

Guns and Speeches

Firearms advocates plan rally to start at Fort Hunt Park and move to Gravelly Point.

aniel Almond has never been to Fort Ward Park or Gravelly Park. And he's never staged a rally before. He doesn't even live in Virginia, but he's not letting that stop him from staging an April 19 rally he's calling "Restore the Constitution."

Almond, who lives near Atlanta, is an Iraq war veteran who separated from the Marine Corps in 2007. Since then, he's become increasingly concerned about a growing list of what he considers constitutional violations. It's a catalogue that includes the bank bail-

out, mandated health insurance, eminent domain and the federal minimum wage for starters. Inspired by a Florida-based online communication network known as Alarm and Muster, Almond decided stage a rally where supporters could bring their firearms in what he calls "civil obedience."

"We wanted to have it as close to D.C. as possible," said Almond, a real-estate agent. "This is intended for a national audience."

Enter the National Park Service.

Last month, the longstanding prohibition against bringing firearms into parks owned and operated by the National Park Service was overturned. When Congress was considering

Admirers Say Parris Helped Shape Northern Virginia

Former congressman, 80, died March 27.

hen Stanford E. Parris took his first job on Capitol Hill in 1958, it wasn't glamorous work.

He ran a mimeograph machine in the basement beneath the House of Representatives. The wages helped pay his law school tuition at The George Washington University.

Fourteen years later, Parris returned to the Capitol in a far more high profile position. He served as the U.S. Representative from Virginia's 8th District from 1973 to 1974 and 1981 to 1990.

The former Republican congressman died March 27 at the age of 80 in Mathews County, Va. He is survived by his wife Martie, three daughters and grandchildren.

AS A CONGRESSMAN, Parris represented a far larger geographic swath of Virginia than his successor, U.S. Rep. Jim Moran (D-8), currently does. In the 1980s, the 8th Congressional District included the City of Alexandria, the entire southern half of Fairfax County, part of Prince William County and the tip of Stafford County.

Responsible for such a large territory, Parris had his hand in a range of regional transportation and economic development projects.

He is partly responsible for the Torpedo Factory Art Center along the Alexandria waterfront and the "high occupancy vehicle" [HOV] lanes on Interstate 95. Parris was also on the founding board of directors at George Mason University.

"Stan was involved in almost every major thing in Northern Virginia," said U.S. Rep. Frank Wolf (R-10), who first got to know Parris when they both campaigned for congressional seats in 1980.

TOGETHER, Parris and Wolf worked to get Dulles International Airport transferred from the federal government to a regional authority, which allowed the airport to advertise and modernize. Dulles had been losing business to Baltimore-Washington International Air-

port prior to the authority change.

"It was a great deal for regional economic development," said Wolf.

Former Fairfax County Supervisor Elaine McConnell (R-Springfield) said Parris also helped secure funding for and assisted with the upstart of the Virginia Railway Express (VRE) commuter train.

"In 1983, I went to talk to him and he was the only politician I know who really moved on it and told me it could be done," said McConnell, who spent 20 years representing southern Fairfax County.

"I didn't have many supporters for VRE in 1983," she said.

PRIOR TO SERVING in Congress, Parris was also a member of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors from 1964 to 1967. He almost won a race for Fairfax County chairman.

The former congressman also served one term in the House of Delegates and was appointed Virginia's Secretary of the Commonwealth in 1978, between his two stints in the U.S. House of Representatives.

"Stan was Fairfax. He is the only person in Fairfax's history to serve in all three levels of government," said former U.S. Rep. Tom Davis (R-11), who was a Fairfax supervisor when



Gang-Related Homicide

Two teenagers, ages 15 and 16, and a 19-year-old man from the Alexandria-area have been arrested and charged in connection with the homicide that occurred in the area of Manor Drive and Osman Drive on Friday, March 19.

The victim in this homicide has been identified as Christian Perez, 16, of 8521 Silverdale Road in the Lorton area. The cause of death has been determined to be blunt force trauma to the head. Police have reason to believe this case to be gang related. The case remains under investigation.

With the assistance of the U.S. Marshals Service Capital Area Regional Fugitive Task Force, the U.S. Marshals Service New York/New Jersey Regional Fugitive Task Force and the Prince William County Police, the three suspects were arrested last week. The 15-year-old was apprehended on Monday, March 22 in Woodbridge; the 16-year-old was apprehended Friday, March 26 in New York City. Both have been charged with murder.

Jorge Albarenga, of 8569 Southlawn Court, was arrested on Wednesday, March 24 in Harrisonburg, Va. He has been charged with malicious wounding by a mob and gang participation. The younger juvenile is currently in the Fairfax County Juvenile Detention Center and Albarenga is being held in the Fairfax County Adult Detention Center.

Woman Shot in Engleside Area

On Wednesday, March 24 around 7:26 a.m., Fairfax County police responded to the intersection of Francisco Way and Orinda Court for reports of a person who had been shot.

Police found Morgan Myatt, 23, of 1311 Holly Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., deceased inside a parked vehicle. Police also recovered a gun at the scene.

Later that day around 4 p.m., Arlington County police responded to a weapons call where Antoine Avery, 25, of 6112 Crown Grant Drive in Spotsylvania, Va., was found shot to death in an apparent suicide in the 1200 block of South Quincy Street. Fairfax County police have concluded that Avery is the suspect in this homicide.

Cause of Death Determined

The body of a man was found in a community pond in the 8300 block of Pondside Terrace on Thursday, March 18. The cause of death was determined to be drowning. Around 4:14 p.m., a resident walking around the pond noticed something in the water that looked suspicious and called police. The police and fire departments responded and determined it was a deceased man. No foul play is suspected and police are working to identify the man.

He is described as black, between 20 and 30 years old, about 6 feet 2 inches tall and 165 pounds. He was wearing brown Nautica pants over three layers of thermal underwear, a multi-colored, button-up Tommy Hilfiger shirt over a thermal shirt and a T-shirt imprinted with "Cabo Verdo Show 2008." Over the button-up shirt, the man had on a brown Field & Stream coat and a green L.L. Bean fleece, sleeveless vest. He also had on black Tommy Hilfiger boots.

Schnoz To the Rescue

A Fairfax County bloodhound and his handler successfully tracked and located a woman who had been missing in the woods of Mason Neck State Park for around two days.

Park rangers were scouring the trails of the park after they found an abandoned vehicle on Monday, March 22. Park authorities contacted Fairfax County Police for assistance and a bloodhound named Schnoz went to work.

At around 11:30 p.m., Wednesday, March 24, Schnoz and Master Police Officer Pete Masood located the 53-year-old Lorton-area woman amidst thick brush, leaves and forest undergrowth. She was disoriented and suffering from hypothermia but was taken to Inova Mount Vernon Hospital where she was treated for non life-threatening injuries. Just three weeks ago, Schnoz successfully tracked down a suspect wanted in an armed carjacking in the Springfield area.

BRAC and Beyond Presentation Answers Some Questions

SFDC Puts Together an Informative Session

packed room of people at the Best Western Mount Vernon had a lot on their minds as they attended SFDC's BRAC and Beyond presentation this week. They wanted to know when Mulligan Road and the Fairfax County Parkway will be complete. Business owners wanted to know what business opportunities there are — both on and off the base. People looking for jobs wanted to know what employment opportunities will be created. And everybody wants to know what traffic will be like when BRAC is finally imple-

Given that BRAC has been discussed for so long, it may seem like a pipe dream. Rest assured, however, that BRAC is closer than it appears.

"We have 18 months left to complete the mandate that was given [to us]," said Col. Mark Moffatt, Deputy Garrison Commander for Transportation and BRAC, Fort Belvoir. "It is not without challenge or consternation, but it will happen."

Evidence of the preparation for BRAC is all around. Moffatt said that

they will have done \$4 billion in construction between 2007 and 2010. While Fort Belvoir is not adding acreage, they are adding buildings and roads. Work has just been completed on the 1,200th new house, and 450 more homes are

A whole new complex is being built for National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency, which is BRAC's major organization bringing 8,500 new employees to the area.

"This is the crown jewel," said Moffatt. "It will bring four separate locations under one roof and occupy 2.4 million square feet."

Moffatt went on to detail some of the other salient points. All phases of the Fairfax County Parkway will be completed at the end of this year. Mulligan Road will open for traffic next summer and will be fully complete in spring, 2012. Mulligan Road will give people in Mount Vernon direct access to Telegraph and Beulah Roads, or as Moffatt

quipped, "It's the road that will take people to the n e w Wegmans."

In addition, several roads within the base are being widened, while new gates are being added and current gates will be updated.

"A lot of

things are happening," said Moffatt.

Work on the new Medical Campus is moving along. This state-of-the-art facility tops off at seven stories, and will include a 24-hour Child Development Center, Dental Clinic and a Warrior Transition Complex. The hospital itself will have four clinic buildings, 10 operating rooms, full ICU, neo-natal ICU and 120 patient rooms. A total of 2,500 employees will be employed by the medical complex.

An excerpt from Belvoir's New Vision newsletter states: "Two major milestones were observed in December 2009, as the last pieces of steel were raised for the Fort Belvoir Community Hospital on the Main Post and the Base Realignment and Closure Recommendation 133 (BRAC 133) project, Department of Defense (DoD) office complex at the Mark Center in Alexandria, Va."

An Aging, More Diverse Community

hirty years ago, 86 percent of Fairfax County residents were white and the average age of the Fairfax citizen was 30 years old. Only 11 percent of the population spoke a language other English at home and nine percent was born in another coun-

But 2010 presents a different picture for Fairfax. Only 67 percent of residents are white and citizens are, on average, nine years older than they were in 1980. More than a third of county residents now speak a language other than English in their homes and 28 percent, almost one in three, are foreign born.

"Washington has emerged as an immigrant gateway over the last 10 to 15 years. It is one of the country's newer destinations for immigrants," said Jill Wilson, a senior research analyst at The

Brookings Institution who has studied immigration patterns in metropolitan areas across the country, including the Washington D.C. area.

The Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments predicts that there will be fewer white Fairfax residents than people from other racial or ethnic minority groups in the coming decade. Fairfax County Public Schools is already a "majority minority" district, meaning that a higher percentage of minority students than students who are white attend the local public schools.

"I am eager to see the numbers regarding our diverse population in Fairfax County. It is obvious how diverse our county has become," said Fairfax County Chairwoman Sharon Bulova (D-At-large).

WHEN COMPARED to the rest of the United States, a larger share of Fairfax's population is already part of a racial minority group. In 2008, the U.S. Census Bureau estimates that 73.4 percent of the United States was white, as opposed to 67 percent of Fairfax resi-

Fairfax's dominant racial and ethnic minority groups are also different from those seen in other parts of Virginia and the country.

In the United States, people who are Hispanic make up the largest minority group, with 15.1 percent of the population. People who are black or African American make up the largest racial minority group nationwide, at 12.6 percent, according to 2008 census esti-

In Virginia, people who are black or African American, at 20 percent of the state's population, are the largest minority group in the commonwealth.

But Fairfax bucks national and statewide trends. Asian residents, who make up 17 percent of the county's population, are the largest minority group in the Northern Virginia county.

By comparison, people who are Asian make up about 4.4 percent of the United States total population and 3.6 percent of Virginia's total population, according to the U.S. Census' 2008 estimates.

Within the Asian community, the Korean, Asian Indian and Vietnamese populations are the largest.

Parris was in Congress.

Parris acted as a booster for the business community and embraced development, which resulted in the current vibrant economy, said Davis and others.

"He came around at a time when the county was beginning to develop. He was very important in the formation and making of Fairfax County as we know it today," said Davis.

PARRIS WAS also one of the forebears of the modern Republican Party in Virginia. Virginia, including Fairfax County, was dominated by southern Democrats until the late 1970s.

He was the only Republican on the Fairfax County Board and one of nine Republicans in the 100-member House of Del-

"He and Jack Herrity, they were part of a small group that really started the Republican

Party in Fairfax in the 1960s and 1970s. There weren't really that many Republicans in Fairfax back then," said Wolf.

THE FORMER congressman also had a series of spirited political campaigns.

Mount Vernon resident and former U.S. Rep. Herbert Harris (D-8) ousted Parris in 1974 after Parris had served just one term. It was the election directly after the Watergate scandal broke, which several people said gave Democrats an inherent advantage.

"I think he worked hard on what he believed but many of the things he believed I was opposed to," said Harris.

But Parris faced Harris in two more elections, beating the Democrat in 1980.

"The Parris-Harris debates, they were like the Lincoln-Douglas debates," said Wolf of the 1980 campaign.

The National Poet Laureate serves as consultant to the Library of Congress and "seeks to raise the national consciousness to a greater appreciation of the reading and writing of poetry."

Virginia also has a poet laureate, a position established by the General Assembly and appointed by the governor from nominees submitted by the Poetry Society of Virginia. The current poet laureate of Virginia is Claudia Emerson, claudiaemerson.org.

Emerson won the 2006 Pulitzer Prize for Poetry for her collection "Late Wife." She is a professor of English and Poetry at the University of Mary Washington in Fredericksburg.

But some residents are lucky enough to have local poetry as well.

On April 10, 2007, the Alexandria City Council named Mary McElveen as the city's poet laureate for a three-year term. Her replacement for the next three years is set to be announced shortly.

MVCCA Is a "Lobbying Organization"

To the Editor:

There are 228 community associations in the Mount Vernon District. The MVCCA represents 64 of them. Another two dozen or so are members of the South County Federation (SCF). Many communities have no community associa-

Since the MVCCA represents barely 1/4 of the community associations in the Mount Vernon District and only a small percentage of the 125,000 or so residents of the Mount Vernon District, it remains a mystery to this writer why Supervisor Hyland sometimes uses decisions of the MVCCA as political cover for decisions he makes in the name of the entire District, and why voters have not, to my knowledge, raised this issue with him.

At the MVCCA Council meeting on March 24, 2010, a small minority of their 64 member organizations voted to enact three resolutions pertaining to the upcoming decision on the Fairfax County Budget. The resolutions could not possibly speak for the Mount Vernon district.

Their Education Committee resolution arose out of a meeting on March 3, 2010, attended by nine community associations. The resolution as enacted through 16 affirmative votes asks the Board of Supervisors (BOS) to establish a real estate tax rate adequate to accomplish the desires of the MVCCA and in so doing to "seek out and employ other revenue enhancement opportunities." (Why can't proponents of "tax increases" just use those words?)

The Health and Human Services (HHS) resolution arose out of a meeting on March 9, 2010, attended by 15 community association representatives. As originally drafted, the resolution proposed restoration of \$12.75 million in proposed budget cuts. At the Council meeting last week, the resolution was amended to strike \$10.1 million in proposed restored budget cuts intended for blueprint housing. With that amendment, the resolution was approved by a vote of 13-0 with five abstentions. This resolution also includes the MVCCA request that the BOS "adopt new tax rates and seek more diversified revenue enhancements that will provide County revenue sufficient to avert unacceptable damage to essential public services ...". What about unacceptable damage to the cash flow of citizens during a severe recession? One taxpayer's "essential" can be another's "extravagant."

The Budget Committee resolution arose from their March 3, 2010 meeting attended by six representatives. At the Council meeting, David Dale proposed an amendment seeking to redirect all funding in the current County budget proposal for the proposed development of North Hill "into public safety, human services, and education, resulting in the delay of the North Hill project by one year." That proposal was approved by a vote of 8-5-5. Mr. Dale was an opponent of the North Hill resolution passed by the MVCCA in 2007, which recommended use of over 20 acres for a park and the remainder, about 11 acres, for construction of 65 affordable homes for the less fortunate. The County intends to proceed along those lines and is moving forward. Last year, Mr. Dale made the self-serving proposal on behalf of his community that the County use the money appropriated for the North Hill project to instead buy foreclosed homes in his neighborhood to house the less fortunate. He continues his opposition to North Hill with the Budget & Finance resolution amendment. According to Cynthia Ianni, the County's Director of Design, Development and Construction for the Department of Housing and Community Development, the current County budget proposal includes no budget item pertaining to North Hill. As such, Mr. Dale's amendment not only has absolutely no effect, it calls into question his credibility. With that amendment, the Budget resolution passed by a vote of 8-3 with five abstentions. For those keeping score, the Budget resolution was supported by fewer than 14 people, eight at the Council and fewer than six at the Committee (I'm told the vote there wasn't unanimous).

Resolutions that fly under the radar and are enacted by the affirmative votes of eight out of 64 MVCCA member communities (12.5 percent) can't possibly even represent the views of MVCCA member communities much less those of the entire Mount Vernon district.

The MVCCA must be seen for



gressman Jim Moran (D-8), discussed some of the funding issues for transportation projects. Some of the money has been allocated, but they are adding language to upcoming bills to get more money allocated.

For the small business owners, Bridget Bean, director, Washington Metropolitan, Small Business Administration, had great news. She said that 1,600 firms have secured \$6.1 billion in prime government contracts — and these numbers

don't even include sub-prime contractors.

"I see a strong commitment by federal, state and local governments, and private and public companies all coming together to build a strong community," said Bean.

One of the questions during the question-and-answer session focused on the possibility of extended mass transit. Moffatt answered by saying, "Mass transit as a general rule is difficult in this area, but we are working with Fairfax County. There has been a lot of discussion about extending Metro from Huntington down Route One but the problem comes down to the land accessibility. There is no real location to put in a rail in without hurting businesses. I think that it will happen at some point, but I'm not sure when or how far down it will go."



Pitching Improvement Key for West Potomac


Donovan is a team captain.

a bill regulating credit cards last year, a provision was attached as a rider that would force the National Park Service to apply state laws rather than having its own rules. That bill passed. And, as of Feb. 22, gun-owners could legally bring their weapons into parks across the commonwealth.

"Certainly having firearms mixed in with visiting crowds would cause us some pause," said Dottie Marshall, superintendent of the George Washington National Parkway. "At this point, we are faced with following the law."

ALMOND CHOSE April 19 to commemorate the anniversary of the "Shot Heard Round the World" in Massachusetts that started the Revolutionary War. His original plan was to conduct the event at Gravelly Point, where he could benefit from Virginia's gun laws while still in sight of the Capitol. But as more and more people began expressing interest, Almond realized that parking would be a problem for the size of the expected crowd.

So he added a second location — Fort Hunt Park, the popular picnicking location in Fairfax County on the parkway. Almond figured holding the event at Fort Hunt could accommodate more people, and small convoys could travel up and down the parkway to take the demonstration to the edge of Washington. Last month, he applied for a permit to conduct the rally. Since then, a debate has emerged online among support-

ers about the wisdom of mixing angry protesters with armed individuals.

"I pray that the cowboys don't show up," said Tom Fernandez, the founder of Alarm and Muster, who will be one of the featured speakers at the rally. "The reality is that there are irresponsible gun owners in this world but this rally is not for them."

Like many of the participants, Almond plans to come bearing arms. For starters, he'll be packing an unloaded rifle. He'll also be wearing a bandoleer with rifle ammunition. Then there's the loaded pistol that he'll keep holstered during the rally. The show of force is an effort to make a statement, Almond said, about the growing threats to the United States Constitution.

"This is serious business," he said. "Why even bother having a Constitution if we are not going to follow it?"

George Mason University professor Solon Simmons says groups such as the ones staging the April 19 protest feel that they have been marginalized, and that organizing tea party events and open-carry rallies are an attempt to regain a sense of lost power. Part of that phenomenon is racial, he said, with certain elements of the movement concerned with the emergence of an ethnically diverse society. It's a mix he said could prove to be dangerous.

"These are people who feel deeply marginalized," said Solon. "Any movement that emerges in that kind of self-perception can be dangerous."


