Clifton's Growing Concern

Rocky Run Garden Club celebrates six decades.

Cabell's Mill, in E.C. Lawrence Park, is an important part of Centreville's history. It was fitting, therefore, that it was the site of the Rocky Run Garden Club's 60th anniversary celebration.

Ellanor C. Lawrence was a charter member of the club, as was Centre Ridge resident Mildred DeBell. The day of the celebration, May 25, DeBell brought her scrapbooks detailing the club's history back to 1950 and shared her thoughts on the anniversary.

"It's hard to believe we've been around for 60, long years," said DeBell, 92. "But they've been wonderful years and the garden club has been a big part of my life."

She said people's lives are like gardens, with four seasons. "In spring, we're growing up and learning our way," said DeBell. "Our parents have planted good seeds and are weeding out the undesirable things. In summer, you're enjoying the blooms of your life and all you've learned."

In fall, she said, "You're looking back and enjoying your memories. Then comes winter and things are closed down. You're not able to work in your garden as much, but you go through your life and recall the good things that happened. And you're blessed with the thought that, hopefully, the seeds you've planted in your life will bring blossoms for the next generation in the spring."

In 1952, DeBell's husband Stuart began his first of 16 years on Fairfax County's Board of Supervisors, and Centreville was a rural place with few services. Lawrence was trying to get trash disposal for the area, and both she and Mildred DeBell tried their best to beautify things. In 1935, Lawrence bought Walney Farm as a retreat for her and her husband David.

"She fell in love with the land, the pond and the mill," said DeBell. "But she said Dave was furious because it was 'out in the boonies,' so her brother helped her financially to buy this land. She always wanted it used only for park purposes, for people to enjoy."

So eventually, Lawrence gave her namesake park, plus Cabell's Mill, to the Fairfax County Park Authority to preserve. And at least once a year, the Garden Club meets there.

"This mill was neat, and Mrs. Lawrence just loved the Rocky Run Garden Club," said DeBell. "After the county became developed and we didn't have to fight for things, flower shows became a major part of our club. Each person's personality came out in their flower arrangements."

Today, the club has 41 members and associates, and more than two dozen attended the anniversary celebration at Cabell's Mill. They enjoyed a crepes and cupcakes luncheon catered by the Clifton Café and participated in a flower-arranging contest, while socializing and discussing what the club means to them.

Clifton's Linda Custis joined seven years ago. "I had lots of dear friends in the group and wanted to spend more time with them," she said. "I have a house with lots of gardens and thought I'd learn something."

Local Soldier Killed

Benjamin J. Park, 25, killed in Afghanistan.

A Fairfax Station resident serving in the U.S. Army in Afghanistan was killed in action Friday, June 18, the Department of Defense announced on Monday.

According to the Department of Defense, Pfc. Benjamin J. Park, 25, of Chippenham Court, was killed in the Zhari District of Kandahar, Afghanistan when his dismounted patrol encountered an improvised explosive device placed by insurgents.

Records from Fort Campbell, Ky., the base where Park was stationed, show that he was an infantryman assigned to Company B, 1st Battalion, 502nd Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team. He joined the Army in August 2009 and arrived at Fort Campbell in January 2010. His awards and decorations include the National Defense Service Medal and Global War on Terrorism Service Medals, Army Service Ribbon and Overseas Service Ribbons and the Combat Infantry Badge.

"I'm still in shock," said In Sook Park, the soldier's mother. "I still cannot believe that my son is dead."

Morin Represents

Lorton mother represents state at Moms Congress on Education.

Christine Morin has been a tireless advocate for children's education for years, consumed by a mission to ensure that every Lorton-area child receives the best instruction possible. Her efforts have brought about many positive changes to local schools.

This work, while long appreciated by Lorton residents, was finally recognized as Morin was selected by Parenting Magazine to be the sole state representative at their 2010 Moms Congress on Education and Learning. The congress brought 51 mothers from each state and Washington, D.C., including Morin, to Georgetown University for a three-day conference in May to celebrate and connect mothers fighting for better schools.

"It was an amazing experience," Morin said. "It was very humbling to be with 50 other moms who are just as passionate on education issues and understand how to get things done."

According to Victoria Livadas, spokeswoman for The Parenting Group, Morin was chosen to represent Virginia in the inaugural Moms' Congress "for her outstanding contributions and dedica-



Woodson Seniors Celebrate End of Era


W.T. Woodson High conducts its graduation ceremony June 17 at Robinson Secondary.

In the Field House of Robinson Secondary School on June 17, seniors from W.T. Woodson High School celebrated the ending of one era, and the beginning of another. The Class of 2010 is the first to graduate since the school completed its renovation project in November 2009.

"Change has been the ever-present theme throughout our time at Woodson," said Michelle Strickland, a senior class officer, as she and fellow officer Nkechinyerem Iko welcomed the students and the guests to the ceremony. "With the new building comes a new era in Woodson's history."

Woodson had more to celebrate than the new building. Sixty-nine seniors graduated with honors, having earned a 4.0 or better GPA during their time at Woodson. Awards and scholarships were also presented to several graduating seniors. Of the specially endowed awards and scholarships, the Christopher Marshall Award went to John Vecchiatti; the J. Tyler Bentley Award to John Hale; and the third annual Julia Campbell Memorial Award and Scholarship to Lisa Gross and Molly Sablosky. W.T. Woodson presented Service Awards to Michelle Strickland and Joseph Jedlicka, the Leadership Award: Alexander Willard, the Faculty Award to Michael Promisel and Jeremy Weir, and the School Award to Nkechinyerem Iko. Cathy Shelton, calculus teacher and head of the math department, was honored as the PTSO Teacher of the Year.

Senior Michael Promisel, the student speaker, delivered a clever charge to the class. He compared the four years of high school to chapters in a novel.

"When we began in September 2006, the chapter was only a single page," he said. He went on to highlight some of the major events of the past four years at Woodson.

"Today is the first day of a new chapter," he said, at the end. "Our lives are like never ending novels, with one exciting chapter after another."

The guest speaker was James Brown, host of the CBS series "The NFL Today." In his speech, he offered the seniors a few "basic fundamentals for success in the game of

life."

"I would like you to view me in the role of a substitute teacher, to reinforce a lot of the basics and fundamentals that [your parents and teachers] have been telling you year after year," he said.

Brown outlined the need for students to practice good communication skills, dressing for success, promptness, intellectual curiosity, and interpersonal skills throughout their lives in order to attain success in the working world. He also emphasized having fun.

"Life can be fun when you are a winner and doing things the right way," Brown said.

"Doing things that are morally correct and ethically correct will always get you success where you can have fun," he said.

"To those who much is given, much is required," he quoted as he completed his speech. "Go chase your dream, and do it well."

After the ceremony, the newly graduated seniors were excited for the future. "It feels good," said graduate Chad Withington. "It hasn't really hit me yet."

"It's a relief [to be finished] because it was a long four years," said graduate Matthew Patrick. "I'll miss the friendships made along the way, but it's a good feeling."



They include giving a yearly scholarship to Northern Virginia Community College. “It goes to a deserving student majoring in horticulture,” said club President Ellen Rosenberger. “And we always decorate a home on the Clifton Homes Tour.”

She’s a 15-year member and recalled when the club went to the White House every year to see its Christmas decorations. “It was a wonderful treat, and we’d have lunch in [Washington], D.C.,” said Rosenberger. “Now we meet once a month in each others’ homes for a luncheon and guest speaker.”

She said they come to Cabell’s Mill for workshops. “For example, a member will teach us to do holiday arrangements,” said Rosenberger. “We also take a field trip in the spring to a historic garden; this year, we’ve been to Oatlands, Hillwood and Tudor Place.” She’s also made nice friendships and learned from others’ expertise. “We all love flowers and good food, and that’s what we’re all about,” said Rosenberger.

Elaine Koehne of Clifton has been a member almost 20 years. “I’m a flower junkie,” she said. “The flowers were the draw, but the people are just wonderful — they’re real treasures. It’s wonderful to celebrate the 60th anniversary and it’s delightful that Mildred is here to share it with us. She’s a hoot.”

Little Rocky Run’s Vicki Cristiani has only belonged for two years, but has known many of the members for more than two decades. “I have so much admiration and respect for their knowledge, motivation and enthusiasm for gardening,” she said. “They’ve inspired me and I’ve somewhat become a gardener now, and I love it. I particularly like dried arrangements. And at our flower show, each May at Cabell’s Mill, when you’ve just joined and win a blue ribbon, it’s a big deal.”

DeBell is delighted that the club has lasted and flourished so long. “We get new ladies in, every year,” she said. “You get to have a nice, social life and enjoy flower arranging — and when you get to be over 90, you appreciate it so much.”

She said it was mainly a Centreville club when it began, plus some members from Fairfax and Manassas. Now, though, most of the members are from Clifton. “Most of the original members’ Centreville homes — and some of the later members’ homes, too — are gone because of development,” said DeBell. “But I have so many memories of so many special people. I like the old friends I know here, as well as the new ones. It’s just been a joy to be a part of and look forward to, every month.”

Judge Sentences Fairfax Station Man to Jail Plus Restitution

A 21-year-old Fairfax Station man was sentenced to three months in jail, plus restitution, in connection with a burglary last fall in Fairfax. He is Ahmad S. Abbasi, 21, of the 9400 block of Larkdale Terrace.

Fairfax County Police Det. S.M. Augustine, of the Fair Oaks District Station, explained the case against him in a Nov. 12, 2009 affidavit for a warrant to search his home. He wrote that, on Oct. 19, a burglary occurred in the 10800 block of Verde Vista Drive, and the stolen items included a laptop computer, Mossberg shotgun and Remington 700 rifle.

Then on Oct. 28, the victim found an ad on Craigslist advertising a laptop he believed was his stolen computer. He contacted the seller and obtained that person's phone number. When he entered that number into his cell phone, the name, Mex, came up. He'd stored the number, a few weeks earlier, when Mex was at his home during a party.

The next day, Oct. 29, undercover detectives arranged to meet Mex to purchase the computer. Mex received \$625, and the computer — confirmed via serial numbers to be the one stolen during the burglary — was received in exchange.

On Nov. 2, another ad posted on Craigslist advertised an X-Box 360 gaming system, and the phone number listed with it was the same number belonging to Mex. Again, undercover detectives arranged to buy it and met with Mex on Nov. 4. They watched him go inside his Fairfax Station home to retrieve the gaming system, and he confirmed that he lived there with his parents.

However, wrote Augustine, "The name, Ahmad Abbasi, was originally provided by the victim as the likely suspect [in the burglary]. A photograph of Abbasi was viewed by both detectives who'd made contact with Mex [during] the two transactions, and both confirmed that Mex was [actually] Abbasi."

Police executed the search warrant Nov. 13 and items seized included a Mossberg shotgun and a Remington 700 rifle — both with serial numbers matching the ones that had been stolen in Fairfax. Abbasi was arrested the same day and charged with breaking and entering, firearm larceny and possession of stolen property with intent to sell.

Following his guilty plea to all three offenses, March 16 in Circuit Court, he returned June 4 for sentencing. At that time, Judge Brett Kassabian sentenced him to a total of five years in prison for all three crimes, with four years, nine months suspended. Kassabian also placed Abbasi on three years supervised probation and ordered him to pay \$825 restitution to the victim.

Support Chesapeake Bay Clean Water Act

Senators Webb and Warner should step up to support water quality.

The Chesapeake Clean Water Act, which will guide the protection and restoration of not just the Chesapeake Bay but the Potomac River and local streams in Northern Virginia, is expected to receive committee vote in the U.S. Senate in late June.

Our streams and the Potomac are the source of our drinking water. We canoe, fish, and swim in these waters and hike along side them. They also provide sustenance and a home for a myriad number of other creatures. They are the source of the waters of the Chesapeake.

By setting fair and equitable requirements throughout the Chesapeake Bay region for clean water in all streams, this bill will require both farmers and those living in towns and cities to do their fair share for clean water.

For decades, we have witnessed the degra-

ation of our local streams by polluted runoff. When rain from storms falls onto concrete roads, parking lots, and suburban yards, it picks up pollution. This runoff carries fertilizer, pesticides and other nasty pollutants after each and every storm into our local water. While stormwater management has controlled some of the runoff in recent years, it has not kept pace with the growing impacts of development.

Fairfax, along with the City of Alexandria have conducted careful studies of their streams and spent significant money and effort to implement stream restoration and protection programs.

But it has not been enough to stem the tide of degradation.

Our communities have spent money and time to improve their streams. The counties of Arlington and

too little affordable land in the area along Interstate 66. So they want to take the Clifton renovation money to build in cheaper areas and redistribute the students away from the congested areas.

To make this work, they must do a larger "boundary study" that affects everyone in the county. Thus children who live beyond the Interstate 66 corridor will get shifted to the next school further out to make room for students pushing out (domino style) from Clifton and the Interstate 66 corridor. This will have a terrible impact on our children as they get "redistributed" away from their friends and familiar surroundings. This is a short-sighted solution that does not solve the real problem.

Instead of busing children further and further from their homes, they should renovate Clifton and build more capacity where they need it. We all make careful decisions on where to live, and for those of us with school age children, housing decisions are driven by the schools our children will attend. For those without children, this is sure to affect the desirability of neighborhoods and property values as well. If the School Board follows this path, it will be because they have not properly planned and they are now looking for cheap and easy solutions. Such short-sighted decisions will up-end our lives and wreck havoc on the citizens of Fairfax County for many years to come.

Instead of closing Clifton and causing turmoil across the county they need to find the courage to make smart long-term decisions that address the real problems we face.

Patriot Rivals Act as Pass-Catch Combo

Woodson's Reilly, Lake Braddock's Johnson connect for pair of touchdowns.

Every athlete competing in the 2010 Region Rumble All-Star Football Game on Saturday, June 19 at South County Secondary School had a chance to prove his abilities. But as the battle between the Northern and Northwest Regions went into overtime, Lake Braddock wide receiver said enough is enough.

"Me and [Hayfield's] Antoine [McCallum] had been splitting time the whole game and I was getting a little bitter about it," Johnson said. "I told them, 'Look, put me in in overtime, let me run the corner [route] and I'm going to score.'"

The Northern Region coaching staff — Johnson's coaches from Lake Braddock — listened to the all-state wideout and let him run to the corner. The result: a 10-yard strike from quarterback Connor Reilly (Woodson) and the game-winning touchdown. After the Northwest Region kicked a field goal on the opening possession of the first overtime period, Reilly, on first down, found a diving Johnson for a 20-17 victory.

Reilly and Johnson were Patriot District opponents during the season, with Woodson

and Lake Braddock splitting their two meetings. But on this night, the two formed a pass-and-catch combo that produced a pair of touchdowns — the second leading to a celebratory Northern Region dogpile near the corner of the end zone.

"We were big rivals during the season," Johnson said, "but going into the overtime, first down, I told him, 'I'm going to get them

on this corner [route] because that was my money all season long.' ... He threw a great pass and I just came down with it."

Reilly earned team offensive MVP honors, completing 21 of 43 passes for 231 yards and three touchdowns. The Temple University-bound signal caller said he knew immediately his throw to the corner was a game-winner.

"As soon as the safety turned his back," Reilly said, "it was wide open."

Johnson caught three passes for 35 yards

and two touchdowns. His first score — a 15-yard reception — gave the North a 14-6 lead with 11:53 remaining in the fourth quarter.

Lake Braddock also had two starters on the offensive line — Penn State-bound tackle Khamrone Kolb and guard Jack Phillips. Bruins defensive lineman Keli Doe and receiver/defensive back Ali Banihashemi also saw playing time for the Northern Region and all-state defensive back Thomas Strickford and receiver Peres Nubong were also on the roster.

Lake Braddock and Northern Region head coach Jim Poythress said it felt good to see one of his Bruins score the game-winning touchdown, adding a good-natured jab, as well.

"Those guys need to graduate," Poythress said. "My kids need to graduate. I've seen enough of them. They're all good boys but they need to graduate."

West Springfield's T.J. O'Connell caught seven passes for 85 yards. West Springfield linemen Maurice McKinney, Henry Dodge and James Lee, and receiver Daniel Collins were also on the roster.

Woodson linebackers Josh Hogan, an all-state selection, and James Johnson saw playing time for the Northern Region. Cavalier defensive backs Colin Dempsey and Charles Basil and running back/linebacker

A Workman's Effort for Rams

Longtime Robinson track and field, cross country coach steps down.

For several years, Jeremy Workman had been considering stepping down as head coach of the Robinson Secondary School track and field/cross country programs in order to spend more quality time with his family. Now, following the conclusion of the recent outdoor spring season, the popular coach has made it official that he is relinquishing his coaching duties.

"I've been thinking about it for a number of years and was putting it off," said Workman, a 1987 Chantilly High graduate who has been a head coach at Robinson since 1995. "I've got kids ages 7 and 2. With the nature of being a cross country and track and field coach, I couldn't juggle everything. I have excellent assistant coaches. I thought it was time I could step down and let other people take over."

Workman will continue his duties as a physical education teacher at Robinson. The school's new cross country head coach will be 1999 Robinson graduate Kim Coffield, an assistant coach on Workman's staff in recent years and a former runner at Virginia Tech. The school is still in the process of selecting a new indoor/outdoor season head track and field coach, according to Robinson director of student activities Marty Riddle.

Workman, as a high school runner at Chantilly during the mid 1980s, competed in such events as the 400 and 200-meters. His head coaches while with the Chargers were Glenn Bayless and Ken Kincade. Workman was part of a Chantilly boys' outdoor team that finished second, behind champion Stuart, in the old Potomac District in 1986. He was named boys' team MVP as a senior. Workman ultimately went on to run at Virginia Tech (Class of 1992) where he concentrated on the 400 and 800 running events.

He became Robinson's girls' and boys' cross country head coach in 1995 and, during his time at the helm of those programs, led the Rams to seven district titles combined, two region crowns and two state championships, with the boys winning states in 1999 and the girls in 2001. On the track and field side, he served as an assistant beginning in 1995 before becoming head coach in 1999. Most recently, he led the Robinson boys' team to district and region outdoor titles in 2006.

Workman's love for his athletes and coaching was superseded in recent years by the concern he felt in spending so much time throughout the school year away from his family. Along with his regular school day of teaching, he spent afternoons and evenings involved with his teams' practices and competitions. Saturdays were often spent at day-long meets.

"All coaching, particularly in track and field, it's too much," he said. "When I came home my son was going to bed."

Workman and his family — wife Cindy, son Jacob, 7, and daughter Chloe, 2 — reside in the Fair Lakes area of Fairfax.

said Workman. "I want to spend some time working with him at a critical age and I couldn't do that. I don't want to have regrets. They are only seven and two once. I don't want to look back when they're 16, 17, 18, and say, 'I wish I was with them a little more when they were younger.'"

He said that the day might come when he returns to coaching.

"The door will always be open to coach, and I can do it later [in life]," he said. "I'm still going to follow [the program] and be around to help the new coaches if they need it. I've had great support at Robinson from the administration and the parents as well."

Workman's strength as a head coach, besides his technical knowledge and passion for running and track and field, has been his ability to relate with people, his own athletes, members of his coaching staff, as well as rival school personnel and the Robinson community in general.

"In any organization that's run well, a lot of times it comes down to the relationships," said Riddle. "Jeremy did an excellent job there, whether it was with his coaches or the athletes. He's able to bring out the best in people. [His stepping

ping down] is a big loss for us, but I'm happy for Jeremy."

Workman had a fervent desire to see his athletes get the most out of their athletic experience at Robinson.

"He just cares so much for the kids," said Coffield, a former member of Workman's Robinson teams and, for the past four years, a part of his coaching staff. "He has put in countless hours. The kids love him. His demeanor in some ways is reserved but the kids respect him. We'll miss him."

Coffield, following college at Tech, served as an assistant track coach at Christiansburg High School outside of Blacksburg. When she had the opportunity to join Workman's coaching staff at Robinson, she jumped at it.

"I was really excited about coming back and working for coach Workman, and having the opportunity to learn from him," she said. "I was so impressed with the way he handled practices every day."

Kelley Devlin, a former Robinson assistant coach under Workman who currently is part of the coaching staff at Centreville High School, said Workman's enthusiasm for track and field is infectious.

"He has had such a successful program at Robinson because he is so well-liked, respected and admired by so many athletes at Robinson," said Devlin. "Hun

tion to improving local schools." The idea for the congress, Livadas said, arose in March 2009 to coordinate mothers from around the country who are involved in education advocacy and leverage their knowledge and talents to create the "Lesson Plan for Change," a template for other moms to instigate positive change in local schools. After a year of planning, Parenting Magazine announced a call for entries.

MORIN, WHO works as a senior staff aide for Supervisor Gerry Hyland (D-Mount Vernon), is the education committee chairman for the South County Federation and serves as chairman for the South County Middle School Solutions Group, was originally selected in mid-April. Kelly Holdcraft, the director of the Paralegal Studies program at Georgetown and Lorton resident, knew about the congress and was also aware of Morin's work with the solutions group. So she phoned Morin's good friend, Judy Herbert to obtain more information. Herbert gave a glowing recommendation and Holdcraft in turn nominated Morin for the congress. Two weeks later, Parenting Magazine notified Morin of her selection.

"Kelly wanted my insight on Christine," Herbert said. "She rallied this community

and was able to get things done that wouldn't have gotten done otherwise. I cannot think of anyone more deserving than her. This was just a pat on the back for all of her efforts."

Morin arrived in Washington, D.C. for the congress Sunday, May 2, and stayed, all-expenses paid, in a hotel until the last day of the event, Tuesday, May 4. The first night, she said, was spent at an orientation reception where each of the mothers were given an information packet and were introduced to each other. Though the first day was slow and relaxing, Morin soon found out that she had more work than she could have imagined.

Morin said that the next day, she and the other participants were in lectures and discussion from 8:30 a.m. until 10:30 p.m. She said that leaders from the National Parent-Teacher Association, the National Education Association, PBS, the George Lucas Educational Foundation and others gave presentations that covered a myriad of topics ranging from food and nutrition in schools to

gaming and technology. U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan was the keynote speaker of the day, giving a speech on the importance of parent engagement in their children's education and talked about the things the Obama Administration is doing to improve it.

all pleased about what we came up with," Morin said. "I can't even describe the amount of energy in the room, but it was pretty cool."

ACCORDING TO Livadas, the ideas that the mothers came up with were all recorded by Parenting Magazine and will be used to create the "Lesson Plan for Change." The plan will run in the magazine's October issue, and when completed, will provide a step-by-step guide that will teach parents how to be educational advocates. In addition, Morin said that the magazine continues to facilitate discussion via e-mail and Facebook between the participants so that the fountain of ideas will not stop gushing.

Though the parents reading that issue will find a trove of new ideas to use, Morin said that she learned just as much from the other mothers as the readers will from her. She said that she will always remember the motivation for change that the other mothers had and will use it as inspiration to continue her quest to better the lives of schoolchildren throughout the Lorton area.

"Parenting Magazine provided a wonderful opportunity," Morin said. "We have parents that want to change things but don't know how, and everyone of the moms there found a way to get it done. That's the message I want to send."

day's activities, started work on the most challenging yet more important part of the congress, the lesson plan. Morin said that all of the participants were divided into six groups and were tasked with coming up with answers to three questions that asked about the best ways to organize parents, build and promote a coalition and use it to bring change. South County Secondary softball pitching ace Chelsey Dunham

Dunham Gatorade Player of the Year

Chelsey Dunham, the South County girls' senior softball pitcher, who led the Stallions to the Northern Region semi-finals this past spring, was notified on June 9 that she has been named the recipient of the 2010 Virginia Softball Gatorade Player of the Year award. Dunham, the 2010 Region Pitcher of the Year who recorded 1,007 strikeouts during her four varsity seasons at South County, will attend Yale University this fall where she will be a member of the Yale Bulldog softball team.

Gatorade, in collaboration with ESPN RISE, chose Dunham as its Virginia Player of the Year honor. She is the first Gatorade Virginia Softball Player of the Year to be chosen from South County Secondary School. The award recognizes not only outstanding athletic excellence, but also high standards of academic achievement and exemplary character demonstrated on and off the field. Dunham is now a finalist for the prestigious Gatorade National Softball Player of the Year award.

Dunham, a 5-foot-6 inch right-handed pitcher, led the Stallions to a 25-1 record this season and to the region semis. A two-time Northern Region Pitcher of the Year and a four-time Patriot District Pitcher of the Year, Dunham compiled a 0.19 earned run average in the pitching circle this spring, recording 314 strikeouts in 184 innings and issuing just 23 walks. She fired seven no-hitters, including a perfect game, and pitched 21 shutouts. At the plate, she batted .295 with 13 walks and 18 RBI.

Dunham has maintained a 4.30 GPA in the classroom. An active member of her church community, she has volunteered locally at a homeless shelter and food bank in addition to serving as a peer science and math tutor at South County.

"Chelsey Dunham is unflappable," said Suzy Willemsen, Dunham's head coach with the Glory Gold Amateur Athletics Union club program.

“Management wise, it was a little tough,” said Workman, with a laugh. “Only about a half of the [team members] would run at the meet, but the others were still a part of it and got something out of it.”

Workman also got a lot out of leading his student-athletes, but now he is ready to move on.

“Robinson is certainly a place I’ve enjoyed most and it was difficult walking away from the kids,” he said. “It hasn’t hit me yet. I don’t think it will until cross country season comes around. I feel I made the decision for the right reasons.”


