



1,000 Coats Arrive For Children in Need

Paul Darby and his wife Cheryl have learned by action how to clothe children for the winter. The Darbys are "Coats for Kids." Living in Alexandria, they recognized the need and began a grassroots project. Paul Darby reached out to manufacturers across the country and initially used their home for collecting, storing and distributing.

The Coats for Kids (CFK)

Foundation was established in January 2004 as a public, charitable foundation by the Darbys. It received IRS recognition as a 501(c)(3) in March 2004. The Coats for Kids Foundation mission is "to ensure that every child who needs a winter coat receives a new one."


Officer Kills Larceny Suspect

Fatal shot happened near Richmond Highway and Fort Hunt Road.

A Mount Vernon police officer fatally shot and killed a Fredericksburg man during a traffic stop last weekend, and police officials have now launched an investigation into how a dispatch call for larceny led to the shooting. Police officials later identified the man as David Alan Masters, 52. Three officers with direct involvement in the incident have been placed on administrative leave while investigators determine why deadly force was used, although the department has not released their names or made them available for comment.

"Don't mistake the fact that they are not talking as a tacit admission of guilt," warned Don Gotthardt, a spokesman for the

Fairfax County Police Department. "They're simply exercising their rights as any other citizen would do."

Police say the call came shortly after 1 p.m. on Nov. 13, when an officer who has been with the force since 2003 was alerted to a larceny in progress in the 8800 block of Richmond Highway. By the time an officer responded to the call, the suspect fled toward the intersection of Richmond Highway at

Shields Avenue. When the officer attempted a traffic stop, the suspect did not comply until he encountered heavy traffic. That's when the police officer opened fire on Masters and shot him in the upper body, according to a press release issued the next day by the Fairfax County Police Department.

"Detectives are eager to make a determination as to why the shot

'Sideways' Opens at West Potomac

Cast becomes second graders.

At 15, Emily Woods has 15 stage credits to her name, but this week she's taking on a role she's played before: that of a second grader.

Woods, together with a dozen of her West Potomac High School classmates are returning to second grade in John Olive's adaptation of Louis Sachar's "Sideways Stories from Wayside School."

Nothing is as it seems at Wayside School. First, the school itself is 30 stories tall with each floor containing only one classroom. The builder misread the construction plans, which originally called for side-by-side classrooms. Second, there is no 19th floor. And third, everything in this play oc-

curs on the 30th floor.

The colors of the set alone make one want to wear sunglasses: checkered tiles each painted separately in bright blue, green, and orange; more orange and purple on walls set off the green door and window trim; and desks painted in pinks, purples and yellows.

Woods plays Bebe, a second grade student, who has exceptional artistic ability. She can draw a cat in five seconds, a dog in four

seconds, and a flower in three seconds.

"It's fun, but unpredictable because I never know what the drawings will look like. I had to practice that a lot. There are lots of different ways to draw cats or dogs or flowers, but only one way to draw them in five seconds or less," Woods said last week during the cast's dress rehearsal.

Drawing aside, how does a 10th grader prepare to play a second grader?





CFK only distributes new winter coats, including a pair of new gloves and a new winter hat. It accepts requests for coats and delivers them all winter-long through the end of March.

This year Paul Darby says that everything has gone virtual. A warehouse in Pennsylvania receives the donations. They are sorted, sized and when requests are made, the orders are shipped. A fire truck bay at

the Richmond Highway Penn Daw Station was lined with tables filled with coats for area children.

The Progressive Firefighters of Fairfax County, the City of Alexandria and Washington D.C. volunteered to help prepare the orders from the local schools and social service agencies and non-profits that had clients in need. The program was organized at Penn Daw by Captain Will Bailey.

She also spoke about how she conducts research for her books, recounting her experience of rappelling down into a mountainous cave for "Exploring Caves, Journeys into the Earth."

Prudent Preparations

To the Editor:

Are we prepared for a major incident? The answer to this is an unequivocal "no." We base our lives on the belief that our critical infrastructures (electric power, natural gas, food, water, gasoline, pharmaceuticals) will always be there; that Giant will open in the morning and be fully stocked. At worst, the price of blueberries might be a bit high.

This is not intended to tell anyone what to do; we know what we should do. If not, the FEMA Web site, <http://www.fema.gov/areyouready/>, provides the right checklists. Further, there are many tips there that we might not think of such as protecting critical documents and having a family plan on how to make contact in a serious emergency.

The point here is to advocate

thinking about our individual vulnerabilities and what we should do to address them. If we were to take a long road trip, e.g., along the northern interstates in the winter, it is obvious that we should pack enough warm clothes and water to survive two days stuck in a snow bank.

It is healthy not to dwell on contingencies that could threaten our lives. Yet it is imprudent not to take some basic actions. We all should be connected to a system such as DC Alert for those contingencies such as tornadoes that require decisive action. Cell phone alerts are good and so are NOAA radios.

Our major concern locally is the potential loss of infrastructure. There are several ways this could happen: a cyber attack, conventional weapons and weapons of mass destruction. There are enough nut cases in the U.S. that could do a lot of damage but likely cause will be groups like al Qaeda and Lashkar-e-Toiba. These terror-

ist groups have a visceral dislike of the U.S. and their goal is to bring down western values and establish Islamic states. It is extremely clear that they will do whatever they desire to secure their ends including the slaughter of innocent people.

If one of these groups decides to hurt us, they will likely succeed. The discipline demonstrated by the 9/11 plotters was awesome in comparison to other terrorist groups (e.g., the 1995 IRA London infrastructure attack).

It would be difficult but not impossible for them to acquire a nuclear weapon and target NYC, DC, LA or Chicago. While it is unlikely that any one of us would not be directly affected by the immediate blast or thermal effects, the majority of the U.S. population would face the secondary and tertiary effects. These would ripple through the economy and poten-



tially devastate our infrastructures for days, weeks and possibly months.

So, what should we do? There is no one-size-fits-all answer to this. Each person needs to assess the personal impact of an infrastructure loss and whether it would be life threatening. If our health is dependent upon a particular pharmaceutical then we better get a revolving 30 day or greater supply. If we are dependent on electrical power, we better have an emergency generator plus an adequate supply of fuel.

There are other obvious actions that would be prudent such as emergency water bottles or a camp stove with propane canisters. The point here is to imagine oneself with no support systems in all conditions such as the coldest or hottest days of the year. The time to think about this is not after an event but now.



To help elected officials to be more responsive, we must let them know our views preferably before they vote on issues. It is easy to become informed on issues and related votes of our U.S. senators and congressmen. Just sign on to the web page Congress.org and follow directions to enroll to receive their votes and upcoming issues to be considered. Or, you can email Megavote@mailmanager.net and request to receive Mega votes for your congressional district.

Since January 2009, I have received 20 two-page easy to read summary documents that list bills and votes and upcoming issues to be voted on. For example, for year 2009 Congressman Connolly of the 11th Congressional District has voted in favor of spending of \$3.4 plus trillion dollars and Senators Webb and Warner have voted in favor of \$1.9 plus trillion dollars of spending thus far. Congressman Connolly's total spending includes the \$1 trillion for the government run health care bill. Senator Warner voted against replenishing \$2 billion for the cash for clunkers program.

The difference in spending totals between the congressman and U.S. senators is largely due to timing of votes on spending bills that originate in the House. Some of the larger spending bills include \$787 billion stimulus, \$410 billion for FY 2009 government budget and \$106 billion supplement budget to fund the Iraq and Afghanistan wars.

If you prefer to do the research on your own, go on line to web site <http://thomas.loc.gov/> and obtain information on congressional proceedings, votes, etc.

Our elected officials respond when enough of us speak up and make our views known to them. So don't hesitate to sign up now for the mega votes and keep current on how your congressman and U.S. senators are voting regarding issues important to you. Your voice can make a difference.





'You Can't Take it With You' at MVHS

Love or money? Personal freedom or conformity? These are the questions tackled by the Pulitzer Prize-winning play "You Can't Take It With You!" performed at Mt. Vernon High School. It entails an eccentric family, led by patriarch Grandpa Vanderhoff, who strives to impress their daughter Alice's potential in-laws, the high-strung, wealthy Kirby family. Of course the families can do nothing else but push each other's buttons. Soon their outlandish practices and attitudes alarm not only the Kirby's, but also government agents investigating communist activity, and Alice's chances at true love are endangered. Mount Vernon made a good choice in choosing "You Can't Take It With You!" It comes with a witty script, vibrant characters, and delivers important lessons about how life should be lived — in the pursuit of love and friendship. But it also comes with a high reputation, and it can be difficult to live up to such a name in a high school production.

Some of the actors took full advantage of their colorful characters. James Beveridge portrayed Boris Kolenkhov, the outrageous Russian ballet teacher who was able to command the scene, changing the entire mood from tranquility to chaos with a few

lines. He quickly became an audience favorite due to his comical rants and sudden outbursts. Alex Dodson depicted Grandpa Vanderhoff a little more conservatively than is traditionally done, but could sufficiently keep the laughter going. The G-men, despite having brief stage time, stole the show with their imposing presence and their unconventional characters. With nearly seamless scene transitions and a well made set, the setting was right on the button.

This play is well known for its humorous script, but in some areas the comedy did not come across. Lines were said quickly and sometimes lost meaning. Other times actors lacked true emotion, and their lines fell flat. To one with no background of the play, the relationships among characters were confusing, and could have had more clarity. While the props were effectively handled by the cast, they did not completely correspond with the background of the play.

Mount Vernon put on a feel good show and brought their audiences into the topsy-turvy world of the Vanderhoff household. Although "You Can't Take It With You!" set the bar high, Mount Vernon was able to acceptably perform a satisfactory production.

ters focused on the disturbing rise of child deaths in the United States due to maltreatment. Local reports earlier in the year also pointed to

an increase in family violence across Northern Virginia as well.

What readers need to know is that the majority of children who die from maltreatment had no

prior contact with child protective services. We need to understand that each one of us is responsible for the children in our community — not just child protective services — and that we each have the power to prevent these tragedies.

Another grim statistic? Over 75 percent of the children who die from maltreatment are under the age of 4. We must provide new parents in our community with support, including parenting classes and support groups, early childhood home visitation and universal access to affordable health and mental health services.

The report (released on Capitol Hill) calls for more federal funding — which is certainly critical as governments on every level face tough budget cuts. But this report should also be a wake-up call to the individual community member. When we see a sign of abuse and neglect right here in our own neighborhood, are we pausing for that child long enough to report it to Child Protective Services? When we know a new parent struggling with the stress of young children, are we pausing long enough to offer support or suggest they contact one of the many organizations in Northern Virginia offering parenting resources?

Perhaps while the federal government figures out the funding for this issue affecting millions of children and parents across the country, we each could be having an impact on just one right here in our own community.



Police Officer Kills Suspect at Traffic Stop

was fired," said Gotthardt. "Obviously that's a pivotal issue in the investigation.

After Masters was shot, the car he was driving continued a short distance until it struck another vehicle near Richmond Highway and Fort Hunt Road. Police say that officers immediately attempted CPR on Masters, who was eventually taken to Mount Vernon Hospital, where he was pronounced dead a short time later. Crime-scene technicians and detectives from homicide and internal affairs were scouring the site well into Friday night to determine what happened.

"Traffic was horrible," said Katherine Ward, co-chairwoman of the Mount Vernon Council of Citizens Associations. "The whole area was blocked off."

POLICE HAVE LAUNCHED parallel criminal and administrative investigations, a standard procedure following shootings involving police officers. The process began with the Criminal Investigation Bureau scouring the scene of the incident for forensic evidence. Then the Internal Affairs Bureau launched its formal investigation, which is currently collecting information that will eventually be presented to

Commonwealth's Attorney Ray Morrogh. The county's chief prosecutor will ultimately make a determination as to whether or not the officer violated the criminal code of Virginia.

"Don't mistake the fact that they are not talking as a tacit admission of guilt. They're simply exercising their rights as any other citizen would do."

"The legal standard that applies to the officer is the same legal standard that applies to anyone else," said Jim Lay, who represented an Alexandria police officer who accidentally killed a teenager in 2006. "There has to be a reasonable apprehension of imminent danger of death or serious injury."

Under Virginia law, individuals can use deadly force in self-defense to repel an as-

sault when threatened by death or great bodily harm. That's a determination based on a reasonable belief of imminent harm, regardless of whether or not the potential threat of danger turns out to be erroneous. Law enforcement officers are not required to use all feasible alternatives to avoid a situation where deadly force may be required, and the law imposes no duty to attempt the use of lethal force in a less than lethal matter.

"The reasonableness of a particular use of force must be judged from the perspective of a reasonable officer on the scene, rather than with the 20/20 vision of hindsight," wrote the late William Rehnquist in a 1989 case. "The calculus of reasonableness must embody allowance for the fact that police officers are often forced to make split-second judgements — in circumstances that are tense, uncertain and rapidly evolving — about the amount of force that is necessary in a particular situation."

AFTER THE PROSECUTOR makes a determination about whether or not the officer violated the Virginia criminal code, an administrative investigation will examine whether or not the officer acted in accordance within the rules of the Fairfax

County Police Department. Ultimately, Chief David Rohrer will make that determination. But that administrative review will have to wait until the Police Department's Internal Affairs Bureau has finished gathering information about the Nov. 13 incident.

"At this point, we are still waiting to hear from Internal Affairs to complete their investigation," said Chief Deputy Commonwealth's Attorney Ian Rodway. "When that happens, we'll review the evidence they've collected and take action accordingly."

Many neighborhood residents expressed support for the Fairfax County Police Department as an aggressive force against crime. Stratford on the Potomac resident Kahan Dillon says the county has a reputation as having a tough law-enforcement system for a county of similar demographics. He credited the police administration, community involvement and the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors for investing in public safety.

"Fairfax County has built a reputation that this is an extremely unfriendly place for criminals," said Dillon, a member of the State Board of Juvenile Justice. "I definitely believe that criminals realize the strength of the Fairfax County public safety system."

Mount Vernon's Jones Signs with Niagara

Senior signs early, can focus on final season with Majors.

Skylar Jones wasn't always a college-caliber athlete. In fact, he had trouble just staying on his feet. "When I was young, I was really clumsy," the Mount Vernon senior said. "I learned how to stay on my feet and get balanced. Once I learned how to stay balanced, the sky was the limit from there."

Jones might have taken his fair share of tumbles. But once he found his balance, he found a gift which will help him get a college education.

Jones, the 2009 National District Player of the Year, signed a letter of intent on Nov. 11 to play basketball at Niagara University. Coaches, teammates, friends and family celebrated the event with a signing party at Mount Vernon High School.

Niagara, located in New York, is a member of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference. The Purple Eagles advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 2005 and 2007 by winning the conference tournament under head coach Joe Mihalich. Niagara was Jones' first visit. He enjoyed his time there so much he didn't bother visiting any other schools.

"It felt like home," Jones said. "I was comfortable with all the players and coaches and I just didn't want to leave — that's how comfortable it was."

Jones' mother, Sam, said she was hesitant when her son made such a quick decision, but he convinced her it was the right choice.

"I wanted him to see other schools before he made a decision," Sam said. "But

ultimately, the decision was his. It had to be a good fit for him. Once he answered my ... basic questions, then I [supported

him] going to Niagara. ... I feel great. I'm very proud of him."

MAKING A DECISION early in the signing process allows Jones to focus on his senior season with the Majors, who are the defending district champions. Mount Vernon went undefeated during district play and won 19 consecutive games before losing to Hayfield in the regional semifinal.

"I've worked all my life just to get to this point. Now it's time to move on and get bigger goals and get ready for the season," Jones said. Signing quickly "was important to me. I wanted to make an early but decisive decision so I could just focus on the season. High school means a lot to me. I've been in the same school for four years and I've known these people all my life. I just want to go out with a bang."

The 6-foot-4 Jones was named National District Defensive Player of the Year and first-team all-Northern Region as a junior. This season, he is expected to play up to four different positions for a Majors team lacking in height.

"He's an all-around player," Mount Vernon head coach Alfonso Smith said. "We feed off his diverse abilities."

Jones brings joy to others with more than just his performance on the hardwood. His sense of humor brings smiles to the faces of friends and family.

"He's a joy to be around," Smith said. "He has a maturity beyond his years. His teachers comment all the time. ... He's not someone that's going to come in your class and just sit perfectly quiet, but he's a personable kid."

HE ALSO showed ability in the classroom, earning a place on the first quarter honor roll.

"For him to make the honor roll," Jones' dad, Wayne, said, "it shows that he's committed."

Wayne also said Jones doesn't allow his accomplishments to affect his attitude.

"He's a very humble kid, surprisingly," Wayne said. "I'll be the one on the Internet looking at stuff, [reading] the paper [and] I'll be talking to him and he'll be like, 'Oh, yeah dad.' You don't see him get excited or anything and he doesn't think he's above anybody else. He's very down to earth."

Jones is the third Mount Vernon player to sign with a Division I school during Smith's six-season tenure as head coach. E.J. Johnson, a 2006 graduate, signed with Longwood and 2008 graduate Marquel De Lancey signed with Old Dominion.

Smith said while producing Division I talent is a positive for the Mount Vernon program, it also reflects well on the National District and Northern Region.

"There's a lot of different private schools here in the area," Smith said. "But for the ones who stay [in public schools] and actually play, it's a testament to their hard work and the fact that, hey, if you can play, even in a public school, [colleges] will find you. ... We're very proud of him."



Huley arrived for dress rehearsal, he did so in his military uniform. A few minutes later, he was transformed into Mrs. Gorf, wearing a skirt, blouse, wig, and hose.

"I need a lot of prosthetics," he said with a laugh. And he gets many laughs in the play as the mean teacher who turns misbehaving students into apples.

"What I like about the play is seeing older kids acting like little kids," said junior Ariel Villa, 16, who plays teacher Miss Zarves. "I remember when I was little and I looked up to older kids and wanted to be like them. Now we are in high school and we want to be like little kids."

West Potomac's theater teacher and "Sideways" director Melissa Christensen chose this play to produce because of the familiarity many have with Sachar's work.

"I wasn't sure how the high school students would react to this choice of play. When I announced it at the interest meeting in September, the room exploded. So many of the kids know the books," she said.


Senior Madeline Dahl, who plays Miss Valoosh the dance teacher, says she loved the books when she was in elementary school. "I reread the books when I found out I was going to be in the play. Now I like the stories in a different way. Revisiting them has made me feel nostalgic."

To prepare, Christensen told the cast to spend time observing younger children.

"There is an exchange in the play, [character] Rondi picks a purple crayon, and [character] Leslie says purple is her favorite color and Rondi responds that she picked it first, and Leslie says, 'Okay, I'll switch to yellow.' It was that fast that she moved on. So, like a second grader, they don't hold grudges."

Sachar is the author of 21 educational and fiction books for children. Most popular are the "Wayside School" and "Marvin Redpost" series. He also received the National Book Award for "Holes."

"Sideways," which opened Nov. 13, will be performed Friday, Nov. 20, 7:30 p.m. and Saturday, Nov. 21 at 2:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. in the Koogelman Theater, Springbank Arts Center at West Potomac High School, 6500 Quander Road, Alexandria. Tickets are \$8 each purchased at the door only.

County Employees To Get More Holiday Leave

Fairfax County employees will get an additional day and a half of paid leave in December thanks to a Board of Supervisors decision Nov. 16.

The supervisors voted to give county employees one half day off on Dec. 24 and a full day off on Dec. 31 that were previously not included in Fairfax's work calendar.

The supervisors said they wanted to reward the county staff for "doing more with less," as a result of budget cuts. The extra paid leave, which Fairfax County chairman Sharon Bulova (D) and Mason District Supervisor Penny Gross (D) brought to the rest of the board, will cost the county approximately \$1 million.

At first, Bulova and Gross had suggested giving county employees two half days on Dec. 24 and Dec. 31. But Sully District supervisor Michael Frey (R) convinced the supervisors to give county employees a full day off Dec. 31, saying that little would get accomplished during a half day of work on New Year's eve.

"A half day of work on Dec. 31 would not necessarily be a productive day," said Bulova, agreeing with Frey.

Several supervisors said the additional vacation days were also supposed to ease the pain of the one furlough day county employees had to take during the first week of January this year.

Fairfax Administrators 21,000 H1N1 Vaccines

The Fairfax County Health Department administered 21,000 H1N1 vaccines over two Saturday clinics held Oct. 24 and Nov. 7 at the Fairfax County Government Center, according to a written statement by Fairfax County chairman Sharon Bulova (D).

The county limited its vaccinations to people considered most at risk for developing complications if they contract the H1N1 strain of the influenza. These groups included children and pregnant women.

A few residents were so anxious to get the vaccine that they camped out before the Oct. 24 clinic to ensure a good place in line. By 9 a.m. on the day of the first clinic, the line of people for the vaccination stretched from the government center door almost to Fairfax Corner shopping center about two blocks away, said Bulova.

The second clinic, on Nov. 7, ran more smoothly, with a very short wait for people who came to be vaccinated after 3 p.m.

According to Bulova, the county medical corps put in 3,900 hours of service, which costs \$96,292 per clinic. The Health Department call center is currently averaging 250 per day from the public about the H1N1 flu.


