

Tour de Cure Raises Funds, Awareness

Cycling fund raiser held in Reston.

More than 1,500 cyclists participated in Reston's Tour de Cure Sunday, June 14, an event sponsored by and benefiting the American Diabetes Association (ADA). Cyclists of all ages were encouraged to participate.

Sean Frankel, 9, and his father Artur Frankel took the 12-mile trail. Sean said about diabetes, "It's something really bad and I would like to cure it." He also said the bike ride was enjoyable as well as help-

ful towards the cause.

Artur Frankel said that he and his son were motivated to participate in this event because "Several family members have either diabetes or borderline diabetes. ... It seems like something curable".

Other participants include red riders who wear red to indicate that they have diabetes. Vanj Real was a red rider for the second year. She has type 2 diabetes. She said from the perspective of one who has the disease, "It's fun to see people really support the cause."

Some participants did not cycle, but still worked to benefit the cause. Alicia Geller,

the volunteer coordinator, helped facilitate the event. She ensured that rest stations were properly equipped and that Route Marshals knew where to be among other tasks. "I think diabetes is a disease that can be managed with research and education," said Geller.

After cyclists roll in from as long as a 100-mile ride, they were greeted by refreshments and entertainment. The Merchants of Cool were the band playing to welcome back the cyclists from their rides. Mark Beeson, the bass player and son of a 40-year-old diabetic, said, "We love [playing at this event]. It's our way of giving back".

The American Diabetes Association's Tour de Cure has had thousands of riders and raised hundreds of thousands of dollars. This year in Reston, approximately \$500,000 was raised.

Promoting Newest Reston Trail

Restonpaths.com creator leads group 2.2 miles along Lakes Thoreau and Audubon.

The Reston Historic Trust took advantage of the beautiful day on Sunday, June 14 on a walk around the newest Reston trail. The Lake Audubon - Lake Thoreau Trail begins at the Lake Thoreau docks at the South Lakes Village Center and follows the shore of Lake Thoreau before crossing underneath South Lakes Drive to a trail on the Lake Audubon shoreline. The 2.2-mile trail goes nearly all the way around Lake Audubon.

Bonnie White, a member of the Reston Historic Trust who organizes walks for the group, said that the Trust goes on group walks once a month and is led once a year or so by Doug Pew, a member of

the Reston Trails and Sidewalks Committee and creator of restonpaths.com. Using his knowledge of Reston's trails' history, Pew gave a history of different trails and forks in the road as the group passed them, information that clicks with the Trust's goal of preserving and sharing Reston's community's history.

"We're the Reston Historic Trust," said White. "We like walks with a story."

And the Lake-Audubon-Lake Thoreau Trail has a story. According to Pew, the trail took two extra years to complete.

"All the developments in Reston had to be completed [before the trail could be completed]," said Pew.

THE TRAIL runs along private docks and townhomes, which provide walkers with a scenic view, but caused delays in its comple-

tion. Delays in the completion of the trail were due in part to bureaucratic complications that arose when issues with access to the trail resulted in a change in the site plan, and in part to the trail's difficult location; vehicles with asphalt for the pavement had to go down a steep grade to complete their work. But the trail was completed in late 2008, and Pew is relieved.

"I kept bugging them to get that trail done," he said.

Pew is a walker himself. "I've been walking everywhere I've lived," he said. When he moved to Reston he became familiar with the trails, thanks in part to a helpful and curious dog that helped him explore on his walks.

Reston's 55 miles of trails were built when Reston was founded, part of the picture of Robert E. Simon's planned community. "The idea was to keep people off the streets so they wouldn't interfere with traffic," said Pew. "As it turned out, the trails are wonderful for hiking, but a

The Fall Line-Up

Virginia Democrats were decisive in their pick for a nominee for governor last week. Sen. Creigh Deeds (D-25), who was the most moderate of the three contenders, scored a knockout victory. There was no question who was the winner with Creigh taking half the votes, and the other two candidates quickly fell in behind and in full support of him in a Unity Rally in which I participated the morning after the election.

In recent years, Creigh has gotten statewide attention by getting his Senate colleagues to agree to an independent redistricting commission only to have it defeated in the same House committee that has killed my bill on the same subject for many years. He is a strong advocate for public schools and a progressive on energy issues. Although a country boy by birth, hailing from tiny Bath County in western Virginia, he has shown an amazing capacity to understand the needs of the cities and suburbs. Apparently, Republicans will make an issue of his vote for a gas tax increase to relieve traffic congestion and improve road conditions in Northern Virginia and the high growth areas. Just think how much better off we might be in Northern Virginia if the Senate bill he supported would have passed the House committee that killed that bill and all other efforts to respond to the transportation crisis in the suburban communities.

Also victorious on Tuesday of last week was former Treasurer of Virginia and former Secretary of

Finance of the Commonwealth, **J o d y W a g n e r**, who will be the Democratic nominee for lieutenant governor. Few candidates for that office have had the incredible experience that she brings to the job. She has been in key positions during the administrations of Govs. Mark Warner (D) and Tim Kaine (D) when the state was named the best managed in the country and the best for business, and despite challenging economic times maintained its triple A best possible bond rating. She will be able to move into a responsible role immediately supporting the governor.

Completing the Democratic ticket is Del. Steve Shannon (D-35) who got the attorney general nomination without a primary challenge. A former prosecutor for Fairfax County, Steve brings impeccable credentials to his candidacy. He is well respected throughout the state which in part led to his getting the nomination without a primary battle.

Others will write about the ticket on the Republican side. I know each of them having served with them in the General Assembly. Bob McDonnell was in the House of Delegates before narrowly defeating Creigh Deeds for the attorney general position four years ago. Both current Lt. Gov. Bill Bolling and attorney general candidate Ken Cuccinelli served in the State Senate, where Cuccinelli is still a member. I have had some difficulty recognizing them recently as they

Danger of Tysonization

The Master Planning exercise begun June 16 will shape Reston's future growth, for better or for worse. As I mentioned in a recent column, there are already numerous construction projects on their way to County, not community, approval. Just these projects will result in 4,000-5,000 new homes and 3 million to 4 million square feet of new commercial and retail space. None includes plans or funding for transportation infrastructure to support them, because that's not the way this county does business. Fairfax approves developer building plans with only a *pro forma* look at impacts. On a separate track, the Virginia Department of Transportation plans and builds transport infrastructure based on its own priorities and state appropriations. That is why Tysons Corner is the congested nightmare it is today and on the way to far worse according to outside review of Fairfax County's newest plans to redevelop for more density.

Unless we use the Master Plan to change the way planning is done, at least in Reston, count on being Tysonized for the sake of more property tax base and developer profit. In revising our Plan, we must insist transportation improvements be built into all new projects before they go merrily off to county blessing. A determination for each project on what improvements are needed must be based on independent analysis, not the typical hokey, self-serving developer studies like the recent one which concluded that building 600 new homes on North

Shore Drive would generate just 100 car trips daily!

It's time to stop ignoring the single most cost-efficient improvements that would make a major difference in reducing vehicular traffic and congestion, making bicycling an integral part of transportation infrastructure. Here's how.

Right now traveling by bicycle in Reston is hazardous and few try it, other than using the RA trails, which don't serve well for commuting to work or shopping. Adding bike lanes at main road edges or designating paths alongside for shared use are much cheaper than more car lanes and effective in reducing cars on our roads. To start, signed bike routes should be designated where wide curb lanes already exist on the following: North Shore, Village Road, Center Harbor, Bennington Woods, Colts Neck (south of Glade), Soapstone (south of Glade), Lake Newport, Twin Branches, Glade and Steeplechase. Just some paint and a few signs. Major thoroughfares would require adding wide bike lanes and signage — but would carry a lot of cyclists: North/South-Reston Parkway, Wiehle, Town Center Parkway, Hunter Mill; East/West-Baron Cameron, New Dominion, Sunset Hills, Sunrise Valley, South Lakes and Lawyers. Other streets in Town Center are OK as is for bikes because speeds are slow.

For a very low cost, Reston could make bicycling a significant part of our transportation picture and make a big dent in the number of cars on the road.

Band of Locals Form Movie 'Fellowship'

Fans of gaming, 'Lord of the Rings' set out to make fan film.

What do two former Alexandria City cops and a onetime Norfolk journalist have in common?

One answer would be a penchant for jumping careers: former newspaperman Scott Mathias, now living in Reston, works in health care marketing. Shane McClung, still an Alexandria resident, has worked as a systems engineer for NASA, started a couple of his own companies and still works in information technology. And Ron Newcomb followed a four-year stint as a minister at McLean Bible Church with his own career in information technology. He now lives in Woodbridge.

But other commonalities include online gaming proficiency, a love of the "Lord of the Rings" series and one dream to bind them.

"Our goal has always been to make a feature-length film," Mathias said.

"Rings" fans are eager for anything connected to the series.

By carefully targeting a specific fan base, a movie can appeal to a larger audience, Newcomb said, invoking the movie's tagline, "There's a little bit of geek and hero in all of us."

IN THE FILM, the leader of the band of teenagers has been framed and has the evidence of his innocence on a flash drive, which, like the One Ring, must be protected at all costs, Mathias said. On their journey, the teens arrive at a truck stop that reflects the crossroads town of Bree, a stopping place for travelers of Middle Earth. Later, they encounter a hippie commune loosely resembling the Elven kingdom of Rivendell. A shadowy, motorcycle-riding pursuer evokes the evil Nazgul of Tolkien's saga. And no reworking of the "Lord of the Rings" would be complete without a creepy, Gollum-like character.

"There are a lot of little nods the true fans will find kind of funny," Mathias said, noting that the character of Tom Bombadil, left out of the movies to the chagrin of some fans, enjoys a reincarnation in "The Fellowship."

He stressed that the film, while a comedy, was more homage than parody.

Mathias said the group hoped to release the movie in 2010 or 2011, noting that two "Hobbit" films are to be released in 2011 and 2012. "We would love to come out hopefully right before the first film comes out," he said, wanting the movie to serve as an appetizer for eager fans.

He said the group would talk to distributors about showing the film and would take it to film festivals.

THAT FILM, called "The Fellowship," will tell the story of four teenagers on a quest to attend a "Lord of the Rings" gaming convention in Orlando, Fla., even as their own journey parallels the eponymous trilogy. Shooting will begin Aug. 10 and end in early September.

"You write about things you enjoy and that you know about," Mathias said.

He and Newcomb met in 2004 in a different sort of fellowship — the Fellowship of Christian Filmmakers, which Newcomb founded through McLean Bible Church and which Mathias joined as one of the first members of the steering committee.

Last May, the two struck out on their own to create Opening Act Productions, with "The Fellowship" already in mind. They co-wrote the script, and a friend living in Northern California, Christopher Bunn, helped them with a rewrite.

They brought on McClung to handle the business end of the operation. McClung said he needed no convincing. "I know these guys, so I know the attitude of these guys and the way they do things. They're the kind of people who will not let anything fail," he said, adding that he too was a gamer and J.R.R. Tolkien fan.

The group began by soliciting investments from friends, family and other acquaintances, Mathias said. As people became attached to the project, they brought others on board. Now, he and his colleagues were seeking out prospective investors, armed with business plans and financial projections. Mathias said they were nearing their target budget of almost \$100,000.

He said the movie had a broad niche to tap into, noting that the online game "World of Warcraft" has 11 million subscribers, while legions of "Lord of the

lot of people are reluctant to get off the streets ... As a result, we're doing a lot of sidewalk work now."

Though the paths didn't work out as an alternative to sidewalks, they provide a different angle for Restonians who take advantage of them, supplying a place to hike and enjoy the woods in an otherwise urban environment. In 2000, Pew created restonpaths.com, a Web site that provides maps and routes of Reston trails, to make it easier for community members to take advantage of the trails.

"I feel that people need a healthy environment, they need a healthy lifestyle," said Pew, who believes that getting out on the trails can be a source of this for Restonians. Restonpaths.com earned Pew his spot on the Reston Trails and Sidewalks Committee. Requests for new trails and sidewalks that come

into Supervisor Hudgins' office are forwarded to him.

PLANS for new trails and information on funding for new projects can be found at restonpaths.com/trails. Many current plans include expansions of sidewalks, including one between South Lakes Drive and Glade Drive at Soapstone Drive and another on Colt's Neck Road.

"The next project's going to be on Colt's Neck Road, in fact it's a little overdue ... they're going to build sidewalks on both sides of the road," said Pew.

Should that not work, he said, they would sell copies themselves at conventions. "That'll be a bit of work if it goes down that way, but we want to get our money back and our investors' money."

THE FIRST CASTING CALL took place on Saturday, June 13 in Arlington, to be followed by two more on June 18 and 30. The cast will consist of local actors. Mathias said the crew is currently scouting for shooting locations, all of which will be in Northern Virginia and southern Maryland.

Newcomb pointed out that the lagging economy had brought down the costs of production. "I can pull off a bigger-budget film on a lower budget," he said. It is not the first time Newcomb has seized an opportunity in unlikely circumstances. He made use of his position at McLean Bible Church to offer filmmaking workshops in an attempt to revitalize the local film community. And, as a "pastor during the day and gamer at night," he said, "I had some of the most open theological discussions

online." The anonymous format, he said, helped some people to talk about things they might not discuss face-to-face.

Asked whether, as a former pastor, he was comfortable with the violence of some online gaming, Newcomb said he viewed the fighting as battles of good versus evil, to which he could relate. "As a Christian, I know there's another battle going on," he said. More importantly, he said, the gaming community gave its members, many of them youths, a sense of having a place in something larger, just as he hoped the movie he had co-written would do for its audience. "Become who you were born to be," he said, quoting the Elven Lord Elrond as he presented Aragorn with the ancestral sword of his fathers.

For Newcomb, Mathias and McClung, "The Fellowship," as well as the two other films they have in the works, is part of a larger quest.

"All of our films are geared toward the underlying theme of helping people," McClung said. "The theme of the company is helping people."

Rivals Turned Teammates, Friends

Oakton's Keith Werman, Lake Braddock's Shane Halley, now teammates, help Cavalier baseball squad.

In the moments that followed the University of Virginia baseball team's ACC Championship-clinching victory over Florida State on May 24, players celebrated, parents fumbled with their digital cameras and Shane Halley and Keith Werman did something that would've made them both sick had it occurred only 12 months earlier.

They stood and posed for one of those pictures. Together. Holding a trophy.

Though they played opposite each other at two of Northern Virginia's top baseball programs in Lake Braddock and Oakton, respectively, Halley and Werman both have made significant contributions to a history-making Virginia squad this spring as true freshmen.

After a 6-3 win over the Seminoles where Halley entered the game as a late-inning substitution and Werman went 0-for-4 while starting at second base and batting in the No. 9 hole, the pair obliged as teammate Will Campbell insisted that they pose together with the ACC trophy.

"Lake Braddock and Oakton have always been big rivals come playoff time, and finally we were together to win a championship and that was pretty awesome," Werman said. "We just said that we had to get a picture of this."

The ACC title hasn't been the only awesome thing for the Cavaliers (49-14-1) this season. Halley and Werman have enjoyed a why-isn't-every-year-like-this ride that continued Monday afternoon with a victory in the College World Series — the school's first. Behind two hits, two RBIs and two runs scored from Werman, the Cavaliers disposed of Cal State Fullerton, 7-5, and they will now face Arkansas on Wednesday night.

Werman DIDN'T mind having his head shaved. At the beginning of the season, Virginia threw a formal banquet to officially start its season, and, as tradition dictates, all of the freshmen had to get a trim. The haircut was also symbolic. It served as the first and last form of playful harassment put forth by the veteran players.

Both noticed it early on: The older players did not mess with the younger guys. They embraced them. They made them feel comfortable. Which was important as Virginia started four of those freshmen Monday.

Halley didn't waste any time providing Virginia with validation of its recruiting efforts, striking out the side during his first career appearance Feb. 22 during a 12-0 win over Bucknell. On the season, Halley had amassed a 3-0 record on the mound with 23 strikeouts and a 1.86 ERA as of Wednesday morn-

ing. In 19 1/3 innings, he's only walked three batters. At the plate, Halley has four hits in eight at-bats.

For his success, Halley attributed most of it to pitching coach Karl Kuhn, whose about-face approach has sat well with the right-hander.

"The mental approach is the same: You want to go after every guy," Halley said of the primary difference between high school and college baseball. "But going about that is a little different than you'd do in high school. In college, it's more location than just being able to rear-back and blow it by someone."

WITH HIS HAIR gone, Werman was also without something that has appeared nearly as often: playing time. A mainstay behind the plate and in the infield at Oakton, rarely had Werman been relegated to the bench like he was during the early part of this spring.

But ever since a May 10 win over Duke, Werman been a regular presence at second base for the Cavaliers. With a batting average of .406 (28-for-69) through Wednesday morning with a .488 on-base percentage, he's been an effective one, too.

"To be completely honest, it was a major adjustment," said Werman, who has gone 6-for-9 with two doubles and three RBIs during his team's first two CWS games. "Really, I think it's the biggest adjustment that I ever made with baseball."

Halley and Werman lived in adjacent dorms — Halley in Kent, Werman in Dabney — but spent a considerable amount of time together this year away from baseball. As both will admit, their Northern Region rivalries didn't exactly bring the two closer together. But Virginia did.

"This means a lot to us and I'm sure that means a lot to the people back home," Werman said. "I know they're there to support us. It definitely brings us together, and we're proud of where we've gotten to so far."

"Finally, we were together to win a championship and that was pretty awesome."

Chemo-Cocktailing at the Depot

Now that the cancer cat is out of the bag (see June 10th column titled, "Dying To Tell You, Sort Of"), I suppose it's reasonable to keep my readership (what there is of it) apprised of goings on. Today, as I sit and write, I am being infused (the medical profession has its own fancy word for chemotherapy) and attempting to write while I am being treated (it's not painful).

This is chemo-cocktail number two of four (or six) total; a final determination has yet to be made; the treatment is sort of fluid (no pun intended), depending on how I tolerate it. Due to a "normal" brain scan (thank God!) indicating that the cancer had not spread to my brain, my oncologist was able to add a third chemical to my intravenous mix, a chemical called Avastin, known for its effectiveness in fighting brain cancer. So, here I sit, comfortable in a barcalounger-type, blue recliner watching the I.V. drip its magic potion (some might characterize it as poison) directly into my vein in order to kill the cancer cells, cut off the blood supply to the targeted tumors — hopefully shrinking them in the process; in this context, shrinkage is the hoped for result) and not side-effect me so uncomfortably that we have to modify the treatment. After all, it's the tumors we're after, not my comfort. But my body has to cooperate, and that's not exactly in the patient's control.

At this very moment, control is what I don't have. Nor, according to my oncologist, do I have a lot of time. But that can change, results both good and bad can alter the present and as a result, most definitely alter the future. Medicine/treatment is not arithmetic, it's not an exact science; certainly what my doctor says is a bit more than a presumption but it's not necessarily so simply because he says it is. As a patient, I have some say. And even though I'm sitting down at this very moment, it doesn't mean I'm going to take the treatment sitting down, if you know what I mean.

However, at this early stage (of the treatment, not the diagnosis), I'm a bit unclear how to proceed. As you can imagine, after receiving a diagnosis of this severity, your priorities change. People, places, things that mattered previously don't seem to matter nearly as much. It's not so much apathy as it is antipathy. But that's unhelpful, and counterproductive even, so far as affecting the cancer. "Live, love, laugh" is a mantra that I've been encouraged to embrace; as is having a positive mental attitude/approach, both of which are proven, anecdotally speaking, cancer fighters. And thanks to my parents, I have them both. I have to admit though, a diagnosis of this kind will shake you to the core.

My challenge is to plan for the worst, yet live for the best. And it remains a difficult pursuit. It's as if I'm serving two masters, each requiring different types of loyalties. Loyalties that, given my abbreviated life expectancy, are tested on a daily basis. How do I plan for a future that's no longer guaranteed and not have it impact my present?

Each day that I wake up, in relative good health, it becomes more normal, or should I be honest and call it, "the new normal." Because that's what my life has to become, as in doing as many of the things I used to do (health considerations notwithstanding) before. Sure, I have some issues, but it's nothing I can't handle. And the longer I continue to have these issues, the better I'm able to adapt. Moreover, each day, I'm learning more about my situation and the alternatives (some non-traditional) that are available to me.

Chemotherapy is the beginning, but it doesn't have to be the end.


