

## Crew State Title: 'Long Time Coming'

**Yorktown crew re-writes local history, wins first-ever state titles after 41 years.**

It's often overlooked amidst the hours upon hours of waiting, anticipation, and preparation that go into a crew regatta like last Saturday's Virginia Scholastic Rowing Championships on the Occoquan River, but ultimately a rowing race comes down to a simple goal: be faster than any other team.

For 41 years, the Yorktown crew had succumbed to this cruel reality, never once taking home a state title thanks to the presence of local powerhouse Thomas Jefferson, who defeated the Patriots last year by a slim 2.4-second margin in the men's varsity first eight race.

After this past weekend, though, the history books will need to be re-written. The Yorktown varsity first eight boat outraced the entire field in the

day's premier event for the first time in school history, in the process becoming the lone state champion from Arlington in the past 20 years. Joining them in the winner's circle were the men's varsity second eight and women's varsity third eight, to complete the most successful state championship meet ever for Yorktown rowing.

"This is the greatest day in Yorktown rowing history," said coach Andy Bacas, who rowed for Washington-Lee when he was in high school and became the Yorktown coach three years ago.

"We had 41 years of Yorktown rowers in

that boat with us," said senior Eric Young, a member of the first varsity eight boat.

**ENCOUNTERING ANYONE** who has ever been a part of the Yorktown crew program since it began in 1968 and their first reaction to what took place Saturday was "long time coming."

As the men's varsity first eight boat approached the shore to dock following their victory Saturday, Bacas thought back to that exact moment a year earlier, when the team neared the shore to accept its silver medal.

His rowers were in tears having just lost

to Jefferson yet again. Sure, it was frustrating to know that a 41-year-old trophy case would remain mostly devoid of state titles, but it was even more demoralizing that the program kept falling short to the same team.

Maybe that was because they put too much pressure on themselves. Last year, Bacas and his rowers devised a plan to start strong and force the issue even more in the middle of the racecourse, but the strategy backfired as Yorktown died down the stretch.

With another year under their belts, the book was thrown out the window and the Patriots "had no planned moves, just constant pressure," according to the coach. Following the memorable finish, the Patriot first varsity eight rowers weren't quite sure how they had done it, but they were sure happy to be wearing gold this time around.

"There's still a whole lot of emotion," said Young. "It feels a lot better than a year ago to be just one place different."

**IT'S BACAS** that many around the program say deserves much of the credit for the revitalization of Yorktown rowing. He took a team that finished fifth in the state in 2006 and in one year had the Patriots in second place, behind only Jefferson.

But as in any sport, becoming one of the best usually isn't the hard part. Becoming the best is where it gets tricky. Rowers and coaches alike point to an annual spring break trip in South Carolina instituted by Bacas, where the team rows seven hours a day for a week, for giving them a boost in

## First Baptist Celebrates 100 Years, Looks to Future

A lot can change in 100 years, but a century after the First Baptist Church of Clarendon was founded it remains, and will celebrate its centennial anniversary this weekend.

The church will celebrate its centennial with an open house for both church members and the community on Saturday, May 16 and the Sunday services will have commemoratively-themed sermons, said Chris Smith, a member of the church.


Smith said he was drawn to the church when he moved to Arlington last year because he had friends there already, but also because the church offers both a traditional contemplative Sunday morning service as well as a contemporary service geared towards younger adult church goers with themes that are relevant for those reli-

giously faithful in modern times.

One thing that has changed over the years at First Baptist is the price of land. When the church was first organized the land on which it sits was purchased for \$850. During the church's recent battle to have a new affordable housing project built on its property, the church was approached to sell the land to developers for as much as \$12 million.

The church plans to break ground in the next year on the 10-story, 116-unit facility that will sell 70 of its units to people who earn 60 percent or less than the median income in Arlington, Smith said. The project, which is to be called The Views at Clarendon, has been opposed by surrounding residential organizations.

# Governor's Primary: The Fight Over Money

How much does McAuliffe's prolific fundraising matter?

Many young adults join political campaigns after graduating from college. Few end up where Terry McAuliffe, a Virginia gubernatorial candidate, found himself during the 1980 re-election bid of President Jimmy Carter.

At the age of 22, McAuliffe rose through the ranks to become national finance director of the Carter campaign, launching a career as one of the Democratic Party's most successful national fundraisers over the next three decades.

During the rest of the 1980s, McAuliffe served as deputy treasurer and director of finance for the Democratic National Committee, and other leadership positions. He was fundraiser for and advisor to President Bill Clinton during the 1990s. In 2000, McAuliffe headed up the Democratic National Convention. He was chair of the Democratic National Committee from 2001 to 2005; he raised money for 2008 Democratic presidential nominee Hillary Clinton and President Barack Obama's campaign.

"Without question, he is a formidable fundraiser. Terry McAuliffe would be on any list of the top 10 Democratic Party fundraisers," said Dan Keyserling, deputy director of communications at the University of Virginia's Center for Politics.

McAULIFFE was the third Democrat and the fourth candidate overall to jump into the 2009 Virginia Governor's race.

Former Alexandria Del. Brian Moran (D), Central Virginia state Sen. Creigh Deeds (D) and former Attorney General Robert McDonnell (R) have been traveling around the commonwealth raising money in anticipation of their gubernatorial runs for the better part of four years. McAuliffe only emerged as a potential candidate in August and started seriously campaigning in November.

Yet McAuliffe raised more money for his campaign in five months than the other two Democrats, who face McAuliffe in a June 9 primary, were able to garner in three years. McAuliffe also collected slightly more money than McDonnell, who does not face an opponent for the Republican Party's nomination.

According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe had raised a total of \$5.16 million for his campaign as of March 31. Moran had collected \$2.95 million and Deeds had garnered \$2.15 million for their respective campaigns by the same deadline.

McDonnell had raised \$5.14 million by the end of March.

McAULIFFE may need all that money if he wants to win the primary against two well-established candidates, according to some political scientists.

Moran represented Alexandria in the Virginia House of Delegates from 1996 to 2008. During the 2007 state election cycle, he served as the Democratic house caucus chair, traveling around the state to help several of the Democratic Party's current delegates win or retain their seats.

Deeds, who is from Bath County and represents the Charlottesville area, has served in the General Assembly since 1982. In 2005, he ran for attorney general and lost to McDonnell by fewer than 500 votes, the closest statewide election in Virginia's history.

McAuliffe has never run for an elected office.

"For a candidate like Terry McAuliffe, with such a thin resume in Virginia, money means a good deal. ... Terry McAuliffe needs all the money that he has because the two other [primary] candidates already have a base in this state," said Cordel Faulk, director of communications at the University of Virginia's Center for Politics.

McAuliffe has never run for an elected office.

FAULK and others are quick to say that McAuliffe's fundraising does not mean that he has more voter support than the other candidates.

In 2006, Sen. Jim Webb (D-Va.) won a Democratic primary against lobbyist Harris Miller, despite Miller outspending Webb.

"The person with the most money does

not always win. ...It is harder to buy a primary because the electorate is so small. You just don't know who is going to show up," said Faulk.

Moran and Deeds have also pointed out that much of McAuliffe's campaign money has come from outside Virginia.

The McAuliffe campaign states that 17 percent of their candidate's donations come from Virginia, while the bulk of Moran and Deed's donations — over 90 percent according to those respective campaigns — have come from inside the commonwealth. According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe's top two individual donors Haim Saban (\$276,064) and Stephen Bing (\$250,000) live in Los Angeles.

"Terry has raised more money. Fortunately for us, the people who have given him money can't vote for him," said Jesse Ferguson, a spokesperson for the Moran campaign. The Moran campaign also boasts the largest number of contributions, with 3,867 people and organizations giving money to the campaign so far, according to the Virginia Public Access Project.

"We built a tremendous network of individual donors and small-dollar donors. They are the ones that are going to fuel this campaign," said Ferguson.

McAuliffe has had 2,530 individuals contribute to his campaign and Deeds has had 3,437 individuals contribute to his campaign.

**EVEN IF** McAuliffe has received most of his money from outside Virginia, the political consultant is still showing significant

fundraising strengths inside the commonwealth.

"I think it is important to note that he outraised both of the other Democratic candidates in Virginia," said Elisabeth Smith, a spokesperson for the McAuliffe campaign.

Of the three Democrats, Moran has raised the most money in Arlington County (\$225,538), Loudoun County (\$51,869) and the City of Alexandria (\$1.1 million) since the beginning of 2008.

But McAuliffe has raised more money during that time period in Fairfax County, Virginia's most populous locality.

According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe garnered \$828,117; Moran received \$502,329; and Deeds raised \$217,001 from Fairfax County residents and businesses during 2008 and 2009.

While most of Moran and Deeds larger Northern Virginia donors are already active in local political campaigns, McAuliffe has also been able to attract local donors who have previously not given to state campaigns in the commonwealth.

McLean resident Hani Masri, who has ties to Bill Clinton, contributed \$100,000 to McAuliffe's campaign, and does not appear to have given money to statewide candidates in the past.

Oak Hill resident Jack Xi Deng, who contributed \$25,000 to McAuliffe, also does not appear to be a regular donor in other Virginia races.

Arlington resident Thomas DePasquale, who has contributed to many Virginia Democrats over the years, gave \$35,000 to

the Moran campaign and \$10,000 to McAuliffe. Alexandria resident Frank Connor gave \$2,500 to Deeds before contributing \$20,100 to the McAuliffe campaign.

**REGARDLESS** of where McAuliffe's donations come from, his campaign said its ability to attract more money will make McAuliffe the strongest candidate to

take on McDonnell in the fall.

"The national Republican Party has kept its promise to throw the kitchen sink into this gubernatorial race. They are bringing in national Republicans like John McCain and Sarah Palin to raise money for Bob McDonnell. Terry is the only one who can compete with that," said Smith.

McAuliffe will not only be able to raise money for himself but also contribute to other Democrats, she added.

"I would look at the amount of support we were able to give Sharon Bulova and Ilryong Moon in recent Fairfax County elections," said Smith. He contributed more than \$16,000 to Bulova.

"All this focus on money, there has been a lot of overkill on it. All three of these candidates have raised a decent amount of money and showed that they can fundraise," said Scott Surovell, chair of the Fairfax County Democratic Committee.

# McAuliffe Receives Celebrity Endorsement

**W**hile political opponents criticize Terry McAuliffe for accepting political donations from wealthy Californians, the Virginia gubernatorial candidate appears to be running toward, not away from, his West Coast connections.

## H1N1 Case Confirmed

The first laboratory-confirmed case in Arlington of the new H1N1 influenza, also known as the swine flu, was reported last week.

The patient is an adult female who is recovering at home, without need for hospitalization. "The Arlington resident is helping us minimize spread of the infection by remaining in voluntary isolation at home," according to Arlington County Public Health Director Reuben Varghese, MD, MPH, in a press release.

The current H1N1 influenza outbreak is caused by an influenza virus not previously detected in humans or animals. Symptoms are similar to those of seasonal flu and typically include fever, cough, and sore throat.

## Money, Money, Money

There are no limits on donations in Virginia; time for change.

Would-be big donors to presidential candidates over the last election cycle know that on the federal level, there are strict limits to how much one donor can give to a candidate: \$2,400 per election to a Federal candidate or the candidate's campaign committee. The limit applies separately to each election, so including the primary and general election, one person could give \$4,800 to one candidate.

Not so in Virginia. You can give as much as you want to any candidate for office in Virginia. So can businesses, political action committees and advocacy groups.

Just five states, Illinois, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah and Virginia, place no limits on contributions at all, according to the National Conference of State Legislators. The only requirement in Virginia is that all contributions of \$100 or more must be disclosed.

Individuals and businesses have contributed in remarkable fashion to the four candidates

vying to be Virginia's next governor, the presumed Republican nominee, former Attorney General Robert McDonnell (R), and three Democrats who will face off in a June 9 primary, former Alexandria Del. Brian Moran (D), Central Virginia state Sen. Creigh Deeds (D) and former head of the Democratic National Committee Terry McAuliffe of McLean.

According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe had raised a total of \$5.16 million for his campaign as of March 31. Moran had collected \$2.95 million and Deeds had garnered \$2.15 million for their respective campaigns by the same deadline.

### EDITORIAL

McDonnell had raised \$5.14 million by the end of March, though he has spent less than the other campaigns because the Republican does not face a primary opponent.

Three of the four candidates for governor in Virginia could have, in their time in the General Assembly, worked for sensible campaign finance reform. Is it meaningful now for these candidates to complain about the fourth candidate's ability to raise huge amounts of money from many sources?

Virginia ranks among the best states in disclosure, but disclosure itself is not enough. The next governor should propose sensible limits on political contributions.

### More Than \$15 Million

By the end of March, candidates for governor in Virginia had raised more than \$15 million between them. The three Democrats face off in a June 9 primary; the winner of the Democratic primary will face Republican Robert McDonnell on Nov. 3.

mandated reporters such as teachers and medical professionals — do take that pause, and then witness something in a child that is unsettling or concerning, they aren't taking a stand and they are often not reporting the incident to local authorities. We're asking everyone to pause, take action and be persistent.

When a call is made to Child Protective Services (and calls can be made anonymously), it usually does not result in a child being removed from his or her home. In

fact, the majority of reports do not even go directly to "investigation" status. They enter a "family assessment" track where local agencies work to connect both parents and children with the resources, support and advocacy they need to build a healthier, stronger family.

By pausing, and then taking action, one person can launch a critical "pause" for a family that can forever change a child's life. It can be a time for those parents to find the help they need to nurture their children and stay together.

Taking a pause is not always an

easy thing to do, but it is always the right thing to do. We've developed a variety of resources to help parents, families and community members learn how to pause for the children in their lives, and they're all available online at our new site, [www.pauseforachild.org](http://www.pauseforachild.org)

The performer might have visited Virginia when The Black Eyed Peas played more college shows, he said. will.i.am is also paying for a student from Delaware to attend college at Hampton University, located in Virginia.

"I am here supporting the next governor of Virginia because my heart says so. I wish he was going to be in California but he is not," said will.i.am about McAuliffe.

The will.i.am event may not have done a whole lot to prove that McAuliffe has deep roots in Virginia, something that McAuliffe, a McLean resident of nearly 20 years, insists is true. But the artist's endorsement caught the attention of people who would not normally pay attention to the Democratic gubernatorial primary.

Eugenia White, a Fairfax County employee, hadn't been paying attention to Virginia's gubernatorial

race at all. She receives daily email updates from the McAuliffe campaign, but she never signed up for them. She thinks she only receives them because she was a volunteer for President Barack Obama's campaign.

Still, the will.i.am appearance caught her eye and White decided that, for \$20, she would attend the event. She also read up on McAuliffe and liked what she learned about the candidate. Now, she is trying to convince her friends to support him in the upcoming election.

"I will do what I can to promote him," said White.

Within a few days, McAuliffe, then chair of the Democratic National Committee, called will.i.am and asked to meet up at the organization's headquarters in Washington D.C. Shortly thereafter, will.i.am started campaigning for Kerry around the country.

"In 2004, there was not another artist who did more than will.i.am," said McAuliffe.

The performer stayed active in politics, campaigning for Obama during the 2008 presidential election. He was also a headliner for the Obama inauguration concert on the National Mall in January.

**AND WHILE** McAuliffe may accept support from wealthy celebrities in California, the candidate made it clear he isn't interested in taking money from Dominion Power's political action committee, even though the utility company is the largest statewide donor to Virginia's political campaigns.

"I have said I won't take a check from Dominion Power," said McAuliffe, who is in favor of wind power and other forms of renewable energy he said Dominion has not been supportive of developing.

The ban does not extend to individual contributions from retired Dominion executives or current Dominion employees that do not come through the political action committee.

According to the Virginia Public Access Project, a nonpartisan group that tracks campaign donations, Dominion executives and employees have contributed, both through its political action committee and not, approximately \$5.16 million to Virginia political campaigns since 1996.

The company is an equal opportunity contributor. It gave about 40 percent of those donations to Democrats and 50 percent to Republicans over the years. Nearly all members of the Northern Virginia delegation to the General Assembly have taken money from Dominion.

Since 1996, Bob McDonnell — the Republican gubernatorial nominee who also served as a delegate and attorney general — has received \$180,717 from Dominion Power. Moran has taken \$46,800 and Deeds has received \$57,200, according to the Virginia Public Access Project.

The Black Eyed Peas first caught McAuliffe's eye when he was watching the group's performance at the Grammy awards in 2004 on television. At the end of the song, will.i.am urged more young people to participate in the upcoming presidential election, where George W. Bush faced U.S. Sen John Kerry (D-Mass.)

# Patriots Have Four, Looking for More

**Yorktown girls lacrosse wins fourth-straight district title, has sights set on regionals.**

**I**t's ironic that the best way to judge just how big the Yorktown girls' lacrosse team's aspirations are this season was to look at how little they celebrated their 17-5 win over Falls Church last Friday in the National District tournament finals.

The victory gave the Patriots their fourth-straight district title, a top seed in this week's Northern Region tournament, and officially cemented their status as by far and away the district's best. But judging from the talk after the game, districts were never really the worry and the scoreboard backed that up. The Patriots won their two tournament games by a combined 31-8 score.

Now it's onto the regional tournament, where Yorktown (11-4 overall, 7-0 district) hopes to prove that it won't be just another National District team to lose in the first round.

"We come from a small district, our name doesn't get out there that much, so just to get our team out there and show them what we have because we're a good team," said National District Player of the Year Hope Barrazotto. "When we play together, we play so well. We've come close to really good teams, so I think we can do it."

**THE OUTCOME** Friday wasn't ever in doubt as Yorktown never trailed and broke

open a tied game midway through the first half with seven unanswered goals. Much of the offensive attack came as a result of penalties taken by Falls Church as it attempted to thwart the aggressive Patriot attack.

Like they have all season long, leading the charge for Yorktown was Barrazotto (three goals, two assists) and senior Katie

Hinsdale (four goals). The pair were both first-team National District selections and play together on a club team during the summer.

Last week Hinsdale signed on to play for Division II Gannon University, while Barrazotto, a junior and also the National District Player of the Year in field hockey



### A Day for the History Books

There were a lot of firsts for the 41-year-old Yorktown rowing program at this past Saturday's Virginia Scholastic Rowing Championships. Here's a rundown of just how much re-writing this year's Patriots have done to the school's crew history.

- ❖ Yorktown's three gold medals and one silver medal at the state championships were the largest haul in school history.

- ❖ Yorktown won the men's varsity first eight race for the first time ever and became the first Arlington school to do so since 1989.

- ❖ Because the men's varsity second eight won the gold earlier in the afternoon, they technically go down as the first heavyweight crew state champion in Yorktown history. The first varsity eight became the second just hours later.

- ❖ Even the second-place women's varsity first eight boat can claim superior status in Virginia since first place went to D.C.-based National Cathedral School. The last time the Patriots medaled in this race previously was a bronze in 2005.


Last year was the first time since 2005 that the Patriots failed to advance in the regional tournament, and this year's team has been hell bent on ensuring that would not become a trend.


