Working To Reduce Cruiser-Car Crashes

Puller requests State Crime Commission to support her traffic safety bill.

State Sen. Linda "Toddy" Puller, who wants to prevent a repeat of an auto collision and fatal accident that took place in her district February 2008, has introduced legislation to require all police and emergency vehicle operators in the Commonwealth to turn on emergency equipment and slow down when running a red light.

This tragedy that killed Ashley McIntosh has focused the attention of those who believe the State

law is flawed and needs to be changed to protect those driving lawfully through heavily used intersections from police and other emergency vehicle drivers who, because of the discretionary language in the Virginia law, may endanger innocent people. Police, sheriff, and other public safety associations view the proposed change as an unnecessary infringement on their ability to perform their duties.

Puller, whose legislative district includes the accident site, said, "I am carrying this bill because I want to prevent unnecessary tragic auto accidents in the future such as the one which killed Ashley McIntosh." Her bill would change the Virginia law to require police and other emergency vehicle drivers to use their emergency equipment — flashing lights, siren, exhaust whistle, or other device designed to give automatically inter-

mittent warning signals — and slow down, when on an emergency call and traveling through a red traffic light.

In the January 2009 legislative session, Puller introduced a bill, SB 847, “Emergency Vehicles Proceeding Past Red Lights,” to do this. It was assigned to the Senate Transportation Committee which voted not to report it to the full Senate for a vote. Undeterred, Puller then sent a letter to the State Crime Commission requesting its review and comment on her proposed changes to the Virginia law governing police and other emergency vehicle operator driving requirements. The commission, an advisory body of 13 members appointed by the governor and the state legislature, held a public meeting in May 2009 to hear testimony and discuss Puller’s bill. On Dec. 15 the commission will again meet to assess testimony and forward its views to the respective Courts of Justice Committees in the House and Senate.

Mark Hubbard, a registered lobbyist with McGuireWoods, Consulting, which is providing pro bono assistance to Puller on this matter, said, “We believe the Puller bill should be enacted. ... With the congested traffic situation in urban areas of the Commonwealth changes in the emergency procedures language in Virginia law are needed to protect the public from unnecessary accidents such as that which resulted in the fatal accident in Northern Virginia. ... We are hopeful that the commission will support the Puller legislation.”

Del. David Albo (R-42), chairman, House Courts of Justice Committee, and former co-chair of the State Crime Commission, said, “Senator Puller clearly believes that there is a flaw in the current Virginia law governing emergency operating procedures for police and other emergency vehicle drivers. ... I look forward to assessing Senator Puller’s bill, the State Crime Commission’s comments, as well as the views of public safety organizations and others when the bill comes before the Courts of Justice Committee.”

The president of the 900-member Fairfax Coalition of Police, Marshall Thielen does not support the Puller legislation: “The changes proposed would place an unnecessary burden on public safety personnel. ... Police must be free to make split second decisions and not be restricted by a requirement that may not fit the emergency.”

Thielen pointed out that in addition to the Fairfax County Police Coalition, the State Association of Chiefs of Police, the State Associa-

Proposed Revision

The current Virginia law governing emergency procedures allows police and other emergency vehicle drivers on an emergency call the discretion of whether or not to use their flashing lights and siren, or to slow down when entering an intersection showing a red traffic light.

State Sen. Toddy Puller’s proposed revision would require all police and other emergency vehicle drivers in the Commonwealth, when on an emergency call, to turn on their blinking/flashing lights and siren, and slow their vehicle to a safe speed when going through an intersection with a red light at all times.

tion of Sheriffs, and the Virginia State Police Association oppose Puller’s bill.

According to Cindy McIntosh-Colasanto, mother of the victim, 26 other states require the use of emergency equipment at all times when traveling through a red light. This past spring she testified before the State Crime Commission, urging that they support the bill. At that time she said: “Ashley had just left a polling place after doing her civic duty and voting in the Presidential Primary Election, but the laws of Virginia let her down. ... More than half the states in the U.S. require police officers to use both lights and a siren and to slow down when driving through red lights. This includes Maryland, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, New York, and California. I hope you commissioners will agree that it is time the Commonwealth of Virginia does the same. ... It is too late for Ashley. But it is not too late to protect other daughters, and everyone in Virginia. ... Thousands of petition signers also agree with me.”

McIntosh-Colasanto has been able to obtain the support of over 3,000 petition signers.

Tappy Phillips, one of the supporters of a change in the Virginia law, said: “It is a very simple issue: when my family enters an intersection in Virginia with a green light, I expect them to make it to the other side alive, not be crushed by a speeding police car.”

When asked about the prospects for passage of the bill next year, McIntosh-Colasanto said: “I am cautiously optimistic; the members are discussing it, and they are now aware that half the states in the U.S. have language similar to Senator Puller’s. For the next several months I will be working to generate letters from the public to write to the State Crime Commission and to Virginia legislators across the Commonwealth to support this legislation that would indeed save lives.”

In addition, she plans on returning to the State Crime Commission for their regular meeting on Dec. 15 to again testify and urge members to back the change.

forks,” said Kahan Dhillion, who owns a venture capital firm with Moss. “That was when I had to explain that one was for the salad, one was for the entree and the other was for desert.”

It was a teachable moment — one of many created by “Santana’s 30/30 Club.” The idea was launched back in 2006, when Dhillion and Mount Vernon High School Principal Nardos King were brainstorming over lunch one day about volunteering opportunities. They eventually created the idea of a 30/30 club, which would include 30 students over a period of 30 months — the duration of their time at the high school. Students were selected because they had problems with attendance, achievement or discipline. Now in its third and final year, the 21 remaining students will begin their senior year next week.

“It’s really turned into a family, and the kids are now holding each other accountable,” said King, who is beginning her third year as principal at the school. “I wasn’t expecting that to happen, but it just kind of evolved over the years.”

THE PROGRAM BEGAN with twice-a-month meetings between five volunteer mentors and 30 students. When they were meeting at school, the encounters would become guidance sessions — reviewing attendance records, achievement goals and discipline problems. Outside of school, the students attended concerts at Wolftrap and ate dinner at the ESPN Zone

thanks to Santana’s sponsorship. They even got to meet Moss at a Redskins football camp.

“Just having someone there to care about them and how they were doing in school really made a huge difference,” said Dhillion. “Extending that olive branch has really changed things for these kids.”

After the first year came to a close, King decided that the groups needed to meet more than twice a

week. So she arranged for all of the 30/30 students to be in a daily class with a teacher who was one of the volunteers in the program. That teacher, Karen Hertel, created an intelligence operation to gather information about each student’s attendance, achievement and discipline. She then used her daily interaction with the students to follow-up. So if a student didn’t turn in an Algebra homework assignment or was rude in English class, the student’s mentor would be informed almost immediately.

“They didn’t necessarily like that,” said King. “But it helped.”

Some of the original students moved away. Others were forced to leave Mount Vernon High School because of discipline problems. But the 21 students remain part of the program. King said that many of these students would likely have dropped out if they had not been involved in the program. So the fact that they are beginning their senior year and thinking about what they might do after graduating high school is a tremendous success for the program.

“This is not just about school,” said King. “We wanted to try to get these kids thinking about where they wanted to be 10 years from now.”

Grand Jury Indicts Hamilton

A Fairfax County grand jury has indicted a former youth sports coach on six felony charges involving sexual improprieties with children. He is John E. Hamilton of 14120 Gabrielle Way in Centreville's Centre Ridge community.

On May 22, Fairfax County police charged him with one count of aggravated sexual battery and three counts of taking indecent liberties with a child by a person in a custodial or supervisory relationship. The complainant was a boy Hamilton coached in 1997, in the Fort Hunt Youth Athletic Association, when the boy was 12.

Then on June 5, police charged Hamilton with two counts of sodomy after two other people, one now 19, the other, 28, alleged that Hamilton sexually assaulted them when they were younger, lived in Mount Vernon's Hollin Hall area and were coached by Hamilton.

On Aug. 17, the grand jury indicted him on all six offenses. He's now scheduled to enter his pleas regarding these charges, Oct. 7, in Circuit Court.

Woman Robbed, Then Shot With BB

A 19-year-old woman was robbed while walking home from a friend's home on Sunday, Aug. 30 around 2:40 a.m. The woman was walking near Laramie Place and Tamarind Street when two men approached her, produced guns and demanded her belongings.

The victim complied and the suspects told her to run away.

As she turned to run, she saw a suspect point a gun at her and felt the sting of a BB pellet on her leg. The suspects then fled. The victim did not require medical attention.

The suspects were both described as black, around 18 years old, and wore blue jeans. One suspect wore a black scarf around his face and the other had a red, white, and blue motorcycle helmet on his head.

Need Protection From MVCCA?

To the Editor:

For much of the year, the Mount Vernon Council of Citizens' Associations (MVCCA) has been holding meetings of its Strategic Planning committee to formulate nominations to the Comprehensive Plan during the Area Plans

Review (APR) process occurring this year and through July 2010. The deadline for submission of nominations is Sept. 16. I live in Stratford Landing and am a member of the Stratford Landing Citizens' Association (SLCA) but currently not a member of its Executive Committee (EC) although I am a past member of that body.

Our community has been aware of the MVCCA meetings but neither our citizens as a whole nor our EC have voted on or even considered presenting the MVCCA with any proposed nominations.

The Little Hunting Creek pumping station is located deep within our community at the corner of Thomas J. Stockton Parkway and Londonderry Road. Changes to the Comprehensive Plan affecting the pumping station would only affect our community and no other. The pumping station lands have been a source of great controversy in our community for a number of years. The Web site at www.pumpingstation.org provides factual background. In 2004, a husband and wife couple living in our community proposed to the SLCA EC that it conduct a referendum of its membership to determine the community's view on creating open space and a park at the pumping station that would afford access to Little Hunting Creek, providing a walking path through the facility from the street

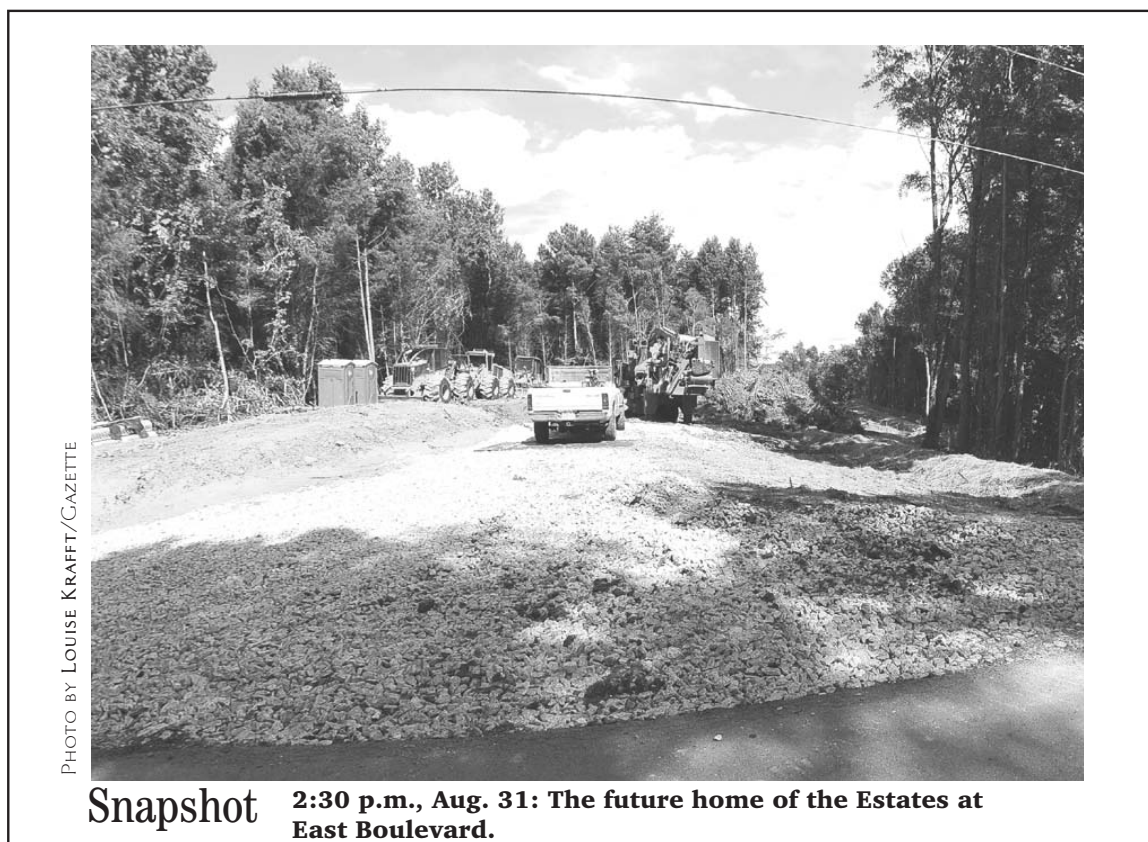

to the creek and perhaps a few amenities. The referendum was conducted in accordance with SLCA Bylaws with the community being given a full month to vote. Twenty-two percent of the members voted, more than double the quorum requirement, and 69 percent of the voters voted against the concept.

Since then, there have been several attempts to change the community's mind about the issue, with the same couple involved on some basis of advocacy — all have

failed. This history makes it clear that a majority of the Stratford Landing community would like the pumping station to be left as it is. In fact, Supervisor Gerry Hyland is on record as stating he would oppose any changes in use of the lands of the pumping station in the absence of a community consensus in favor. I confirmed this position during a telephone conversation this week with Brett Kenney, Supervisor Hyland's chief aide.

With this backdrop, last Thursday, I learned for the first time from a Gazette article, that the MVCCA's Strategic Planning

committee would be proposing an APR nomination directed to our pumping station. This surprised me because, three weeks ago, I met for over an hour with Kahan Dhillon, chairman of the committee, and he made no mention of any such proposed nomination. On Friday, after several e-mail exchanges and phone calls, I received the paperwork for the proposed nomination from Mr. Dhillon. To my surprise, one of its main drafters was none other than the wife of the couple living in our community. The nomination proposed (1) changing the designation of the 9-plus acre pumping station

site from R-3 zoning to open space, (2) creation of a publicly accessible park, and (3) consolidation of some of the land with an adjacent parcel owned by the Northern Virginia Conservation Trust (NVCT) an organization with which the couple is quite active. In other words, having been thwarted in every attempt to create a park and open space at the pumping station against the will of our community, the wife of the couple had embarked on a strategy of using the MVCCA's APR process against her

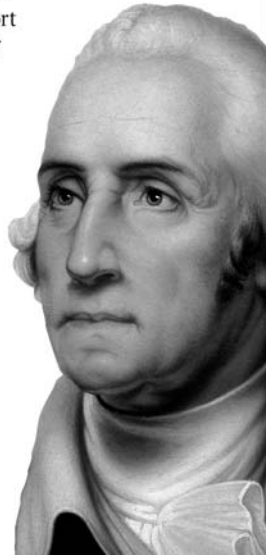

Priorities Vs. Social Agenda

I was elected to the General Assembly alongside both of the current nominees for Governor, Creigh Deeds and Bob McDonnell. When you work with two people like that, you learn their values. This week, I was reminded of McDonnell's with the resurfacing of his master's thesis, penned just before the beginning of his legislative career.

Creigh has an impressive legislative scope. I remember his hard work on Kim Stan, Megan's Law, and choice. He also penned the modern Governor's Opportunity Fund, which has created some 78,000 jobs.

The same cannot be said for Bob McDonnell. I respect him as a person, but his record — especially his social agenda — troubles me.

While Creigh worked for schools and economic development, Bob McDonnell did the opposite. While Creigh worked on numerous policy issues, McDonnell sponsored 35 bills on abortion — not including his crusades against contraception and sexual education. McDonnell is entitled to his beliefs, but he has furthered them single-mindedly, neglecting important concerns.

But McDonnell's agenda goes even further. In his master's thesis at then-CBN University, McDonnell lays out not a youthful consideration of Reagan-era politics but rather a social vision for later legislative

efforts. His thesis is a blueprint of the extreme policy agenda that he pursued throughout his career in public life and would continue to pursue as Governor.

And I do mean "extreme." For instance, he attributes the American family's "break-down" to working mothers, feminism, and "the self-centeredness of modern individualism." He writes that school-based health clinics that dispense information about sexual health options promote promiscuity.

No wonder he's now trying to distance himself from this.

Bob McDonnell pursued these ideas as a legislator and Attorney General. He worked against women's rights, from equal pay to choice. He opposed bills on daycare safety regulations, such as criminal background checks on employees. He even voted to cut the Governor's Opportunity Fund — though the "new" McDonnell wants it increased.

TODAY, he has a transportation plan that drains \$5.4 billion — his own estimation — from education and other priorities.

That's not an agenda Virginia can afford, with statewide unemployment, millions uninsured, and other challenges in the next four years and beyond.

I support Creigh Deeds for Governor. He's a commonsense leader in the mold of Mark Warner. He will work for issues that matter to all Virginians, rather than taking us back into past social wars, as Bob McDonnell promises. Creigh Deeds will keep Virginia moving forward.

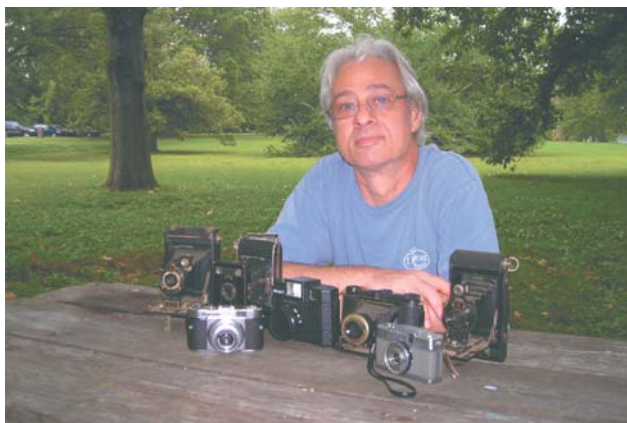

Annual Festival Features Local Artists

There was a time when watercolor artist Jane Gillette hoped people would buy paintings that meant something to her. But experience taught her that people want a painting that means something to them.

“Sometimes I have the good fortune to sell a painting that means something special to both of us,” she said. “When it comes together like that, it’s a really great feeling.”

An exhibitor in the Alexandria Festival of the Arts since its inception, Gillette says she loves the quality of the show.

“It really forces me to grow not only in my work, but in the way I display my work, too,” she said. And, since it’s a juried show, she says being selected to display at the festival denotes a certain level of success.

“People don’t come into my booth and wonder who I am. Just being in the show gives artists a certain credibility. It helps people know they’re buying something of value.”

Originally from Iowa, Gillette’s been an Alexandria resident for 30 years. She earned a BA in fine arts from the University of Iowa where she painted in oil. Now, it’s strictly watercolor.

“I like its portability,” she said. “I can pack my materials in a box, stick it in a suitcase and go anywhere.”

All of Gillette’s work is original. Her subjects range from florals and botanicals to her friends that play golf and even her kitty. She also paints architecture and landmarks — including Alexandria buildings and scenes.

“People will come into my booth and say I’m so happy to see somebody local,” according to Gillette. They’re also drawn into her booth by the bold, intense colors she uses.

“I use the colors I love — bright colors, especially yellows. I think it has something to do with growing up in Iowa with cornfields all around,” she said.

Yellow is a theme in some of her new work this year, which includes a series of little strips of sunflowers. Patrons will also see tulips in new sizes, small paintings of Baltimore’s Fells Point, and a whole lot of mini Alexandria doorways.

“Just the doorways — in 5”x5” and 6”x6” sizes,” she said. “Something for everyone.”

Gillette says she loves seeing the patrons who come by her booth every year at this arts festival.

“I love the local support,” she said. “I love it when a patron can’t decide which painting they like better so they buy two. Every year has a different feel.”

Too often, Gillette feels, people are thrown off by the myth that art has to be an investment.

Growing up in Essex County, N.J., Ed Hirschfield never thought of himself as creative. Sports were more his thing.

But when he was 13, Hirschfield received a gift that changed his life — a home photography developing kit.

“It just triggered something in me,” he said. “I was fascinated the first time I saw a print come up in the developing tray, and that feeling never went away. It’s still the same thrill.”

After earning a fine arts degree in photography from George Washington University, Hirschfield worked the kind of jobs that artists often do — bar tending, restaurant managing — all the while trying to figure out how to make a living at photography. About 14 years ago, he made the transition to full-time artist.

Hirschfield describes the D.C.-area art crowd as sophisticated, knowledgeable, and appreciative of the work that it takes to create art.

He says if people want to experience what a good arts festival is like, the Alexandria Festival of the Arts is the one to see.

“You’ll be exposed to passionate, talented, high-quality artists,” according to Hirschfield. “And, the experience of talking to the actual artist is quite special. They share their passion for what they do, and it’s contagious. You can get the story behind the work directly from the artist, and you get to understand and appreciate what went into it.”

“That work of art displayed on your wall is no longer anonymous.”

Returning patrons to the Alexandria Festival of the Arts who are fans of Hirschfield’s vibrant painted photographs will be treated to something new hanging on the walls of his booth. They’ll still be able to enjoy and purchase his familiar hand-painted individual prints.

But Hirschfield is eager to have folks experience a new technique he’s been developing since last fall. This new work involves distressing and laminating together multiple negatives shot with a variety of antique cameras. The combined negatives are then printed, toned and sometimes hand-painted.

This new process, he feels, allows him to be a little more creative. “It’s time to see how the public responds,” said Hirschfield.

Hirschfield has never worked in digital photography, preferring to preserve the tradition of the craft.

“When I take a photograph, I like to wait for the right light rather than create light on a computer. And in the darkroom, I’m able to bring a uniqueness to each image,” he said.

Some of Pat Palermino’s ideas for paintings come to her in dreams. Sometimes she’s inspired by her travels up and down the east coast or the familiar sights in and around Alexandria.

But whatever the source or subject, the paintings all share her signature bold, bright colors and touch of playfulness.

“A lot of people tell me they like the colors,” said Palermino. “They may be too much for some people, but I like bright colors,” she notes while pointing out the bright red counter in her white kitchen with the colorful collection of antique advertising signs adorning the walls.

Palermino describes herself as a self-taught contemporary folk artist and her work as humorous, whimsical and always a lot of fun: “Even the historical buildings have something fun going on in the painting.”

Palermino recalls her talent for drawing started to show up in first or second grade.

“All through school,” she said, “teachers would give me special assignments to make posters for school events because they all knew I could draw.”

By her early teens, she had added painting to her artistic repertoire.

But when it was time to go off to college, even though she loved art, Palermino chose a Catholic school for nursing.

“They didn’t have art classes,” she said. “But there was a place where some of the nuns used to paint, and we’d sneak up there and finish their work,” she added with a mischievous grin.

Palermino worked several years in nursing and public health. She first came to Alexandria in 1971, moving often with her Naval officer husband and three children. But they always returned to Alexandria.

“I love Alexandria. I love the look and feel of it — the water, the people, good restaurants — just a lot going on. It’s just a lot of fun.”

Once the family returned to Alexandria for good and her children were in high school, Palermino, who works in acrylic on canvas or Masonite board, decided to start painting full time. She opened her studio in 1992 and entered her first art show the next year in Fairfax County.

“I was shocked when I sold my first five paintings.”

Now, Palermino has original paintings hanging in permanent museum collections including The White House.

Wolverines enter tonight's game as more experienced team.

The West Potomac offensive line, which returns all five starters and averages more than 250 pounds, has the makings of a dominant force.

Tonight, those in charge of security for the Wolverines' no-huddle spread offense will get to show their on-field skills during a 7:30 p.m. match-up with Mount Vernon at WPHS. On Tuesday, some members of the West Potomac O-line displayed their trash-talking talents toward the rival Majors.

Left guard Dan Carriker's description of the West Potomac-Mount Vernon rivalry: "It is our time to put [the Majors] in the dirt and end their season for them right then and there."

Right tackle Samlullah Ahmady gave the Majors even less of a chance.

"Mount Vernon doesn't deserve to be on the same field with us," he said.

Center Matt Campbell brought up more than football.

"We're born and bred to hate Mount Vernon," he said. "We don't like to be near them. Every time I'm over there, I just don't like them. I don't like to be over there. I hate their school. It's like a prison to me."

"I just don't like Mount Vernon in general."

Earlier in the day, Mount Vernon coach Tom Glynn described the rivalry this way: "We don't really like the West Potomac Weasels. Oh, I'm sorry, Wolverines."

While the smack talk came from both directions, West Potomac held an advantage in verbal jabs thrown. Good thing for the Wolverines, they appear to hold the advantage in talent and experience necessary to back up their pregame chatter.

Along with a strong offensive line, West Potomac has a slew of talented skill position players, including quarterback Colin Mathewson, receivers Shawn Lee, Deondre Essex and running backs Darel Layne and Edward Johnson.

The defense is led by D-linemen Francisco Jimenez and Akram Mohamed, linebacker

Shakil White and a secondary that head coach Eric Henderson praises.

After Tuesday's practice, Henderson spoke to the team about having the chance to do something special in 2009 and to focus on getting better. Step one is beating Mount Vernon.

"We just want to be a better team after the [Mount Vernon] game than we are right now," Henderson said. "We want to do things the way that we are coached to do and we want to do it with just a little extra flavor — because it's Mount Vernon."

Campbell said the Wolverines have something to prove.

"We're looking to be one of the most dominant forces in the Patriot District and in the region," the senior said. "[We're] trying to take over, prove our point that we're not just a bunch of small highway kids, that we're a bunch of weight-trained, committed athletes that are out here to play."

MOUNT VERNON enters

the season as a relatively inexperienced group, which lost a lot of size on the offensive line. The Majors' option offense, which pounded people out of the wishbone last season, may use more shotgun in 2009.

Vernon, but a win would be the ultimate statement.

"I know a lot of those kids," Sable said, "so it would be nice to knock them off — have bragging rights over them."

own community to pave the way for a park and open space. Incidentally, SLCA is a charter member of the MVCCA.

I immediately provided the nomination information to the SLCA president last Friday and she confirmed that she had heard from the nomination proponent (who also happens to be a member of our SLCA EC) that a proposed nomination was in the works but knew none of the details before I had provided them. Our president immediately engaged in a discussion with MVCCA officials that resulted in the park aspect being removed. The rest of the proposed nomination remains active.

On Monday Aug. 31, the MVCCA's Board of Directors conducted a special meeting to vote on whether to send a dozen or so proposed nominations to the MVCCA Council for an up or down vote at the special meeting scheduled for Sept. 10. A neighbor and I attended the meeting with the hope we could provide the MVCCA Board with the above facts and convince them to vote against sending the nomination to the MVCCA Council. MVCCA Board meetings are public meetings and the presiding chair has the discretion to recognize members of the public for comment. I had e-mailed each Board member earlier in the day, providing them all the information set forth above. We waited patiently for an hour and a half until the proposed pumping station nomination was up for vote. When we sought to be recognized, presiding chair Katherine Ward refused to recognize us. When I stated she had the discretion to do so, she replied on the record that she would not exercise that discretion in our favor. We attempted to speak anyway and Ms. Ward gavelled us down. With little discussion, the MVCCA Board voted unanimously to forward the nomination to the MVCCA Council. During the brief discussion, my neighbor and I were subjected to a lecture by two longstanding MVCCA Board members, the chairmen of the Education and Health & Human Services committees. They informed us that our community is at fault for not being aware of the MVCCA's proposed nomination because our president failed to monitor the MVCCA listserv and because we didn't sufficiently monitor the activities of the SLCA EC member who was behind the nomination who, they said, our community should discipline (that SLCA EC member, to her credit, never represented that she was speaking for the SLCA in supporting the proposed nomination). In other words, with the MVCCA lurking in the background, citizens and associations must continually be on the alert and on the defensive, continually monitoring the activities of the MVCCA to make sure they are not being victimized by actions of the MVCCA. In this situation, only Stratford Landing would be affected by a nomination regarding the pumping station.

Why didn't the MVCCA ask the SLCA president whether our community was aware of the proposed nomination and the community's position on it before voting to forward it to the MVCCA Council? Why do MVCCA Board members believe the burden is on civic associations to protect themselves

against proposed actions of the MVCCA? Isn't this backwards? Only they can answer these questions. The SLCA is a charter member of the MVCCA and its members have been accorded no respect from the MVCCA.

To those who think the MVCCA represents you, think again. My experience on Monday demonstrates that the current incarnation of the MVCCA represents the views of those who participate in its processes and meetings, regardless of whether those views coincide with the views of a community directly affected by what they propose to do. The MVCCA Board didn't want to receive the views of a member of an affected community, it just wanted to vote and get on with it. I am a former member of the MVCCA Board and the MVCCA's former Planning & Zoning chairman. I am thoroughly disgusted with the MVCCA after my experience Monday evening.

As a member of the Stratford Landing community, not its official representative, I ask Council Presidents who attend the MVCCA Council meeting on Sept. 10 to vote against the nomination proposed for the Little Hunting Creek pumping station. The reasons why are:

1. Stratford Landing was unaware of the details of the nomination until three days before the MVCCA Board voted on it.
 2. Stratford Landing is the only community directly affected by the proposed nomination.
 3. The SLCA EC and Stratford Landing community have never considered, discussed or voted upon the proposed nomination.
 4. Supervisor Hyland is on record stating that there will be no changes at the pumping station without community consensus in favor.
 5. The proponent of the proposed nomination can propose it as an individual, rather than the MVCCA making it with no input whatsoever from the affected community.
- Our president will likely speak at the Council meeting, but she can't state the community's views on the proposed nomination because, again, neither our EC nor our community as a whole have taken any position regarding the proposed nomination. Thanks for your consideration.

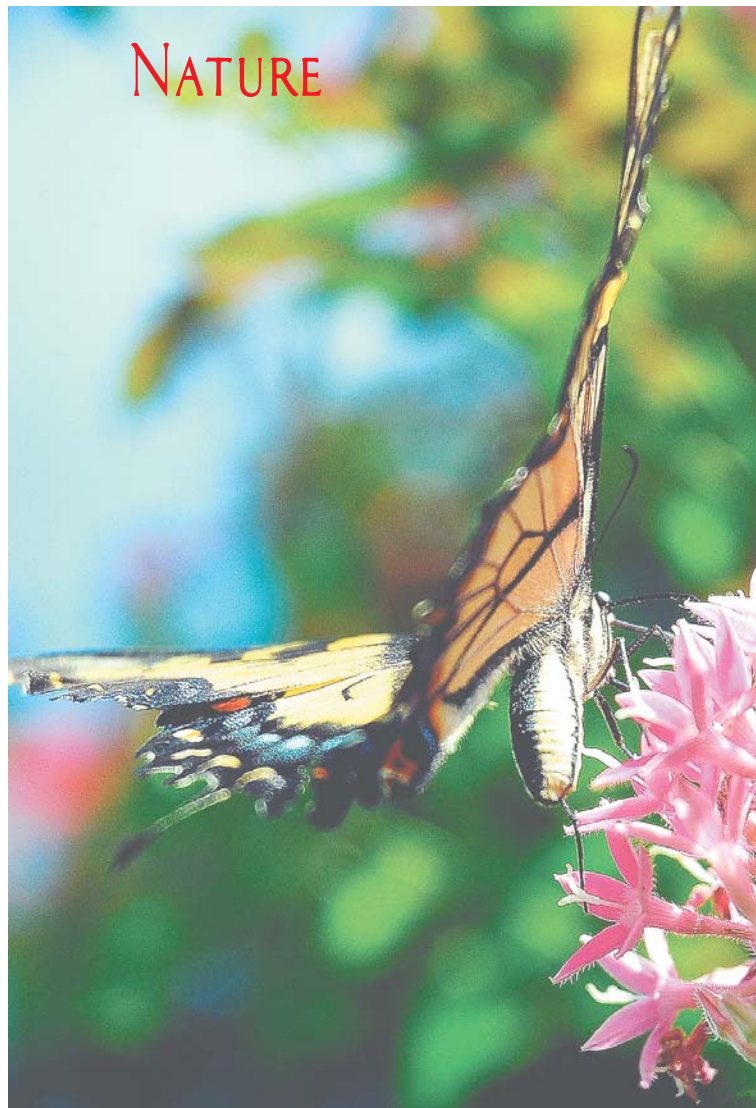
