Banking on Young Experience

Through local partnership, Franklin Sherman students get first-hand look at banking industry.

When fifth-grader Meaghan O'Reilly interviewed for a job as an assistant bank manager, she said, "I was a little nervous because, you know, you're in this big room with all these important people."

She got the job and now helps to oversee operations at Franklin Sherman Bank, which is open every other Monday during lunch hours in the Franklin Sherman Elementary School cafeteria.

The school bank is backed by Chain Bridge Bank, which opened less than two years ago in downtown McLean. "The entire community wins in a project like this," said Chain Bridge Bank Senior Vice President John Vogt, whose two children work at the in-school bank. "Sponsoring an in-school bank is a perfect project for a community bank."

A COUPLE OF YEARS AGO, members of the school's PTA had heard of another school partnering with a bank and had been discussing the idea as a way to teach students about money and saving, said PTA

member Sophia Bruner.

Now, the bank has been open since October and business is good. About one-third of the students in the school have opened accounts at the bank, "which is very good for the first year," Bruner said.

Each of the 28 students, grades four through six, who work at the bank had to interview for the job before a panel that included the school's principal and assistant principal, a PTA member and Chain Bridge bank officials. "For the children to be sufficiently brave to do that was not insignificant in and of itself," Vogt said.

Bruner said some children had arrived at the interview with references from neighbors for whom they had done work such as dog walking.

"Some of them came very prepared," said Principal Vicki Duling, noting that one student discussed previous work at a snack bar. "They all take it very seriously."

The children were hired for three different positions — tellers, assistant managers and marketing specialists.

"The kids actually run the bank and we're here to oversee and make sure everything's running smoothly," said Chain Bridge Bank Branch Manager Heather Schoeppe.

Three Chain Bridge Bank representatives, as well as Bruner or another PTA member and a member of the school's staff, are on hand when the bank is open.

As incentive, Chain Bridge Bank offered

students an unheard-of interest rate of 5 percent on their savings. "Obviously, it's non-economic from a profit perspective, but it's a wonderful example of the type of re-investment banks should be making in their communities," Vogt said. The bank also donated hats and aprons for employee attire, as well as candy to be handed out to depositors. Also, Chain Bridge Bank officers often teach lessons in financial literacy in the school's classrooms. "In addition to the arithmetic skills is the importance of saving that fits with the curriculum," Vogt said. His bank's employees teach the children lessons on concepts such as opportunity costs and needs versus wants.

The in-school bank is deposit-only, and students can make withdrawals at Chain Bridge Bank if a parent goes with them.

However, they can view their accounts online anytime, and statements are mailed home each quarter.

Bruner said the account statements, which tell students how much interest they have earned, reinforce saving and are usually followed by an influx of deposits.

After less than two hours of operation on Monday, April 27, the bank had taken 23 deposits and opened several new accounts.

THE SCHOOL has also incorporated the theme of banking into its field trips this year. In January, the entire school took a field

Scams Blossom in The Spring

Police advice: take precautions against scam artists.

The warm weather brings out more than just flowers as scam artists take to the streets of McLean to cheat senior citizens out of big money. Posing as tree trimmers or driveway sealers, they prey on vulnerable homeowners, often stealing checkbooks or money from the house while the owner is distracted. Unlicensed and uninsured, they offer unreasonably low prices for their work, but later raise the prices to overcharge for shoddy or non-existent work. Citizens can take some simple precautions to protect themselves from these scam artists and help the police put them out of business [see the sidebar].

The scams begin when the homeowner answers a door-to-door canvas by the scammer who offers to do work for a low price. Usually based out of an unmarked pickup truck, the one or two scammers solicit your business. The pitch may be that a tree needs trimming, the asphalt driveway needs sealing or the chimney needs work. They may even claim to have already performed some repairs and want payment. A low price is quoted (perhaps a few hundred dollars), but after the work begins, they come back with a "re-estimate" at a much higher amount, usually in the thousands. Elderly victims may not be willing to contest the new price and will pay. Other times one scammer may distract the victim while the other scammer enters the house from another door and takes valuables. Generally, the owners do not discover until much later that checks from their checkbook have been written and cashed by the scammer.

The homeowner can begin to protect him or herself by demanding to see the license and bonding of the worker. Without a contractor's or solicitor's license, the scammer cannot sell anything. They rely on their "cold call" approach to surprise or shock the owner into accepting their offer. Without insurance or bonding, the scammer may prey upon the homeowner's insurance for injuries occurring while on the job. In addition, the job being requested is often ill defined without a written contract, so that the quantity and quality of work, the materials, and the payment schedule (for partial payments as some work is completed) are subject to disagreement.

The primary goal of the scams is to obtain direct payment of the high price for the substandard job. The secondary goal is to gain entrance to the owner's house for the purposes of stealing money, valuables or a checkbook. The distraction may come in the form of engaging the homeowner in the front yard while a cohort enters the house through a side or back door. Alternately, the scammer may request a drink of

Classic Play Demands Actors' Best

Small cast carries McLean Community Players production of character-driven 'Glass Menagerie.'

Not a whole lot happens in "The Glass Menagerie," one of Tennessee Williams' most famous plays, said Jessie Roberts, who will play the overbearing mother in the upcoming McLean Community Players production of the show. "But the dynamics are just incredible."

In a way, the relatively simple plot is part of the point. The play is about a family that lives in an insular, unchanging world, trapped in the past,

until the arrival of a gentleman caller. The sparse storyline also makes room for the character development that has made the play a seminal work in modern western theater.

"I'm exercising acting muscles I haven't worked in a really, really long time," Roberts said. "And it feels great."

HER CHARACTER, Amanda Wingfield, is a single mother living with her two grown children in St. Louis in the 1930s. "She wants her children to succeed, but she wants them to succeed in her version of success," Roberts said.

Her daughter, Laura, who will be played by Heather Plank, walks with a limp and is painfully shy, spending most of her time with an old Victrola record player and the collection of glass animals that gives the play its name. It's the second time Plank has taken the role, having played Laura in a 2006 production by Rooftop Productions in Manassas. "I wanted to do it again because it's a really demanding role for an actor," she said, adding that the character required her to use every tool in her acting toolbox.

Laura's brother, Tom, played by Derek Bradley, is somewhat of a poet and finds his mother's insistence that her children live up to her expectations stifling, Bradley said, noting that the character is considered to be semi-autobiographical for Williams.

Tom works in a shoe warehouse, and, like his mother, wants more for himself but not necessarily in the sense of moving up the ladder at that job, Roberts said.

Scott Carter plays the only other character in the show, gentleman caller Jim O'Connor. While Tom regards Jim as a sort of emissary from an outside world unfamiliar to the family, Carter points out that his character, who was very successful in high school, is

trapped in the past in his own way.

The play, Carter said, is about examining the role of the past in shaping one's present. "Everything that happens to us really affects and determines who we become," he said.

WHEN PLANNING the 2008-09 season, the McLean Community Players (MCP) Board of Directors decided to start a masterworks series to introduce McLean audiences to some of the most influential works since Greek theater, MCP President Mike Scott said. In that spirit, they decided on "The Glass Menagerie," Williams' first play to hit Broadway and his most autobiographical, Scott said. "There's very little argument that Tennessee Williams is one of the greatest playwrights of the second half of the 20th century."

He added that the group brought in Rick Davis, a senior member of George Mason University's theater faculty, as the

production's dramaturge, working to help the actors and director determine the playwright's intent and the historical context of the script.

Plank is not the only member of the cast and crew who is revisiting the play. During planning discussions, it was mentioned that Rosemary Hartman had directed "The Glass Menagerie" 23 years ago for the Great Falls Players, one of the three groups that eventually merged to form the McLean Community Players, Scott said. She was asked to direct the play again, "and she jumped at it," he said.

"I was very eager to revisit it," Hartman said, noting that producer George Farnsworth had been the stage manager for the previous production and Scott had been the producer.

With more experience, Hartman said, she felt she could bring more to the play. Also, she was excited to try the show in a theater with better technology. The last production had been performed in the Grange in Great Falls.

"I love the play. It's one of my favorite Tennessee Williams plays," Hartman said. "I love the poetry of the dialogue."

"The Glass Menagerie" will show throughout the month of May, beginning this Friday, May 8, at the Alden Theatre in the McLean Community Center.



Hopeful Home Sales

First time homebuyers get shot at affordable homeownership; domino effect helps all homeowners.

A look at the records of more than 1,000 homes that sold in March, 2009 in our area offers a glimpse of a sales at the top and bottom of the market.

In March in Northern Virginia, hundreds of homes, mostly condos and townhouses, sold for less than \$250,000.

About half or more of these were likely foreclosures or distressed properties, but all movement in the real estate market is a good sign, clearing out inventory.

Many of the families whose homes sold and closed in March are now able to move up in the market; there are unusually good prices available on homes at all entry points right now.

In the City of Alexandria, at least five townhouses sold for under \$250,000, with more than two dozen condominiums selling for under \$200,000. At the other end, five homes sold for more than \$1 million.

In Arlington, 14 sales closed for under \$200,000, and 14 more between \$200,000 and \$250,000. There was movement at the high end too, with the sale of one condominium for \$5.65 million, plus eight more homes selling for more \$1 million in March alone.

Looking for a single family home under

\$200,000? Among the nearly 50 March sales under \$200,000 in Sterling were a dozen single family detached homes, with many more under \$300,000.

More than 20 townhouses sold in Herndon for under \$200,000.

In Mount Vernon, the top home sold for \$2.65 million, while nearby a variety of bargains sold for remarkably low prices in the Route 1 corridor, including 29 condos and townhouses for under \$100,000. Twenty more condos, townhouses and duplexes sold in March in the area for between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

In Reston, one condo sold for \$1.1 million, while there were 13 sales of condos and townhouses for under \$200,000.

In Burke, 15 homes sold for under \$250,000 in March, mostly townhouses.

In Centreville in March, 22 townhouses sold for under \$200,000.

In Springfield in March, there were 31 sales

of condos and townhouses for under \$250,000.

In Fairfax Station and Clifton, 22 homes sold for more than \$500,000, with two sales over \$1 million in March. In Lorton in March, 10 townhouses sold for under \$200,000.

In Great Falls, only one home in March sold for less than \$500,000, but there were five homes sold for more than \$1 million.

In McLean, one home sold for \$3.4 million, with eight more homes selling in March for more than \$1 million. A handful of condos sold in McLean for under \$250,000.

In Vienna, eight homes sold in March for more than \$1 million, while nine condos and townhouses sold for under \$300,000.

In the Interests of Public Health

While it's a huge topic for discussion, no one really has any idea what the future holds for us and the so-called swine flu. It's reasonable to predict that in the next few weeks, it will turn up in Northern Virginia.

With the Centers for Disease Control calling for the closing of schools where cases are confirmed, we might well be facing one or more schools that are unexpectedly closed.

But we question whether such a policy is considering all aspects of public health. When an elementary school, for example, is closed, how do families that depend on two incomes

or single parent families cope? In any less affluent area, what percentage of children might be home alone because parents have no sick leave or vacation time?

In middle school, students are nominally more able to be home alone for some period of time, but we know there are consequences to unsupervised adolescents in terms of risky behavior.

Let's take the actions necessary to stem a crisis, but let's not lose sight of other risks in the process.

Protecting Homeowners

The number of home foreclosures in Virginia rose from 24,000 in 2007 to 68,000 last year. As of December 2008, about 20 percent of all homeowners nationwide owed more on their house than its current market value.

These economic realities breed those who wish to prey on homeowners. Reports of such unscrupulous persons posing as mortgage loan modification or foreclosure prevention companies have risen across the nation in recent years. The last thing distressed Virginians need is to be misled by opportunists.

In a phony counseling scam, someone tells you that he can help you negotiate a workout deal or refinancing with your lender if you pay him first. In the end, they take your money and do nothing.

Our office worked to craft new laws, which go into effect July 1, to protect homeowners. One such law will amend the Virginia Consumer Protection Act to make it clear that mortgage foreclosure operators are not permitted to charge advance fees for mortgage foreclosure prevention transactions. Homeowners can protect themselves by avoiding a business that:

- ❖ guarantees it can stop the foreclosure process, no matter what your circumstances
- ❖ instructs you not to contact your lender, lawyer or credit counselor
- ❖ collects a fee before providing any services
- ❖ requires you to make mortgage payments to it as opposed to

your lender or servicer.

All Virginians facing foreclosure are encouraged to work directly with your lender or servicer to see whether a loan modification or other relief is possible. Virginians also may consult with a HUD-approved foreclosure

avoidance counselor, or in the alternative, the Homeownership Preservation Foundation's HOPE Hotline, toll-free at 1-888-995-HOPE.

Consumer protection is an important statutory duty of the Office of the Attorney General, and our staff can help. In an age of increased consumer issues, we all must continue to be educated and vigilant.

water or to use a bathroom. Once inside, any distraction allows one or more of the scammers the freedom to look for valuables.

The scams can take several forms and the participants can even claim to be working for the county or the power company. The most common is the tree trimming pitch. The scammer appears to notice some trees that need work and offers a low price to cut them. Later, while the work is underway, the owner is approached with a new assessment of the amount of work that is required. The price is inflated and the owner may feel obligated to continue with the work. Another type of scam is the driveway sealer who offers a very

low price. The owner gets an apparently sealed asphalt driveway, but in reality, used motor oil has been poured on the driveway, ruining the asphalt and killing any adjacent grass. The repair expenses to fix this mess greatly outweigh any savings offered by the cheap price of the sealing job. A third type of scam is the spring cleanup offer, in which "fertilizer" is spread and "chemicals" are sprayed. In fact, little good is done for the landscape and the owner's money is wasted. Finally, there is the chimney or roof repair scam. Again, a low price is the lure, but the work is of poor quality or perhaps not even performed.



The Tradition Continues

The outstanding sense of community that is still so apparent in McLean today is what started the festival in 1915. Starting out in field adjacent to Franklin Sherman School, the event was sponsored by the McLean School and Civic League, Inc. The league used it to bring the community together to raise funds for various school and community projects.

The first McLean Day began at 9 a.m. and ended at 11 p.m. and included a baby show, dancing, carnival games, performances, refreshments and a "jousting" tournament. Men dressed as knights from the Middle Ages would ride horses at full gallop while attempting to place a lance through a tiny ring. The winner had the privilege of crowning his "lady" "Queen of Love and Beauty." In its early years, the festival occurred on the Saturday preceding the Democratic Primary in August, so it has always been popular with candidates seeking office.

A number of community organizations kept McLean Day going throughout the years until MCC began producing it in the mid-1970s. The Center, which itself was built by the same "community spirit" that began the festival, seemed the perfect organization with which to entrust what has become a community treasure. Put on at the Center's grounds until 1989, the Center relocated McLean Day to Lewinsville Park to better accommodate the growing number of participants it drew each year.





Candidates who are running for a seat on the McLean Community Center's 2009-10 Governing Board will greet residents coming to McLean Day 2009 on Saturday, May 16, at Lewinsville Park. The Center's annual Governing Board Election will be held from 10:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. and candidates will be located at the entrance to the park in order to meet district residents and ask for their votes. Lewinsville Park is located at 1659 Chain Bridge Road.

Seven McLean tax district residents have qualified to run for seats on the Governing Board, which sets policy and provides general oversight for all the facilities and programs of the Center, including the Robert Ames Alden Theatre and the Old Firehouse Teen Center.

Adults vote for adults and teens (ages 15-17) vote for the youth representative who resides within the same high school district, Langley or McLean. Residents of Dranesville Small District No.1 must provide proof of residency,



such as a driver's license or another form of identification, in order to cast a vote.

Three adult positions and two youth positions are open this year. Adult members will serve three-year terms. Youth members will serve one-year terms. One youth member (ages 15 to 17) will be selected from the area served by McLean High School and one will represent the area served by Langley High School. However, youth candidates do not have to attend these schools to serve on the board.





trip to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing to see where money is made.

Next, Bruner said, the students will visit businesses in McLean to see where money is earned, and then they will take a trip to Chain Bridge Bank to see what happens to the money after it has been earned and deposited.

Some of the students already have a good idea.

Now that she is an assistant manager, Meaghan said, "I sort of, like, stand in back and watch and make sure it's correct." She also re-counts the money.

Bruner's daughter Jackie, a fifth-grader and a teller at the bank, said that with each deposit, she counts the money, makes sure the depositor has the correct account number and other information on the deposit slip, seals the deposit in a stamped envelope and gives the depositor a receipt. Then again, she said, "If there's not much action in the bank, we just make posters."

This is normally the work of the marketing specialists, but the students know each other's jobs well

enough to stand in for each other. For example, Vogt's fourth-grade daughter Allie, a marketing specialist, said she occasionally took the place of absent bank tellers. But, she said, her usual work consists of making signs to advertise the bank and helping to decide where to hang them in the school. Allie said she and a friend also make rounds of the cafeteria reminding students that they might have deposits to make.

"A couple of days ago Miss Bruner and I did a rap song for Chain Bridge Bank and it was on the news," Allie said, referring to the Franklin Sherman Elementary closed-circuit news program. The bank's marketing specialists regularly make advertisements for the school's morning news.

Allie said she and the rest of the marketing team were still in the process of coming up with their next marketing strategies, such as the possibility of rewarding a deposit of more than \$10 with two pieces of candy rather than the standard single treat.

"The kids dig it," John Vogt said. "They want to be a part of it and their enthusiasm is infectious."

Governor's Primary: Fight Over Money

How much does McAuliffe's prolific fundraising matter?

Many young adults join political campaigns after graduating from college. Few end up where Terry McAuliffe, a Virginia gubernatorial candidate, found himself during the 1980 re-election bid of President Jimmy Carter.

At the age of 22, McAuliffe rose through the ranks to become national finance director of the Carter campaign, launching a career as one of the Democratic Party's most successful national fundraisers over the next three decades.

"Without question, he is a formidable fundraiser. Terry McAuliffe would be on any list of the top 10 Democratic Party fundraisers," said Dan Keyserling, deputy director of communications at the University of Virginia's Center for Politics.

McAULIFFE was the third Democrat and the fourth candidate overall to jump into the 2009 Virginia Governor's race.

Former Alexandria Del. Brian Moran (D), Central Virginia state Sen. Creigh Deeds (D) and former Attorney General Robert McDonnell (R) have been traveling around the commonwealth raising money in anticipation of their gubernatorial runs for the better part of four years. McAuliffe only emerged as a potential candidate in August and started seriously campaigning in November.

Yet McAuliffe raised more money for his campaign in five months than the other two Democrats, who face McAuliffe in a June 9 primary, were able to garner in three years. McAuliffe also collected slightly more money than McDonnell, who does not face an opponent for the Republican Party's nomination.

According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe had raised a total of \$5.16 million for his campaign as of March 31. Moran had collected \$2.95 million and Deeds had garnered \$2.15 million for their respective campaigns by the same deadline.

McDonnell had raised \$5.14 million by the end of March.

Moran represented Alexandria in the Virginia House of Delegates from 1996 to 2008. During the 2007 state election cycle, he served as the Democratic house caucus chair, traveling around the state to help several of the Democratic Party's current delegates.

Deeds, who is from Bath County and represents the Charlottesville area, has served in the General Assembly since 1982. In 2005, he ran for attorney general and lost to McDonnell by fewer than 500 votes, the closest statewide election in Virginia history.

McAuliffe has never run for an elected office.

"For a candidate like Terry McAuliffe, with such a thin resume in Virginia, money means a good deal. ... Terry McAuliffe needs all the money that he has because the two other [primary] candidates already have a base in this state," said Cordel Faulk, director of communications at the University of Virginia's Center for Politics.

"The person with the most money does not always win. ... It is harder to buy a primary because the electorate is so small. You just don't know who is going to show up," said Faulk.

Moran and Deeds have also pointed out that much of McAuliffe's campaign money has come from outside Virginia.

The McAuliffe campaign states that 17 percent of their candidate's donations come from Virginia, while the bulk of Moran and Deed's donations – over 90 percent – come from inside the commonwealth. According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe's top two individual donors Haim

Saban (\$276,064) and Stephen Bing (\$250,000) live in Los Angeles.

"Terry has raised more money. Fortunately for us, the people who have given him money can't vote for him," said Jesse Ferguson, a spokesperson for the Moran campaign.

The Moran campaign also boasts the largest number of contributions, with 3,867 people and organizations giving money to the campaign so far, according to the Virginia Public Access Project. McAuliffe has had 2,530 individuals contribute to his campaign and Deeds has had 3,437 individuals contribute to his campaign.

Even if McAuliffe has received most of his money from outside Virginia, he is still showing significant fundraising strengths inside the commonwealth.

"I think it is important to note that he outraised both of the other Democratic candidates in Virginia," said Elisabeth Smith, a spokesperson for the McAuliffe campaign.

Of the three Democrats, Moran has raised the most money in Arlington County (\$225,538), Loudoun County (\$51,869) and the City of Alexandria (\$1.1 million) since the beginning of 2008.

But McAuliffe has raised more money during that time period in Fairfax County, Virginia's most populous locality.

According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe garnered \$828,117; Moran received \$502,329; and Deeds raised \$217,001 from Fairfax County residents and businesses during 2008 and 2009.

McAuliffe has also been able to attract local donors who have previously not given to state campaigns in the commonwealth.

McLean resident Hani Masri, who has ties to Bill Clinton, contributed \$100,000 to McAuliffe's campaign, and does not appear to have given money to statewide candidates in the past. Oak Hill resident Jack Xi Deng, who contributed \$25,000 to McAuliffe, also does not appear to be a regular donor in other Virginia races.

Arlington resident Thomas DePasquale, who has contributed to many Virginia Democrats over the years, gave \$35,000 to the Moran campaign and \$10,000 to McAuliffe. Alexandria resident Frank Connor gave \$2,500 to Deeds before contributing \$20,100 to McAuliffe.




