No to Stimulus Money

Business leaders and Republicans clash with Democrats over stimulus money.

When John Nicholson and his wife opened a flower shop in Arlington 18 years ago, he didn't know much about Virginia's Unemployment Trust Fund. As he monitored the tax over the years, he became concerned about increases even though he hadn't fired anyone or laid-off any of his employees. One year, a big-box retailer fired all its employees before closing and his bill spiked as a result. Now the governor and his Democratic allies in the General Assembly are trying to expand unemployment insurance benefits to part-time employees.

"My full-time employees are rapidly becoming part-time employees because I'm being forced to cut back hours," said Nicholson, owner of Company Flowers on North Pollard Street. "People are getting canned left and right, and this is going to make my unemployment compensation double."

For now, Virginia has said thanks but no thanks to \$125 million stimulus funds made available to the commonwealth's Unemployment Trust Fund. But legislators are bracing themselves for the possibility that Democratic Gov. Tim Kaine might call a special session to overturn the Republican rejection of the stimulus money. Meanwhile, as the governor tries to line up GOP support behind expanding unemployment benefits to part-time employees, Republican leaders convened a press conference to spotlight businesses that oppose expanding benefits.

"Our little shop has paid thousands each year into the Virginia Unemployment Trust Fund, even though we've never laid off anyone in the past 10 years," Nicholson said in a written statement released last week by the press office of Republican House Speaker Bill Howell (R-28). "To cover these

new rate increases when the federal giveaway dollars run out, businesses like mine will be forced to cut back."

THE FIGHT OVER expanding unemployment benefits has taken a sharply partisan tone since the General Assembly's veto session on April 8. Since the General Assembly had convened in February, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act made \$125 million available to the Unemployment Trust Fund. But only if the rules were changed in Virginia that restricted unemployment benefits to full-time workers and people enrolled in a state-approved training program. Last week, Howell assembled a handful of business owners to stand behind the Republican argument for limited government.

"The speaker is trying to find some wedge between the business community and Democrats," said Del. David Englin (D-45) in response to the speaker's press conference. "They have this idea that if you are unemployed, you are lazy."

As Kaine was trying to find Republican support for expanding the unemployment benefits, Howell was trying to build a base of support behind opposition to the proposal. On the line is \$125 million that would otherwise go to the Unemployment Trust Fund, which budget officials warn is headed for insolvency. According to an analysis by the Virginia Employment Commission, the cost for business to pick up the expanded benefits after the one-time federal stimulus money runs out is about \$5 per employee each year.

"It's widely known that a special session would be the best and perhaps only way to overturn that vote," said Del Adam Ebbin (D-49), referring to the Republican-led effort to reject a Kaine amendment during the veto session. "This won't cost employers a dime until the stimulus money runs out."

WITH THE ONE-TIME payment of \$125 million expected to last about five years, Democrats argue that the General Assembly could reverse the benefit extension after the federal money dries up. Until then, they argue, failing to accept the money would be irresponsible because it could pro-

Revival on the Potomac

Area crew teams bask in Potomac River's last annual regatta turned festival.

Crossing over the Key Bridge from Rosslyn into Washington, D.C. Saturday morning, there were the familiar sights of Georgetown University and the row houses that line the historic main drag along M Street.

But if anyone took a glance down towards the Potomac River bank, they might have thought an impromptu village had started. Dozens of tents lined a

quarter-mile stretch of the district shore as thousands of rowers and their families and friends took in the Charlie Butt Invitational, the lone remaining crew regatta to be held on the Potomac River every year.

"It has the feeling more of a festival than an athletic event," said Yorktown coach and event organizer Andy Bacas, who had a bike handy to go back-and-forth along the spectator-filled half-mile cor

Winner of more than \$400,000 in scholarships offers workshop at church.

Curious on how to search for scholarships, 18-year-old Arley Turner attended a scholarship workshop at the Mount Zion Baptist church in Arlington Wednesday evening, April 15. "I'm frustrated with trying to find scholarships and how to get advice on them," Turner said.

Not only was the workshop free, but all students that attended were automatically eligible for the Ragins/Braswell National Scholarship. "My mom had sent me a forwarded email through the PTA about this workshop and I thought that it would be worthwhile to attend. I'm definitely taking all this information with me. I already feel like I have gotten a lot of help," Turner said.

A set up of about 70 chairs were available along with refreshments for the atten-

dants. A total of about 80 people showed up, including both parents and students. All took notes and followed along with the packets provided as Marianne Ragins, president of The Scholarship Workshop LLC, encouraged note-taking. "I always say that the best way to learn is to take notes and ask questions," Ragins said. A visual was provided up front with a power-point.

THE WORKSHOP covered a range of the types of scholarships, research, local communities, directories, search engines and references. With each topic, Ragins provided time for questions and encouraged the students and parents that it is never too early to start looking, "Please, please, please don't wait! Kids as young as six are eligible for scholarships. Start now and always be

47th Candidates Look To Distinguish Themselves

Democratic candidates highlight their experience and differences at debate. **Short Takes**

Creating a distinct identity is vital to any political candidate. In a race between multiple candidates espousing near-identical goals and values, it is vital.

Such was apparent as the five men running for the 47th District seat in the House of Delegates squared off in a debate against one another on Tuesday, April 21 at the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association Building on Wilson Boulevard.

Tackling topics from the impact

of the economic recession on Virginians and Arlingtonians to gay marriage and naming their political influences, the candidates focused on their personal and professional backgrounds to clarify their differences while espousing similar political views.

“When you get all these candidates in there it [becomes a matter of] whose message is most salient,” said Joe Lestingi, the campaign manager for Alan Howze. For Howze, that message was his experience working in Richmond as a senior advisor to then-Gov. Mark Warner and the fact that having grown up in Clarendon and lived in various areas around the state he is well-versed in the issues and needs of the entire state.

Perhaps the most visibly recognizable candidate is 23-year-old Adam Parkhomenko, a lifelong Arlington native who worked on Hillary Clinton’s presidential bid and has used those connections to raise more money than any of his opponents. At last week’s debate Parkhomenko pledged to make the job of the 47th District his full-time job if elected, and challenged the other candidates to make a similar pledge.

“I think the issues facing Arlington right now are too important not to be a full-time job,” Parkhomenko said.

In the most contentious point of the evening, his four opponents each declined to make similar pledges, citing the \$17,640 salary of a delegate as insufficient to raise a family on.

“I think the circumstances for Adam might change, he might settle down, buy a house,” said Patrick Hope.

Miles Grant said that the state constitution created citizen legislators specifically so that the state’s politicians would understand the troubles and concerns of everyday residents, and that professional experience can help legislators be more informed on certain topics.

“I think that [work experience] would be a benefit to me as a citizen legislator, to bring that back with me to the legislature,” said

Grant, who has put clean energy and mass transportation issues at the top of his agenda.

Whoever wins the race for the Democratic nation is expected to be a shoe-in in the general election in a staunchly liberal district. With only six seats needed to be gained in the House of Delegates for Democrats to take control of both houses of the General Assembly in addition to having a Democratic governor, Hope said he thinks a push to use Washington, D.C. lobbyists to raise the necessary campaign funds is in order. The director of Legislative Policy at the College of Cardiology and the founding and current president of the Buckingham Community Civic Association, Hope touted both his experience as a community leader and his experience fighting for health care legislation as being among his defining qualities.

THE CANDIDATES expressed similar views on ensuring that Northern Virginia gets its fair share of tax revenue, extending the right of marriage to gay couples, expanding mass transportation in Arlington including dedicated funding for Metro, weaning the state and the country off of coal to cleaner sources of energy, and expanding health care coverage to those in need.

Helping underprivileged residents is what Andres Tobar posited as his political credentials. The longtime community activist has a wealth of experience fighting for immigrant rights and vowed a willingness to work across party lines if elected, something that Hope said would be essential regardless of the outcome of the upcoming election.

“Whether we take back the six seats or not, Richmond will still be deeply divided,” Hope said.

The candidates preached largely to the converted at the debate as many of the roughly 150 in attendance were supporters or contributors for one candidate or another.

Buckingham resident Wendy DeMegret said she hadn’t made up her mind yet between Tobar and

At a debate between the five candidates running to win the Democratic nomination as the delegate from the 47th House District, topics ranged from gay marriage and political role models, to building coalitions in Richmond and allocating more transportation funding to Northern Virginia to enhance mass transit systems. Below is a sampling of what the candidates had to say on various issues.

“I know what the Arlington way is, I’ve [demonstrated] it, and it’s the way you bring people together.”
— **Patrick Hope**, on building coalitions in Richmond.

“I think the issues facing Arlington right now are too important [for the delegate position] not to be a full-time job.”
— **Adam Parkhomenko**, on why he would make the delegate position his full-time job.

“The top priority has to be getting our economy moving again.”
— **Alan Howze** on his priorities if elected.

“I don’t think we can really afford to stay on coal.”
— **Miles Grant**, in explaining why he opposes a proposed coal-fired power plant in the Hampton Roads area.

“What has been created here because some people are not able to get a license [is that] many people are driving without a license. It is absurd to be dealing with it in this way. It is a safety issue, not an immigration issue.”
— **Andres Tobar**, on not issuing driver’s licenses to illegal immigrants.

Hope and said that her most urgent question wasn’t answered.

“I want to know ... what [the candidates] can really do to generate jobs in the legislature,” DeMegret said.

Arlington resident Frank Sitzen said afterwards that he is deciding between Hope and Grant, though leaning towards Hope. He said the most important issues to him are providing health care coverage to vulnerable populations and getting new blood into the legislature in the form of a representative who is willing to build cross-aisle coalitions.

“That’s what Arlington needs to do, is send someone to Richmond who [is] going to fight for these critical issues,” Sitzen said.

vide assistance to the increasing number of people who are finding themselves out of work. But Republicans counter that saying no to the stimulus money was the right thing to do. The dispute is unfolding with a backdrop of a looming election for all members of the House of Delegates.

“Our bottom line is that we don’t put our finger in the air to see which way the wind is blowing,” said Howell at the April 23 press conference. “We try to do what’s right for Virginia, what’s right for the workers in Virginia, what’s right for the economy in Virginia. At the end of the day, voters will recognize that.”

persistent. Never give up," Ragins said.

Along with the types of scholarships, Ragins emphasized that no matter what, there are scholarships available for everyone. "If you do the research and stay persistent, you will see that there are great possibilities for every student; whether in middle school, high school or even college. Hey, if you're tall there's a scholarship for you, if you're into science there's another one. Do the research and I will guarantee you that you will find something for you," Ragins said.

One main focus concerned community service. "I cannot stress it enough, especially to you students. Community service is a great advantage when applying for scholarships. Not only do you stand out, but it separates you from other students that may have the same grades and such," Ragins said.

STUDENTS RAISED their hands and asked questions about specific community services and what

would be best. "Any services is good. But make sure you show commitment. Stay with one and do others as well on the side. But if you show that you have dedicated a certain amount of hours to one community service, it will definitely work to your advantage," Ragins said.

Norma Green, a parent of a ninth grader, found the information was very useful. "I am definitely overwhelmed with what goes into scholarships, however I feel great to have the privileged to have learned about them. I am

definitely going to take advantage of what I have learned and it's refreshing to know that people are willing to help," Green said.

Jazmyn Moore, 17, a high school student also found the information helpful. "This was a really good workshop and I learned a lot from it. Marianne was very open to questions and went to a lot of great detail on how to be successful," Moore said, "I am going to make the efforts to get more organized and getting ready. All About Atmosphere

Tennessee Williams' 1972 drama, "Small Craft Warnings" is all about the atmosphere you would expect in a seedy bar along the coast of California. It is not so much about plot as it is about the feeling of the place and the types of people who congregate there. To create that atmosphere, director Jay Hardee and his co-designer Karen J. Sugrue stage the play not in the theater at the Clark Street Playhouse, but in the lobby which they turn into a dive, complete with a cash bar for the audience members.

With all the theatrical devices at their command, they really do make you feel you are in "Monk's Place" somewhere along the Pacific Coast Highway where the locals while away the evening as a storm threatens outside. Inside the lights are low and smoke is thick, thanks more to stage mist than to cigarette smoking.

On the juke box, the choices include all the songs you might expect of that time and that place plus one surprising addition: Jascha Heifetz playing Tchaikovsky's "Serenade Melancholique" provides the soulful near mourning feel that at least one of the ladies in the bar covets.

While there is not much of a plot to the play, the characters are all intriguing as brought to life by a talented cast. There's John C Bailey as the "Monk" who lets his patrons argue all they want but draws the line when they get too close to violence. Kari Ginsburg is the hot tempered woman who has just about had it with her swaggering sex object, played with vigor by James Finley. Joe Palka is a doctor drown-

ing his memories of cases not cured in glass after glass of brandy only to be called off to deliver a baby. ("Give me one more brandy to steady my hands" he says.)

Into the mix comes Christopher Henley as one of Tennessee Williams' flaming gay characters, a minor movie mogul with his young companion of the moment, Thomas Wood. Their break up provides some of the few plot-driven moments of this atmosphere play.

Before the play even gets started the audience is immersed in the atmosphere of the evening. Bailey as "Monk" is already behind the bar and Palka is already downing brandies. Mundy Spears, who plays a young woman with a deep psychological problem, and Brian Crane who hovers about her for most of the play as an almost equally disturbed would-be partner, are already interacting among the tables. Indeed, Crane's behavior in the bar before the play actually gets under way provides a clue about that relationship.

This being Tennessee Williams, sex and sexual compulsions play a part in the evening so audiences should expect a few moments that would not be appropriate for younger people. There is a brief flash of buttocks and a few simulated sex acts but Hardee avoids placing too much reliance on these moments. Instead, it is the overall atmosphere of a night in a seedy spot that marks this production.

ridor that equated to bleachers. Bacas, a Washington-Lee graduate who rowed for the Generals 35 years ago under coach Charlie Butt, remembers when every crew race in the area took place on the Potomac, either in Georgetown or down by Alexandria. Butt established the W-L crew program as the first in the area 60 years ago in 1949.

In recent years, though, the Virginia Scholastic Rowing Association (VASRA) has de-emphasized regattas on the Potomac in favor of the Occoquan River, which is larger, and therefore can accommodate more teams. For example, a race on the Occoquan can have six lanes of boats, whereas the Potomac has the capacity for just four lanes. The only problem is most boathouses on the Occoquan are at least 30 miles outside the area.

And while many of the coaches and athletes on hand Saturday agreed that regattas held in the city are logistically more difficult, preserving the tradition and ambiance of crew along the banks of the Potomac is more important.

It's not every venue that has the Kennedy Center as a backdrop and is easily accessible for a vice president like Joe Biden, who was on hand to watch his granddaughter race for Sidwell Friends, one of 18 schools along with Arlington's Yorktown, Washington-Lee, and Bishop O'Connell to compete in the regatta.

"I think it's really important that we hold these high school regattas where the city of Washington and the surrounding suburbs can actually see it happening," said Bacas, who is one of several W-L alums that have moved on to the coaching ranks. "The sport needs to keep selling itself as a highly valuable activity with participants and parents, but if we compete in visual obscurity all the time, the

Charlie Butt Invitational Results

In an event named after a legendary Arlington-based coach, the county's schools — public and private — made sure his legacy could be felt with the quality of rowing each was able to muster along the Potomac.

The Yorktown boys' team stole the show, not only winning the varsity men's first eights race by more than four seconds, but also taking home the crown in the second eights race by a margin of nine seconds. It was the third-straight year in which the Patriot first eights won this regatta, which is a new school record.

Washington-Lee was led by its men's second eights boat, which came in second place behind Yorktown. The Generals' varsity men's first eights and women's first eights and second fours all came in third place. Meanwhile, O'Connell finished in second place in the men's first four race. T.C. Williams won both the first and second eight races on the girls' side.

The VASRA state championships take place on May 9, while the Stotesbury Cup Regatta — one of the biggest crew events in the country — takes place the following weekend on May 15-16.

city never gets to see what the kids do."

Yorktown senior Ian Suvak's story illustrates just how popular the sport of rowing has become in this area of late. Born in Osijek, Croatia during the Croatian War of Independence from Yugoslavia, Suvak was one of several people from his hometown to join a rowing team there.

"It was learning to row, not competitive," according to Suvak, "since everybody who did rowing in my town was on my team."

But after moving to Arlington in 2005, Suvak joined the Yorktown crew team and has since become one of the top rowers in the area,

helping lead the Patriots' first varsity eight boat to a first-place finish Saturday. Next year, he'll move onto the Yale crew team, one of the most prestigious programs in the country.

"When I describe myself, rowing is a big part of me," said Suvak "It's helped me in school and I wouldn't be going to the school I'm going to if it weren't for rowing."

It's athletes like Suvak that have had Bacas and other area coaches advocating for a new boathouse along the Potomac for years. Currently all three Arlington high school rowing teams house their boats in the Thompson Boat Center, sharing the space with

Georgetown, George Washington, nine other high schools and several rowing associations.

To say it's cramped would be an understatement and that was part of the reason Saturday's festivities took all day. T.C. Williams rowing coach and Yorktown teacher Jon Schildknecht graduated from high school in this area in 1992. Back then, he said there were about 12 schools with crew teams.

Now that number is more than double with "30-plus" around the area to go along with a burgeoning rowing scene in the Richmond and Chesapeake areas. And yet, the number of boathouses along the Potomac has remained the same for the past three decades.

"We don't have the infrastructure anywhere," said Schildknecht. "Even the Occoquan can barely handle the number of people that use it."

"The rowing community around here is in desperate need of a new boathouse," said Bacas, who added that several proposed sites and private funding from Georgetown University have been shot down by the National Park Service, which controls much of

the land along the Potomac River. "This is a growing sport and to allow more kids to participate in a complete way, we need to solve the overcrowding."

OVERCROWDING the shoreline was not a problem on Saturday, though. In addition to the many friends and family members getting to see a regatta for the first time — because regattas on the Occoquan are harder to get to and take place mostly in seclusion until a final stretch that has grandstands — there were also those who were simply out enjoying the great weather and stumbled upon a race.

Inside and around the shoreline tents were plenty of food for post race consumption and tons of school spirit. Everyone was in a festive mood as the Potomac River's big day took flight.

"It's a beautiful venue and it's a really great way to spend an afternoon," said Yorktown senior coxswain Elliot Oakley, who was also a member of that winning men's varsity eight boat. "Coming down the Potomac in first place, there's nothing like it."


