





Primary Tough Choice for Dems

Strong candidates lead to indecision?

With the Democratic gubernatorial primary less than two weeks away, Scott Surovell still had not made up his mind about his vote.

Surovell, a Mount Vernon resident, is not a typical voter. He is the chair of the Fairfax County Democratic Committee, one of the largest local Democratic organizations in the commonwealth. Surovell is paying very close attention to the race and the three candidates — state Sen. Creigh Deeds (D-25), former Democratic National Committee chair Terry McAuliffe and former Del. Brian Moran (D-46).

“These candidates are pretty similar on policy. There are subtle differences but they are all strong candidates. I think the question a lot of people are trying to answer is which candidate would be the best to go up against Bob McDonnell,” he said. “I am actually undecided. I have really been struggling with this myself.”

Many other likely voters are having a tough time choosing a candidate in Democratic Party's gubernatorial primary June 9.

“It was a tough decision. We are have embarrassment of riches this time around and it was a tough choice to make,” said Greg Zimmerman, a Democratic activist from Arlington County, who would not reveal who he was supporting publicly.

“I think, for Democrats, I think this primary is really difficult,” said Loretta Nawakowski, the Democratic Party's captain for the Greenspring voting precinct, which traditionally has the highest election turnout out of any precinct in Virginia. Though the residents are known for being politically active, attendance at a candidates' forum May 14 on the Greenspring campus was particularly high, about 250 people.

Volunteers who have knocking on the doors of reliable Democratic households in Northern Virginia have also found a lot of uncommitted voters.

“I am going door to door and a lot of people are undecided,” said Steve Baker, an Arlington resident who supports McAuliffe.

Voters may be having a tough time choosing a candidate because

the three men in the race are similar in many respects.

Deeds, a native Virginian who lives in Bath County where he grew up, likes to tell the story of his mother only giving him a few \$20 bills in his pocket when he went off to college.

McAuliffe, a McLean resident, started a driveway paving business at 14 years old in upstate New York so that he could pay for school.

Moran, a former state delegate for the City of Alexandria and Fairfax County, recalls when he father was laid off and his employer towed away the company car they used as a family station wagon.

All three candidates promise to make Virginia the epicenter of green technology and jobs. McAuliffe talks of turning chicken waste into fuel. Deeds wants to build an algae-to-fuel plant in Hampton Roads. Moran calls for wind farms off the coast of Virginia Beach.

Northern Virginia, they all expect, would be a hub of green job research and take part in developing things like the smart electrical grid and clean coal technology. “I think we can build on the technology companies that we already have here,” said Moran.

Moran, in particular, appears to be trying to set himself apart by running to the left of his primary opponents on social and environmental issues.

If elected governor, Moran promises to seek repeal the 2006 Marshall-Newman amendment, which defines marriage as between a man and woman and bans marriage-like contracts for same sex couples. “We should not be placing discriminatory language in the Virginia constitution,” said Moran at the Greenspring forum.

As a state senator, Deeds voted in favor of the same-sex marriage amendment in 2006. McAuliffe said he does not support gay marriage but is fully supportive of civil

unions. But he has said multiple times that the campaign should focus on other issues.

“If we don't fix the economy, we are going to go backwards on several fronts folks,” said McAuliffe at an Annandale debate.

Moran has spoken out against drilling for oil or natural gas off the coast of Virginia and opposes the construction a new coal power plant in Surry County between



Remembering Jim Hughes

Realtor, father will be missed.

This is what Keri Hughes wants people to know about her husband, Jim ... that he was the “most amazing dad” to his children, and that all who knew him loved him and “counted” on him.

James Hughes’ body was found on May 16 along the Potomac River near Fletcher’s Boathouse; his kayak was found later.

Sometime, during the afternoon of Mother’s Day, Jim Hughes, of Vienna, took his Volvo and his kayak out. His wife reported him missing later that day when he failed to return home.

“On Mother’s Day, Jim brought me breakfast in bed, carrying our daughter [18-month-old Rory Catherine] in a backpack. Steak and eggs he made.

“We had purchased a kayak a few years ago, and Jim was dying to go out with it. We thought of Burke Lake because it was safe for the baby and our beagle, nice and calm. We went out but when it got too cold, we came home early.”

WHAT HAPPENED next is not clear.

When Keri Hughes awoke from a nap, Jim, the kayak and his backpack were gone, and Jim was not the “kind of person just to take off,” Keri Hughes said. She didn’t think too much of it, however, until dinnertime when he had not come home or called.

By the time Jim Hughes’ oldest child, Christopher, called about 8 p.m., Keri Hughes had begun to grow “nervous.” She called 911 but emergency services had little information to go on. Friends and family mapped out all possible boating locations to search, and on Monday afternoon, a friend — a former client of Jim’s real estate business — found Jim’s Volvo, without the kayak, at Algonkian Regional Park in Loudoun County. Fairfax County search-and-rescue mounted an effort by boat and air, and on Saturday, May 16, Jim Hughes’s body was found.

“I was watching the search-and-rescue on Monday at Algonkian, and I was waiting for him to walk out of the woods, dirty, and say, ‘hey, what’s going on here?’ It didn’t sink in until Wednesday that he may be gone.”

Jim Hughes had been Keri’s Re-

altor, and she liked to say that he did such an “amazing job,” she married him. His wife recalls his “goofy sense of humor, almost twisted.”

“He bought me a tee-shirt, and on the back was written, ‘My next husband will be normal.’ That was his sense of humor.

“To say he was fearless would be putting it mildly. He was a pretty gutsy guy. I was the voice of reason in our relationship.”

Keri and Jim Hughes met in 2002 and married six years ago. Jim Hughes had two children already and Keri, at 35 years old, did not think she wanted one of her own ... until Jim. “He was the

most amazing father to all his children. There was no task he wouldn’t do, no element of Jim that spoke of a ‘mother’s’ job. He did it all and loved every minute of it.”

He made sure he was at every soccer game, every softball game, his older children played in.

“He was there, hands-on. He was a dad.”

He brought the family beagle, a therapy dog, into Rory’s preschool for show-and-tell. “He had the biggest heart. There’s nothing he wouldn’t do for his children,” said Keri.



Call To Keep Tysons Moving

To the Editor:

Anyone who passes through Tysons Corner today is keenly aware that its transformation from a suburban office park to a vital, vibrant urban center has begun in earnest. Both the Capital Beltway HOT Lanes and Dulles Corridor Metrorail Project are in full construction mode. In the private sector, numerous construction projects are in various phases of planning and development.

The future Tysons Corner will be well worth the temporary inconvenience. But the road to a new Tysons will not be smooth or easy. Employers share a common concern regarding increased congestion from construction activities and its affect on our businesses and employees. We fear that in the coming months and years, commuting to, from and within Tysons Corner may become even more challenging than it is today.

For this reason, it is incumbent on the Tysons Corner community to work together to alleviate any

additional congestion that may be caused as we grow. Government, business leaders, and community organizations, as well as employers, employees, and residents must all play an active role to keep Tysons moving through the construction period.

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation, and Fairfax County Employer Services have begun the effort by developing Employer Solutions, a free service to businesses in the Tysons, Merrifield and Dulles Rail Corridor to help them create or enhance commuting services to keep employees, clients and customers moving during the construction period. Through employer-based meetings, transportation fairs and follow-up services, the Employer Solutions team will help employers design transportation strategies that best fit their culture and budget.

Some of the approaches include encouraging ridesharing, using mass transit and park-and-ride lots, promoting the regional Guaranteed Ride Home Program, providing a transit benefit or subsidy

and developing alternative work schedules and telework programs.

This coordinated effort will empower Tysons employers and their employees with real solutions to ease the challenges of commuting during construction. These programs also are effective employee recruitment and retention tools as well as environmentally sustainable practices.

As chairman of the Tysons Transportation Association (TYTRAN), an organization that has worked since 1981 to improve transportation for businesses in Tysons, I urge everyone to work with us to face this challenge. Learn all you can about how these strategies can help you, your employees, your clients and your customers. Con-

KERI HUGHES has no doubt her husband's death was an accident, perhaps a bad decision to enter the water, but certainly not an intentional death. "I know that man," Keri Hughes said. "And I know that he would not leave his children." Keri Hughes' pride spills forth as

she describes the "amazing person" he was and how "truly everyone loved him." Since his disappearance and death, she has gotten calls from people who were clients of Jim's from a decade ago. "I couldn't think of someone who didn't love him."

James Hughes leaves behind his wife of six years, Keri; two older children, Christopher, 27, and Sa-

rah, 24; and Rory Catherine, 18 months; his father and step-mother and siblings.

Local Music Makers See Limitless Opportunity

Three George C. Marshall High School International Bacca laureate alumni, now in college, are living out their dream. They're making music transatlantic-ly. They're BlissFM, hip-hop artists.

Sebastien Christie, Class of '08; John Carmichael, Class of '08; and Andrew Like, Class of '07 met early on in their Marshall days. Like introduced Christie and Carmichael to one another and, for five years, the trio has written, performed, recorded and produced their own music. Like, aka DJ MAF, goes to college in London but that hasn't dampened the artistic relationship.

"It's all done digitally," said Christie. "We do it all on our own. That's what's so great about it."

Christie and Carmichael record the music in Christie's home studio and they send it to Like in London via the Internet.

DJ MAF is back in the Vienna-Fairfax area temporarily, promoting the launch of the production company he and business partner Christie recently started, Polar Bear Music.

As producers, they help other groups get started and they provide

the instrumentals for groups as needed, mainly for hip-hop artists. The producers' goal is to do as much independently as possible, they say.

Christie and DJ MAF are business-savvy; they have a marketing plan. Polar Bear Music recognizes the trends in music distribution. "Everyone downloads music now," said Christie. "Most people won't buy from artists they never heard of, so our music can be down-

loaded for free.

"We make money off our shows. Eventually, as we get more exposure, we will be charging when there is demand."

ON MAY 23, BlissFM and bands that the group works with performed in concert at Jammin' Java. The concert lasted well past midnight, and while Memorial Day weekend might have kept the attendance down somewhat, it was

"a pretty good" concert, Christie said. In performances or special projects, BlissFM hires additional musicians to play with them, but when recording, they make all their own sounds.

Carmichael does the vocals and lyrics, Christie the instrumentation, and Carmichael – DJ MAF – the sound effects and mixing.

"I used to joke around with friends, rapping with them," said Carmichael, referring to his high school years. "Started writing lyrics, met Andrew, and we did a couple of songs together and had fun. Then, I met Sebastien and we were all hanging out together. That's how we started making music."

Christie, going into his sophomore year at George Mason University, also works at his father's guitar shop in Washington, D.C., The Guitar Gallery, where he gives lessons, primarily to younger children. DJ Max will return to school in London and will continue to work as a deejay there.



Pastor John Michael Hyde Dies

Pastor John Michael "Pastor Jack" Hyde 65, of Woolwine, Va. died Wednesday, May 27, at Culpeper Regional Hospital.

A celebration of Hyde's life took place on Monday, June 1, at Vale United Methodist Church in Oakton, with Pastor Tracy Wines officiating. Another event is scheduled on Thursday, June 4, at 11 a.m. at Woolwine United Methodist Church, with Pastor Bruce Tuttle officiating.

Illegal Conduit Contributions

Vienna resident Jerry Pierce-Santos, 50, pleaded guilty May 27 to illegally making conduit contributions to a candidate seeking federal office, according to Assistant Attorney General Lanny A. Breuer of the criminal division.

Conduit contributions are illegal campaign contributions made by someone in the name of another person, according to court documents.

During 2003, Pierce-Santos made \$17,000 in such contributions, according to plea documents. Pierce-Santos reimbursed seven people \$2,000 each and three people \$1,000 each for their contributions.

Individuals were only permitted to contribute up to \$2,000 to a candidate seeking election to federal office in 2003, according to Breuer. The current limit is \$2,400 per candidate per election, according to the Federal Election Commission. Pierce-Santos, who has no criminal history according to plea documents, faces up to two years in prison, three years supervised release and a \$50,000 fine. Court documents state that his stipulated sentencing guideline range is six to 12 months.

Trial attorneys Peter M. Koski and Kevin O. Driscoll of the Criminal Division's Public Integrity Section are prosecuting the case, which is being investigated by the FBI and the Office of the Inspector General for the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Pierce-Santos pleaded guilty before Magistrate Judge Alan Kay in U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia. For a citizen's guide to making campaign contributions to federal candidates, see <http://www.fec.gov/pages/brochures/citizens.shtml>.

Oakton Girls Soccer Heads for States

Cougars, in weather-forced postponement, fall to Chantilly, 1-0, in Region finals.

Blue skies brought out the best of both the Chantilly and Oakton High girls' soccer teams during their suspended Northern Region championship game on Saturday afternoon.

The title match, ultimately won by Chantilly, 1-0, began in miserable, rainy conditions on Fairfax High's synthetic turf field on Friday afternoon.

But the game eventually was stopped due to lightening with just less than two minutes remaining in the first half of a scoreless game. Eventually, it was decided the game would be completed the following day at Vienna's Madison High.

In Friday's first day of action in the rain, both teams seemed to be battling the elements as well as competing against one another. The result was a championship game with uneven flow and two teams simply trying to make it to the halftime.

Saturday was such a different story. There was a renewed, brisker step from players on both teams as the finals game continued in beautiful, sunny weather.

"Last night, it was insane," said Oakton coach Brooke Alexander, of the title game's first day of play. "[Play] was broken up, wet and the turf played real fast. I think [Chantilly] coach [Melissa] Bibbee and I were tentative, worried about injuries."

Both squads played their hearts out on Saturday. The game's final two minutes of the first half were completed. Then, following a shortened five minute halftime, both squads went all out in the second half to de-

termine a champion.

IN THE END, it was Chantilly, behind an early second-half goal from senior forward Kristen Melchiori that captured the region crown by defeating a tough and talented Oakton team. The region championship was the first in the history of Chantilly's girls' program.

Both Concorde District teams, by reaching the region finals, assured themselves of a seeding for this upcoming week's state AAA tournament. Chantilly (17-2-1) is scheduled to host Atlee High (Mechanicsville), a Central Region team, on Tuesday. Oakton (14-4) was preparing for a Tuesday trip to Richmond to take on home team Mills Godwin, also a member of the Central Region.

Chantilly's region title victory on Saturday marked the third time in three meetings that the Chargers have defeated Oakton this season. Earlier in the postseason, Chantilly had beaten the Cougars, 2-1, in a district tournament semifinals game. Chantilly went on to win the district title with a finals win over perennial power Robinson.

Bibbee, the Chantilly coach, said her team was able to grab the early momentum against Oakton in day two of the suspended region finals game. The Chargers, with 1 minute, 59 seconds showing on the first-half clock when play resumed, opened the action with a free kick off the foot of sophomore defender Madyson Brown. Chantilly eventually earned a corner and finished the half strong.

"The last two minutes [of the first half], we kind of set the tone," said Bibbee. "The free kick got us into the [Oakton] box."

The Chargers carried that energy into the second half, putting offensive pressure on

the Cougars right from the get-go. Then, just like that, Chantilly struck when Melchiori, a seasoned player who is at her best in the biggest games, gained possession of the ball off the left side of the goal area, the result of a forward pass from freshmen midfielder Olivia Colella. With Oakton defenders around her, Melchiori turned and sent a low, crossing shot into the right side of the net.

Oakton goalie Erica Stein made a valiant diving attempt for the ball, but it found its way into the net. Chantilly, with 36:43 remaining in the game, held a 1-0 advantage.

"I got a nice feed from Olivia," said Melchiori, who has scored five goals this postseason. "I just turned on it and hit it into the goal. I felt a defender [near me]."

"I was so excited. We've never been in a [region] championship. I'm real proud of my team."

Bibbee said Melchiori came up big for the Chargers.

"Kristen, as a senior, has always been able to capitalize for us at the end of games," said the coach. "I knew [a score] would come from someone like Kristen. She's our second leading scorer."

And it was Colella who helped set up the score.

"Olivia has been just as consistent as they come all season," said Bibbee. "She's very steady and has great ball skills."

LOTS OF TIME remained following Melchiori's goal, and Oakton put together a several flurries of offensive pressure, but could not get a shot past Chargers' net-minder Lauren Jancuska.

"I know our defense is pretty good," said Brown, a top defender for the Chargers. "I love playing against Oakton. They're great competition, and they push us to do better."

Alexander, the Oakton coach, said Chantilly earned the win.

"We are well-matched teams," said Alexander. "Today, Chantilly finished [on the score by Melchiori]. That's what it takes. We couldn't seem to penetrate and get things going [on offense]."

All in all, it was a crazy two days of championship soccer. The two teams made the best of the poor weather on Friday and shined with stellar play on Saturday.

"I was a little nervous about it," said Bibbee, of the game going into a second day. "We tend to get a little lackadaisical sometimes when there is a little layover."

Brown said the Chargers were determined to come out strong on Saturday.

"We knew we had to pick it up to win the game," said Brown. "It's great to win."

By winning, Chantilly earned the right to host Tuesday's first round state quarterfinals game.

"We're really excited about having a home game and having lots of our fans," said Melchiori.

The All-Northern Region teams were announced on Friday. First-team members for Chantilly were senior midfielder Katie Menzie and junior goalie Lauren Jancuska. Chantilly's Madyson Brown was named to the Second Team.

For Oakton, no players were named to the first or second Teams. Honorable mention selections for the Cougars were freshmen forward Alex Meyers and senior midfielder Christy Hassell.

B-Team Cycles against Diabetes

Vienna bicyclists ride June 14 Tour de Cure.

When the National Capital Tour de Cure kicks off on June 14 from Reston to Vienna and back, Vienna's own B-Team will be riding in honor of one of its own.

Brenna Healy, 16, of Vienna was diagnosed with Type I diabetes in February 2008, and next month the Madeira sophomore will take to the Washington & Old Dominion Trail and ride her bike alongside her mother, Vicki.

"When I was first diagnosed, it was really overwhelming," said Brenna. "It's a whole different lifestyle. It changes everything."

Brenna had been feeling tired, thirsty and losing weight for a few weeks when her mother brought her to her doctor. She was immediately sent to the hospital for treatment of high blood sugar.

"It was pretty scary," she said. "I thought, 'doesn't diabetes have something to do with needles?'"

Since that diagnosis, Brenna has become a pro with needles, injecting herself with four shots every day and testing her blood sugar four to six times a day by pricking her finger.

"I am more aware of what I eat," said Brenna. "I count carbs. I can eat whatever I want. I just have to cover it with insulin."

THE TOUR DE CURE raises money to fund diabetes research.

"We all have deep roots in Vienna," said Vicki Healy, B-Team captain. "Some of us went to school together here. We hope Vienna will get behind us."

Vicki Healy and her friends have cycled together socially as a group for approximately five years and now they ride together to support her cause. Brenna and Vicki Healy wear "Red Rider" Tour de Cure shirts. A Red Rider is someone living with diabetes (type 1 or type 2), whether the patient or patient's family member.

Vicki Healy joined the Tour de Cure last spring after her daughter's diagnosis and, this year, joined the board of the cycling event. The B-Team is named in honor of Brenna, but "B" stands for brave and beautiful, as well, Vicki Healy said. "When I rode it last year, it was incredibly inspi-

rational."

Tracy Welch rides as a B-Teamer, because it's a "great opportunity for fellowship and exercise, all for a good cause."

A diabetes educator for 27 years, rider Karen Dawn has facts and numbers at ready disposal. She sees promise in stem cell research and in new means of insulin distribution. "What Brenna is doing to treat her diabetes is not what we'll be doing in 10 years," she said. "A lot of neat stuff is going on in the field. The money we raise here goes to research in treatment and cures."

THE B-TEAM is looking for riders to participate on June 14 and for sponsors. Joining the Tour de Cure costs \$25 and participants pledge to raise \$175 each. As of late May, B-Team has raised more than \$3,800 and is one of the top

10 fundraisers in the National Capital area. The team's goal is to raise \$6,000 by event time.

B-Teamers are Karen Dawn, Brenna Healy, Claire Healy, Vicki Healy, Chris Mihm, Tracy Welch, Betsy Zolper, John Zolpher, and Mary Cowden of Vienna, and Patricia Navin-Greenfield and Patricia Richards of Arlington, Kim Forbes, a Vienna native, and Bruce Johnson.

"I learned not to let it [diabetes] stop you," Brenna said. "When I first got it, it put a damper. But now, it's worked into my lifestyle. It's my health."

And it's not that I'm stupid when I sit and listen cluelessly; it's more that I'm incredulous how little I know about so many subjects, one of which was discussed this particular evening: the trials and tribulations — and rewards, of growing herbs and spices in your own backyard. Who knew there would be such back and forth — and such knowledge, about such things? Not me (in case you didn't know that previous sentence was rhetorical.)

And though I am now not the least bit interested in tilling the soil at "Belly Acres," (our two-acre, non-ancestral home), I am nevertheless intrigued by the possibility. The only problem I foresee, other than all the obvious problems that you readers foresee, is what exactly would I do with all the herbs and spices if I were able to actually grow them? The closest I get to a spice is my aftershave. The closest I get to an herb is my neighbor across the street. I realize that herbs and spices have something to do with food and taste and cooking and food preparation, but that's no more my world than growing the stuff was in the first place. Oh, I can certainly appreciate the effort required to grow your own; my problem is, if I did grow it, would I have to eat it?



address job creation but also housing needs and other problems that have cropped up in the down economy.

“We need a governor who puts the people first,” said Moran at the Greenspring forum.

Deeds and Moran have similar professional backgrounds. Both worked as local prosecutors and are currently lawyers at small law firms. They are also both former members of the House of Delegates. In 2001, Moran replaced Deeds as the House of Delegates Democratic caucus chair when Deeds won his election to the state senate.

A fixture of political talk shows, McAuliffe is one of the most recognizable Democratic Party figures on the national stage, even though he has never held elected office.

McAuliffe is trying to reshape his public persona into that of a Mark Warner-like businessman, who does Democratic Party activism on the side. He has rescued both a failing bank and Florida home building company during his career. Through these and a few other business ventures, McAuliffe said he has created several thou-

sand new jobs.

Deeds and Moran tout their legislative experience in Richmond as an asset.

Deeds said he was able to get legislation passed as member of the minority and the majority party in the House of Delegates and Senate.

“I am going in knowing that system like the back of my hand,” said Deeds.

While McAuliffe talks about needing to win more Democratic seats in the House of Delegates, Moran points out that he has actually done that as head of the House of Delegates Democratic caucus.

“I helped build the House Democratic caucus from 33 members to 45 members,” said Moran.

McAuliffe, who has lived in McLean for almost 20 years, does not seem phased by his lack of experience at the Virginia statehouse. The Washington insider is running as a Richmond outsider.

“If you are happy with Richmond, I am not your guy,” said McAuliffe.

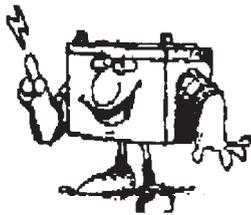

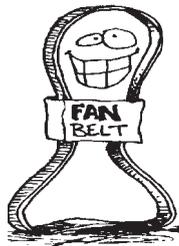

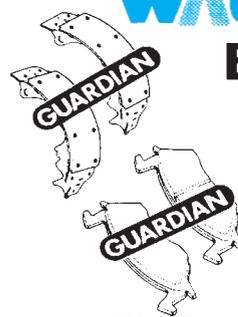
