



## Assisting Victims' Pets

Sanctuary for pets eases domestic abuse victims' decisions.

When a mother and child living with domestic violence decided to seek shelter, concerns about the safety of their dog were expressed to Johanna Martinez, client services coordinator of the domestic violence program at Doorways for Women and Families, an Arlington nonprofit for victims of domestic violence and homelessness.

"If the woman is being abused, studies have found that pets are oftentimes also abused," said Martinez.

A joint project between Doorways and the American Humane Association (AHA) ensures that women who are fleeing violent situations also have a safe shelter for their pets. The Pets and Women's Shelters (PAWS) program was launched in May of 2009; it's the first of its kind in Northern Virginia and currently one of 49 nationwide.

"It's a tough decision to leave an abusive relationship. Women often will not leave their beloved pets behind in a violent home. Our pet shelter removes another barrier to women and children leaving a bad situation," said Linda Dunphy, Doorways executive director adding, "Now that pets also have a place to go, more women in our community will get the help they need for themselves and their families."

**THE PAWS PROGRAM** is the brainchild of Allie Phillips, vice-president of

## Saving Two Lives

Nonprofit connects veterans with pets.

Sergeant Raymond Crook was 18 years old when he enlisted in the military and went to Frankfurt, Germany to fight in the Cold War. Thirty-two years later, he finally received help for his recently diagnosed Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and mild depression. Crook's help does not consist of counseling or medication: instead, he found Meyers, a two-and-a-half-year-old Shepherd part Akita dog who has, he said, saved his life.

It started when Crook left his fatherless home and drug-infested D.C. neighborhood to join the army. He endured heavy cycles of training to prepare for active duty abroad, learning German, surviving below-zero temperatures, and undergoing "reverse cycle training — where soldiers sleep for two hours during the day and then work real hard at night."

Crook feels scarred by his experience as a young man. "The fear factor of the Cold War was tremendous. We were right at the border, and we didn't know if Russia and the United States were going to kick off any minute. If they did, we would be dead in two hours. There was no flying back to America, no swimming back home."

Crook describes the cause of his PTSD as "continuous cycles of training and fear, training and fear."

**CROOK MOVED** to Maryland to be closer to home and started a family. "But," he said, "I got sick, I didn't know it, and I didn't know I was suffering from depression and PTSD. Looking around, I saw civilians that didn't understand what was going on abroad. They didn't understand what I witnessed, and some looked at me like I was crazy."

He admitted to abusing alcohol often, because he couldn't face problems that had surfaced from the Cold War. "I really don't like drugs, but it just got worst and worst. When my mind started to move, I had a couple of beers. I depressed the depression."

Last August Crook came to the brink of

## Feeding a Need To Help Animals

Restaurants' owners support rescue work.

Ross Underwood wanted to open up a restaurant since he was in college. He met his partner, Pamela McAlwee, while working at a hotel. They opened Westover Gourmet Pizza Deli 26 years ago; now it's called Lost Dog Café. In May 2005, they opened the neighboring Stray Cat Café.

Because Underwood and McAlwee have a love for animals, they started rescuing dogs at the deli, but in 2001 they created

the Lost Dog and Cat Rescue Foundation (LDCRF), a non-profit organization. Lost Dog Ranch, located in Sumerduck, Va., houses dogs, cats, pigs, and goats. They are all sprayed and neutered prior to adoption. LDCRF places an average of 1,500 animals per year into permanent homes.

Some of the profit made by both cafés goes to foundation, "there's not a set amount," said Underwood. LDCRF also accepts donations, which directly goes to providing care for their rescued animals. The foundation has placed about 15,000 animals since 2001.

The ranch has seven full-time workers and three part-time workers. Both owners say that they are always in need of volunteers who are willing to foster, transport dogs and cats, or organize a fundraiser.

Underwood gives most of the credit to McAlwee for managing both the restaurant and the foundation. "Pam has 40 or so dogs living at her house, and a full-time employee to take care of them," Underwood said.

"What inspired me was that we always had a thing for homeless animals. We used



killing himself. However, "literally in the blink of an eye," he drove to the D.C./VA Hospital with a knife in his car and let loose all troubles.

"I thought, 'I'm gonna commit suicide right now if you guys don't help me,'" Crook said.

Crook attributes his problems — that many other soldiers encounter — to a divide between military and civilian worlds, as well as the military's underfunded debriefing process.

Crook has seen "thousands" of veterans who are traumatized by battle. That's when Dave Sharpe, the founder of the nonprofit Pets2Vets, stepped in. "The first time I saw Dave was at the D.C./VA Hospital, when he told a group of soldiers how animals can change their lives," said Crook.

**SHARPE SERVED** in Afghanistan and at one point had a gun pointed to his face. He suffered many uncontrollable outbursts due to his PTSD. During one, he hit a wall with rage and started crying. Then, he saw Cheyenne, which he found at a pit bull shelter shortly before going to Pakistan, wagging her tail and looking at him with her head turning left to right in the corner. This was Sharpe's epiphany:

"Cheyenne doesn't talk back to me. She loves me unconditionally. Having her is so peaceful, so harmonic, and now I can be calm and sociable in public. One time an 80-year old woman approached me when I was walking her, and soon I found myself talking about dogs and my military experience."

Sharpe founded Pets2Vets in October of 2009 with the hope of curing the psychological conditions that face veterans. "It's been a phenomenal ride," he said.

Pets2Vets operates out of a P.O. box in Arlington and is supplied by a "very loyal staff of volunteers and workers." In less than a year, the nonprofit has made 23 matches. Crook and Meyers were the fifth match.

Next fiscal year, Sharpe wants to expand Pets2Vets to New York City, San Antonio, and San Diego: places with large veteran populations and high kill shelters. Another goal is to make 300 matches and 200

"connections" or pet visits to hospitals.

**SINCE DECEMBER** 2009, when Meyers was adopted from a small shelter in Tennessee, Sharpe and Crook have become close friends. Both experienced severe mental setbacks and overcame them by adopting dogs. Both find spiritual company in their pets and praise their nonjudgmental, loving nature.

"Meyers is heaven-sent," Crook said. "He is always happy to see me, no matter what. I can leave the house, come back an hour later, and that smile is still on her face."

Sharpe endured brutal nightmares and shunned family and friends after Afghanistan. "It's incredibly important to be aware of the challenges facing soldiers leaving active duty," he said. The need for better veteran treatment is crucial, especially with suicide attempts increasing sixfold in the Army, according to the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.

Meanwhile, the nonprofit works to save lives, two at a time. "The scope of this is astronomical. There's no measure you can put on the bond between man and dog," Crook said, who left the Army for the private sector and has introduced Meyers to his grandchildren.






human-animal strategic initiatives at AHA. The Alexandria resident and former prosecutor who worked with domestic violence cases saw a grave need. "Up to 48 percent of women delay leaving an abusive home because of concerns about their pets," Phillips said.

According to a national 1997 study cited by Martinez, up to 85 percent of women entering domestic violence shelters reported that a partner had threatened, injured or killed the family's pet animal. Said Martinez, "The abusive partner can use pets to intimidate and control the person being abused."

It is estimated that one in three women will be victims of domestic violence at some point during her lifetime. With 71 million U.S. households having companion animals as pets, there's an urgent need for pet shelters. A study of intentional animal abuse found that 13 percent of cases, involved incidents of domestic violence.

Martinez explained that when the agency receives a call for help,

they conduct an eligibility assessment on the client and a separate assessment on the pet. "The pet has to be domesticated and in good health and exhibit a friendly demeanor towards people," she said. For reasons of confidentiality, Martinez cannot identify clients but said the presence of the family's pet was a significant factor in the healing process. "When the dog was able to join them, you could see a change in the child, being more calm."

Being with a beloved pet, according to Martinez can help to normalize a difficult situation. "When you go through so many traumatic things, just being able to hold the pet and stroke its fur ... holding this living thing provides comfort, especially when you're in a completely different environment," she said adding, "domestic violence impacts everyone, including pets."

Phillips worked closely with Doorways to implement the program. Using much of the information from the Doorways pilot, Phillips has produced a manual,

"The PAWS Program Startup Guide" which gives methods and advice to start a pet shelter.

"With AHA's funding and model, we were able to get this important program off the ground. This innovative effort will save lives — women, children and pets," said Dunphy.

# Dogs, Cats Waiting for Adoption

Looking to adopt a pet? Three animal shelters — all within 10 miles of one another — care for cats, dogs, and other species.

The **Homeward Trails** shelter (822 North Kenmore St./703-908-PETS).

The **Animal Welfare League of Arlington** (2650 South Arlington Mill Dr., 703-931-9241) took in 2,553 animals last year: 54 percent cats, 30 percent dogs, and 16 percent small companion pets. Of these, 56 percent of cats, 41 percent of dogs, and 32 percent of small companions were adopted. The average adoption fee is \$72, with the most expensive animals being large parakeets and parrots (\$150)

and the least expensive being hamsters, mice, gerbils, and pet rats (\$10).

“One of our goals is to be recognized as a progressive leader in animal sheltering with the highest standards in companion animal care,” said league representative Susan Sherman.

## Animal Protection: No Place for Partisanship

**W**hile partisanship is red hot on Capitol Hill, four animal protection measures have the potential to elicit bipartisan consensus.

Last week, the House of Representatives voted to outlaw the sale and distribution of graphic videos depicting the murder or abuse of animals by an overwhelming margin, passing the "Prevention of Interstate Commerce in Crush Videos Act" 416 to 3. While these videos show case behavior that would be considered animal cruelty under most state and federal laws, it is nearly impossible to prove who produces the videos, making a ban on their sale through interstate commerce a critical tool for prosecutors. The need for this legislation stemmed from a recent Supreme Court decision, *Stevens vs. US*, which struck down a decade-old law that banned the videos on the grounds that its broad scope could unduly restrict free speech. Following the Stevens ruling, the Animal Protection Caucus, which I chair with Rep. Elton Gallegly (R-CA) (comprised of 67 Democrats and 21 Republicans) quickly mobilized support for a narrower bill, focused solely on prohibiting the sale of crush videos. Members of the House Judiciary Committee from both parties worked together to refine the legislation to ensure it addressed the constitutional concerns raised by the Court.

Of particular concern was the impact the bill could have on legitimate hunting and fishing videos, so explicit language was added to exempt those materials. The final product is one that I believe will both stop the proliferation of crush videos and withstand further consti-

tutional scrutiny.

**THERE ARE MANY** bills currently pending before Congress that attempt to take a similarly measured, bipartisan approach to animal protection issues. Three pieces of legislation — including one up for consideration on the House floor this week — are especially deserving of broad, bipartisan support.

Today, it is easy to buy a product — let's say, a pair of fur-lined winter gloves — under the assumption that the fur is not real because the price is low and there is no tag or label stating otherwise. Unfortunately, due to a loophole in current law, the fur that decorates your winter gloves could be a real animal pelt. What's worse, there's a good chance it could be that of a dog or cat, especially if imported from China.

The Truth in Fur Labeling Act (H.R. 2480), legislation which I authored, would close the loophole in current law that allows products made with fur that are less than \$150 in value to forego labeling requirements. If passed, this common sense measure would give Americans with allergies or ethical objections to fur the information they need to make an educated purchasing decision. The Truth in Fur Labeling Act, which has 170 bipartisan cosponsors, was unanimously reported out of the Energy and Commerce Committee earlier this month after being amended to address legitimate concerns about the unintended impact on hunters and trappers who sell small quantities of homemade products. I expect the bill to pass the full House this week.

The Prevention of Farm Animal Cruelty Act (H.R. 4733) is another measured attempt to address animal welfare. The bill would require agricultural producers that supply food to the federal government to give egg-laying hens,

breeding pigs, and veal calves enough room in their cages to turn around and stretch their legs. Polls indicate that this basic level of humane treatment for farm animals is supported by an overwhelming majority of Americans, and many food retailers and fast food companies are already demanding this level of care from their suppliers. Supported by lawmakers on both sides of the aisle, this bill is yet another example of how targeted legislation can help put an end to some of the most egregious forms of animal suffering.

**A THIRD ISSUE** that warrants immediate action involves puppy mills. The Puppy Uniform Protection Statute or "PUPS" (H.R. 5434) would stop thousands of large, commercial breeders who have made big bucks selling puppies over the Internet without needing to obtain the appropriate licensing and abide by the animal welfare standards that govern traditional breeders. Due to improper care and over crowded conditions, these puppies are often sick, leaving unsuspecting consumers with ill, sometimes dying puppies that require expensive veterinarian visits just to have a slim chance at survival. Meanwhile, the breeding dogs at these facilities often spend their entire lives in constant confinement and deprivation. If enacted, the PUPS Act would eliminate this exception in the Animal Welfare Act and end the illicit internet puppy trade in the United States.

As demonstrated by the passage of the animal crush video bill, it is clear that members of Congress from both sides of the aisle reject senseless violence towards animals. But there is also a number of other animal protection issues in which bipartisan consensus is possible. We need these commonsense measures enacted to ensure the humane treatment of our companion animals and other sensate beings.







# Lightning Strikes Twice at WGCC

**O**n July 13, the Washington Golf and Country Club Lightning Bolts hosted Division-A rivals Kenwood at home. In what promised to be the most exciting dual-meet of the season, the Lightning Bolts planned to show Kenwood that their domination of the Country Club Swimming and Diving Association last season was no fluke. WGCC did not disappoint.

Many thought the showdown would be a close one — but WGCC's prowess in the water proved to be too much for Kenwood. After event No. 30 (out of 50 events), the Lightning Bolts had a comfortable lead of 173.5 to 120.5. Then, lightning struck — literally. After a lengthy delay, the storm hung overhead and the meet was finally called.

One of the highlights of this meet was the acknowledgement of WGCC's graduating seniors. The team honored six of its long-time (and much-beloved and respected) swimmers, all of whom graduated from high school in the spring and will head away to college in the fall. These seniors (and the schools they'll be attending in the fall) are: Hope Barrazotto (James Madison University), Ariel Cohen (William and Mary); Blake McKelvey (Sewanee), Matty Prominski (University of South Carolina); Olivia Shipley (Virginia Tech), and Drew Wallace (University of Alabama).

Then, on July 20, WGCC, the 2009 CCSDA defending champions, took one step closer to repeating this feat as they won the Division-A Championships at home. With a score of 357.5, the Lightning Bolts defeated their Division-A rivals Kenwood (339.5), Congressional (246), Edgemoor (144), and Columbia (133). WGCC showed its depth and power across the board, leading after each stroke was completed.

Ryan Baker continued his dominance this season with wins in the boys 12U 100-meter IM, 50-meter backstroke, and 50-meter butterfly. Baker has won three individual events (the most a swimmer can enter) in every meet this season — and he's broken a few records along the way.

Other winners were Drew Wallace (boys 18U 50-meter free); Jillian Johnson (girls 8U 25-meter backstroke); Richard Gentry (boys 10U 25-meter backstroke); Grayson Offutt (girls 10U 25-meter breaststroke); Duncan Green (Boys 10U 25-meter breaststroke); George Cranwell (boys 12U 50-meter breaststroke); Shipley (girls 18U 50-meter breaststroke); Carson Wood (boys 10U 25-meter butterfly); and Amanda Didawick (Girls 18U 50-meter butterfly).

The boys relay teams dominated the competition: The boys 18U medley relay team (Gentry, Cranwell, Daniel O'Berry, and Mike Poppalardo) and the boys 14U medley relay team (Baker, Green, Will McMahon, and Angus Ricks) both won their events. The boys also won the 18U 200-meter Freestyle

The Lightning Bolts travel to Congressional this week for their final meet — the two-day CCSDA Championships. The league was formed in 1952 and, prior to last year, WGCC had won the swim championship only once — in 1956. Perennial powerhouse Kenwood has won 41 times. The Lightning Bolts hope to serve notice that a new dynasty has taken hold.

## Overlee Falls to Chesterbrook in Division 1 Showdown

The Overlee Flying Fish traveled to Chesterbrook for the season-ending matchup of undefeated teams with the Division 1 NVSL title on the line. The Flying Fish were on a mission to claim their 26th consecutive dual meet victory, their fifth consecutive Division 1 title, and their 27th Division 1 title overall. Overlee knew coming in that the Tiger Sharks had the times to win and the Flying Fish would need their best times of the summer to overtake them. The Overlee swimmers delivered with 74 percent best times for the summer in the individual events. Chesterbrook responded with many best times of its own and repelled the Overlee challenge. The Tiger Sharks won the meet by a final score of 217.5-184.5 to break the Overlee win streak and secure their first Division 1 title since 2004 and their sixth overall.

Both teams brought their "A-games" to the pool. In the 38 individual events, an incredible 34 percent of the times were in the top 25 for the summer for the entire NVSL. There were a few cases where a top 25 time was not fast enough to score a point in this meet. The meet was full of fast races and close finishes. Some races were decided by a hundredth of a second. Team records fell — four for Overlee and three for Chesterbrook. In the end, Chesterbrook

took more event victories (22-16) and more second-place finishes (20-18) to go into the relays with a 187.5-154.5 advantage. A split in the relays led to the final score.

The meet started close in the freestyle events with the lead changing hands. The 15-18 girls delivered the only Overlee sweep of the meet in the final freestyle event to put Overlee in front 49-41. Chesterbrook responded with a sweep in the 8U boys back and added their second and final sweep in the 15-18 boys back to win the backstroke events by a 57.5-32.5 score and take a 98.5-81.5 lead. The Flying Fish fared better in the breaststroke and butterfly events, but were still outscored 49-41 in the breast and 40-32 in the fly.

Overlee was led by the 15-18 girls, who recorded the only sweep and scored 38 of the 41 available points. The 11-12 girls followed with 27 of 41 points to outscore their Tiger Shark rivals. The 11-12 boys were the only other age group to outscore Chesterbrook as they took 23 of 41 points. Overlee had five double winners: Ryan Baker (11-12 boys free and fly), Suzanne Dolan (11-12 girls free and fly), Michaela Morrison (11-12 girls back and breast), Rachel Robertson (13-14 girls back and breast), and Kaitlin Wolla (15-18 girls free and fly). The six single event winners for Overlee included Brady Almand (11-12 boys breast), Katie Bennett (15-18 girls back), Emma Day (9-10 girls free), Jonathan Day (9-10 boys back), Abigail Ortmyer (15-18 girls breast), and Nick Pasternak (9-10 boys free). Overlee swimmers set four new team records. In three cases, the current record holder lowered their own record time set earlier this summer. Ryan Baker lowered his 11-12 boys 50 fly record from 31.46-31.26. Nick Pasternak dropped his 9-10 boys 50 free record time from 32.43-31.85. Wolla improved her record time the 15-18 girls 50 fly from 29.83 to 29.82 seconds. The new record holder is Suzanne Dolan, who swam a 32.11 in the 11-12 girls 50 fly to break the record time of 32.16 set by Caitlin Ham in 2000.

## Overlee Finishes Second at 2010 NVSL All-Star Relay

The 2010 NVSL All-Star Relay Carnival was held on July 21 at Hayfield Farm. It was hot and humid and the swimming was fast with seven new Relay Carnival records set. The Overlee Flying Fish, along with Chesterbrook, qualified a league-high 21 relays for the meet. Overlee exceeded its point total from 2009 by scoring 594 points (the Fish scored 586 points in 2009 while finishing first), but Chesterbrook used a total of four event victories and 15 top-five finishes to two event victories and 11 top-five finishes for Overlee to claim the 2010 title with 660 points. The rest of the top 10 in the team scoring included Tuckahoe (412), Fairfax Station (312), Lee-Graham (306), Mosby Woods (304), McLean (288), Highlands Swim (282), Donaldson Run (277) and Oakton (272).

The 11-12 girls led Overlee as they won both of their relays. The 100 medley relay consisted of Suzanne Dolan, Michaela Morrison, Katherine Lundy, and Beth Gentsch. The winning 100 free relay team included Dolan, Gentsch, Morrison, and Anna Polise. The 9-10 boys posted two second-place finishes to be the second highest scoring group. They also provided the only new team record at the meet when Nick Pasternak, Jonathan Day, John Aldinger, and John Thomas Dolan swam a 1:01.16 in the 100 free relay to break their own record of 1:01.93 set last week at the Division Relay Carnival. The 15-18 girls (Katie Bennett, Abigail Ortmyer, Kaitlin Wolla, Olivia Shipley, and Molly Merkel) added a second- and third-place finish in their relays to be the third-highest scoring group for Overlee. The boys mixed age 200 free relay team of Ryan Baker, Pasternak, Andrew Loranger, and Torey Ortmyer also posted a second-place finish. When scoring is separated by gender, The Overlee girls were the top scoring team in the NVSL with 352 points. They were followed by Tuckahoe (328) and Chesterbrook and Mosby Woods tied for third (254). The Overlee boys were the third-highest scoring team on the boys' side with 242 points, outdistanced only by Chesterbrook (406) and McLean (258).
