

Deeds Wins Democratic Primary

Voters cite Washington Post endorsement and ability to beat GOP as key factors.

Just minutes after gubernatorial candidate Terry McAuliffe and his family finished voting at their home precinct in Spring Hill Elementary School, Susan Gorin walked through the door.

Gorin, like McAuliffe, is a McLean resident with a home near Tysons Corner. She and the former Democratic National Committee chair live so close to each other that they are likely to get stuck in the same traffic jam on any given weekday afternoon.

But Gorin voted for state Sen. Creigh Deeds (D-25), whose home county in central Virginia is so rural, it doesn't contain a single stoplight.

"I am in education and the teachers' union endorsed Deeds. The Washington Post endorsement [of Deeds] also impressed me," said Gorin, who works for the National Association of School Psychologists.

TERRY McAULIFFE may be a Fairfax County resident and former Del. Brian Moran used to represent part of the jurisdiction in the Virginia House of Virginia Delegates. But Deeds beat both candidates statewide and in Fairfax County to become

the Democratic Party's nominee for governor this week.

"Wow. ... No one could have imagined what we accomplished here tonight," said Deeds to his supporters at a victory party in Charlottesville on election night.

Across the commonwealth, Deeds received about 49.73 percent of the vote to McAuliffe's 26.43 percent and Moran's 23.84 percent. Just under 20 percent of the primary ballots were cast in Fairfax County, where Deeds, winning about 49.31 percent of the vote, enjoyed the same level of support he saw statewide.

"I have supported Creigh for six months but I am as surprised as anyone to see the amount of support he got up here,"

said state Sen. Chap Petersen (D-35).

In the City of Fairfax, where Petersen lives, Deeds won 53.42 percent of the vote.

In the aftermath of primary, both Moran and McAuliffe endorsed Deeds and encouraged their supporters to throw their support behind the Democratic nominee.

VOTER TURNOUT in the election, at 9.2 percent, was slightly higher in Fairfax County than the rest of Virginia, where approximately 6.3 percent of registered voters participated in the primary overall.

Though any registered voter, including

Republicans, could vote in the primary, Fairfax County registrar Rokey Suleman said he expected participation to be low.

"Historically, Virginia and Fairfax have low primary turnout," said Suleman.

Areas like the Mason District and Vienna, where competitive Democratic delegate races were also taking place, tended to have higher turnout and could have driven up participation overall in the county to higher than the state average.

THE NEW DEMOCRATIC nominee will face Republican candidate and former Virginia Attorney General Bob McDonnell for

the second time in a general election this fall.

McDonnell beat Deeds by just 323 votes in the 2005 attorney general race, the closest election in the history of Virginia.

In that election, Deeds carried Fairfax County four years ago by a healthy margin of 57 percent to McDonnell's 42 percent. McDonnell said he intends to close that gap of support between him and Deeds in Fairfax, where approximately one in seven Virginia voters lives.

"I will make sure people know I am the

Wagner Wins Lt. Gov. Race Easily

Former Virginia Secretary of Finance Jody Wagner easily won the Democratic Party's nomination for lieutenant governor over political consultant and Arlington County resident Mike Signer in a primary June 9.

She will face current Lt. Gov. Bill Bolling (R), who is running for his second term, in November's statewide general election.

Wagner, a Virginia Beach resident, received 74.21 percent of the vote overall in Virginia to Signer's 21.3 percent. Russell County Supervisor Jon Bowerbank, who dropped out of the race May 18 and endorsed Wagner, still appeared on the ballot and received 4.48 percent of the vote statewide.

Wagner, a veteran of Gov. Mark Warner and Gov. Tim Kaine's administrations, performed better in Fairfax County than she did statewide. In the county, where approximately one fifth of the statewide votes were cast, Wagner received 78.42 percent of the vote to Signer's 17.74 percent and Bowerbank's 3.83 percent.

Signer, who was also a member of the Warner administration, performed slightly better in the City of Fairfax than he did in the statewide vote. The Arlington County native received 24.31 percent of the vote to Wagner's 71.86 percent. Bowerbank also garnered 3.81 percent of the vote in the city.

A few Democratic activists said they were concerned about how little voters seemed to know about the lieutenant governor primary candidates.

"I felt like there was not enough information about that race," said Janet Wynovich, a Springfield resident who voted in the primary.

Reston resident Debra Steppel, a Wagner volunteer, said she was able to convince approximately 15 undecided voters to back her candidate outside the polling station at South Lakes High School.

"The voters are very uninformed about that race," said Nelson Henderson, who was passing out information about the Democratic Party outside Sangster Elementary School on primary day.

Robinson Earns Seven Cappie Awards

'Fiddler' wins trophies for best musical, lead actor, among others.

Winning for Best Musical and Lead Actor, Robinson Secondary captured a school-record seven victories Sunday night at the 10th annual Cappies Gala at The Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., for its production of "Fiddler on the Roof."

As the fiddler, freshman Jose Justiniano took home two trophies – one for Cameo Actor and one for Creativity – and Eric Fischer, who portrayed patriarch Tevye, won the Cappie for Lead Actor in a Musical. As for Director Chip Rome, he's as proud as can be of his entire cast and crew.

"It was a very exciting night. I'm exhausted," he said Monday, after directing the entire Cappies Gala. "It was gratifying to win this. Now we can hang banners saying 'Best Play' and 'Best Musical,' side by side."

Four years ago, Robinson won six Cappies, including Best Play, for "Metamorphoses." Sunday night, said Rome, "When the numbers started to climb and the kids were keeping count, I hadn't realized how under the shadow of 'Morph' they felt. They really wanted to beat that total. Talk about the cherry on top of the frosting on the cake. And with this show, I confess, I really wanted to win the big one."

Backstage, overjoyed with their victory for

Best Musical, the students who'd accepted the star-topped trophy for Robinson excitedly passed it around, from person to person, taking turns holding it. "I'm so proud, I'm crying," said co-stage manager Paige Ford. "There's no award for stage manager,

so it makes my day, my world, to go on stage for this. Everyone worked so hard; I feel like a mother hen — all my babies have grown up."

Co-stage manager Sam Wharton said he felt "overwhelmed, excited and thankful."

Assistant director Emily Nice was "ecstatic." She said everything in the play fit together "like a puzzle we solved."

Life with Cancer Receives \$50K Grant

Grant will strengthen and improve cancer awareness and treatment.

Inova Health System's Life with Cancer program received a \$50,000 grant for two years to improve access to the program's services and to encourage nationwide outreach about cancer education and treatment.

"The purpose of this grant is to improve our Web site and have it be more of a national presence, and to produce national teleconferences to educate breast cancer patients on treatments and support programs," said Eric Cohen, program manager of patient and family education for Life with Cancer.

The grant was awarded by Side-Out, an organization established in 2004 that raises funds for breast cancer through volleyball

tournaments. Side-out uses donations gathered at the volleyball events to conduct clinical trials in breast cancer and to fund breast cancer support organizations on the local level.

"Life with Cancer was a perfect fit with an extraordinary reputation of serving cancer patients and families over 20 years," said Bryant Dunetz, Side-Out Foundation. "We expect our partnership to grow over the next several years as more and more highly sought after Life with Cancer services become available at the local level."

Life with Cancer is a community supported cancer program, whose mission is to provide education, support and information to anyone affected by cancer. The program, which has been around since 1986, is located at all five Inova hospitals as well as out in the Northern Virginia community.

"Life with Cancer provides a critical service to patients and their loved ones, a service that is not provided by physicians as they focus on medical treatment," said Gordon Hay, director of Inova Health System's Life with Cancer. "Life with Cancer offers a wide range of support and educational services that help families deal with the impact of cancer with a goal of improving quality of life while living with the disease."

The majority of the funding for the program comes from individual donations and big businesses in Northern Virginia. Life with Cancer offers its programs and services free of charge.

The organization is comprised of a 24-member board of directors that not only

raises funds for the program, but serves as the community voice that emphasizes the importance of the program by promoting its services.

"Life with Cancer is one of the most comprehensive support programs in the country," said Hay.

In February, Life with Cancer opened a new family center in Fairfax to offer education and support for cancer patients, family members and survivors. The center provides a warm and comfortable environment to help the patients acquire hope and a good quality of life.

The 16,000-square-foot tutor style home offers a medical library, counseling rooms, children's and adult art therapy studios, a large exercise room for classes specifically

Bear Sighted in Clifton

Fairfax County Police have received their first reports of a bear sighting this year. On Monday, June 8, shortly after 7 a.m., residents observed a young black bear trolling through back yards in the Clifton area. Animal control officers say it's not unusual to see black bears at this time of year and residents should not panic or feel alarmed when they see one.

Bears typically avoid humans and will often keep moving through an area once they fail to find food. Unless a bear is sick, injured or deemed a threat to public safety, animal control officers doesn't try removing it from a neighborhood. Black bears have a natural fear of humans and, in most cases, would rather flee than encounter people.

Police advise people to take the following precautions to keep bears and other wildlife away from their homes:

- ❖ Don't store household trash on porches, decks or in vehicles. Keep it secured in a garage, shed or basement, if possible.
- ❖ If a bear is sighted in your neighborhood, remove birdfeeders.
- ❖ Take garbage to the curb on pickup morning, not the night before.
- ❖ Consider installing electric fencing around gardens, dumpsters and other potential wildlife food sources.

Three Plead Guilty to Armored Car Robberies

Three people have now pleaded guilty in federal court to a string of armored-car robberies, including one each in Fairfax and Lorton. They are Carlis Darnell Brown, 25, and Christopher Blakeney, 21, both of Shady River Court in Woodbridge, and Blakeney's cousin, Michael Blakeney, 20, of New York.

"The conspirators stole approximately \$360,000 in three separate robberies, each occurring when a Loomis armored-car employee was in the process of loading an ATM machine with money," said Peter Carr, spokesman for the U.S. Attorney's Office in the Eastern District of Virginia.

The Blakeneys both entered their pleas in May in U.S. District Court in Alexandria, and Brown did likewise, on Friday, June 5. As a result, he was convicted of use of a firearm during two of the armed robberies. In a statement of facts filed with his plea agreement, Brown admitted to

Brand New Fixer Uppers

Volkswagen donates cars for high school auto shop classes in Fairfax County.

The first ever Volkswagen Drive Off kicked off on Friday, June 4 in the auxiliary gym at South County Secondary School. The Drive Off showcased the partnership between Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) and Volkswagen Group of America, Inc. (VWGoA).

"It's part of our larger philanthropic effort with Virginia schools," said Jill Bratina, head of corporate communications for VWGoA.

VWGoA donated Volkswagen and Audi cars to automotive technology teachers from 10 Fairfax County high schools and three high school academies. Teachers received keys to the cars during the Drive Off and were able to drive the vehicles back to their schools once the event was over.

"It was a fantastic moment to watch the teachers drive off in their new vehicles, and we're thrilled the rain held off so that the two convertibles could ride away with their tops down," said Bratina. "It was also wonderful to experience the excitement of the students as they sat in the cars and looked under the hood at the engines."

With the partnership agreement, FCPS automotive technology teachers will receive more than 550 hours of industry training on topics including clean fuel diesel engines, direct fuel injection gasoline engines, electrical diagnosis and fundamentals of the changing technology in automobiles. Teachers begin training in August.

The training will also allow for students to gain experience in diagnosing and repairing high-tech vehicles.

The Audi A5 received by South County Secondary students will serve as a training car, just like the rest of the cars donated to the other schools.

"The students were extremely excited," said Frank Cannon, automotive technology teacher for South County. "They were hooked because they got a new car to play with."

For many of the students, receiving an unused car was a first. The automotive technology programs are used to receiving older, donated cars.

"To get a brand new car and see the newest technologies out there is huge for these kids," said Can-

non.

Guests at the Drive Off included Gov. Timothy M. Kaine (D); Del. Kenneth R. Plum (D-35); Del. Mark D. Sickles (D-43); Board of Supervisors Chairman Sharon Bulova (D-At-large); Supervisor Catherine M. Hudgins (D-Hunter Mill); Supervisor Gerry Hyland (D-Mount Vernon); FCPS Board Members Daniel G. Storck (Mount Vernon), Elizabeth Bradsher (Springfield) and Martina Hone (At-large); and the President of VWGoA Stefan Jacoby.

"The governor spoke to the importance of education, partnerships and workforce development, while Mr. Jacoby emphasized education and the value of business and education partnerships," said Chad Maclin, coordinator for trade and industrial education for FCPS.

Jacoby also joked that he is used to selling cars, not giving them away.

The VWGoA program will allow students to learn about Volkswagen's new clean diesel engine as well as other environmentally conscious technologies.

"I can't believe they gave so many brand new cars away just to be taken apart by students," said Bryanna Fenton, a South County leadership student who worked the event.

A goal of the program is to foster a highly educated group of environmentally conscious consumers, marketers, engineers and mechanics, while contributing to workforce development by building a skilled, home-grown work force.

In addition to donating cars to high schools in Fairfax County, VWGoA plans to donate even more.

"Although we're donating 16 more cars to Northern Virginia Community College and the Excel Institute, we don't have another drive off planned in the near future," said Bratina. "We'd certainly look for another opportunity down the road."

participating in all three of the robberies.

Court documents stated that Brown conspired with the Blakeneys to steal money from Loomis armored cars. At times wearing all black clothing and black-and-white masks resembling skulls, the trio pointed firearms at Loomis employees while they restocked ATM machines with cash. In each instance, the robbers then grabbed a bag full of money and fled.

The first holdup occurred April 4, 2007, near a Wachovia ATM in Lorton, where a Loomis employee was robbed of approximately \$80,000. The second offense was Feb. 1, 2008, near a Navy Federal Credit Union ATM in Fairfax and

involved \$120,000. The

third robbery, during which the men escaped with \$160,000, happened April 1, 2009, near a Bank of America ATM in Prince William County.

Following their arrests, April 6, searches of the adjacent homes of Brown and Christopher Blakeney yielded, among other items, two semi-automatic handguns, one shotgun and rubber skull masks. Now all three men have been convicted in federal court:

♦ On May 6, Michael Blakeney pleaded guilty to use of a firearm during the April 1 robbery. However, he has not admitted involvement in the previous two robberies. His sentencing is set for July 17 before U.S. District Court Judge Gerald Bruce Lee. Michael Blakeney faces a mandatory minimum sentence of seven years in prison and a possible maximum of life behind bars.

♦ On May 13, Christopher Blakeney pleaded guilty to using a firearm in the course of two armed robberies. He also admitted participating in all three heists. He's scheduled for sentencing Aug. 7 by U.S. District Court Judge James Cacheris. Christopher Blakeney faces a mandatory minimum sentence of 32 years in prison and a maximum of incarceration for life.

♦ Then on Friday, Brown also entered his guilty plea before Judge Cacheris and is slated for sentencing Aug. 28.

This case was investigated by the Washington Field Office of the FBI; Prince William County, Fairfax City and Fairfax County police; and the U.S. Marshals Service. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Benjamin Hatch and Jonathan Fahey are the prosecutors.

Sunday was also a big night for the Hillman family of Clifton, with sophomore Logan Hillman winning the Cappie for Male Dancer and his sister Piper, a senior, winning one for Choreography, along with Sarah Russell. Dancing for four years, Logan Hillman dubbed his victory "awesome."

"I'm too excited to think," he said.

Piper Hillman said doing the choreography was "a really fun experience, working with everyone, and I'm grateful for all their cooperation and talent."

"It was all Piper," said Russell. "I did fight [choreography] and she did dance, and it really was a great team effort."

Piper Hillman also designed the set and, although Stone Bridge won that award, Rome said he was "particularly proud of our set [because] it contributed to our sense that this was a quality production. So when Piper won for choreography, I told her, in my head, it was for set design, as well."

When the ceremony was over, the Robinson students gathered outside for photos. "They just screamed and screamed," said Rome. "They had so much energy, they couldn't contain themselves."

Teen Safety in the Summer

Washington Regional Alcohol Program's tips for keeping teen drivers and passengers safe.

Proms and graduation season is upon us. Most schools have organized events that deter drinking and driving around these joyous times, although there have been tragic exceptions in recent years.

Two years ago, on June 14, 2007, four young women died in on the Beltway in Springfield; two of them had graduated earlier in the day from West Potomac High School, and police reported that alcohol was found in the car.

THE SUMMER continues to be the most dangerous time of year for teens and drinking and driving. WRAP's top tips for parents to deter underage drinking and drunk driving this summer include:

♦ Talk. Parents can have a significant — if not most significant — impact as to whether their teens will engage in risky behaviors including the use of alcohol. Talk openly to your teen about alcohol.

♦ Provide structure. The National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse found that teen children of "absentee parents" were four-times more likely to abuse substances than children in structured homes.

♦ Host a party. Host a teen party in your own home following guidelines of no drugs or alcohol. Ask another parent to help chaperone; when a guest leaves, do not allow them to return; make your presence known; and if you suspect that a guest has used alcohol or drugs, contact their parents.

♦ Instill self-confidence in your teen by talking with them about peer pressure. At some point, your teen will be offered alcohol. As the National Institutes of Health points out, teens prefer quick "one-liners" that allow them to dodge a drink without making a big scene.

♦ Lay down the law. In Virginia, it's a crime to possess, transport or purchase alcohol if

you're under 21. A new law went into effect last year ensuring that teens convicted of driving after consuming virtually any amount of alcohol will lose their driver's licenses for a year.

♦ Even if you know your teen won't drink alcohol, make sure he or she also knows how to avoid getting in a car driven by someone who has been drinking.

♦ Beware of your civil liability. In most cases, it's unlawful for parents to allow their children's friends to consume alcohol in their home. If these same "friends" are later involved in a crash, the providing parents may be responsible for injuries, property damages and wrongful death. These same parents may also face criminal charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

♦ Be a role model. Parents, themselves, should be good role models by making sure their behavior is appropriate. Use alcohol moderately, serve as a responsible host and never drink and drive.


♦ If you suspect that your child is drinking, intervene. Talk to your child and obtain qualified professional help if necessary.







'It's a Family Thing'

South County softball finishes season with 27-2 record, state semifinal appearance.

Whenever the South County softball team walks toward a field, they're reminded of two small rules and one collective groan. No boys and no cell phones. Or, as the girls put it, "no Bs and no Cs."

During games and practices both are prohibited, and it's as much because of team rules as it is a household understanding, mainly because three Stallion coaches moonlight as fathers to girls on the team.

Head coach Al Thompson, as well as assistants Gary Dillow and Paul Sbardella, do not try to control the girls as much as they just want them to be focused on the task at hand. That desire, coupled with the fact that they sleep under the same roof, has led to a rather family-like atmosphere.

"They're a lot like a little family," Thompson said after South County's season ended Saturday, June 6 with a 2-0 loss to Loudoun Valley in the Virginia AAA state semifinals. "We all know each other very well."

A lot of teams claim to be close. A lot of teams tend to have little idiosyncratic things that they do. But a lot of teams aren't like these South County softballers, both in the actual closeness and the lengths to which the Stallions go to keep it that way.

Shortstop Meaghan Hunt was up fourth

in the top of the sixth inning against Loudoun Valley, and there she stood, hanging out near the on-deck circle and dancing to "Love Shack" by the B-52s. The game was scoreless and tense, and Hunt would later face a two-on, one-out situation.

Though she struck out looking and Chelsey Dunham later flied out to end the threat, the point was made. On a team that winning has been ultra-important, with the Stallions amassing a record of 27-2 this spring, South County has also found a way to couple that with having fun.

"We all are really committed and we want to win, but we know how to have fun with it, too," said junior third baseman Stephanie Sbardella, who went 2-for-3 in the Loudoun Valley loss and was a first team All-Northern Region performer this season.

Sbardella was not part of South County's first-ever softball team in 2006, at least as a player anyway. She was a team manager and had a front row seat to watch the Stallions finish with a record of 2-13.

The next year, with Sbardella on the varsity squad, South County improved to 16-3. And that, the talented hitter said, was what brought this group together. Sbardella, Dillow and Dunham were all freshmen on that team, and they quickly realized what it would take to win.

THE NO Bs and no Cs rule only applies on

the softball field. Thankfully. At team dinners or team outings, players are allowed to have their cell phones and text. They're even allowed to talk to boys, though a few on the coaching staff might prefer that not be the case.

But all rules are happily followed once the team arrives on a field. Both Dillow, Sbardella and their teammates relish the family-style atmosphere, saying that it helps them focus.

"It doesn't really bother me because when everyone has their cell phones out, it's easily distracting and it doesn't keep people focused," Dillow said. "It's good for softball."

On Saturday, South County allowed two runs in the bottom of the sixth inning, the result of two errors and a single from Loudoun Valley's Karli Johnson-Kemp to center field. But South County didn't crumble in a losing effort either.

South County will graduate four senior from this year's group, Hunt, Michelle Halsted, Kayla Reisinger and Ashley Ward, and the team has taken on the feeling that the younger sister might have when her older sister heads off to college.

"We all get along," Sbardella said. "We're the best of friends, and we hang out inside and outside of school. Coach Thompson and all the coaches are our family. Every time I say that it gets me all teary-eyed because not all teams are like that where you can




First baseman Kayla Reisinger is one of four seniors that will be lost from this year's South County softball team, which went 27-2 and won Patriot District and Northern Region championships.



Democrats Choose Deeds in Primary

original Fairfax resident and I intend to spend a lot more time up here," said McDonnell, who grew up in the Mount Vernon area.

In the aftermath of primary, both Moran and McAuliffe endorsed Deeds and encouraged their supporters to throw their support behind the Democratic nominee.

In 2005, McDonnell outspent Deeds \$5.9 million to \$3.1 million in the attorney general's race. And Deeds still came very close to beating McDonnell, which proves he can win a general election against the Republican, he said.

Many Northern Virginia voters also said they were not concerned Deed had lost to McDonnell in a previous statewide race. As a rural Virginian, Deeds would be able to attract a broader base of support to the Democratic Party ticket, they said.

"We need a candidate who has been a part of the Virginia government and is a good match against McDonnell," said Paul Honigberg, a McLean resident who was considering voting for Deeds.

Just a few weeks ago, Deeds was lagging behind McAuliffe and Moran in polls and considered a long shot to win the primary, particularly in voter-rich Northern Virginia.

As of May 27, McAuliffe had raised \$5.7 million to Deeds' \$2.3 million and Moran's \$3 million. Several said the prolific fundraiser would be able to overwhelm the other candidates with staff and advertising.

MORAN ALSO had more name recognition than Deeds in Northern Virginia. He had been a local delegate to the state legislature and his older brother, U.S. Rep. Jim Moran (D-8), is a popular local congressman.

Others said Deeds would also be too conservative for the Democratic primary voters of Northern Virginia.

Deeds had voted in favor of bill that would have allowed people to wear concealed guns in bars, a measure that Gov. Tim Kaine (D) vetoed and the Fairfax County government actively lobbied against



people came up to him and said they were voting for him," said Petersen.

In days leading up to the election, the newspaper also followed up with two more editorial columns praising Deeds, including one admonishing the Moran campaign for being "misleading" about Deeds' record on gun control.

"In a general election, I don't think the Washington Post endorsement makes as much of a difference. But the people voting in this primary are the type of people who read newspaper editorials and I think it has made a difference," said Rex Simmons, a Fairfax Station resident who was volunteering for the Democratic Party outside a polling station.

Primary voters said Deeds support for increasing Northern Virginia's state transportation funding was important.

In 2008, Deeds supported a failed bill that would have raised the gas tax statewide to provide more transportation funding, even though many of his own constituents were unhappy with the decision. Moran did not support the plan, in part because he did not believe it would be politically viable as a time when gas prices were reaching record highs.

"I think Deeds has a better record on the issues like transportation that affect us than the other candidates," said Carolyn Lee Decker, a Fairfax Station resident who voted for Deeds.

Among the runners up, Moran outperformed McAuliffe in Fairfax County, despite losing to him overall in Virginia.

The former delegate won about six Fairfax precincts that directly abut or are very close to the City of Alexandria, which he used to represent. He also performed about seven percentage points higher — for a total of 35.43 percent overall — in those Fairfax County polling stations than overlap with his brother's congressional district.

McAuliffe did not earn more than 45 percent of the vote at any Fairfax County polling station but won about still won about three precincts. His strongest support was found in parts of Herndon, Lorton and Centreville.

Historically, Virginia and Fairfax have low primary turnout.

this year. The state senator had also voted in favor of changing the Virginia constitution to define marriage as between a man and a woman, thereby limiting same sex partner benefits.

But Fairfax County Democratic Committee chair Scott Surovell said Democratic primary voters were most concerned with picking the person who could beat McDonnell in the fall.

"A lot of people assume that hard-core Democrats are single issue voters like hardcore Republicans and they are not. Democratic Party people tend to vote 'electability' over social policy," said Surovell.

"They may not agree with Creigh's voting record on guns and gay marriage but a lot of Democrats recognize that the rest of the state doesn't think like Fairfax County

and Arlington," he added.

Deeds did pick up a lot of support in Fairfax's more conservative, Republican-leaning like Clifton, Fairfax Station and Newgate South.

But one of his largest precinct wins — getting 65 percent of the vote at the Sunrise Valley Elementary School — came in Reston, one of Fairfax's most socially lib-

eral communities.

Several Deeds supporters said the campaign began to gain momentum and attention in Northern Virginia after The Washington Post editorial board endorsed the candidate on May 22.



South County Hires Wrestling Coach

After helping to resurrect a Gar-Field wrestling program that for the past seven years has posted a dual-meet record of 149-56 and finished as the Northwest Region's runner-up three times, Sean Anderson is moving north, albeit not by much.

Anderson spent the past seven seasons as an assistant coach at Gar-Field and on Thursday, June 4, was hired to succeed Andy Jimmo as the head coach of South County's wrestling program. Jimmo helped the Stallions garner the program's first-ever Patriot District title this past season.

"With a new coach, there are always going to be changes, but I hope that they're not too drastic," said Anderson, who will continue to serve as a social studies teacher at Gar-Field. "At Gar-Field, when I first came on, we were able to elevate that program from being very average to a top-10-in-the-state team consistently for about five or six years in a row.

"I think there's potential at South County to make that a top-10-in-the-state team on a regular basis."

During Jimmo's tenure, South County's wrestlers earned a Northern Region-wide reputation for enduring some rather innovative and excruciating training techniques. Carrying sandbags and swinging sledgehammers were familiar sights around Lorton.

While Anderson didn't commit to have his entire off-season program based around flipping monster truck tires, he didn't rule it out either, especially if the wrestlers are willing to work.

"We didn't quite do it like that at Gar-Field, but I know our football coach was doing things like that," Anderson said.

Rams Shocked In Final

Robinson girls' lacrosse coach Alison Neun approached each one of her players following this past Sunday's stunning 13-4 loss to Chantilly in the Virginia AAA state title game. Though Neun was aware that words wouldn't make the pain subside, she reassured her team that it wouldn't be

judged on one day's performance.

"I told these girls, you really don't measure your career by trophies, because if you did only, these two teams would be happy with what they've done," Neun said. "And these girls from the start had so much heart."

The state final unfolded completely opposite of how anyone wearing blue and gold would've expected — or wanted — it to. Chantilly raced out to a seven-goal lead before Robinson got on the board, which happened after a Courtney Coleman goal with 12 minutes, 27 seconds left in the first half.

But the Chargers went on another five-goal run and had a 12-1 lead with 9 minutes to play. Robinson (17-4) scored three of the game's final four goals, making one last push behind scores from Coleman, Tory Barron and Katie McHugh.

"They could've given up when this team went ahead on them, but instead of giving up, they just kept on fighting," Neun said. "I'm really proud of them for doing that."

Of course if Neun was looking to measure her team's season by trophies, those two commemorating the Rams' Concorde District and Northern Region title game victories would surely suffice.

It's a Rugby Day In Fairfax County

The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors declared Saturday, June 6 to be Rugby Day in the county. Supervisor Pat Herrity (R-Springfield) sponsored the proclamation. The event also coincided with the first-ever crowning for a Virginia state rugby champion with three title games, and though they were supposed to take place at South County Secondary School in Lorton, rain forced a move to the turf field at T.C. Williams.

"I played rugby when I was in high school and I am pleased to see that the sport has grown so much that we now have an official high school state championship," Herrity said in a statement. "Any time we can expand access to athletic programs, it's a good thing." On Saturday, both the Western Loudoun boys' and girls' teams swept the U-19 Division I games, while the T.C. Williams boys' team won the Division II game.




