Fairfax Likely to Cut School's Gardening Program

tudents from Hollin Meadows Elementary School in Mount Vernon were back at the White House for a second time, continuing what seemed to be a personal relationship with First Lady Michelle Obama.

Children from Hollin Meadows first met with the White House chef and toured the First Lady's vegetable garden last spring. Obama returned the favor, coming to Hollin Meadows with U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack in November.

Obama is particularly interested in Hollin Meadows extensive gardening program. The U.S. Department of Agriculture plans to start videotaping students and staff at Hollin Meadows later this month. They intend to use the footage for an instructional program on gardening with children.

Staff and students grow food to eat on the grounds of the school, in part, to teach children about the origins of food and healthy eating habits.

A number of Hollin Meadows pupils are considered poor and qualify for free or reduced-price lunches at school. Many live in apartment complexes on the Richmond Highway corridor and do not have space for their own gardens.

For those students, this is the only time

they have been put in an agricultural setting, said Principal Jon Gates.

"Many of our kids don't have an opportu

Seeking Complaints

County depends on neighbors' help to enforce zoning violations.

t's a common sight in Fairfax County
— cars parked on neighborhood
yards. It's also illegal. According to
county zoning codes, cars can only be
parked on lawns for a 48-hour period for
cleaning, repairs or loading. Violators can
face a \$100 fine. But that's only if the county
knows about violations.

"This is a county with more than a million people," said Brian Worthy, a spokesman for the county government. "We can't drive around the county all day looking for violations."

Because the Fairfax model is complaint driven, citizens are encouraged to identify violators. Worthy says that people are encouraged to include their names and contact information so zoning inspectors can contact them during the course of their investigation. They can even be filed anonymously. Worthy says county officials will investigate anonymous zoning complaints, but he was quick to add that the names of those who issue complaints will be closely guarded by county officials.

"The name and identity of those who file complaints are protected by law," he said. "We urge people to let us know if one of their neighbors is violating the law."

THE PROBLEM of cars parked on lawns across Fairfax County is not a new one. But it's persistent. The county received 322 complaints last year about cars parked in lawns. Officials say the phenomenon has long been a problem, and that zoning inspectors regularly respond to complaints

'Peter Pan' Opens at Carl Sandburg April 9

wo years of a lagging economy brought about by an all-time high jobless rate and mortgage foreclosures were one of the reasons Margaret Mary Howell thought the musical "Peter Pan" should be the production to celebrate the 30th anniversary of the Mount Vernon Community Children's Theater

After all, the fantasy is about a boy entitled to be a child forever, without the responsibilities of adulthood — something some adults may need a little bit of right now. "In Peter Pan's 'Neverland' people are taken away to a whimsical world. That's what theater does: it takes us away to something fun and happy, but sometimes also to something sad and depressing," said Howell, who chairs the community theater's board that selects its annual productions of three musicals and/or plays.

"We wanted to do it and we thought it would be appealing to children of all ages — young and old. We wanted fun and we wanted happiness."

Howell got both fun and happiness when she and the board chose Scottish writer J.M. Barrie's book, which was first published 108 years ago as six chapters in "The Little White Bird." Two years later, those six chapters were republished under the title of "Peter Pan in Kensington Gardens." Adapted and expanded several times since, today it is known simply as "Peter Pan."

You already know the story: Peter Pan is a boy who can fly and refuses to grow up. He spends his perpetual childhood on a

small island called Neverland. As the leader of his gang the Lost Boys, he communicates with mermaids, Indians, fairies and pirates and occasionally with children from the world outside

Forty-six children ages eight to 18 from the Mount Vernon community have each spent 100-plus hours every Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday evening since January learning their lines, lyrics, and stage positions for the theater's opening night, which is this Friday, April 9, according to Ellen Woods, the producer of the musical and a board member.

"It has been an amazing process to go from auditions to seeing how focused these kids are," Woods said. "The only other activity that I know of where the ages vary so much is on swim team," Woods said, whose son James, 11, is also a cast member.

"I'll see an eight-year-old talking to a 16year-old during break. It's one big group regardless of age that has the same set of expectations. They have to be on time and on stage when they're called and their queued," she said.

One child actor who is accustomed to being ready at all times is Emily Whitworth, a 15-year-old Mount Vernon High School student who has taken on the lead role of Peter.

"It's a little daunting," Whitworth said, who plays opposite Daniel Scalph's Captain Hook.

"I know this isn't professional theater. We don't have the stress of performing for professional critics and it's hard to follow in the footsteps of Mary Martin and Cathy Rigby, but it's nice to let everything go and do something you really enjoy doing," she said.

FOUNDED IN 1980, the children's theater was the brainchild of several Mount Vernon parents who "were responding to the lack of arts education, particularly theater," according to the children's theater marketing and education director Beth Hauptle.

Since then, the children's theater has produced 78 musicals and/or plays. This is its third time producing "Peter Pan," which was previously produced for the 1994-95 season and the 1983-84 season.

The children's theater has two paid staffers — Hauptle is one of them — but the organization depends on the help of volunteers, like Howell and Woods and a bevy of others.

Professionals that have degrees in their fields are hired to direct, choreograph, and stage the productions.





The children's theater also conducts eight-, 12-, and 14-week classes in theater at six area schools. Students are taught the art of playwrighting and performance at Mount Vernon Woods, Woodlawn, and Woodley Hills and the art of acting at Belleview, Stratford Landing, and Silverbrook.

"They are taught to use theater as a way of expressing the challenges they're facing," Hauptle said.

Some students who have participated in the children's theater have gone on to lead professional roles in theater. Katie Fox-Kirsch is one of them.

Shy and lacking in self-confidence, Fox-Kirsch, now 28, first performed on stage while in the fifth grade. She added two more shows to her list of credits while in the seventh grade and her final performance with the children's theater came when she was in the ninth grade. It was the role of Beth March in "Little Women."

Dedicated to career path in the theater, Fox-Kirsch graduated from James Madison University in three-and-a-half years with a degree in music with a concentration in musical theater. After an eightmonth stint in Los Angeles where it was difficult to find work, she relocated to New York and has been there for six years. Despite not finding a role on Broadway, she managed to find work in regional theater across the country. This summer, she will appear in two productions at the Greenbriar Valley Theater. That contract alone has enabled her to become a member of the Actors' Equity Association, automatically opening more doors for audition when she returns to New York in the fall.

"MVCCT gave me the bug," she said. "I've always wanted to perform, but I didn't know how tough

nity to grow things at home. This can be a real 'aha' moment for them," he said.

The program also exposes children to new types of produce. Students are more willing to try a strange vegetable or fruit they have grown themselves than one purchased in a store, said Gates.


The First Lady recently launched an initiative to prevent and combat childhood obesity. She and Vilsack appear to be interested in using Hollin Meadows gardening project as a model for other schools nationwide.

But all the high-profile visitors and swooning from the federal government has not kept Hollin Meadows gardens safe from local county budget cuts yet.

The Fairfax County School Board took a preliminary vote to eliminate Project Excel and the "focus" program, the two sources of funding for Hollin Meadows gardening, in 2010. Without the extra money, approximately \$276,000 annually, the school will have to let its acres of plants go dormant and end the gardening program next year, said Gates.

The Fairfax County School Board will take their final vote on funding for both Project Excel and the "focus" program in May.

— both from those willing to give their name and from those who aren't. Yet neighborhood groups say the problem hits some neighborhoods more than others.

"I've never seen this in my neighborhood — ever," said Mount Vernon Council of Citizens Associations co-chairman Robert Reynolds, who lives in Riverside Estates. "If it was a problem, the homeowners association would be out there taking care of it."

But many areas don't have covenants. Some areas don't even have active homeowners associations. That means that cars can often end up in yards with little or no opposition — especially if neighbors are unwilling to make formal complaints. County officials say little can be done without feedback from residents about the exact location of offenders.

"If people don't want to file a complaint in their name, they can call my office and I'll file it in my name," said Lee District Supervisor Jeff McKay. "I encourage people to do that all the time."

Cuccinelli Misleads on Costs

Perhaps we need a referendum to decide if and when Virginia will spend time, resources and image on challenging federal actions?

admit that we are embarrassed, as two of Virginia's major newspapers warned we might be. But no one predicted that there would be so much to blush about so soon.

Suddenly, Virginia is in the national spotlight, not for being home of the Internet along the Dulles corridor, not for being the place for lovers (too many exceptions apply), not for being the mother of many presidents, not for its history, not for its wine.

No, Virginia is in the national spotlight because our newly elected Attorney General, Ken Cuccinelli of Clifton, Fairfax County, Editorial

has taken to court declaring recently passed landmark health care legislation as unconstitutional. He also sued to

stop the regulation of greenhouse gasses and now will challenge new federal standards for auto emissions (even though even the auto industry would rather have federal controls that a patchwork of state regulations).

He opened his administration telling Virginia's dramatically underfunded colleges and universities that they could not include sexual orientation in their anti-discrimination

Last October, before the election, the Virginian Pilot warned: "Cuccinelli's election would bring embarrassment to Virginia." The Washington Post, a few days later: "Cuccinelli would drive away qualified lawyers from an office that

ome of us are probably prepared to functions as the state government's law firm, and, given his bizarre ideas, he would very likely become an embarrassment for the commonwealth."

> ADDING INJURY TO INSULT, Cuccinelli denies that these escapades are costing the Commonwealth anything, releasing a statement claiming, for example, that the only costs involved are the filing fees, \$350 in the case of the constitutional challenge to the health care.

> That's like saying it didn't cost anything to close the Federal Government in the snow emergency in February. The actual cost was about \$70 million a day.

> Cuccinelli owes his constituents a real accounting of the costs, the amount staff time devoted to the efforts. The Office of the Attorney General is Virginia's law firm, and there are established methods for billing and assessing costs.

> Most important is admitting the opportunity costs. What is it that his office is not doing because of the time and focus playing national

> His two immediate predecessors, Gov. Bob McDonnell and Virginia Supreme Court Justice Bill Mims, both focused on consumer protection. McDonnell launched the "consumer alert of the month," a column which addressed real problems faced by ordinary Virginians in terms of financial fraud, identity theft and

other critical issues. Mims maintained the monthly effort. The columns appeared in media around the state, and served both as a warning and as a means of reaching out to people who had been victims.

The last such "alert" was filed the month before Cuccinelli took office, after monthly entries for four years through 2009. (www.oag.state.va.us/CONSUMER/ Consumer_Alert_Archive.html)

Taking care of Virginian's interests is not at the top of the priorities of the current attorney general.

The 14 duties and powers of the Office of Attorney General (see www.oag.state.va.us/OUR OFFICE/ Role.html) include providing information on identity theft and remediation, help Social Services collect child support, prosecute certain environmental and computer crimes, enforce laws that protect businesses and consumers, represent consumers in utility matters before the State Corporation Commission, in addition to providing legal advice and opinions to the Governor, General Assembly and other state agencies.

Ken Cuccinelli was elected state senator representing the 37th District, part Prince William and Fairfax counties, in a special election in 2002. The election drew 16.6 percent of registered voters after state Sen. Warren Barry (R) resigned to take a job with the Warner Administration. Cuccinelli was reelected in 2003 and then in 2007 held onto his seat by less than 100 votes.

Highlights of General Assembly

BY TODDY PULLER STATE SENATOR (D-36)

he budget passed by the General Assembly was austere. I voted for it because I believed it was the best that we could get this Session. We were forced to make about \$4.2 billion in cuts due to the loss in receipts coming into the State treasury and many members of the General Assembly

RICHMOND REPORT refused to consider any tax or fee increases. However, a few increases man-

aged to pass in the budget negotiations. I am pleased that we were successful in unfreezing the Local Composite Index (LCI), the formula by which the state funds local schools. This saved about \$61 million in education funding for Fairfax County and \$22.6 million for Prince William County.

K-12 Public Education — One of the top priorities of the Senate's Democratic-led budget negotiators was to prevent devastating cuts to K-12 education. The final budget reduced K-12 education by \$253 million, but these reductions were made in such a way as to minimize the impact on programs, standards and jobs. We were able to prevent over \$400 million in additional cuts proposed by the House of Delegates.

Higher Education — It was spared as cuts had been imposed in recent Sessions. However, there was a reduction of \$5 million to the Tuition Assistance Grant program (TAG).

The Arts — These were also protected receiving a 15 percent cut instead of total elimination.

Health and Human Resources — The Senate fought to preserve the healthcare safety net because of the increasing demand being placed on providers. Funding was restored to the Virginia Health Care Foundation, community health centers and free clinics. Virginia's FAMIS program was funded to allow more low-income children and pregnant women to receive care and \$75 million was included for home and community-based care for those with disabilities

Public Safety — Funds were restored to protect the jobs of sheriffs' deputies and local police. Funding was dedicated to protect children from online predators creating the Internet Crimes Against Children fund that will support law enforcement through a \$10 fee on misdemeanor and felony convictions. One correctional field unit will be closed in FY 2011 and one larger facility in FY 2012. The closures will be determined by the Department of Corrections.

Virginia Retirement System (VRS) — Savings were achieved by deferring \$620 million in payments to the VRS for the 2010-12 biennium. An amendment proposed by the Senate requires repayment of the deferred contributions over 10 years beginning in FY 2013. There will be one furlough day for state employees in 2010 with a 3 percent bonus in 2013 if funds are available.

Public Hearing On Land Use

To the Editor:

On April 13, at 7:30 p.m. at the Mount Vernon Government Center where Supervisor Hyland's office is located, a public hearing will be conducted by the APR Task Force concerning two nominations proposing amendments to the Comprehensive Plan regarding the Little Hunting Creek Pumping Station (Pumping Station). One nomination, 9MV was filed by the Mount Vernon Council (MVCCA). I am the nominator for the other nomination, 10MV.

Three years ago, several

Stratford Landing neighbors and I created a Web site at www.pumpingstation.org to address issues of concern to our neighborhood concerning the Pumping Station. That Web site was recently updated to discuss issues concerning these Comprehensive Plan nominations. I urge interested citizens to visit the Web site, learn the facts, attend the hearing, and testify.

In 2004, Stratford Landing residents Elizabeth Martin and (her husband) Paul Siegel sought community approval for opening up the Pumping Station land to public access. A referendum was held by the Stratford Landing Citizens' Association (SLCA) in 2004 and with over double the quorum requirement voting, the proposal was defeated with 69 percent opposing. At least three subsequent attempts to open up the Pumping Station lands to some level of public access failed. At least two of those failed attempts involved efforts by Ms. Martin and Mr. Siegel.

Thwarted in her efforts within the Stratford Landing community to open up the Pumping Station lands to public access, Ms. Martin sought an MVCCA nomination to the Comprehensive Plan to pave the way for achievement of her goal. The nomination as proposed by Ms. Martin included the proviso of "a boardwalk and nature pathway [within the Pumping Station land] to provide walking access to Little Hunting Creek and its wetlands." As a backup plan, her proposal requested that any portions of the Pumping Station land not in use by the County "should be preserved as open space" and that "Consideration should be given to consolidating portions of this 9.6 acre parcel with the adjacent 1.8 acre parcel ... owned by the Northern Virginia Conservation Trust [NVCT] ...". Ms. Martin and Mr. Siegel are listed on the NVCT Web site as contributors of at least \$1,000 each in the 2008-2009 fiscal year. They also donated some rights in their waterfront parcel on Stockton Parkway to the NVCT.

The boardwalk and nature pathway were stricken at the SLCA's request but the open space and NVCT provisions remain.

My nomination to the Comprehensive Plan was filed as a defensive measure, after the MVCCA defied the SLCA's objection to their nomination and the SLCA took no defensive action on its own. My nomination seeks to codify the promise Supervisor Hyland has made to Stratford Landing time and time again that there will be no material changes in the char



ive of Old Town Alexandria's finest historic homes and gardens will be open to the public on Saturday, April 17 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., in a kick-off to the 77th Annual Historic Garden Week in Virginia.

Visitors will tour the property of a classic Federal house that was home to George Washington's nephew and Martha Washington's favorite niece. Another home has served as a girls' school, then a library, and currently houses a Civil War museum which features the camp chair of Robert E. Lee. The design of one of the homes is architecturally significant as an unaltered example of a wealthy merchant's residence of the mid-19th century.







Helen Hayes Award Winners

Local actors win prestigious awards for community theater.

At the 26th annual Helen Hayes Awards Monday, April 5 at the Warner Theater in the District, MetroStage in Alexandria won three awards. It is the first time the company founded by Carolyn Griffin in Alexandria has seen multiple awards going to work performed on its stage.

The three were Outstanding Choreography in a Resident Musical for Maurice Hines for his work on "Cool Papa's Party," Outstanding Musical Direction in a Resident Musical for William Knowles for the same show, and the Canadian Embassy's Award for Outstanding Ensemble in a Play for the cast of its charming three-actor show "Heroes".

The three actors who received the Canadian Embassy Award for Outstanding Ensemble in a Play for "Heroes" were three veterans of Washington area stages whose total time trodding local boards was tabulated by MetroStage as 105 years. Ralph Cosham, John Dow and Michael Tolaydo brought a professional rapport and a sense of mutual respect as theater veterans to the gentle play of a trio of aging veterans of "The Great War" in their twilight days at an old soldier's home.

That last award was in a tie with Synetic Theater's cast of "A Midsummer Night's Dream," which played first at The Kennedy Center and then at the Rosslyn Spectrum.

SYNETIC'S FAMILY THEATER, performing in Shirlington, won the first-ever award in the new category: Outstanding Production — Theatre for Young Audiences award for its "The Tale of the Fisherman and the Golden Fish."

The only other award for work in Alexandria/Arlington was Holly Twyford's latest award for Outstanding Actress in a Play for her work at Signature Theatre in "The Little Dog Laughed." She had been nominated for three performances this year - the other two at D.C. theaters - and it is her fourth award.

The cross-river nature of professional theater in our community continues to be evident — Arena Stage which performs some of its work in Crystal City while its home facility in Southwest D.C. is undergoing construction, saw an actor from its production of "The Fantastics," which played at the Lincoln in D.C., walk away with the Outstanding Supporting Actor in a Resident Musical (Laurence O'Dywer). And Keegan Theatre, which was nurtured through the Arlington Arts Incubator program but which recently became the resident company at the Church Street Theatre in Northwest D.C., earned two prestigious awards: Lead Actor in a Resident Musical for Parker Drown who played "Angel" in its production of the rock musical "Rent" — and the entire company of that show earned the Canadian Embassy Award for Outstanding Ensemble in a Musical.

Majors, Wolverines Respond During City Tourney

West Potomac freshman Murray throws two-hit shutout in first varsity start.

ount Vernon thumped its ri val before twice trying to overcome an early deficit. West Potomac was on the wrong end of a lopsided score, but bounced back with a stellar pitching performance. It was an interesting spring break for both teams during the Alexandria City Championship baseball tournament.


After inclement weather delayed the start of the tourney, Mount Vernon got rolling with a 10-0, six-inning victory over West Potomac on March 31.

West Potomac catcher David Burns said the Wolverines entered the game assuming they would beat Mount Vernon due to results against a common opponent. West Potomac opened its season with a 14-0, fiveinning victory over Stonewall Jackson on March 19. Three days earlier, Mount Vernon lost a nine-inning battle with Stonewall Jackson, 5-1.

Against Mount Vernon "we thought we were going to walk all over them because we beat Stonewall and they got beat by Stonewall," Burns said. "It was just, 'Look at this, they did this, we did this, we can beat them."

Instead, the Majors jumped out with five runs in the third and never looked back.

The following day, Mount Vernon split a doubleheader against Bishop Ireton and Episcopal. In the opener against Ireton, the Majors fell behind 5-0 when pitcher Jimmy

Woehrle gave up a grand slam. Woehrle responded with a 3-run home run of his own shortly after. The Majors followed suit and came back to win 10-8.

"We battled back," Sable said. "We had some big hits."

Following the win, Mount Vernon took on Episcopal. The Majors tied the game at 3 in the bottom of the fourth inning on a basesloaded walk by Collin Bowyer, but fell behind 7-3 in the top of the fourth when they committed three errors.

Mount Vernon continued to fight, however, cutting the lead to 7-5 in the bottom half of the inning on an RBI single by Justin Boutin and an Episcopal error. The Majors loaded the bases with no outs in the bottom of the seventh but managed only one run and lost 7-6.

"The kids were coming off a big win and

it was an emotional letdown for them," Sable said. "They battled back but they just couldn't get the big hit when we needed it."

Boutin, who led off the bottom of the seventh, pitched for the Majors and received praise from Sable.

WHILE MOUNT VERNON flattened West Potomac early, the Wolverines responded quickly. On April 1, West Potomac beat St. Stephen's/St. Agnes 10-0 in five innings, led by a stellar pitching performance by Jayme Murray.

Making his first varsity start, the freshman left-hander struck out 10 Saints while tossing a two-hit shutout. Murray threw 55 of 84 pitches for strikes (65 percent) and delivered a first-pitch strike to 10 of the 18 batters he faced.

West Potomac head coach Jim Sullivan called the team's performance "night and day" compared to how the Wolverines played against Mount Vernon, thanks primarily to Murray.

"We got a great pitching effort from Jayme and that fired the guys up," Sullivan said. "I think he set the tone with the pitching and got them excited. Good play can be contagious, as can bad play. We're familiar with both of those.

"Just about everything seemed to be working [for Murray]. He does a tremendous job of keeping the ball down. He got one ball up that they hit to the fence ... but other than that, most all of his strikes were right on the knees."

Murray allowed a triple off the centerfield fence to Josh Smith in the first inning and a single to Jason Jamula in the fourth. He walked one batter and retired 15 of 18 batters faced.

Murray said he placed his fastball well and the Saints were swinging at his curveball. The freshman added time spent playing with his teammates during the offseason eased the shock of playing varsity as a freshman.

"I played varsity in the summer, so I was used to it," he said. "That definitely prepared me well. [There weren't] a lot of surprises."

Does he feel he belongs at the varsity level? "Absolutely," he said. "I feel like part of the family."

West Potomac closed the tournament with a 3-1 loss to Hayfield on April 2 and a 4-2 loss to Bishop Ireton on April 3.

Mount Vernon beat Yorktown 10-4 on April 6 in a rematch of last season's National District title game, which was won by Yorktown.

Mount Vernon travels to face Hayfield at 7 p.m. April 9. West Potomac hosts Lee at 6:30 p.m. April 9.

"I've had tendentious in my knee for the past fourth months and this is my first mile since December," Coffey said. "I just wanted to come out here and give it all I had."

Coffey said his last mile run took place on Dec. 5, 2009 but since then he's been recovering from his knee injury.

competitive mile since Dec. 5, 2009, but managed to finish first in the 1600-meter run at the Leslie Sherman Memorial Invitational on April 1.

track meet of the season and Coffey said he tempered his expectations for the boys' 1600-meter run.

"I didn't except to win," he said. "I just wanted to see what I could do after being hurt."

But winning is exactly what Coffey did. The Wolverine runner developed a commanding lead early in the race and held on to the lead in the final laps creating enough distance to hold off any passing attempts.

Coffey finished with a time of 4:28.52, five seconds ahead of Centreville's Robert Kelly.

After spending months struggling to return get his knee race fit, Coffey said the injury didn't play a factor in his race.

"I guess I was in the zone," he said. "I was feeling pain, but not in my knee."

acter of use of the Pumping Station lands without a consensus of the Stratford Landing community in favor. While I believe he will abide by his promise, it would be helpful to Stratford Landing if the language I have proposed were added into the Comprehensive Plan so subsequent Mount Vernon supervisors will be more likely to respect that promise.

My nomination is justified because the Pumping Station is located deep within Stratford Landing. Any material changes in the character of use of the Pumping Station lands would only affect Stratford Landing. Stratford Landing should have a significant say over any material changes in the character of use of the Pumping Station land. There is precedent in the Comprehensive Plan for this sort of provision.

Five hundred years from now, the Pumping Station will still be a Pumping Station. The portions of the Pumping Station lands that are not currently in use are likely necessary to make it possible to expand or change the facility to accommodate to population changes and fluctuations in demand. Approval of my nomination would go

a long way toward limiting material changes in the use of the Pumping Station land (besides uses as a pumping station), going forward.

I note that six members of the Task Force were either MVCCA officials when the MVCCA's Pumping Station nomination was prepared and filed or are MVCCA officials now, or both. Each of these Task Force members has a vested interest in seeing to the approval of the MVCCA's nomination. As such, they should all recuse themselves from participating in the hearing on the Pumping Station nominations as Task Force members. Although Supervisor Hyland appointed these people to the Task Force and he only requires recusal for direct financial conflicts, these facts do not immunize these past and present MVCCA officials from their obligation to the Mount Vernon community they represent on the Task Force to avoid a conflict or an appearance of one. Given their roles concerning the MVCCA nomination, if they do not recuse themselves, they would taint the perceived integrity of the Task Force.


