Rattling State's Cash Jar

Governor commits to working toward expanding dental coverage to uninsured adults.

s Washington grapples with health-care reform, Willie Jackson is facing his own healthcare crisis. He must choose between paying for a place to stay or scraping together enough money to fix his seven rotting teeth. It's a choice that illustrates the difficult real-world decisions people without dental insurance face every day.

"My teeth are loose," said Jackson. "They are so loose, I have to be very careful about what I eat."

Jackson told his story to Democratic Gov. Tim Kaine and 1,100 participants of a new interfaith religious group known as Virginians Organized for Justice and Political Participation — oknown as VOICE. The group, which was created last October, called a mass

\$3 Million for Route 1 Expansion

County will pay to design six-lane highway for two-mile stretch.

ecause of the lack of commitment by the Virginia Department of Transportation and knowing the military base realignment is on schedule to be completed by 2011, the Board of Supervisors approved \$3 million last week for a Route 1 highway expansion design for six lanes and a median and turnaround lane for a two-mile section of Route 1 beginning at Route 235 south to the Fairfax county parkway. This includes the section of Route 1 that runs through Fort Belvoir where the bulk of the traffic will be moving on and off the base at the entrance gates.

Correspondence

The following summarizes the letters of correspondence marking the history of the Board of Supervisors' effort to obtain the necessary commitment to complete the studies necessary to move forward on an enhanced Route 1 corridor road, light rail, enhanced bus, or combination to prepare for the increase in vehicular traffic beginning in 2011.

May 25, 2006: Letter from VDOT to Katherine Ichter, County Department of Transportation, committing \$1 million to fund the transit study but placing the location study on hold. Eventually this money was reallocated to other priorities by VDOT.

July 25, 2007: Letter from the Board of Supervisors to the Secretary of Transportation and Director of Rail and Public Transportation requesting an explanation as to why the requested and agreed upon transit study has not been initiated. No explanation has been received by the board.

Jan. 28, 2008: Letter from the Board of Supervisors to the Secretary of the Department of Transportation requesting an explanation for why the transit funding is no longer available and why the study has not been initiated. No response has been received as of July 21, 2009.



Lannan Pitches for Pets

Nationals pitcher talks about pet ownership at local PETCO.

variety of wide-eyed and furry fans greeted Washington National's pitcher John Lannan at the PETCO on Richmond Highway last Saturday, where Lannan joined the Washington Humane Society to sign autographs and promote responsible pet adoption.

Lannan's agent Todd Wiseman noted the event is part of the effort to get the major-league pitcher involved with the community. Lannan spent two hours signing autographs, doling advice for young baseball players, and scratching ears.

Lannan admits he didn't have much exposure to animals as a child aside from the occasional low-maintenance gerbil. But when his grandmother rescued their first dog, Lannan was hooked. The pitcher bought a French bulldog-beagle mix named Bailey last October. However, the traveling required with a Major League baseball team makes it difficult for him to give Bailey constant care, so he relies on the support of his family to lend a hand.

"It's a lot of work, " said

Lannan regarding dog ownership, "it's a lot of responsibility."

This responsibility is fundamental to the Humane Society's message. Julie Conway, chief development officer for the Society, acknowledges Lannan's support of their organization enhances his ability to act as a role model for young fans.

"If kids see pro-athletes loving animals, they're going to love animals, too," said Conway.

The Humane Society had its "Adoption Mobile" parked outside the PETCO during Lannan's visit to encourage the adoption of young dogs. And Lannan was just as enthusiastic about engaging the animals as he was fans, who often brought along their own pets. While the 24-year-old does admit he is not crazy about cats, he nevertheless welcomed a multitude of Nats enthusiasts — young, old, with fur or scales — to join him.

Lannan acknowledged one of the best parts of being a petowner is their ability to bring a family together, as happened with his own dog Bailey.

"You don't just get a pet temporarily," said Conway. "They are a part of your family and they're part of your family for life."

Park's Project Under Way

Design for wetlands restoration almost complete, approval process to begin.



espite Park Authority cutbacks in staffing and revenue, the Wetlands Restoration Project for Huntley Meadows Park is on schedule. Supported by Bond referenda in 2004 and again in 2008, the park project is immune from current cutbacks.

The restoration project is the first of its kind at the park and, according to county and citizen supporters, is vital to the long-term survival of the park as a non-tidal wetlands habitat.

Huntley Meadows Park, located in the southern Fairfax county area off Route 1, encompasses 1,480 acres of wetlands, forests, and meadows that is teeming with a diverse wildlife population according to park literature and citizen advocates who regularly visit the park. Permanent inhabitants include deer, turkey, beaver, and more than 200 species of birds. It is the only non-tidal freshwater wetlands habitat in the region, and is annually visited by 200,000 visitors.

"The park is a fragile ecosystem which is being stressed by urban development. Asphalt driveways, concrete sidewalks, lawns, pesticides, storm water and non-point runoff, and pollutants dumped into the feeder streams which end

able tools for preservation and management of the park that we don't have now," said Park Manager Kevin Munroe.

Wetlands restoration doesn't happen overnight. It has taken county managers years of effort to bring them to this historic point in the life of the park. Before Munroe became the park manager two years ago, Gary Roisum was the manager for 30 years before retiring. Munroe credits Roisum as instrumental in making the restoration project a reality. "Because of Gary's vision and commitment, we have an opportunity to sustain the marsh habitat for the long term future," Munroe said.

But according to Munroe, the project is not without its problems. Primarily the permitting process will require perhaps a year to obtain all the necessary environmental approvals before the actual construction work can be started.

The complexity and unique environmental requirements of the water control system design will be a major hurdle in the permitting process that involves federal, state, and county government agencies, he said. The design of the restoration project has required public and expert consultation, and the work of a civil engineering firm. The design work is almost completed and now the approval process is the next step.

Environmental activists have played a major role

for years in promoting the need for the wetlands restoration project and influencing the design. Approximately 200 citizens commented on the design.

"The design was modeled after other successful marsh restoration projects elsewhere in the U.S.," said Norma Hoffmann, a member of the Friends of Huntley Meadows. "The key to preserving Huntley Meadow's diversity is to control the rise and fall of the water in the marsh in the park; with the completion of this restoration project, and with continued dedicated stewardship of the park, we will preserve and protect the park and its many inhabitants for many years."

Munroe said, "On behalf of the Park Authority and Huntley Meadows Park we cannot be more excited about this historic project. With the help and support of the community, we will do our part to make a sustainable wetlands habitat a reality for generations yet unborn."

personal and at times emotional testimony, the governor pledged to "rattle the cash jar" for expanding dental coverage for the uninsured.

"Candidly this issue was not on my radar screen before," said Kaine. "But it's on my to-do list now because of VOICE."

Kaine reminded the capacity crowd that in the first year of his administration he worked to expand dental coverage to 100,000 additional low-income children early in his administration. But he admitted that after achieving that victory, the issue of expanding dental coverage to the uninsured was no longer a concern. That's why VOICE leaders said after the meeting they counted the governor's commitment to rattling the cash jar as an important victory —oeven if the governor stopped short of promising he would find funding for the issue.

"To be honest, I would have liked to hear him say he was going to put it in the budget," said Kerry Kincannon, pastor of Rising Hope United Methodist Mission Church. "But I understand his constraints."

THE OTHER ISSUE on the agenda Monday night at T.C. Williams High School was the persistent federal delays in processing naturalization applications of Northern Virginia residents. Although Virginia's two United States senators were unable to attend the meeting because of business at the Capitol, their representatives were presented with 200 individual cases VOICE leaders said demanded their attention. And they pressed for speeding up the processing time in Northern Virginia, which lags behind other areas of the country.

"We have an immigration backlog in this part of the county that just doesn't happen in other parts of the county," said Kincannon. "We've heard of cases that can take a year or more to process. That's just too long, especially for families that might not be able to pay a second application fee after the first one expires."

The religious leaders also pressed the senatorial proxies for greater accountability from the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service on processing citizenship, permanent residency and asylum applications form families in Northern Virginia. The audience gasped when one woman explained that she wasn't able to attend the funeral of her son in Indonesia because she was told she would not be able to return to the United States. Kaine agreed that the woman deserved better.

"How hard is it?" the governor asked, his voice cracking with emotion. "It's not that

SINCE ITS CREATION in October, the multi-faith organization has been pushing for a number of specific action items across the political spectrum. Earlier this year it was able to persuade elected officials in Alexandria and Fairfax County to maintain funding levels for affordable housing and expand dental coverage locally through the Northern Virginia Dental Clinic. In the future, VOICE leaders say, they would like to meet with U.S. Department of Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano to press for speedier processing of applications for citizenship, green cards and political asylum. In the future, leaders say, the group will seek to broaden its advocacy for maintaining affordable housing in Northern Virginia. One of the key areas where they plan to focus their efforts in Mount Vernon is a site off Popkins Lane in the area of Woodley Hills Trailer Park known as "North Hill."

"We are not a single-issue organization," said Kincannon. "And we plan to be around

VOICE was founded on Oct. 5, 2008 as a multi-faith, multi-racial, non-partisan coalition of religious organizations seeking social justice. Participating groups include a range of the Northern Virginia religious community, and has grown from 40 member organizations to 48 since it was created. Leaders say the focus of the group is to advocate for low-income residents of Northern Virginia - ospecifically on issues pertaining to affordable housing, immigration and health care.

"VOICE has shown we are willing and able to use our power network with elected officials to craft solutions to improve the lives of all our families and communities," said Leonard Hamlin, one of the chief clergy leaders of the organization. "It is in times like these that we need to stand up with

projected increase in vehicular traffic. The U.S. Army's traffic consultant, Jim Curran, estimated peak hour vehicular traffic on Route 1 north and south of Fort Belvoir will increase from 1,800 vehicles per hour to 2,300 vehicles per hour. The traffic analysis was completed in 2007.

NOW THAT the funds have been made available by the supervisors to design the highway expansion, when can military employees and dependents, Mt.Vernon area residents, and other area travelers expect the work to be completed? Katherine Ichter, a county transportation official, estimated that it may take two years to complete the design, two more years to acquire the land needed for the highway expansion, and one more year to relocate utilities. Thus, the BRAC MILITARY spokesman Don Carr area is unlikely to see the completion of

construction of an upgraded Route 1 for this segment for five or six years, or 2014-15.

The six-year time frame for a two-mile segment of Route 1 means improvements in the much longer 7.4 mile stretch of highway from the Route 235 and Route 1 intersection north to the Beltway will lag even further behind since transit analysis has yet to be funded and the length of roadway upgrade is almost four times the distance of the Fort Belvoir section of Route 1.

With the completion of the Fort Belvoir expansion well underway and projected to be fully operational by 2011 or 2012, the southern Fairfax county community will be confronted with difficult traffic problems "far beyond what currently exists today," according to Ichter.

Completed in 2003, this study recommended phased implementation of enhanced bus service. It also concluded that light rail was a long-term possibility. Fort Belvoir expansion was a consideration at this point.

Fairfax County and Prince William County requested and VDOT commissioned a multi-year location study including environmental assessment. The study concluded that transit expansion was needed, however, it should not preclude the need to construct the proposed Route 1 highway improvements. The Steering committee approved the location plans for two of the three segments of Route1; the third northern segment should be held in abeyance until the completion of a long-term transit study for this segment.

and BRAC hospital representative Dr. Richard Repeta provided these people projections of daily, weekly, and annual visits to the Fort Belvoir main post on Route 1 beginning 2011:

- ❖ Total employees coming daily to the Fort Belvoir Main Post: 3,400.
- ❖ Patient visits at new Ft. Belvoir hospital: 500,000 annually; or 4,000 per week.
- ❖ Eligible medical beneficiaries in the northern Virginia service area who may be coming to the Fort Belvoir Hospital: 225,000 (active duty and depen-

dents; retired military and dependent family).

❖ Wounded Warriors Transition Rehabilitation Complex (288 patients); up to 35 percent are projected to be combat and non-combat related patients from Iraq and Afghanistan. No projections available on families visiting annually for this new facility.

In addition, plans are in the works to locate a new military museum. One of the site options being considered is at the main post of Fort Belvoir. The museum would be of interest to visitors from throughout the United States. One BRAC spokesman projected up to 400,000 visitors annually to the museum.

Loval Man Arrested for Threatening Federal Judges

FBI officials arrested Stephen H. Rosenberg, 51, at his Alexandria home on July 15 after Rosenberg threatened to kill federal judges in South Carolina through e-mail communication, according to Joseph Persichini Jr., of the FBI.

Since appearing in federal court in South Carolina on May 11, 2009, Rosenberg, a plaintiff in his civil case against South Carolina and the United States, has sent numerous threatening e-mails to the federal judge that presided over his case in the Colum-

bia Division of the U.S. District Court of South Carolina, Persichini said.

A South Carolina federal grand jury indicted Rosenberg on July 7, 2009. He is charged one count of "knowingly transmitting in interstate commerce" e-mail communications threatening to kill judges in South Carolina. He is also charged with one count of threatening to influence and intimidate a federal judge.

Some Swine Flu Risks

If you're sick, stay home from work; if the children are sick, keep them home from school.

Control, Virginia has had more than 300 confirmed or probable cases of swine flu, and two deaths from the swine flu, including one in Arlington. A 27year-old Alexandria man, hospitalized with a confirmed case of H1N1 flu, died in EDITORIAL

We suspect the actual number of cases of swine flu in Virginia to be much higher, given the example of other states, e.g.

Wisconsin, which reports more than 6,000 probably or confirmed cases of swine flu, but just eight deaths.

Cases have spiked in Virginia in recent weeks according to the Virginia Department of Health, during a time when health officials say anyone with flu symptoms of sore throat, fever and cough almost certainly is infected with swine flu. The regular, seasonal flu is almost unheard of this time of year. The CDC identifies the level of infection in Virginia as "regional," with the level of infection in Maryland as "widespread."

Overall, so far swine flu has been more mild than feared, with most people recovering without hospitalization. Seasonal flu, as differentiated from swine flu, kills about 36,000 people nationwide each vear; about 1.000 people die in Virginia each year from influenza and pneu-

The CDC is predicting that swine flu will continue to spread through the summer and into the fall and winter, and will be a significant complicating factor when the seasonal influenza strikes when the weather gets cold.

ccording to the Centers for Disease The CDC reports: "The novel H1N1 virus, in conjunction with regular seasonal influenza viruses, poses the potential to cause significant illness with associated hospitalizations and deaths during the U.S. influenza season."

The primary method to avoid the spread of

the swine flu is to tell people who are sick to stay home from work, keep sick children home from school or camp. Call your doctor's office, let them know

you have flu symptoms (fever, cough, sore throat), so your doctor can determine if you would benefit from an antiviral medication. People who have had the swine flu are deemed contagious for seven days after the onset of symptoms, or until all symptoms have disappeared, whichever is longer.

All of our health in the coming year will depend on people following the advice to stay home if sick and seeking the right medical attention from a doctor's office, not the emergency room.

But what about the millions of workers who have no (or very limited) paid sick leave? What about the millions of people who have no health insurance and have no doctor to consult by phone?

According to a new report from an advocacy group, Health Care for America Now, In Virginia, about 12 percent of whites, 17 percent of African Americans and 45 percent of Latinos lack health insurance

According to the National Partnership for Women and Families, about half of workers (excluding those who work for government) have no paid sick leave.

Frequently Asked Questions New H1N1 Virus (Swine Influenza)

What are the symptoms?

Symptoms in people are similar to the symptoms of regular human flu: fever, cough, sore throat, body aches, headache, chills and fatigue. Some people have reported vomiting and diarrhea.

What is the incubation period after expo-

About 1-4 days. If a week has gone by from when you know you were exposed, it's not likely you will get sick.

Are there medicines to treat the new H1N1

Antivirals don't cure you of flu, but they do work to lessen the duration and severity of symptoms. . Influenza antiviral drugs work best when started soon after symptoms appear, usually within two days. You must have a prescription to receive these medications.

How can people decrease the spread of the new (H1N1) virus?

Taking the following steps can decrease the spread of flu: frequent hand washing; covering coughs; having ill persons stay home, except to seek medical care; minimizing contact with others; having household members of cases minimize contact in the community, to the extent possible; reducing unnecessary social contacts; avoiding crowded settings, when possible; keeping children home from school if they are ill. If you are sick, stay home and call your doctor, wash your hands often.

The rest of us who are blessed with access to health care and paid sick days are at risk as other workers are under intense financial pressure to go to work even when they are sick, or their children are sick.

There are no simple answers, but it's also important to recognize the growing costs of the status quo on health care.







Video Added to the Bard

Firebelly augments Hamlet with camera, screen.

t is always a pleasure to find a theater company that stretches its reach, giving artists challenges and, at the same time, audiences a fresh look at some familiar works. With a new view of Shakespeare's "Hamlet," Arlington-based Firebelly Productions continues to meet its mission of giving young performers and designers meaty material on which to cut their teeth, but the results don't give audiences a lot of new insight into a classic work.

Did they reach a bit too far? No. Not really. They manage to provide a clear and consistently watchable presentation of a complex and convoluted story, but they don't add a lot to one of the theater's most oft-produced dramas.

"Hamlet" has been something of a staple for quite a few centuries now. First penned at the start of the 17th century (or perhaps even the end of the 16th) the story of the prince of Denmark who feigns madness in order to unmask his father's killer has been on local stages multiple times in recent seasons, many with satisfying productions and some with stunning ones.

Firebelly's is more a middling one. Lead actor John Bonner of Chantilly makes an easy-to-follow young Hamlet driven by a thirst for revenge when his uncle Claudius murders his father the King and marries his mother, Queen Gertrude. The King may be dead before the play begins, but Matthew Friedman stalks the ramparts as his ghost before re-appearing in the role of one of Hamlet's famous friends as one half of the pair of Guildenstern and Rosencrantz.

The 400-year-old text often falls on modern ears as a bit of heavy going but the cast here does its job

of first understanding the meaning of the measured verse and then communicating that meaning to modern audiences. Best at this in this cast are Steven J. Hoochuck, as the felonious uncle Claudius; Charles St. Charles, as Polonius, a court advisor who goes with the flow; and Charley Mann, as his son Laertes, who seeks his own revenge when Hamlet mistakenly stabs his father thinking it is the king hiding behind a curtain.

THE PLAY only provides two roles for women but they are certainly solid roles. Sonia Justl delivers a high-octane mad scene as Hamlet's girlfriend, Ophelia, while Shelby Sours hits a few nice highly emotional notes as the Queen.

The production is under the direction of Michael Ryan Fernandez, who is currently working on his masters at the Film School at DePaul University after graduating from George Mason's Theatre Department. His interest in film and video technology is clear in this production as he uses a screen at the back of the stage to display live images of many of the scenes from video cameras both hand held and mounted on the set. These images don't often add a great deal to the proceedings and often distract when attention should be focused on the action. However, the pre-taped (or filmed) scene of Ophelia's off-stage death by drowning is both effective and particularly memorable.


Since video technology is visible during the production, it seems proper that this is a modern-dress mounting of the venerable classic, using street-style clothing for many of the men, but putting the queen in some outfits that look a

bit like out-of-date prom dresses. Stephen Frost provides an almost cinematic musical score that, in keeping with Fernandez's approach, sounds at times like the soundtrack of a Hollywood movie.


No production of "Hamlet" can truly work without close attention being paid to the combat skills of the troupe. Here, in the small black box Theatre on the Run where no seat is more than four rows from the stage, it is even more important. Firebelly was fortunate to obtain the services of Andrew Pecoraro as "fight coordinator," who makes sure that the final scene in which Bonner, as Hamlet, and Mann, as Laertes, go at it with poisoned swords and daggers.

Connolly Opposes Tax on High Incomes

Connolly: U.S. should pursue more savings in health care costs before turning to additional taxes.

.S. Rep. Gerry Connolly (D-11) or ganized other fresh man Democrats to oppose a component of his political party's health care proposal that would have raised taxes on individuals earning \$280,000 or more per year and households earning \$350,000 or more per year, even though these households are among the wealthiest one percent in the country.

"Why are we talking about new taxes at all? We spend twice as much on health care as any other industrialized nation already," said Connolly, who thinks there are more ways to wring cost savings out of the current health care system.

The congressman said the pharmaceutical companies have put \$85 billion worth of savings on the table in terms of health care savings and the hospitals have offered up \$130 billion. But the insurance industry has not offered up any cost savings so far, even though profits for the country's top 10 insurance companies have increased by 428 percent over the last decade, he said.

"The insurance companies have not put a dime on the table. ... We should be looking at new taxes as a last resort. We need to look at savings first before we consider revenue enhancement," said Connolly.

Still, the original version of the Democratic Party's health care reform plan called for a surtax that increases from one percent for those making between \$350,000 to \$500,000 to over five percent for people earning more than \$1 million.

After the objections of Connolly and some other Democrats, House speaker Nancy Pelosi has proposed bumping up the tax threshold to individuals earning \$500,000 and families earning \$1 million.

Though Connolly would like to avoid a new tax altogether, he said Pelosi's new proposal is more palatable than what was originally proposed.

It would have less of an impact on small business owners, who sometimes have to report their company's earning as personal income, he said.

With a household cut off of \$350,000, the original tax plan would also have affected some of Connolly's constituents, since the congressman represents one of the wealthiest congressional districts in the nation. Connolly said that about 14 percent of households he represents earn more than \$200,000 annually.

The bulk of Connolly's district is in Fairfax County, where the median annual household income was \$102,460 in 2007. In that same year, the nation's median

Fimian Runs Against Connolly Again

Local businessman Keith Fimian announced that he will run for Virginia's 11th District seat in the U.S. House of Representatives again in 2010.

Fimian, a Republican, lost to U.S. Rep. Gerry Connolly (D) by about 11.5 percentage points in the 2008 election. Connolly replaced Republican Tom Davis, who decided to retire after 14 years in the office.

The 11th Congressional District includes most of central and southern Fairfax County as well as part of Prince William County.

Even though Davis had held the seat as a Republican, Connolly was thought to have a significant advantage over Fimian in the political race two years ago.

Connolly had served Fairfax County chairman, the highest elected office in local government, for five years and had been a member of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors since 1995.

Fimian had never run for or held elected office before.

But Fimian outperformed Republican presidential candidate John McCain in the 11th Congressional District. President Barack Obama (D) beat McCain by about 15 percentage points in the district compared to Connolly's 11.5 percentage points over Fimian.

household income was about \$50,007, according to the U.S. Census.

Even if they are among the wealthiest households in the country, Connolly said his constituents should not be considered in the same way as Hollywood movie moguls or investors on Wall Street.


"These people have not inherited their wealth. ... We are not talking about Rockefellers," he

Connolly is also worried about the piling-on effect of President Barack Obama's tax policy on those in the upper income brackets. The president already intends to let George W. Bush's tax cuts for those who make over \$250,000 annually expire in 2011. This means that wealthier people will automatically see a tax increase, regardless of whether the health care surcharge is added or not.

"If all we were talking about is this surcharge, it would be a different situation. You have to look at it in context," said Connolly.

U.S. Rep. Frank Wolf (R-10), who represents northern and western Fairfax, is opposed to several aspect of the health care proposal, including the suggestion of a tax increase, said Dan Scandling, Wolf's chief of staff.

A Guide to Alexandria Biking

1 Woodrow Wilson Bridge Trail

One of the newest additions to the region's bike trail network, the Woodrow Wilson Bridge Trail spans the Potomac River, linking Alexandria's Mount Vernon Trail with the Potomac Heritage Trail in the Potomac Waterfront Community. "I used to have to ride 13 miles out of my way, all the way into the District, just to reach the Mount Vernon Trail," said avid cyclist Joseph Robinson of Fort Washington. "Now I can go from my home in Maryland to the bike trails in Alexandria in under 20 minutes." Along the trail are three "bump-out" balconies where pedestrians and bicyclists can take in the views of Old Town, National Harbor, the District of Columbia and, of

Alexandria/Mount Vernon area. Eisenhower Ave

course, the Potomac River. The balconies include benches, bike racks, viewing telescopes, and informational displays detailing the history of the region.

2 Mount Vernon Trail

One of the oldest bike trails in the region, the Mount Vernon Trail follows the Potomac River along a nearly 18-mile expanse from Theodore Roosevelt Island to George Washington's historic country estate. The trail allows cyclists a safe and scenic route through Old Town and along the Alexandria waterfront, with views of the Kennedy Center, Lincoln Memorial, and Gravelly Point Park. "Along the trail, you really get a sense of the beauty, both natural and manmade, of the Washington Area," said David Struhs, a Memphis, TN, native who comes to D.C. often and considers the trail one of the region's highlights.

3 Holmes Run and Cameron Run Bike Trails

The Cameron Run Bike trail begins at the

Eisenhower Avenue Metrorail Station and continues through Eisenhower Valley along Cameron Run until it reaches Cameron Run Regional Park, at which point it becomes the Holmes Run Trail. The trail offers cyclists and pedestrians access to Ben Brenman Park, Beatley Central Branch Library, and the William Ramsay Recreation Center. The trail also provides visitors the opportunity to experience Alexandria's natural beauty, with such features as Clermont Natural Park, Brookvalley Park, the Jerome Buddy Ford Nature Center, and Dora Kelly Nature Park. The City of Alexandria is currently conducting a \$750,000 project to construct a pedestrian and bicycle crossing of the stream that would link the Holmes Run Trail with bike trails in Fairfax County.

4 Commonwealth Path

The Commonwealth Path is a 1.5-mile onstreet pathway that begins at Commonwealth Avenue's intersection with King Street in Old Town and extends to Four Mile Run. "Since Commonwealth is such a wide avenue," said Jerry King, president of BikeWalk Alexandria, "the Commonwealth bike path is one of the oldest and longest onstreet bike trails in the city." The trail offers residents of the Rosemont, Del Ray, and Arlandria neighborhoods easy and safe bicycle access to Old Town and the King Street Metrorail Station.

6 Four Mile Run Trail

Warrior in Transition Unit Complex U.S. Army Garrison Fort Belvoir Directorate of Public Works Fort Belvoir, Virginia

Name of Action: Construction and Operation of a Warrior in Transition Unit Complex

Description of Proposed Action: The Army proposes to construct and operate a Warrior in Transition Unit Complex at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. The proposed action involves constructing new facilities, including buildings, sidewalks, parking, access roads, and necessary utilities to accommodate the personnel and functions of unit head-quarters, two companies of Warriors in Transition and a Soldier and Family Assistance Center (SFAC) that would assist both soldiers housed at the Warrior in Transition Unit Complex and additional re-covering soldiers residing off post. Annroximate sizes of the new fanoused at the Warrior in Transition Unit Complex and additional recovering soldiers residing off post. Approximate sizes of the new facilities include 194,400 square feet (SF) for the barracks, 15,000 SF for the SFAC, 31,000 SF for the administrative and operations facility, and 412 new parking spaces. The new facilities would accommodate the use by 412 warriors, with 36 personnel staffing the SFAC and 137 personnel for administration.

The Environmental Assessment (EA) evaluated the proposed action Alternative, which sites the project in an area north of 9th Street, on the former South Post golf course. A No Action (No Build) alternative also considered by the Army would not meet the need to provide tive also considered by the Army would not meet the need to provide adequate new facilities meeting current standards for care of Warriors In Transition at Fort Belvoir. Two sites along Gunston Road were considered in earlier phases of the planning process. These alternatives were not carried forward in the EA as they were considered unreasonable alternatives. The Army Material Command site was dismissed due to limited future growth and does not have adequate space without encroachment on sensitive natural resources. The Directorate of Public Works site was dismissed as an alternative due to its greater distance from hospital and safety concerns for wounded soldiers crossing a major roadway.

Environmental Consequences: The EA identified and evaluated the

Transportation and Traffic: It is anticipated that the proposed ac-Transportation and Traffic: It is anticipated that the proposed action would adversely affect two intersections during the a.m. peak hour and one intersection during the p.m. peak hour. The proposed action would not adversely affect transit operations in the area or adversely affect bicycle and pedestrian facilities. Construction traffic from the proposed action would average less than 6-percent of the total construction traffic at Fort Belvoir during the period through 2015

Air Quality: Air pollutant emissions from the proposed action would not be significant and would be below *de minimis levels* for general conformity. During construction of the proposed action, the restrictions outlined in the Construction Performance Plan for the Reduction of Air Emissions for Implementation of 2005 Base Realignment and Closure Recommendations and Related Army Actions at Fort Belvoir, Virginia would be implemented to offset cumulative impacts

Natural Resources: The proposed action would not have significant impacts on renewable natural resources, wetlands, resource protection areas, topography, or soils.

Leveling and grading of the project site would result in minor impacts to soils or topographic conditions. The required soil erosion and sediment control plan would be implemented to ensure impacts to soils are temporary and minor.

The proposed action would have minor impacts to surface water Plans for stormwater management, stormwater pollution prevention, and sediment and erosion control would mitigate these effects. The proposed action is not located in floodplains and will have no effect.

The proposed action would be sited in an area that is partially developed and contains semi-improved grounds. Mitigation of tree removal would include tree replacement at 2:1 for trees four inches in diameter or more. Minor impacts to vegetation and wildlife would occur and no impacts to threatened & endangered species are expected.

Cultural Resources: The proposed action would not have an adverse effect under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. No cultural resources, including archaeological sites, are present at the project site. The planned building height of no more than four stories would not be visible or affect the setting of any historic property.

Utilities: The proposed Warrior in Transition Unit Complex would require a minor increase to overall demand for potable water, sanitary sewers, gas, and electricity.

Sustainable strategies would be included in the proposed project design, construction, and operation to meet or exceed Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Silver rating; the High Performance and Sustainable Building, Low Impact Building Memorandum of Understanding; and the Energy Policy Act of 2005 for reduced energy and water requirements.

The EA concluded there would be minimal impacts for land use plans, aesthetics, coastal zone management, noise, socioeconomics, and community facilities and services as a result of the proposed ac-

Summary of Environmental Impacts: The proposed action would not generate significant impacts on human health or the environment.

Conclusion: On reviewing the EA and other project information, the Installation Commander at Fort Belvoir has concluded that the proposed action would not have a significant effect on the human environment. Therefore, an Environmental Impact Statement is not need-


