Elected Officials Rally To Save Pavilions

National Park Service to "start all over again."

Fort Hunt Park's picnic pavilions may not be doomed after all now that the National Park Service has stated it's heeding a public outcry to save them.

"I believe," said U.S. Rep. Gerry Connolly on Monday, "that the National Park Service has expressed a willingness to start all over again. It's very clear that the community doesn't support tearing down the pavilions. I'm hope-

ful this time the National Park Service will get it right and respect the wishes of the community and local elected officials."

The furor began at a public meeting Sept. 21 held at Fort Hunt Park when officials of the National Park Service proposed tearing down four of the park's five picnic pavilions and building a visitors center focused on the park's history, particularly its use in World War II as an interrogation center for Axis POWs. Attending residents were appalled.

The Politics of Revitalization

Frederick hopes to make Route 1 a wedge issue against Puller.

Candidates have been talking about revitalizing the Route 1 corridor for a generation, and yet little seems to have been accomplished. The road seems more gridlocked now than it's ever been, and supporters for mixed-use development were crushed when a new Wal-Mart was constructed at King's Crossing. Now, as the November election approaches, revitalization may be emerging as a wedge issue in one of the hottest campaigns in Northern Virginia.

Republican challenger Jeff Frederick is hoping to make the

lack of progress along the corridor a wedge issue, blaming state Sen. Toddy Puller (D-36) for the lack of action. In an interview this week, Puller shot back that Frederick is an ineffective leader who doesn't understand the pro-

Exploring Belle View Arts And Craft Fair



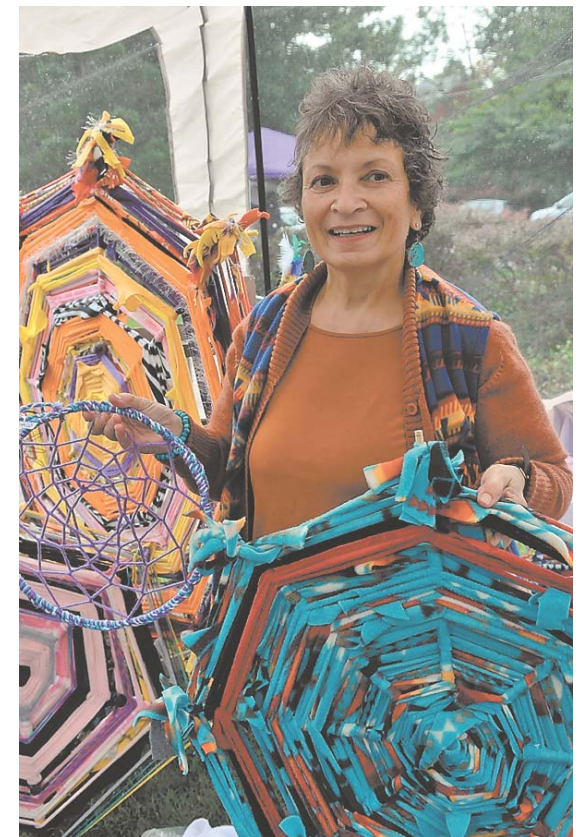

Park Planning Starts Over

Del. Scott Surovell raised an alarm, notifying Connolly, U.S. Rep. Jim Moran, and U.S. Senators Jim Webb and Mark Warner.

Wrote Surovell on his "Dixie Pig" Blog: "I oppose the demolition of the picnic pavilions. Fort Hunt Park is a valued community asset used by thousands of my constituents."

Contacted Oct. 4, Jon James, assistant superintendent at the NPS, said, "What we're going to do is go back and come up with a couple more alternatives that are more balanced in terms of the pavilions." He noted that the deadline for public comments has been extended 30 days to Nov. 6, and that another public meeting will be held, most likely in January.

In a Sept. 28 letter to the NPS, Connolly and Mount Vernon District Supervisor Gerry Hyland addressed the issue of preserving the pavilions while expressing support for the building of an interpretative trail and reducing the nonpermeable paving, which benefits the Chesapeake Bay. They also went beyond park issues to address problems with the Mount Vernon bike path, calling for its widening and eliminating sharp turns.

Surovell said he has so far collected 52 public comments on his blog, running "98 percent opposed to tearing down pavilions." He's going to forward them to the NPS, which has already received over 70 comments.

"I'm happy that the National Park Service has listened to our community," he said by phone Monday, "and I'm hopeful that a new proposal will reflect the input of the Mount Vernon community."

Also commenting, Moran said, "The Park Service should establish the historical center in a way that strives to add value to the park while minimizing loss of its current use."

Meanwhile, state Sen. Toddy Puller questioned the expense.

"I can't imagine the federal government paying money to do whatever they want to do in Fort Hunt Park when they don't have the money to do essential services," she said.

cess. In the end, voters will have the final say when they head to the polls this fall.

"People may care a lot about abortion or gay rights, but it's not necessarily something that many voters have to deal with on a day-to-day basis," said Kyle Kondik, political analyst with the Virginia Center for Politics. "An issue like Route 1, which is something voters have to deal with every day, could be the kind of thing that resonates with voters."

Frederick is certainly hoping that's the case, mentioning the issue on the campaign trail and including it as part of his message in direct mail to voters in the district. The basic outline of his attack on Puller is she has been ineffective during her time in office, a term that stretches back to her first election in 1999. Frederick says the time for studying the issue has long since passed and that voters in the district deserve action now.

"If you want 20 more years of studies, elect my opponent," Frederick said in an interview this week. "But if you want action, elect me."

WHEN ASKED about the issue, Puller said Frederick didn't understand the issue and that studies are a necessary part of securing funding for transportation improvements. She said she tried to introduce legislation to get a transit study four times before it finally passed the General Assembly, and that her success on the issue was a reason voters should send her back to Richmond. She dismissed Frederick's line of attack on Route 1 as a cynical and misinformed ploy for votes.

"The man served in the House of Delegates for six years and he never introduced any bills about Richmond Highway," said Puller. "Now he's trying to copy me?"

The issue is certainly on the minds of voters in the 36th Senate District, which stretches from Groveton into Prince William County. Things are only going to get more complicated along the Route 1 corridor with the relocation of thousands of new workers to Fort

Belvoir, adding additional strain to the corridor. Both candidates say the additional workers offer an opportunity jumpstart the revitalization process, although they differ on the length of time needed to study the issue.

Some say more studies are needed. "I don't believe that there has ever been a truly comprehensive study integrating transit and land use," said Stewart Schwartz, executive director for the Coalition for Smarter Growth. "We need a bipartisan state and local commitment to smart growth revitalization of Route 1 in Fairfax and Prince William counties."

AT THE HEART of the issue is money — funding for the millions of dollars that will be needed to pay for widening and transit lanes. Frederick says tax revenue from car insurance premiums could be set aside for transportation funding, creating a new stream of revenue that could be allocated based on the level of congestion. He would also support tax incentives for the corridor such a tax abatement program that would al-

low property owners to avoid paying property taxes on improvements for a certain period of time or eliminating the business and professional occupancy license taxes to attract new businesses to the corridor.

"Reagan cut taxes and revenues skyrocketed," said Frederick, who also pointed to tax cuts by John Kennedy and George W. Bush. "You can cut taxes and, in the end, create more revenue."

Puller blasted Frederick's plan to eliminate the BPOL tax as unworkable, describing the money as essential to the operating budget of Fairfax County. She said that she's worked for years to revitalize Route 1, and the transit study that's now being conducted is the final piece in the puzzle. Furthermore, she pointed to an analysis conducted by a business group known as Virginia Free that listed Frederick as one of the commonwealth's least effective legislators.

"He just doesn't understand what he's talking about," said Puller. "The BPOL tax is one of the major sources of revenue for Fairfax County, so we can't just do away with it and expect more money to come rolling in."

ROUTE 1 IMPROVEMENTS AT FORT BELVOIR FAIRFAX COUNTY

Meeting: Wednesday, October 19, 2011; 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM; South County Center, 8350 Richmond Highway, Alexandria, Virginia, in Room 221.

Purpose: The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), in cooperation with Fairfax County, the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), and the U.S. Army Garrison at Fort Belvoir, is continuing studies for improvements to U.S. Route 1 through Fort Belvoir. The limits of the studies are from Telegraph Road to Mount Vernon Memorial Highway. Among the components of the study are identification of transportation needs, analysis of alternatives to meet those needs, and analysis of the environmental consequences of those alternatives, all of which will be documented in an Environmental Assessment in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act and the National Historic Preservation Act. Public involvement and coordination with local, state, and federal agencies will be ongoing throughout the study. At this stage of the study, citizens will be updated on project activities to date and are invited to provide suggestions and comments on the range of alternatives that are being considered to address transportation needs in this section of the Route 1 corridor. This meeting is an opportunity for interested citizens to meet informally with study team members and discuss ideas, suggestions, and concerns. Informational displays and handouts will be available at the meeting, and there will be a brief presentation at 6:30 PM. Additional project information can be found on FHWA's website: <http://www.efhwa.dot.gov/projects/environment.aspx>. A summary of the public meeting will be posted on the site within two weeks following the meeting.

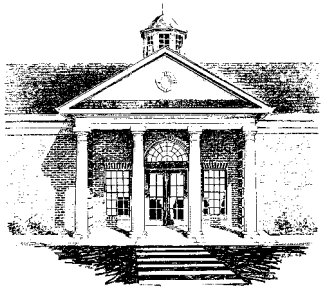

Northern Virginia Pays Again

Commonwealth reaps economic benefits of Dulles, National airports, forces costs on Northern Virginia residents.

Drivers in Northern Virginia are justifiably concerned about tolls. The cost of driving from Leesburg to Woodbridge on existing and proposed toll roads would run between \$30 and \$40 at some times of the day.

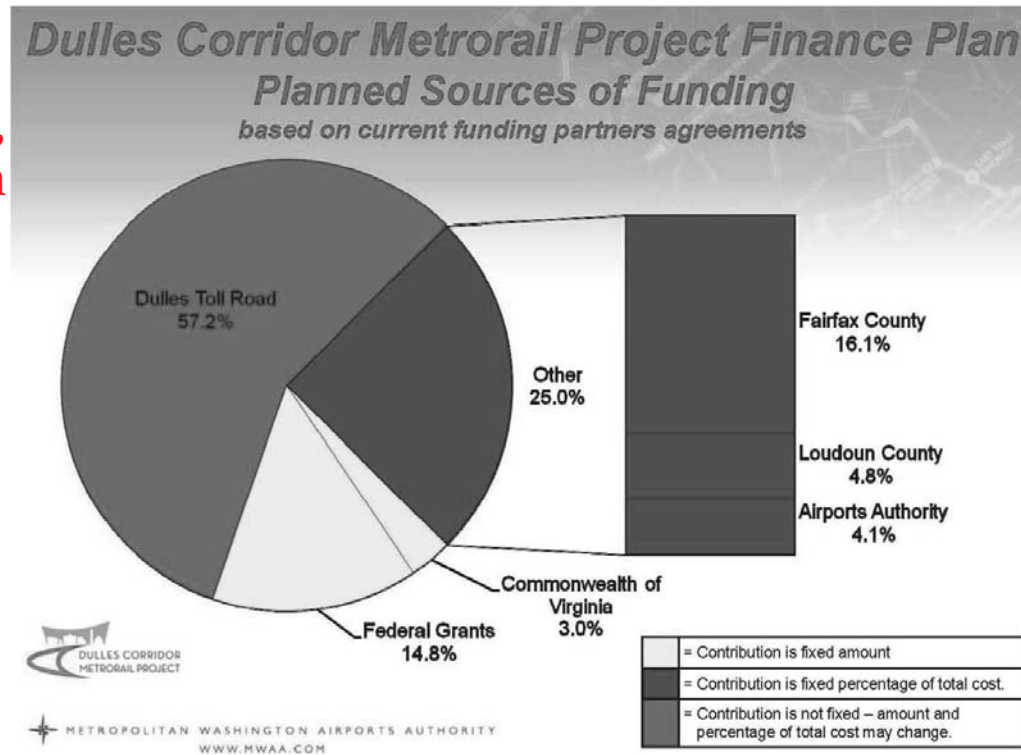
The Greenway in Loudoun leads to the Dulles Toll Road to Beltway HOT Lanes to Interstate 95 Corridor HOT Lanes. In each case, a driver would theoretically have an alternative, Route 7 along the Greenway and Dulles Toll Road, the regular lanes of Interstates 495 and 95.

But recent vitriol about tolls on the Dulles Toll Road is misplaced. This is one more example of the Commonwealth of Virginia feeding on revenues from the economic vitality of Northern Virginia, then forcing Northern Virginia residents to pay for the infrastructure of that economic activity out of local funds and personal pockets.

The Virginia Department of Aviation report in August attributes \$17.5 billion in annual economic activity in Virginia to Dulles International (IAD) and Ronald Reagan National airports, with Dulles providing the majority of that.

The Commonwealth collects most of the tax revenue that results from this activity, but pays only 3 percent of the \$6.2 billion cost of rail to Dulles. This will force more than 80 percent of the costs of building rail to Dulles to local drivers and property owners.

Having major airports adequately served by rail and other transportation options is more

than an amenity, it is part of sustaining the economic benefit that comes from major airports. The question is not whether we should be building rail to Dulles, but about who benefits and who pays.

So yes, it makes sense to pressure MWAA to proceed to make cost-effective decisions. Yes, it is maddening that tolls could climb to the point of pushing drivers off the Toll Road and onto Route 7.

But when you hear that the state wrapped up last fiscal year with a surplus, you can realize one more time that Northern Virginia residents are paying for the Commonwealth's prosperity coming and going. No relief is in sight. The state collects the income tax from the good jobs generated here in Northern Virginia by the airports, by the high tech firms, by the business innovators, by proximity to the Pentagon

and the federal government.

The current funding structure for rail to Dulles, based on a projected total project cost of \$6.2 billion, is:

- ♦ Fairfax County, Loudoun County and Airports Authority contribution, 25 percent (Fairfax County pays most of this, 16 percent)

- ♦ Federal contribution, 14.8 percent, based on a fixed grant for Phase 1 of \$900 million.

- ♦ The Commonwealth contribution, 3 percent, which is based upon a fixed contribution of \$275 million.

- ♦ Dulles Toll Road contribution, more than 57 percent, provides the remaining amount.

And drivers beware, HOT Lanes ahead.

tivities ranging from “field days” to Eagle Scout ceremonies. Other frequent users include family reunions/celebration; church and corporate groups; state societies; as well as class reunion and graduation groups (from kindergarten to college). As far as I know, picnickers have been for the most part respectful of the park’s rules and property. Picnic-facility users represent people of all ages and all socioeconomic backgrounds. By retaining this wonderful “diverse, peaceful-user” aspect of the park, it would be a great way to ensure that the park’s history and amenities are made available to the broadest possible audience. As such, the picnic facilities can be seen as a rather effective “loss leader” for the park — yes, it’s more work for the park service, but it brings in many people who may otherwise never know of its remarkable history and lovely setting. It should not be too difficult to combine some historic interpretation of the Indian settlement and POW activities with the existent picnic facilities — especially since there are currently no existing (remaining) structures from these time periods.

Finally, this park has become a democratizing, regional fixture. It represents for many people the one big, wide-open green space in which people can congregate joyfully, safely and rather freely. I would appeal to the NPS to please keep all of the park’s picnic facilities open and to please put up as many interpretative signs and information around these sites, as necessary, to inform all the people who attend various events there, of its unique and very interesting history. Ft. Hunt Park can become a benchmark for other National Park sites that feature a unique history — effectively combining the needs of the living with the great and important need to preserve and elucidate on what is significant and interesting from our past.

I am a weekly visitor and facility user at Ft Hunt Park. I support the development of passive interpretive displays and access to historic elements of the grounds. I support retention and renovation/upgrading to the public restroom facilities; preferably as they are currently located instead of one centralized facility. I support the presence of pets, namely dogs. I support the introduction of an off-leash dog area that is open for interaction and play, including mown lawn fields and woodlands.

I do not support the introduction of a small fenced-in sod-less enclosure for that purpose. I support retention of the newly constructed picnic pavilions, and the retention of open play fields that may be used for ball games, soccer, and any other form of field activity. I do not support the loss of any existing facilities in the interest of replacing them with an interpretive walk or pathway system.

I support the use of the existing wood frame residential house as a visitor center. I support the repair and maintenance of the existing woodland paths, without further expansion or disruption of the woodlands. I do not support the removal of existing roads or the interruption of the roadway loop as a shared use. I do not support the creation of a new perimeter pedestrian/bike path that would interfere with neighboring land uses, and thus promote conflicts between neighboring residents and park users. I support the park rangers being less aggressive in their patrolling of the park and their intimidation of dog owners. I do not support the development of the park as an outlet for park ranger interpretation activities and further advancing their police-like tactics.

I support the use of the park as a public national resource located within an established, historic residential community; one that does not need to become a national public attraction just because it is owned by the federal government. This is a community-oriented facility that should recognize its historic basis and should celebrate that legacy without harm to daily users who are not only its primary visitor/user group, but also its greatest protector, whether the park service wishes to acknowledge that fact or not. Any overpowering change to the park will result in a negative backlash from a surprisingly diverse user population that has been dedicated to the continuity of the park for many generations. This park should be enhanced for its current uses, and not become a theme park opportunity for bureaucratic national interests.

Therefore, I do not support any of the proposed Alternatives, and

Double Standard

To the Editor:

Martin Tillett's personal attack against me in his letter in last week's Gazette is merely an exhibition of his frustration at the lack of credibility of his personal observations leading to his non-scientific conclusion that the drainage ditch in Westgrove Park is a perennial stream. What is Tillett's evidence? His evidence consists of his periodic visits to a park across the street from Westgrove Park without regard to the County requirement (grounded in science) that such observations occur when drought maps published by the National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) say drought conditions don't exist. County records demonstrate that's exactly where County employees made their single observation that resulted in the perennial stream designation in the first place (although County employees at least consulted the drought maps prior to making their one observation). They never set foot in Westgrove Park. This is to be contrasted with the multiple observations required to remove the perennial stream designation. Quite a double standard.

Describing my comments as "propaganda" is truly inaccurate, particularly since my letters have been accompanied by photographic evidence and references to (1) the NOAA maps, (2) the exact

actions of County employees in designating the drainage ditch a perennial stream and (3) the exact County procedure for removing that designation. Facts are not propaganda. Tillett also alleges that his disagreement with me is "political." The truth is that Mr. Tillett is frustrated because he and his fellow anti-development zealots used to have the civic playing field to themselves. Now that other voices are being heard, imposing his extreme views on the community has become hard work.

The best evidence that the drainage ditch at Westgrove Park isn't a perennial stream accompanied Mary Tracy's letter in last week's Gazette. She provided a photo of ivy and other non-aquatic plants growing, in fact thriving, in the bed of the ditch. One need not have been a science teacher to know that such plant life can't exist in a perennial stream. The Virginia field indicators used to score possible perennial streams found at the following link give no score whatsoever for non-aquatic plants such as those found in the Westgrove Park drainage ditch. http://www.dcr.virginia.gov/stormwater_management/documents/Field_Datasheet_03.pdf Case closed.

'Eyeball' Evidence

To the Editor:

Streams feeding into Chesapeake Bay are protected by sound scientific and legal regimens to shield them from contamination. An extensive, science-based process defines which streams should be protected. A comprehensive legal framework ensures that development avoids these streams. But

an organized group of citizens demanding an interim use of an off leash dog area or OLDA wish to see this protection removed using only "eyeball" evidence. We should all be greatly concerned about this lack of parity and its potential consequences for the bay.

The Chesapeake Bay's value to our region is well known, but this precious jewel is in peril. The Menhaden fishery is near collapse. Oyster harvests are about 1 percent of historic levels. Aquatic grasses cover less than half their historic area. And dead zones with oxygen choked out of the water are now common in this once great ecosystem.

Twenty-five years ago, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency attributed the bay's decline primarily to contaminated suburban and agricultural runoff. This peril has not abated. Impervious surfaces in overdeveloped regions like Fairfax County rapidly shunt dirty water into streams. Streamside vegetation, once removed, can no longer filter runoff. The lesson learned is that the best way to protect the bay is to protect headwater perennial streams throughout the watershed.

Virginia took heed by participating in the historic interstate Chesapeake Bay agreement and requiring tidewater counties to identify environmentally sensitive buffer areas along perennial waterways, which cannot be disturbed by development. Fairfax County uses an exceptionally robust protocol to identify which streams to protect, relying on 26 hydrological, physical and biological characteristics that decades of scientific inquiry have shown mark the critical features of a perennial stream.

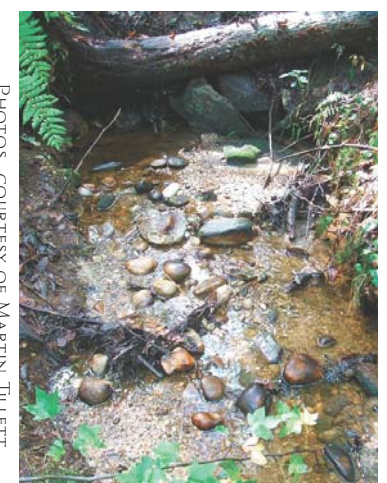
The reason for this multi-faceted analysis is that water moves through the sediments of a streambed even when it is not visible.

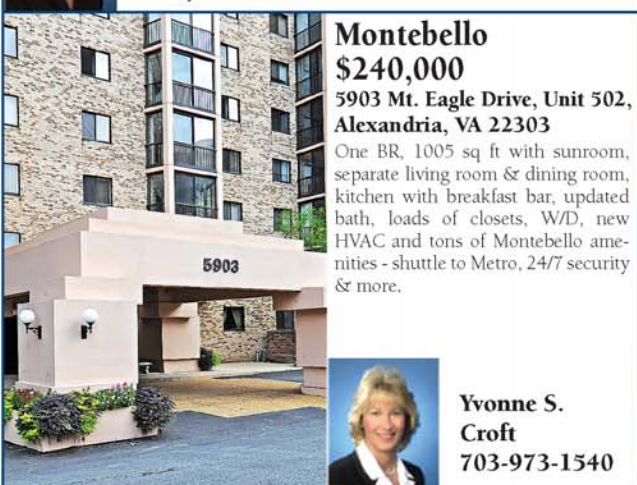

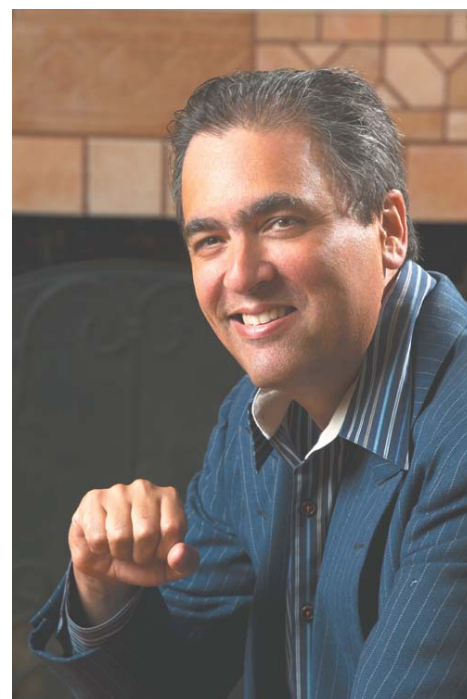

The cool fall weather signals the start of a new season of music by the Alexandria Symphony Orchestra. Entitled "Music of Dreams," the 2011-2012 season, led by Maestro Kim Allen Kluge, will begin on Oct. 8-9 with the world premiere of David Balakrishnan's Force of Nature, performed on cello by the composer's fellow Turtle Island Quartet member Mark Summer. Balakrishnan will perform violin on another of his original compositions, Little Mouse Jumps. Other performers this season include Thomas Mastroianni performing Liszt's transcription of Schubert's Wanderer Fantasy on Nov. 5; Richard Stoltzman on Mozart's Clarinet Concerto Feb. 11-12, and Carlos Rodríguez rounding out the season on May 19 with a performance of Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 2.

Repertoire highlights throughout the year include Berlioz's Symphonie fantastique; Symphony No. 3, Organ by Saint-Saëns; Mozart's Requiem; Stravinsky's Firebird Suite; and The Planets by Holst.

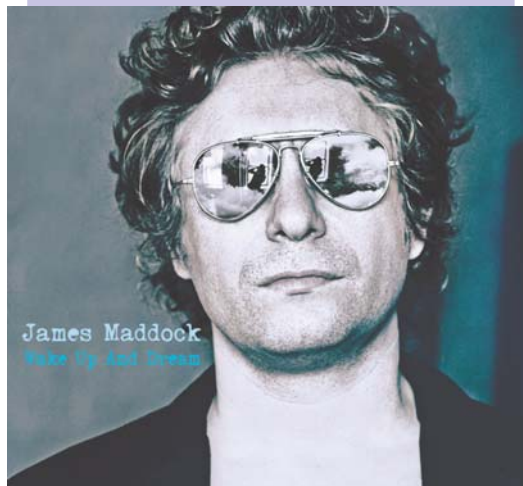

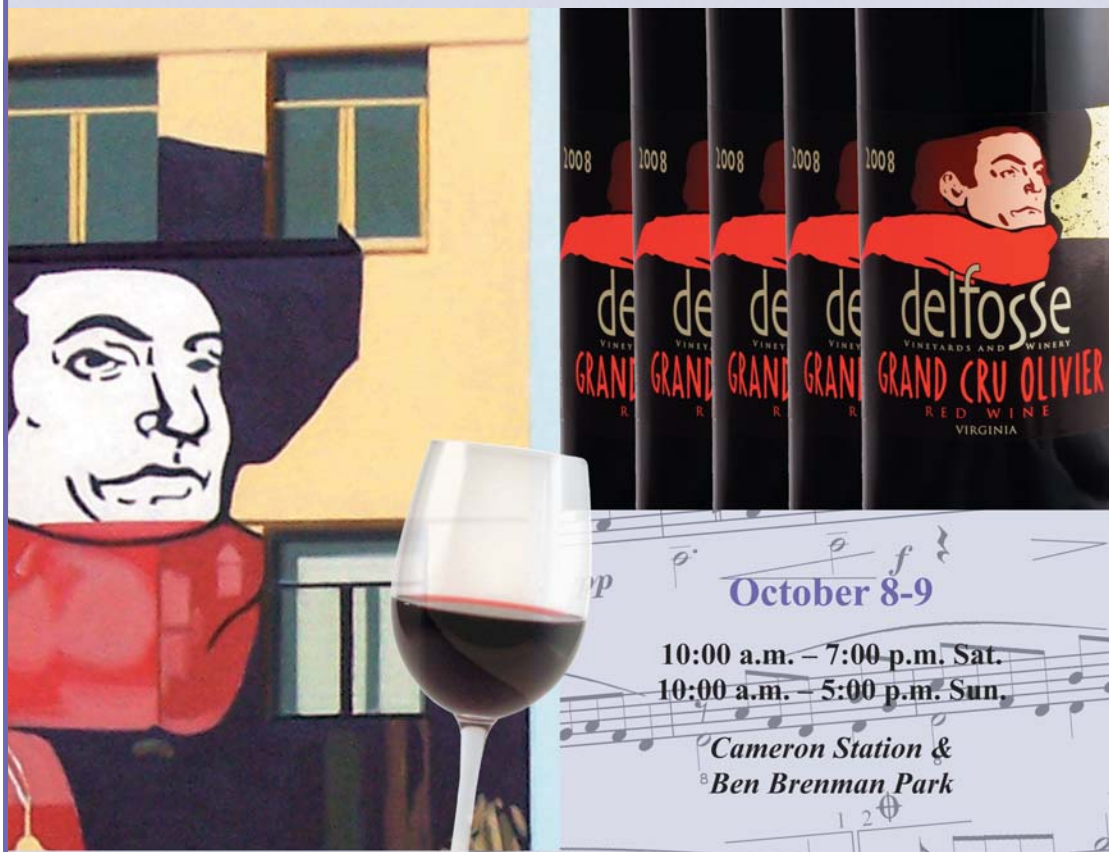

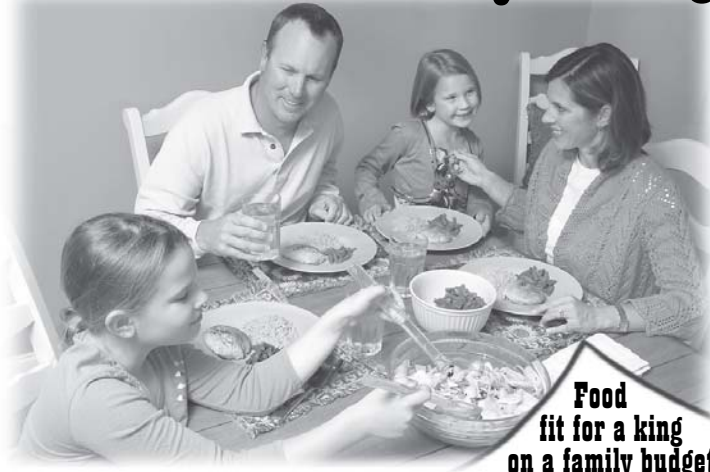

West Potomac's Jenkins Gets Aggressive Against Atoms

Wolverines score a touchdown on each of their first four possessions.

Back in August, West Potomac head football coach Eric Henderson called Tyrone Jenkins “the best pure athlete in the Patriot District.” But nearly two months later, while Jenkins’ ability is apparent, one Wolverines assistant coach felt the senior receiver played passively during the team’s first four games.

Heading into West Potomac’s Sept. 30 homecoming contest against Annandale, Jenkins vowed to make a change.

“Earlier this season, [after] some catches I got, I kind of went down easily,” Jenkins said after Friday’s game. “I had a talk with [defensive coordinator Chad] Louisville yesterday and he said it seems like I’m a different player from what I was last year — I’m not as aggressive as I was last year — so I had to turn it up this game in order for me to go back to how I was last year.”

Jenkins turned it up to the tune of seven receptions for 107 yards and two touchdowns against the Atoms as West Potomac

defeated Annandale, 45-10. The Wolverines’ record improved to 3-2, including 2-1 in the district.

Each of Jenkins’ touchdowns was the product of a short pass he turned into a long gain. Late in the second quarter, Jenkins ran a hitch pattern and caught pass near the left sideline. He evaded would-be tacklers with a spin move and then tip-toed down the sideline for a 20-yard touchdown and a 28-0 West Potomac lead.

Early in the fourth quarter, Jenkins caught a pass near the right sideline, made a hesitation move and then stiff-armed the Annandale defensive back on his way to an 18-yard score and a 38-3 Wolverines advantage.

“He’s an excellent athlete and can make anybody miss on the field and he did get aggressive,” Henderson said. “He attacked the defensive backs and tried to make something out of nothing. With hitches, there are a lot of people rallying to the ball and he’s got the quicks to run away from it.”

Jenkins wasn’t the only West Potomac playmaker putting his talents on display. Joseph “Jam” Marinelli caught four passes

for 68 yards and a touchdown. DeMornay Pierson-El broke a 65-yard touchdown run and tallied two receptions for 10 yards and running back Keaton Labyzon rushed for 49 yards and a touchdown.

Sophomore quarterback Caleb Henderson was in charge of distributing the ball and played into the fourth quarter after splitting time with Charles Ruiz Hernandez during the first four games. Eric Henderson said coaches made the decision to go with Caleb Henderson on a full-time basis during a loss to Lake Braddock on Sept. 23. No. 6 rewarded coaches by completing 15 of 22 passes for 204 yards and three touchdowns. He also rushed six times for 44 yards.

“I love throwing to the athletes I have,” Caleb Henderson said. “They just make me right all the time. ... [Our playmakers are] all different in their own way. DeMornay is shifty in the open field, Tyrone will just burn

right by you and Jam will make that tough catch that no one can make.”

With West Potomac leading 38-3 in the fourth quarter, Ruiz Hernandez came in to play quarterback and threw a 20-yard touchdown pass to Chris Carter.

West Potomac reached the end zone on each of its first four possessions and kicked a field goal on its fifth. The Wolverines led the Atoms 31-3 at half-time.

West Potomac will host Lee at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 6. The Lancers are 4-1, including 2-0 in the Patriot District, and are averaging 38.6 points per game. The Wolverines are averaging 31.6 points per contest. With

each team featuring a high-powered offense, Eric Henderson told his team the game could turn into a “video game.” Caleb Henderson said the Wolverines are ready.

“I know our defense will do their job and our offense will do our thing,” the quarterback said. “We’ll score every time we get the ball, just like we did today.”

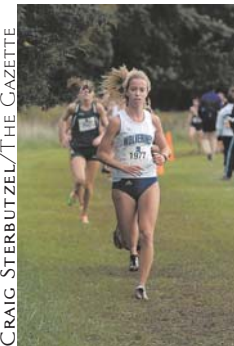
Regional Park.

one so close.”
The team win was the West Potomac girls’ third of the season. The Wolverines also won the Monroe Parker Invitational on Sept. 14 and the William & Mary Invitational on Sept. 17.

This flowing water, often less than an inch out of sight, supports aquatic life and can certainly carry pollutants toward the bay. A number of the protocol’s 26 factors can signal the likely presence of such below-streambed flow: seeps and springs, for example, or aquatic creatures that require running water to live. Flowing streams also write their signatures on the landscape, as meandering channels with a sequence of riffles and pools. The protocol accordingly cautions that visual “flow may stop at a point and begin again some distance downstream,” and the simple observation of flow by human eyes or lack thereof is not determinative. In other words, appearances can be deceiving.

But despite the scientifically rigorous protocol and state regulations requiring “a reliable, site-specific evaluation” before stripping protected streams of their buffers, supporters of the OLDA are asking for the elimination of stream buffers in Westgrove park based simply on visual observations of a purportedly “dry” stream. At present their intent appears to be an effort to trigger a renewed evaluation of a stream all for the sake of an interim use lasting a few years. Should they succeed, then maybe at some unforeseen time, the county may revisit the issue, but otherwise a stream declassification is permanent.

Qualified and neutral county staff applied the protocols and

concluded that the stream should be protected. They classified it as perennial thus creating the land buffers afforded to a resource protection area. Are the other 25 factors of the protocol to be ignored and the stream’s buffer eliminated, based on visual observations of the stream bed on the east side of Fort Hunt Road? So what of the stream west of Fort Hunt road with observable surface flow or after it leaves the Westgrove property? Is it, miraculously, perennial once again but not so on the area for the OLDA?


While the fate of the West Grove stream alone will not exacerbate the record dead zones predicted for the Chesapeake, similar streams across Fairfax are at risk, and the cumulative threat is profound. We should not rely on visual evidence of stream flow without considering subsurface flow that may continue despite a temporarily “dry” appearance? If the OLDA people want a restudy of the Westgrove stream to reverse the prior classification, then they should pay for a new review since taxpayers already paid for the review that classified it as perennial.

I am supportive of more OLDA’s in Fairfax County. They are needed and more should be built. There exists other public property and parkland that do not have environmental protections that could equally serve this function. What really surprises me about the group in support of the OLDA that calls themselves PACK is their

breaking the line ahead of other groups in Fairfax County also asking for park use designations. By doing so they are permitted to subvert a park planning process that FCPA has followed for decades. It surprises me even more that the FCPA Board asked FCPA staff to consider the request for a fenceless, walk-to OLDA within Westgrove Park. There is seemingly less courage than I would have expected from a board that most citizens expect to be on the frontline of protecting our natural resources.

Fortunately there must be a 2232 Review (the Planning Commission must review public facility proposals to determine if the proposal is consistent with the Fairfax County Comprehensive Plan) and there may be a public hearing. The FCPA Board will not give final approval until after the 2232 review. People wanting to help the Chesapeake need to do more than place a Save The Bay bumper sticker on their vehicles. Citizens need to appear at public hearings as proposed here and speak in support of our watersheds and once and for all put an end to the chipping away piece by piece the components of our streams, otherwise, the careful system of interstate protections to rehabilitate the imperiled Chesapeake Bay will suffer the death of a thousand cuts. As our local streams go, so goes the bay.
