Radio Host 'Dukes' It Out in Fairfax

Local radio personality Chad Dukes releases his first film.

After duking it out with the Junkies at a Spring Break Party and battling the mysterious Mr. X, the Main Event Mafia has finally encountered a worthy adversary: the "Undead World Order."

Pitting the Main Event Mafia, radio personality and Burke native Chad "Nash" Dukes' pro-wrestling troupe, against a rival wrestling team consisting of zombies, the film "The Undead World Order" premiered Thursday night, April 30, before a packed-to-capacity Hard Times Cafe in Fairfax.

Dukes, co-host of "The Big O and Dukes Show," airing on WJFK weekdays from 10 a.m.-3 p.m., created the film after putting together nearly 20 short movies featuring the Main Event Mafia.

"We did have reservations about doing a feature length film, but Chad knows what he wants." Said Beau Schembechler, WJFK sales coordinator and Mafia member. "I've never seen anyone work harder or put as much effort and passion into a side project."

The movie was just the latest in a string of successes for Dukes,

15-Year Sentence for Fair Lakes Rape

Judge, victim reluctantly accept agreement in case that stretches back 17 years.

Neither the judge imposing the sentence, nor the victim on whose behalf he did so, were particularly pleased that Charles Lamonte Pollard received just 15 years in prison for rape, robbery and abduction with intent to defile.

"I received a letter from the victim which indicates that she reluctantly accepts the plea agreement," said Fairfax County Circuit Court Judge David Schell. Doing so closed a horrific chapter in her life and kept her from having to relive her ordeal during a trial.

Actually, Pollard's punishment was a long time in coming because the crimes happened in Fair Lakes in 1992. Because of substance-abuse issues at that time, he "has no recollection of these events," said his attorney, Robert Frank. But the victim will never forget.

On Nov. 3, 1992, a 36-year-old Fair Lakes woman attended an adult-education, Span-

ish class in Falls Church and drove home. She parked her car inside a garage on Hunt Club Circle and began walking toward her apartment complex.

Then, said Deputy Commonwealth's Attorney Ian Rodway, "An individual came up behind her, put his hand over her mouth and something in her neck and directed her back to the garage."

The assailant demanded money and she gave him \$30 from her purse, but that wasn't enough for him. "He walked her behind a car and raped her," said Rodway. "Another car came in and passed by, so he pulled her down, out of sight."

But when he began to rape her again, said the prosecutor, she screamed and he ran away. Later, police collected her clothing and the forensic evidence obtained from her person.

However, the state forensic lab wasn't as technologically advanced then, as it is today, so no arrest was made for almost 16 years. But in August 2004, Det. Mark Pfeiffer resubmitted this evidence to

Virginia's Division of Forensic Sciences.

When it was entered into the Virginia DNA Databank, it matched that of Pollard, of no fixed address. His DNA had previously been entered into the databank after he was convicted of an unrelated felony. "The forensics lab came up with Mr. Pollard as the contributor of the DNA found on the victim's clothing, etc., to the exclusion of better than the population of the world," said Rodway.

On April 18, 2008, police arrested Pollard and charged him with rape, abduction and robbery with intent to defile. On Friday, May 8, in Circuit Court, he was sentenced according to an agreement reached earlier by Rodway and Frank.

Pollard received 20 years in prison, with 15 years suspended, for each charge. Each of these sentences will run consecutively to each other, for 15 years total, and concurrently to the prison sentence Pollard is presently serving in Maryland. If he's released from prison there within the next 15 years, he'll return to Virginia to serve the balance of his sentence here.

Convicted of first-degree rape in Frederick County, Md., Pollard was sentenced to life imprisonment on May 11, 1994. Rodway said he would have to serve 30 years there before the governor would even consider releasing him, and that's not likely to hap-

pen. Pollard has been incarcerated since his arrest in February 1993, so 30 years will have passed in 2023.

Before sentencing Pollard, Judge Schell said it was clear to him that the victim wanted this case resolved and him to accept the plea agreement. "In her letter to me, the victim said, 'This settlement does not establish justice on my behalf, nor on

behalf of other victims, and I want you to accept it with profound regrets,'" read Schell. "I want nothing more to do with this and I want to get on with my life."

He then imposed the sentence, plus five years active probation upon Pollard's release from prison. "There are serious concerns by the victim as to the terms of the plea agreement," said the judge. "But the court will accept it,

in light of the totality of her letter."

Pollard then stood and said he used to be an alcoholic and drug user. "But I'm 50, I've turned my life around now, I'm a Christian and I'm a different person than I was then," he said.

Schell, though, had the last word. "I'm happy you've turned your life around," he said. "But I want you to recognize that this victim has had her life turned around and it can't be undone. ... She'll feel the impact of this the rest of her life."

Fairfax Man Still Wanted Following Sting Operation

A year-long, undercover police operation at a shopping center in Bailey's Crossroads culminated, May 6, in 143 criminal charges. Jeff Baumgardt, 27, of 3100 block of Ranger Road in Fairfax, is wanted on a charge of distribution of stolen property.

Operation Build America was launched in May 2008 to better understand the criminal activity taking place in and around the Build America Shopping Center in the 3800 block of South George Mason Drive. Community concerns of illegal activities in the shopping center, coupled with indicators that crime was in the upswing, were the catalysts for the operation.

According to Fairfax County Police, the investigation successfully infiltrated several criminal organizations and businesses operating around the center. Undercover police officers identified nearly 40 people suspected of criminal activity ranging from property crimes to crimes of violence. The undercover operation successfully recovered stolen firearms and illegal narcotics, including cocaine and marijuana.

15,000 Child Porn Images

U.S. District Court Judge Liam O'Grady sentenced David O. Newman Jr., 45, of Fairfax, to 97 months in prison for receiving child pornography over the Internet.

Law enforcement officials identified Newman during a national investigation of individuals trading child pornography.

Newman's computer had approximately 15,000 images and videos of child abuse, including images of infants and sadistic conduct, according to Dana J. Boente, acting U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia, and Joseph Persichini Jr., assistant director in charge of the FBI Washington Field Office.

The Fairfax County Police Department's Child Exploitation Task Force assisted the Northern Virginia Resident Agency of the FBI Washington Field Office in the investigation of the case, which was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Jay V. Prabhu.

At sentencing on Friday, May 8, in Alexandria federal court, Judge O'Grady also ordered Newman to serve 20 years of supervised release, to undergo counseling and to register as a sex offender following his release from prison.

Prison Time for Remington

Fairfax woman, 18, receives 2-year sentence for distribution of heroin.

One thing became clear during Jessica Remington's sentencing, Friday morning, May 8, in U.S. District Court. She was as much a victim of heroin as a distributor, with her addiction to it only making her existing problems worse.

At the outset, Assistant U.S. Attorney Daniel Grooms recommended she receive a sentence within the federal guidelines of 37-46 months. But in the end, Judge Leonie Brinkema deviated downward and instead sentenced the Fairfax 19-year old to 24 months.

She told Remington she did so "because of your long history of mental-health issues that pre-date the heroin use. But the law cannot excuse the conduct entirely; you need to be held responsible for your actions."

Remington and her friend, Ashleigh Shade, 19, were each charged with conspiracy to distribute 100 grams or more of heroin, in connection with the Centreville-based heroin-distribution ring. On April 8, Shade received the same sentence.

Initially, the pair bought heroin from Centreville's J.R. Quick. But when he was jailed in March 2008, they purchased it in Washington, D.C. Then from March through July 2008, they began regularly distributing heroin in Centreville to a number of people

Quick had previously supplied. He's since been sentenced to 19 years in prison.

BUT THERE'S more to Remington than her involvement with heroin, said her attorney, Bill Reichhardt, on May 8, in federal court. Her family calls her sweet and gentle, and a Fairfax County School Board member described her as "a distinguished, young artist." Yet she had serious problems.

"Her parents watched her spiral downhill for years, due to drug and mental-health issues," said Reichhardt. "[Substance-abuse treatment facility] Crossroads called her 'struggling, but making it.'"

In the heroin ring, he said, there were people who viewed it as a business, people who were addicts and those who knew how to obtain the drug and sell it

for a profit. But, he added, "Shade and Remington were on the periphery of children trying to die, in some respect. When I first met my client, she was 20 pounds less than today, had a wool cap pulled over her head and couldn't make eye contact — but she always told

me the truth."

Reichhardt said Remington was identified as a special-education student in high school, but had "significant, mental-health issues, was expelled from school and enrolled in Mountain View Alternative School [from which she graduated in June 2007]."

In addition, he said, Remington was also diagnosed as bipolar and having depression, plus "She's impulsive and suffers from anxiety disorder, for which she took medication. Then in August 2007, she was given heroin for free and became addicted within three weeks." She attended VCU for its art program but, said Reichhardt, "She didn't last a week there because



as he has made his mark in multiple platforms before this foray into film. In addition to a midday talk show, Dukes, who graduated from Lake Braddock Secondary, is also the creator of "The Fukerton," which was recently named top blog in the 2009 "Best in NoVA" awards.

The success Dukes, born Chad Sisson, has encountered lately is the culmination of years of hard work and a series of disappointments that were largely out of his control. Dukes broke into radio as a student at George Mason University, where he had his own radio show and eventually, through the school, landed an internship working for the Sports Junkies on WJFK. He later moved to WHFS, getting his own show with his current co-host, Oscar "Big O" Santana.

"I've always loved radio," said Dukes. "I've always listened to it. When the Junkies got on the radio, I realized real guys could get on the air. Their show really sounds just like four guys talking and so I thought that if they could do it, then I could do it."

Two years later, in 2005, CBS Radio switched WHFS' format to a Spanish language station, ending Dukes' run at the station. He and Santana then moved to Baltimore to host their show, gaining notoriety when they brought the controversial former Baltimore Police Commissioner Ed Norris on board. However, soon after hiring Norris, the station abruptly cancelled their show, giving Norris his own show instead.

Seeking an opportunity to continue working with

each other, Dukes and Santana moved to Phoenix to host a show on KZON, but, again, Dukes was subjected to a format change, and again he was soon looking for a home. This time, however, the change proved to be for the best, as WJFK brought the two back to the area, where they are today.

"When you have a gig, it makes you tremendously thankful and everyday is a blessing," said Dukes, of the impact of losing a show. "You have to take advantage of the opportunities you're given."

Looking ahead, Dukes plans to build upon what he has started with the Main Event Mafia. Dukes said that while he expected a large turnout at the Hard Times Cafe because of his show's large fan base, the actual number of people that showed exceeded his expectations. So, for the next film in the series, Dukes said that the Main Event Mafia would like to secure a larger venue for the premiere, mentioning the Arlington Cinema and Drafthouse as a possibility.

"I compare the short things we do to television, but this was a big production," Matt Cahill, fellow Mafia member and executive producer of the "Big O and Dukes Show" said. "Hopefully, the next film will be bigger and better and blow people's minds."

Though Dukes acknowledges that the themes of "Undead World Order" may not have the mass appeal he says is necessary to make a living in terms of subject matter, he hopes that skeptics will give it a chance and recognize that Dukes and his cohorts were just trying to have some fun.

"[People should] go into it realizing that we don't take ourselves seriously," Dukes said. "Go into it with an open mind, and you will enjoy it."

Money, Money, Money

Virginia places no limits on donations; It's time for change.

Would-be big donors to presidential candidates over the last election cycle know that on the federal level, there are strict limits to how much one donor can give to a candidate: \$2,400 per election to a Federal candidate or the candidate's campaign committee. The limit applies separately to each election, so including the primary and general election, one person could give \$4,800 to one candidate.

Not so in Virginia. You can give as much as

you want to any candidate for office in Virginia. So can businesses, political action committees and advocacy groups.

Just five states, Illinois, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah and Virginia, place no limits on contributions at all, according to the National Conference of State Legislators. The only requirement in Virginia is that all contributions of \$100 or more must be disclosed.

Individuals and businesses have contributed in remarkable fashion to the four candidates vying to be Virginia's next governor, the presumed Republican nominee, former Attorney General Robert McDonnell (R), and three Democrats who will face off in a June 9 primary, former Alexandria Del. Brian Moran (D), Central Virginia state Sen. Creigh Deeds (D) and former head of the Democratic National Committee Terry McAuliffe of McLean.

According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe had raised a total of \$5.16 million for his campaign as of March 31. Moran had collected \$2.95 million and Deeds had garnered \$2.15 million for their respective campaigns by the same deadline.

McDonnell had raised \$5.14 million by the

end of March, though he has spent less than the other campaigns because the Republican does not face a primary opponent.

Three of the four candidates for governor in Virginia could have, in their time in the General Assembly, worked for sensible campaign finance reform. Is it meaningful now for these candidates to complain about the fourth candidate's ability to raise huge amounts of money from many sources?

Virginia ranks among the best states in disclosure, but disclosure itself is not enough. The next governor should propose sensible limits on political contributions.

Meanwhile, voters should recognize the importance of the June 9 primary, and the November general election.

What We're Up Against

Delegates from rural areas making decisions on issues concerning Fairfax County.

The structure of the Virginia House of Delegates presents challenges for the delegates that represent Fairfax County. The membership of a number of committees is configured to ensure that bills important to our county are heard predominately by individuals who are indifferent to urban and suburban issues.

I have over 30 years of experience in juvenile justice and have made a life long commitment to child safety. As a result, the Gang Unit in Fairfax County approached me to introduce legislation that would prohibit the concealed carry of air soft guns (bb guns and pellet guns). Youth gang members are taking them to school and in some instances, such as in Chesterfield County, have committed armed robbery using these weapons. Some pellet guns can be configured to propel an object by the force of air to almost lethal proportions and they look exactly like real handguns. Together, the Fairfax Gang Unit and I discussed the need to make concealing these weapons, which propel projectiles faster than 350 feet per second, illegal in the Commonwealth without a concealed weapons permit.

Unfortunately, these dangerous weapons can still be concealed legally in Virginia. If caught concealing one in school, a child might face a suspension or expulsion but could not be arrested or charged with an offensive.

This issue is not going away in Fairfax County, and I hope to work with members across the aisle and across the state to find a solution. Public safety is too important to let this issue be dropped.

When I introduced this bill, HB 2227, it was referred to the Committee on Militia, Police, and Public Safety. The bill was heard in front of three rural members of the House of Delegates who sit on the subcommittee. These members, who do not have gang problems in their districts, do not see that the misuse of these weapons represents the possibility of serious permanent injury or death, not to mention the intimidation these weapons presents.

It was of no concern to them that these weapons are dangerous in the hands of gang members and, under Virginia law, are currently defined as "toys." No one made a motion on the bill, and with little recognition of the problem these guns create in suburban communities, the bill died in committee.

This issue is not going away in Fairfax County, and I hope to work with members across the aisle and across the state to find a solution. Public safety is too important to let this issue be dropped.

I bring this to everyone's attention for two reasons. First, breast cancer does occur in 1 percent of men. It is often overlooked delaying diagnosis and worsening prognosis. Second, I am concerned that in this environment of "reforming healthcare," as a means of cost cutting, if reimbursement for these important procedures is already being denied, what will happen when health care is rationed!?

she was withdrawing from heroin — which complicated her anxiety disorder — and was in crisis.”

Making matters worse, he said, “People from Centreville came and encouraged her to continue using heroin and to get it from Richmond. August 2007-August 2008 was horrific for her and her parents. Her involvement in distributing heroin was about five months — and for small amounts for her own use.”

After Fairfax County Police arrested Remington on that charge in March 2008, she was released from jail and her parents tried getting her into various drug-treatment programs. “She went to detox and, one day before she was to go into a residential-treatment program, her parents took her out so she could cooperate with the detectives,” said Reichhardt. “There was a belief she wouldn’t be charged, if she did so.”

The Commonwealth dropped its charges — but then she was charged federally. She was in a residential-treatment facility when she was arrested. “Look at her history when considering her sentence,” Reichhardt urged Judge Brinkema. “She is nine months clean.”

Although she briefly used again while at Crossroads, he said, “What’s remarkable is that she called me and self-reported and kept going with her treatment. The likelihood of recidivism is high; there are going to be slips and setbacks ... and a propensity to drug addiction, which she’ll struggle with until the

day she dies. For a child of her background, her efforts are courageous.”

Reichhardt asked if his client could remain in Crossroads until it’s time for her to report to prison, and Remington, herself, told Brinkema, “Crossroads is saving my life. With the support of God, my parents, sponsor and network, I realize I’m not alone.”

“All my life, I never felt comfortable in my skin and I used drugs to mask my problems,” said Remington. “I couldn’t talk to anyone unless I was high. I made big mistakes and never intended to cause anyone pain. I’ve finally found peace of mind. Sobriety has taught me responsibility. I now have hope that I can live a better life.”

In response, Brinkema said, “I recognize you had many demons in your life, but you’re responsible for coping with them. You’re only 19, but you’re an adult.” She then sentenced Remington to 24 months in prison and said she’d recommend the teen be enrolled in the Bureau of Prison’s 500-hour, intensive, drug-treatment program.

Brinkema also placed her on four years supervised release, provided she stays drug-free, submit to regular drug testing and obtain whatever drug and mental-health treatment her probation officer requires. Remington may be in contact with Shade again, but not with the drug conspirators from Centreville. The judge also let Remington remain in Crossroads until she reports to prison. “You are very young — use this time to get your life in order,” said Brinkema. “You have four years in prison hanging over your head during supervised release.”

Get Ready To Ride

Patriot Harley Davidson readies for annual Rolling Thunder rally.

Memorial Day weekend in the City of Fairfax will once again be kicked off with the roar of over 3,000 motorcycles, courtesy of the Ride of Patriots at Patriot Harley Davidson.

For the 11th year, the dealership on Fairfax Boulevard opens its doors to motorcyclists and veterans from around the area for their parade to the Pentagon, where they will join up with the national Rolling Thunder procession through downtown Washington.

and the Fairfax Deputy Sheriff's Coalition Pipe and Drums and the Fairfax High School Marching Band. The Armed Forces Color Guard will carry the American and Virginia flags into the ceremony at Patriot Harley Davidson, where Anderegg will follow comments from U.S. Rep. Gerry Connolly (D-11); Mo Smith, director of the Fairfax chapter of the Harley Owners Group; Bob DeHaven, CEO of Patriot Harley; City of Fairfax Mayor Rob Lederer; Del. David Bulova (D-37) and State Sen. Chap Peterson (D-34).

FOLLOWING THE ceremony at 9 a.m., the motorcycles, expected to number well over 3,000, will depart east down Fairfax Boulevard to Nutley Street and onto Interstate 66 toward the Pentagon.

On Friday, May 22, riders are invited to join a candlelight vigil at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, sponsored by the national Rolling Thunder organization.

This year, some of the riders departing Patriot on May 24 will be making a special pitstop instead of driving to the Pentagon. At least 50 riders will be attending an event sponsored by Bobby Van's Steakhouse in Washington for 500 disabled veterans and their families at the request of the Department of Veterans Affairs, according to Ken Lyons, Communications Coordinator for the Fairfax Harley Owners Group club.

Governor's Primary: The Fight Over Money

How much does McAuliffe's prolific fundraising matter?

Many young adults join political campaigns after graduating from college. Few end up where Terry McAuliffe, a Virginia gubernatorial candidate, found himself during the 1980 re-election bid of President Jimmy Carter.

At the age of 22, McAuliffe rose through the ranks to become national finance director of the Carter campaign, launching a career as one of the Democratic Party's most successful national fundraisers over the next three decades.

During the rest of the 1980s, McAuliffe served as deputy treasurer and director of finance for the Democratic National Committee, and other leadership positions. He was fundraiser for and advisor to President Bill Clinton during the 1990s. In 2000, McAuliffe headed up the Democratic National Convention. He was chair of the Democratic National Committee from 2001 to 2005; he raised money for 2008 Democratic presidential nominee Hillary Clinton and President Barack Obama's campaign.

"Without question, he is a formidable fundraiser. Terry McAuliffe would be on any list of the top 10 Democratic Party fundraisers," said Dan Keyserling, deputy director of communications at the University of Virginia's Center for Politics.

McAULIFFE was the third Democrat and the fourth candidate overall to jump into the 2009 Virginia Governor's race.

Former Alexandria Del. Brian Moran (D), Central Virginia state Sen. Creigh Deeds (D) and former Attorney General Robert McDonnell (R) have been traveling around the commonwealth raising money in anticipation of their gubernatorial runs for the better part of four years. McAuliffe only emerged as a potential candidate in August and started seriously campaigning in November.

Yet McAuliffe raised more money for his campaign in five months than the other two Democrats, who face McAuliffe in a June 9 primary, were able to garner in three years. McAuliffe also collected slightly more money than McDonnell, who does not face an opponent for the Republican Party's nomination.

According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe had raised a total of \$5.16 million for his campaign as of March 31. Moran had collected \$2.95 million and Deeds had garnered \$2.15 million for their respective campaigns by the same deadline.

McDonnell had raised \$5.14 million by the end of March.

McAULIFFE may need all that money if he wants to win the primary against two well-established candidates, according to some political scientists.

Moran represented Alexandria in the Virginia House of Delegates from 1996 to 2008. During the 2007 state election cycle, he served as the Democratic house caucus chair, traveling around the state to help several of the Democratic Party's current delegates win or retain their seats.

Deeds, who is from Bath County and represents the Charlottesville area, has served in the General Assembly since 1982. In 2005, he ran for attorney general and lost to McDonnell by fewer than 500 votes, the closest statewide election in Virginia's history.

McAuliffe has never run for an elected office.

"For a candidate like Terry McAuliffe, with such a thin resume in Virginia, money means a good deal. ... Terry McAuliffe needs all the money that he has because the two other [primary] candidates already have a base in this state," said Cordel Faulk, director of communications at the University of Virginia's Center for Politics.

McAuliffe has never run for an elected office.

FAULK and others are quick to say that McAuliffe's fundraising does not mean that he has more voter support than the other candidates.

In 2006, Sen. Jim Webb (D-Va.) won a Democratic primary against lobbyist Harris Miller, despite Miller outspending Webb.

"The person with the most money does

not always win. ...It is harder to buy a primary because the electorate is so small. You just don't know who is going to show up," said Faulk.

Moran and Deeds have also pointed out that much of McAuliffe's campaign money has come from outside Virginia.

The McAuliffe campaign states that 17 percent of their candidate's donations come from Virginia, while the bulk of Moran and Deed's donations — over 90 percent according to those respective campaigns — have come from inside the commonwealth. According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe's top two individual donors Haim Saban (\$276,064) and Stephen Bing (\$250,000) live in Los Angeles.

"Terry has raised more money. Fortunately for us, the people who have given him money can't vote for him," said Jesse Ferguson, a spokesperson for the Moran campaign. The Moran campaign also boasts the largest number of contributions, with 3,867 people and organizations giving money to the campaign so far, according to the Virginia Public Access Project.

"We built a tremendous network of individual donors and small-dollar donors. They are the ones that are going to fuel this campaign," said Ferguson.

McAuliffe has had 2,530 individuals contribute to his campaign and Deeds has had 3,437 individuals contribute to his campaign.

EVEN IF McAuliffe has received most of his money from outside Virginia, the political consultant is still showing significant

fundraising strengths inside the commonwealth.

"I think it is important to note that he outraised both of the other Democratic candidates in Virginia," said Elisabeth Smith, a spokesperson for the McAuliffe campaign.

Of the three Democrats, Moran has raised the most money in Arlington County (\$225,538), Loudoun County (\$51,869) and the City of Alexandria (\$1.1 million) since the beginning of 2008.

But McAuliffe has raised more money during that time period in Fairfax County, Virginia's most populous locality.

According to the Virginia Public Access Project, McAuliffe garnered \$828,117; Moran received \$502,329; and Deeds raised \$217,001 from Fairfax County residents and businesses during 2008 and 2009.

While most of Moran and Deeds larger Northern Virginia donors are already active in local political campaigns, McAuliffe has also been able to attract local donors who have previously not given to state campaigns in the commonwealth.

McLean resident Hani Masri, who has ties to Bill Clinton, contributed \$100,000 to McAuliffe's campaign, and does not appear to have given money to statewide candidates in the past.

Oak Hill resident Jack Xi Deng, who contributed \$25,000 to McAuliffe, also does not appear to be a regular donor in other Virginia races.

Arlington resident Thomas DePasquale, who has contributed to many Virginia Democrats over the years, gave \$35,000 to

the Moran campaign and \$10,000 to McAuliffe. Alexandria resident Frank Connor gave \$2,500 to Deeds before contributing \$20,100 to the McAuliffe campaign.

REGARDLESS of where McAuliffe's donations come from, his campaign said its ability to attract more money will make McAuliffe the strongest candidate to

take on McDonnell in the fall.

"The national Republican Party has kept its promise to throw the kitchen sink into this gubernatorial race. They are bringing in national Republicans like John McCain and Sarah Palin to raise money for Bob McDonnell. Terry is the only one who can compete with that," said Smith.

McAuliffe will not only be able to raise money for himself but also contribute to other Democrats, she added.

"I would look at the amount of support we were able to give Sharon Bulova and Ilryong Moon in recent Fairfax County elections," said Smith. He contributed more than \$16,000 to Bulova.

"All this focus on money, there has been a lot of overkill on it. All three of these candidates have raised a decent amount of money and showed that they can fundraise," said Scott Surovell, chair of the Fairfax County Democratic Committee.

"Terry McAuliffe would be on any list of the top 10 Democratic Party fundraisers."



Ram Holiday Tradition

Last spring, Michael Del Bueno's family was forced to understand one of the basic precepts associated with Robinson's baseball program, which has consistently been one of the Northern Region's strongest, winning a region title in 2005 and Concorde District crowns in 2006 and 2007.

Though teams like Westfield, Chantilly, Lake Braddock and West Springfield, with a combined 62-12 record through Tuesday afternoon, appear likely to assume four of those eight slots, the remaining four are up for grabs.

"No matter how we play during the regular season, when tournament time comes, I think we are definitely one of the better teams around."

At 10-10 overall, 6-6 against Concorde District opponents, Robinson finds itself right in the middle

of a crowded playoff picture. The Rams were scheduled to play Herndon in the district quarterfinals on Wednesday night, but that game ended too late for this edition. With a win, Robinson would achieve part of its goal by reaching the region tournament.

WHILE DETWILER'S focus has been on Memorial Day, for part of the year it appeared as if the Rams weren't going to make it to Mother's Day. Despite a 4-2 win over defending region champion Lake Braddock on April 14, Robinson tripped up against Centreville, who was 3-8 at the time, on April 22.

But as someone who played baseball at Chantilly from 1995-98 and has served as an assistant coach at Robinson since 2003, Detwiler is familiar with the competitiveness and quality of teams within the Northern Region, something he highlighted before practice on Monday afternoon.

"Beating a team with a good record and then losing to a team that's below .500, the records may be a lot different, but I don't think there's a lot of difference in the team, as funny as that sounds," said Detwiler, whose team has swept Fairfax and Herndon while splitting games with Centreville and Oakton this spring.

To further emphasize that point, Detwiler said that his team has played in four games this season that have been decided by a walk-off hit or homer. The Rams have won three and lost one. However, Detwiler said, it could've just as easily been the other way around.

DESPITE THE up-and-down results, Robinson has been stabilized by senior catcher Chris McCloud, a Catholic University recruit who led the team with six home runs and 21 RBIs as of Wednesday morning. Rutger Floyd, a corner infielder, was hitting .470 with four homers, while Del Bueno had a team-high .475 batting average with eight stolen bases and 15 walks.

"Robinson is known as a tournament team, and, honestly, if we can get past this first game, I think we have a really good shot," McCloud said.

ing on having the ball in my stick so I knew I needed to create just like my coach taught me," said Zinck, who also recorded 14 saves in the win. "I saw Sam post up in the middle, and I used all my energy to throw it out to her. I figured there was nothing to lose."

WITH THE VICTORY, Robinson claimed the Concorde's top seed in this week's Northern Region tournament, which Zinck and Co. parlayed into a 20-8 win over Stone Bridge on Tuesday night. The Rams will now host South County in the region quarterfinals on Thursday.

According to fifth-year coach Alison Neun, Robinson's late-game composure was nonexistent during the first meeting this season between these two teams, which resulted in a 12-5 for Chantilly on April 4. All last week, Neun and her team studied film of that game, picking out mistakes that none of them had ever made before and haven't made since.

"These girls have wanted this so bad, and they really regretted how they played against [Chantilly] the first time," said Neun, whose squad improved to 12-3 this spring with the Stone Bridge win. "We watched film and learned that we had improved a lot since the first time we saw them."

The solutions that Robinson found couldn't have come at a more convenient time, as the Rams have now developed quite the playoff rivalry with the Chargers. In last year's title game, Megan Dunleavy scored with one second remaining to deliver the upset, ruining yet another undefeated season for Chantilly.

This spring, Dunleavy needed to only score once as seven different Rams contributed goals, including tallies from Sarah Moody, Katie McHugh, Abby Eastman, Tory Barron (2), Barber and Rachel Moody (2).

"We knew it was going to be a tough game, but we learned from our mistakes big time and came out here ready to play," Rachel Moody said. "We're a calm team, and we know when we have to take a deep breath."

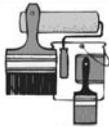


