that was located where the Monarch building now stands, Huntley was a second residence where he could escape the hot summer days in Old Town.

"We are hoping to start construction in the late summer or early fall."

"It's a beautiful example of the federal style because of its symmetry," said J.G. Harrington, a member of Friends of Historic Huntley who led tours last weekend during an annual open house. "The design could have come from a pattern book or Mason could have designed it himself. At this point, we really don't know."

Bridge Dedicated To Cheers And Horns

Telegraph Road Interchange now takes center stage.

noon, it was finally declared officially finished. That was when, to the cheers and applause of more than 1,200 dignitaries and guests, U.S. Senator John W. Warner (R-VA) brought to a symbolic conclusion one of the most expensive and successful highway transportation projects in American history. Torquing the final bolt with a three-foot-

long chrome wrench he declared the new \$2.5 billion, twin-span Woodrow Wilson Bridge complete.

"I pull this bolt to honor all who worked and paid for this bridge. There was a total bipartisan effort in Congress to make this bridge happen. This is a bridge to every-

where - not a bridge to nowhere," Warner told the crowd assembled on the span above the Potomac River just prior to making the final tug on the brass bolt.

Labeling Warner "the Godfather of the bridge," U.S. Secretary of Transportation Mary Peters said, "This bridge stands as a tribute to your efforts to get it financed and built. And we (Federal Government) are very willing to work with the region to gain the maximum use of this new bridge." Warner is credited with being the moving force behind securing the necessary federal funding for the project.

Some of that maximum use was on audible and visible display throughout the hour long ceremony as truckers crossing the first span of the new bridge expressed their displeasure at a long traffic backup by blowing their horns and down shifting their rig's gears. There were also a few hand signals not meant to signify turns.

While the truckers and a local radio station were busy blaming the bridge project for the delays they seemed ignorant of the fact that the real cause was rubber necking drivers whose ranks the truckers joined as they ap-

proached the ceremony site on the Inner Loop span contributing to the delay of other drivers behind them. Traffic would not have had access to the north span that day, ceremony or no ceremony. It will not open until the end of May.

"I think they're telling us they like the new bridge," Peters said with a wry smile as she took the podium waving to the fire breathing truckers.

Joining her and Senator Warner on the temporary stage, set up on the Maryland

> side of the north draw span, which was raised to form a dramatic backdrop, were Maryland Governor Martin O'Malley (D) and Virginia Governor Timothy Kaine (D). Behind them were rows of bleachers filled with the men and women who actually performed the day-to-day constructed of the new bridge.

> "This bridge is a symbol for going from the past to the future. It would not have happened without courage and compromise. And, I'm going to take that message

back to Richmond and the General Assembly," Kaine said in reference to the upcoming special legislative session in June to deal with transportation funding.

"This is an accomplishment we did together. If we want to make this region better we need to make more of these commitments. This bridge is symbolic of a beginning, not an end," O'Malley said.

"We can still achieve great things in this country. Today we have to renew the spirit that built the Hoover Dam and the Golden Gate Bridge. In the words of the man for whom this bridge is named 'All that obstacles do to brave men and women is to encourage them," O'Malley said quoting Woodrow Wilson.

He also took a not so subtle swipe at the Bush Administration's support for creating more toll roads and bridges rather than using federal and state funds to finance them. Referring to the horn blowing truckers going past, O'Malley said, "They think they were delayed now, how would they like to be paying a \$7 toll to Bear and Sterns to cross this bridge," making reference to the collapsed Wall Street financial institution.

As with the dedication of the new bridge's south span in 2006, the federal and state dignitaries arrived at the podium via a restored vintage automobile used by America's 28th President supplied by the Woodrow Wilson Presidential Library and Museum in Stanton, Va.

Two years ago it was Wilson's Rolls Royce convertible touring car. This time it was the







late President's favorite means of transportation during and following his presidency — his 1919 Pierce-Arrow limousine. It also characterized the cooperation referred to by both Kaine and O'Malley and the consequences of failing to achieve such cooperation on policies serving the common

The new 1919 limousine, known as a Vestibule Sedan, awaited Wilson at the New York City docks when he returned from negotiating the Treaty of Versailles in France at the end of World War I. That treaty was a precursor to the establishment of the League of Nations, which the United States

failed to join due to a blocking action by several U.S. Senators led by Republican Henry Cabot Lodge, Sr. The League's disintegration, among other factors such as the vengeance driven economic isolation of Germany, set the stage for World War II.

ACTUAL CONSTRUCTION of

the new bridge commenced in mid 2001 with a combination of federal and state funding. The federal portion, primarily engineered by Senator Warner, with the support of other Northern Virginia and Maryland Congressional representatives, accounted for \$1.5 billion of the total \$2.5 billion cost.

The old bridge, constructed in 1960 as part of the Interstate Highway System initiated during the Eisenhower Administration, became not only an integral part of the North/South I-95, Maine to Florida corridor but eventually its worst bottleneck as traffic volume grew throughout the Washington Metropolitan Area. It met its demise with a spectacular Chinese firecracker style series of explosions engineered by the replacement bridge project just after the opening of the new south span.

Construction of the new bridge has encompassed both land and water modern technologies and methodologies as well as a lot of old fashioned frustrations, irritations, negotiations, compromises, and, probably most of all, ideology to ideology verbal and emotional combat. But, in the end the differences were drowned out, just as the fly over by the four Virginia National Guard jet fighters drowned out the truckers' horns last Thursday, by the necessities of tomorrow.

Along the way there were several flash points:

* The noise and vibration of the pile driving both in the area of Jones Point Park and in the river. The latter was far more annoying to nearby residents given the decibel levels that resounded throughout the area like a huge bongo drum being played by Johnny One

* The falling ceilings in Hunting Terrace, their subsequent repairs, and the eventual relocation of the residents. That was coupled with the demolition of one of Hunting Towers' multi-level buildings and the ongoing negotiations with residents in the remaining towers and Porto Veccio about noise, vibration, dust, etc.

* The environmental impacts of the bridge on Little Hunting Creek, the marsh lands, and Cameron Run. Some still see the bridge construction as a major contributor to the flooding of Huntington, although there is no scientific documentation to substantiate those suspicions.

* The mitigation funds and how they were and are to be used both in the context of Jones Point Park didn't happen either. and other potential areas throughout Alexandria. Those discussions

* The design, original and ultimate, of the so-called Urban Deck

and the adjacent Freedmen's Memorial Park and Cemetery. The completed Deck was dedicated last summer, but its landscaping was only recently completed. That landscaping remains a sore point with many, as does the absence of benches on the Deck. The Cemetery Memorial is probably one of the most positive aspects of the project's by-products.

* The construction, design and placement of various sound walls, both on the bridge's north span and in the Route 1/Church Street areas, have almost had a life of their own. Gaining the new laminated, see-through wall on the bridge was a hard fight with the National Capital Area Planning Commission due to their overprotective reaction to the bridge's aesthetics. It's up. It looks good. And, it does the job. The Route 1 walls remain a work in progress.

* Lane switches, asphalt laying procedures, opening and closing of interchange ramps, and various Route 1 bridge and access/egress approaches have all contributed their fair share of migraine moments for motorists and project personnel, as well as City, State and Federal officials over the course of the last seven years. And that will continue until 2013 when the final leg of the total project, the Telegraph Road Interchange element, is scheduled for comple-

When that dedication takes place, and the entire Woodrow Wilson Bridge Project is complete, the ultimate test of a return on investment will commence. Will traffic, both commuter and through elements, actually be eased or will volume be such that there will be little noticeable difference to drivers?

One of the primary arguments put forth for the construction of a new bridge was that the old one was literally disintegrating from traffic concussion for which it was not designed. The primary cause of that concussion factor was the increase in large tractor-trailer crossings, according to traffic analvsts. The concussion from one, fully-loaded, 18-wheeler was comparable to 200 automobiles, they maintained.

Many argued for an outer loop, primarily in Maryland, to connect with and replace the existing Route 301, crossing the river well south of the National Capital environs. That didn't happen.

Others pushed for a tunnel instead of another bridge. That

Weber Builds Tournament From The Grassroots

Alexandria native nearing retirement after showcasing top AAU talent for the past 18 years.

ess than a month ago, Charlie Weber sat in a plastic chair at American University chatting on one of his two cell phones. On an overcast, chilly Sunday, the grayhaired, tournament coordinator was locked inside, at the forefront of the entrance of Bender Arena.

Yet as time passed, the everchanging basketball nucleus barely recognized him. A few coaches chatted him up, but mostly the hordes of players passed him unknowingly.

Weber's world is the sometimes filthy, but necessary arena of amateur basketball, where desperate

college assistants gawk at teenage basketball players, some of who aren't old enough to possess a driver's license. On championship day, the spectacle is always on the court, where coaches are scribbling in their final evaluations and kids are battling for a coveted chance at the ultimate prize a Division I scholarship.

"Over the years plenty of kids have used his events as a platform to further their reputations and in turn earn college

scholarships," said Dave Telep, Scout.com's national recruiting director.

While the coaches confer on the railing overhead, like scientists watching lab mice, Weber sits in the shadows. A Brooklyn-styled Gatsby, he has grown to dread the inevitable headache that the nearly 190-team tournament, which bears his name, causes.

"You're worried about everything that could go wrong, from a father coming out of the stands and punching a player to a fist fight between a referee and a coach, and teams showing up where they're supposed to be," Weber said.

After a cycle of three concurrent games finished, one featuring the second tier team of Hamptonbased Boo Williams — with T.C. Williams guard Edward Jenkins, and another of much-publicized D.C. Assault, Weber took a glance at a massive three-ring binder, trying to synchronize eight tournaments trees that bent in awfully awkward angles.

"Just make sure the referees get to Gallaudet (University)," Weber said wildly, trying to simultaneously hold three conversations. Another coach, whose team had just won an overtime semifinal thriller, demanded that there was no plausible route across Wisconsin Avenue that would have had his team ready to play in less than 20 minutes.

Weber, exhausted from the month-long blitz of sleeplessness leading up to the first of two tournaments over consecutive weekends, simply sighed.

"People get lost," Weber said later. "You're getting telephone calls from coaches who haven't shown up so you have to break out directory, and ask 'where the hell are you?' There's always a problem somewhere."

IN 1990, Weber worked for the Department of Labor, alongside now-New Mexico governor Bill Richardson while his wife Jo worked exactly a floor higher for the Department of Foreign Affairs.

Fate tugged the pair — who will celebrate their 38th wedding anniversary in July - to Washington, D.C. from their native New York City in 1971. Circumstance would later expose the couple to AAU basketball, when recruiting analyst Bob Gibbons initially asked Weber to interview athletes about their prospective colleges.

At a Nike-sponsored event in Princeton, N.J., Weber met then-University of Maryland assistant Billy Hahn, when the college assistant casually conjured up the idea of a small tournament hosted at Cole Field House after a church service.

"I told him I wouldn't know how to start a tournament," Weber said.

He did, first starting with 12 squads spanning the Mid-Atlantic, with teams traveling from both Tennessee and Boston. Weber remembers buying pizza for Rasheed Wallace, then a lanky high school junior and baby-faced high school freshman Ron Mercer, both of whom eventually morphed into

The next year, the event ballooned to 16 teams and soon thereafter Ron Stewart, a then-assistant for Lon Kruger at the University of Florida, coaxed Weber into coordinating a Florida-based tournament. Before he knew it, Weber's tournaments, one of which he co-coordinated with Gibbons, were considered premier stops on the summer circuit.

The shoe contracts, a necessary evil in the grassroots basketball landscape, came calling. First, it was adidas, then Nike, back to adidas to Converse, and then his final one with adidas, which terminated on Dec. 31, 2007. Included in the deals were 10,000 T-shirts, 48 pairs of shoes, 60 golf shirts, a \$2,000 clothing allowance and cash.

Relationships with high school, AAU and college coaches were soon cultivated, and by the late 1990s, Weber was a mild influence in where and more importantly, which kids would be showcased.

His premier annual event became the Charlie Weber Invitational, held annually in September, then one of the most pivotal recruiting months of the season. Weber relayed a message from then-UMass head coach John Calipari, who said his tournament

"was like a convention, where you had to show up."

WEBER WAS ON TOP when his relationship with Gibbons deteriorated beyond repair in 2000. In

the ego-driven, money-grubbing business of amateur hoops, the abrasive pair went their separate ways, and despite a decade-long partnership, have had one cold conversation since. So Weber and Jo, who was part-secretary, partfill-in, carried on alone, before a coaching coalition — he's convinced that was spearheaded by Roy Williams and Mike Krzyzewski — lobbied the NCAA to erase the September team evaluation period. Weber thinks the ruling was based on jealously of other ACC coaches, who argued that U-Md. received an unfair advantage by

having recruits attend the tournament on campus. After all, four of the five starters from the Terrapins' 2002 championship season had played in Weber's crown jewel of a tournament. So in 2002, Weber's event became irrelevant overnight. Instead of having teams beg for an opportunity to fork over the \$595

athy Jenkins started coaching the St. Stephen's & St. Agnes girl la crosse team in 1976, before her current roster was even born. But the current roster, some of who are daughters of former players, capped a perfect season for the legendary coach.

Jenkins received her 500th win as the Saints completed an undefeated season by blasting fifth-seeded Episcopal, 19-3, on Friday and second-seeded Collegiate School on Saturday at the University of Richmond.

The Saints finished the season with a school-record 26 wins, which is also the best according www.laxpower.com. According to the same Web site, SSSAS currently holds the No. 2 national ranking behind Maryland's John Carroll School, though it could still change.

But over the weekend, the focus was on Jenkins and her 501-41-9 career record that includes 20 Group AA Independent School League championship seasons. The players weren't notified of Jenkins' milestone win until there were three minutes left in regu-

"It was awesome," said girls athletic director Samantha Eustace, who also serves as an assistant coach. "The parents had bought T-shirts and had flowers, balloons and cake. She was very excited. It's been a special team for her.'

After the state championship — the Saints second victory over Collegiate this season

the players were emotional that the season was coming to a close.

According to Eustace, the group of 11 seniors, nine of which are headed to play Division I next season, was a unique crop.

"They were crying before game was even over," Eustace said. "They were tears of something great that was coming to an end." "These players, and especially these seniors, have made this season so special," Jenkins said after the game.

Eustace echoed the head coach's sentiments, saying that talented group bought into the team philosophy.

"This particular group of seniors and particular the captains have just been wonderful," Eustace said. "It's not about any individual person or the accolades. It's been about the team from the very beginning."

Four days prior to the state title, the Saints pounded Georgetown Visitation for the second time to capture their 14th consecutive ISL-AA title. Senior Hadley Lankford, who finished the season with school-record in assists, had five goals in the ISL final. Kelly Austin and Charlotte Davis added four goals as SSSAS cruised after amassing a 10-3 halftime advantage. The Saints haven't lost a league game in over a decade.

In the fall during field hockey, many of the same girls, including mega-recruit Annie Taylor (University of Virginia) helped Marsha Way get her 300th victory. The Saints also won the ISL-AA regular season, ISL title and VISAA state championship.

"For these seniors, they've won everything," Jenkins said.

that hovers between genuine enjoyment for being a senior member of basketball's inner fraternity and another that bites on the bitterness of what it's become.

"The whole mentality is that all of these kids think they're God's gift to the world," Weber said. "They're all looking at it now and saying, what's in it for me?"

A few moments later, he's telling stories of Hakim Warrick, now of the Memphis Grizzlies, who probably would have never received a scholarship had it not been for a can't miss weekend at the fall tournament. Or conjuring up names surrounding former show executive John "Sonny" Vaccaro like Carlos Boozer and Lamar Odom, or even sagas from lesser-known recruits like Will Solomon (Clemson) and Jerome Harper.

Or tales about how a father spilled magic marker all over Williams, who was sitting in the rafters not wanting to be bothered, or how Calipari should be a stand-up co-

During the near-two hour conversation, Weber again flashed a level of resentment, saying he can't keep up with other tourna-

ments that offer financially laced incentives in exchange for kickbacks or how the lack of a shoe contract deters his credibility.

"I'm glad that my career in this is coming into the final stages because I'd hate to be starting out," Weber said.

But weaving through the conversation, he harks on a life-altering experience, when a routine surgical procedure turned into a month-long hospital stay.

During the ordeal, he received 142 emails and even more concerned phone calls from the basketball brotherhood, some from current coaches like Matt Doherty and Mike Brev, and others from diverse contacts sprinkled across the nation.

"I was never so emotional in my entire life," Weber said when reading them all at once. Still though, Weber realizes his 18year run is nearing its final chapters.

"It's going to hurt me to walk away from this, whether it is this year or next year because you develop relationships," Weber said. "I know it's going to happen because it's the nature of the way these things work. You're going to end up being separated from the fraternity."





in his board matter. "The rear setbacks in this R-4 zoning district are 25 feet. Why did this lot not have to comply?" he queried.

McKay even went so far as to have the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) assure him that their right-of-way had not been encroached upon. "All is OK," said VDOT, even though "the exact setback from the three-lane Backlick Road was a mere 10 feet."Then on May 5, two and half months after McKay first sounded the alarm, "staff found the errors in the permit and on the site," McKay pointed out to his colleagues on the board.

"They (staff) told me that a "series of mistakes were made," that "the lot is unique," that "changes in the way plans are reviewed have already been implemented" and that "technical staff have received updated training," McKay said.

"And, because of that, the string of egregious errors on this site continued unnecessarily. It also defies common sense that setbacks are not routinely verified by our building officials during construction and that significant changes to building plans can, in some cases, be approved on site," McKay stated.

A stop work order has been issued on the construction and the owner has two choices, according to McKay: Correct the setback violation along the Backlick Road boundary; or apply for a special permit from the Board of Zoning Appeal for error in building location.

"There is much work that needs to be done to restore the community's trust in our building review process. We are the eyes and ears of the community and many times the community knows better than staff when something just does not seem right," he said.

Citing the progress made by the County Strike Team in restoring "County credibility" in code enforcement, McKay warned his colleagues, instances like this can "unravel all our progress."

He moved that the County Executive "initiate a comprehensive study of setback enforcement procedures and include the lessons learned in this case in the Housing Compatibility recommendations that are scheduled to come back to the Board later this summer."

six times with bullets designed to fragment inside the body.

After he had been shot, Rogers' car crashed into a parked car in the neighborhood

"[Bloxham] thought he was going to get away with it. He just didn't think that Todd would live that long," said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Kathryn S. Swart during Bloxham's trial in March.

Rogers lived just long enough to identify his killer.

A resident, who was having tea with her in-laws, said she was called by a neighbor who told her somebody had hit her truck. When she went to inspect the street, she saw a man with a hooded sweatshirt running away from Rogers' car with a duffel bag in hand.

Rogers, bleeding from wounds from the six shots fired at him, kept blowing the horn, she said

She used a towel to try to help slow down the bleeding. Rogers was pale and his voice was quiet, "like he was gasping to get out everything he said," the neighbor testified.

"He asked me to call a phone number, to tell them that 'Todd had been shot and that

John did it," she testified.

The number she called rang to Rogers' parents.

FAIRFAX POLICE ARRESTED Bloxham, after going to his residence on Memorial Street off Route 1 in Mount Vernon. When Bloxham answered the door, police smelled a strong odor of gun cleaning solvent around Bloxham, who initially told police he had been cleaning his gun after a day of shooting and white-water rafting in West Virginia.

At trial, he and his attorneys claimed self-defense.

"It is ironic that the defendant and the victim had two things in common: one, Carrie, and, two, the church," Swart said during Friday's sentencing hearing. "Todd Rogers was taught, he lived the lessons every day, and he died. The defendant was taught, he did not live the lessons, and he killed.

"[The defendant] will have to make his own peace with his own God at his own time," Swart said.

Rogers' family is left making their own peace through grief.

Instead of being Rogers' best man at his his brother Scott.

wedding, Russell L. Bowers was a pallbearer at Rogers' funeral.

"Todd truly loved his friends," Bowers wrote, saying Todd and the way he lived life was "an example, inspiration and instructor to me. As I think about my friend, as I often do, I am compelled to be a better man.

Instead of planning a future and family and marriage together, Carrie Johanson, helped plan a funeral and talked with homicide detectives investigating the murder.

"To say that I have been devastated by this loss would be an understatement," wrote Carrie Johanson. "We were so fortunate to have found each other."

"When Todd was murdered, he didn't just lose his current life, he lost his future and, in particular, he lost his future with Carrie," wrote his sister Lisa Rogers. "He lost thousands of sunrises and sunsets, thousands of opportunities to breathe near her and hold her hand. ... He lost all the experiences inherent in marriage and fatherhood, all the joy and pain and vitality that comes with living and rearing a family of one's own."

"I miss Todd and I want him back," wrote


