If It Isn't a Bus, What Is It?

Arlington's multi-colored mystery.

The flashy vehicle with fake coffee sacks on the roof is an eye-catcher. It is parked randomly on George Mason Drive, between Columbia Pike and the grounds of Wakefield High School. Many call it "a bus," but to others the proper term is "la chiva."

In Colombia, and South and Central America generally, buses are an essential cog in the transportation system. Loaded (and often overloaded) with people and goods, they move between rural areas and nearby market towns before dawn and at dusk. Popular films have featured these over-worked vehicles; think "Romancing the Stone" with Michael Douglas and "Collateral Damage" with Arnold Schwarzenegger. Called "la chiva," the rough translation is "the goat."

When not engaged in such a mundane role, buses have another life and another name: "la chiva rumbera" or "party bus." On a festive occasion, the party bus is

hired, guests are collected, food and drink are consumed, music is played, songs are sung and everyone celebrates as the vehicle rolls about the neighborhood. With the party winding down, guests are returned home.

MANUEL MARTINEZ arrived in the United States from Colombia as a young man decades ago. He admits that he came "to pursue 'the American dream.' Here, you can become whatever you want to be, if you work hard." He started working hard, at the bottom, in restaurant kitchens and as a common laborer in the building industry. Then he became a driver and chauffeur.

In the mid-1990s, Martinez established A-1 American Limousine, Inc. Clients came, and still come, mainly from embassies of Spanish-speaking countries and contacts with groups and individuals through those embassies. In addition to a variety of vehicles and local road knowledge, bi-lingual service is a prime selling point. Point-to-point transportation is augmented by calls for shopping trips and informal

sightseeing. Soon he hired his first (and only) employee to keep up with business. During a family visit to Colombia, Martinez realized he missed one element of his youth, "la chiva rumbera," and determined to have one at home in Northern Virginia. His wife, Erenia, could not hide her disbelief. He continued with the project and looked upon it only as a hobby and something to be shared with family and friends. After many inquiries about rentals, Martinez decided to go commercial. There would be

authentic music and dancing and singing, but no food or drink would be provided (although ice and cups and other party supplies would be available).

Most customers are Hispanics who delight in re-living "the good old times" in their homelands. However, Martinez is animated when boasting of non-Hispanic customers. Some have fond memories of the party bus from serving in foreign military and diplomatic posts. Others are attracted by novelty, like the group that used the vehicle in lieu of tailgating at an outdoor concert in Manassas. No matter the reason, Martinez is happy to play host. He explains that "Colombia is seen as a bad place overrun by drugs and danger. Guests enjoy a piece of our culture and learn a little about us and our customs. They sometimes change their minds about Colombia."

A Streetcar Named Disagreement

Green Party candidate disagrees with Democratic incumbents about streetcars.

Meet the Candidates

Should Arlington County drop hundreds of millions of dollars on a new Columbia Pike streetcar system? The all-Democratic County Board is solidly behind the program. But when voters head to the polls in November, they’ll have a choice. Green Party candidate Audrey Clement says the streetcar system is a waste of money, unnecessarily diverting a funding stream that could be used to improve bus service in other parts of the county.

“It’s a sinkhole,” said Clement. “They’re taking a stream of revenue and sinking it into one project, which is a mistake.”

Clement says Columbia Pike is already well served by buses, including the ART service as well as Metrobus service. As a result, she said, the county should find another use for the funding stream identified to pay for the \$160 million initial capital investment in purchasing the streetcars. But incumbent Democratic County Board member Mary Hynes said that elected officials promised the

Two Officers Honored Nationally

The International Association of Chiefs of Police Highway Safety Committee has selected two Arlington County officers as the grand prize winners of the 2011 Looking Beyond the License Plate award. The 3M Traffic Safety Systems Division has partnered with the IACP Highway Safety Committee for 13 years to recognize police officers who use license plates to solve serious, non-traffic related crimes.

On Feb. 27, 2010, around 4 a.m., police responded to the 600 block of North Wakefield Street for a call about an abduction. Two young women were walking to a residence when a man confronted them with a handgun. The suspect forced them inside the house where he restrained them. The suspect then forced one of the victims to leave the house with him and she was forced into the suspect's vehicle. Four hours later, the victim was found seeking help and medical treatment in a neighboring jurisdiction. She was suffering from serious injuries and was transported to an area hospital.

During the investigation of these crimes, Corporal Timothy Clifford and Officer Andrew Nucelli recalled seeing, and running the license plate, of a vehicle that matched the description of the SUV used in these crimes. That information led to the owner of the SUV, Jorge Torrez. This police work was instrumental in the identification and subsequent arrest of the suspect.

Torrez was convicted of 14 charges including abduction with the intent to defile, forcible sodomy, robbery, and rape, he was later charged with the death of a Naval Petty Officer and linked by DNA to the a double homicide of two young girls in Illinois that occurred in 2005.

Gala To Benefit Food Assistance Center

The Arlington Food Assistance Center is expected to get a big boost this year from the agents at the Keller Williams Realty Arlington office through a fundraiser on Nov. 10 aimed at retiring AFAC's mortgage.

The food bank, which serves about 1,650 families every week, has almost paid off the mortgage and associated costs of purchasing their warehouse and food distribution center at 2708 S. Nelson St. The \$50,000 that Keller Williams Arlington hopes to raise is expected to retire the mortgage. This will be the fourth consecutive year that the Arlington office of Keller Williams has staged a gala to help AFAC reach its goal. The real estate agency has raised a total of \$110,000 in three years and is the largest single donor to AFAC's Pemanent Home Campaign. The event is open to the public.


Resident Arrested on Gun Charge

Hellyer Named Regional Magistrate

State reorganizes magistrate system.

Robert D. Hellyer has been named the regional supervising magistrate for region 5, which encompasses Arlington, Alexandria, Fairfax and Prince William.

Hellyer grew up in Arlington County. He attended Kemper military high school and college. He later went on to get his associate's degree from Northern Virginia Community College and his bachelor's degree from the University of Phoenix in 2005.

"It took me 27 years to get my associate's degree," said Hellyer. "When I came to the magistrate's office, I had a high school degree."

He spent nine years working at the Arlington county sheriff's office as a shift supervisor and sergeant. He also owned a bail bonding company called Express Bonding, which was based out of Alexandria.

Hellyer came to the magistrate's office in 1999. He was a magistrate for Arlington from 1999-2002 appointed by the chief circuit court judge Paul Sheridan. He was reappointed twice.

In 2008, the state reorganized the magistrate system to be under the office of the executive secretary. At this time, Hellyer was reappointed by Karl Hadeof, executive secretary of the Supreme Court of Virginia, to be chief magistrate of Arlington.

In December 2010, he became acting regional supervisor for region 5. The title became official in August 2011.

"A magistrate is an independent judicial officer," said Hellyer. "Their job is to be impartial and unbiased and listen to complaints from law enforcement

and citizens and establish probable cause to see if a crime has been committed. They issue arrests warrants and make bail determinations. They work 24 hours a day 7 days week. If somebody gets arrested at 2 in the morning, they're brought before the magistrate to issue the probable cause and make the bail determination."

He also noted that they handle mental detentions, which he described as "not a big majority of our job but of absolute importance to protect the community."

But Hellyer is more than just a magistrate; he is the chief magistrate and the regional supervising magistrate.

"I supervise the chiefs to ensure that all of our services are consistent," said Hellyer. "The chiefs are in charge of the locality."

Hellyer said he had always wanted to have a career in law enforcement.

"It's a public service," said Hellyer. "It's an important job. I enjoy doing it. I enjoy helping people. I enjoy being part of the criminal justice system."

He said the hardest part of the job is dealing with irate people.

"The magistrate's office is open 24 hours a day and there are a lot of distressed people that come to the office," said Hellyer. "Most of the people come when they're upset. No body comes when they're happy just to say, 'Hi, how you're doing.'"

He said he tries to stay calm,

be objective and listen.

He wants people to know that the criminal justice system actually works very well.

"It's something that not everybody sees because not everybody is part of the criminal justice system unless they're a defendant or a victim," said Hellyer. "But the magistrate's office is the introduction to the criminal justice system. We are directly put here by the state to serve the citizens."

Hellyer is proud of the area he serves.

"I love it here," said Hellyer. "I grew up here. I enjoy its diversity."



with run off.

“Rain gardens mimic the forest process that naturally removes pollutants,” said Christin Jolicoeur, a spokeswoman for the Arlington Department of Environmental Services.

Jolicoeur, who advised Marymount on the type of flora to incorporate in the garden, emphasized the importance of native plants and that all residents can create their own backyard rain gardens.

“We recommend native plants because they provide habitat value over and above what non-native plants provide,” said Jolicoeur. “Location is key. A rain garden should be at least 10 feet from a basement, and in a depressed area where water flows.”

The Dominion Education Foundation helped support the Marymount rain garden as a model for the community at large.

“We believe the rain garden is important because it supports a sustainable environment,” said Le-Ha Anderson, a spokeswoman for the Dominion Foundation. “The project helps in terms of protecting the soil and educating the public.”

“The Arlington community is invited to take a look anytime,” said Dr. Barbara Freutzer, an associate professor of Biology at Marymount University.

Although the rain garden at Marymount carries a price tag of \$20,000 due to the sensitive nature of existing pipelines and the proximity to the university’s library, Arlington residents who wish to incorporate their own backyard rain gardens have

more affordable options open.

“As long as the ground isn’t frozen, a family can put together their own rain garden in just a few days for a hundred dollars,” said Dr. Freutzer. “At the same time, it’s worth waiting till spring to think it over, check out the resources online, and plan how the garden will work best.”

to go back on that commitment.”

“Before the streetcars were approved, we had a full community process where people could participate and tell us what they wanted,” said Tejada. “People overwhelmingly supported the streetcar option.”

ARLINGTON COUNTY has been moving toward installing a streetcar on Columbia Pike for almost a decade. Since that time, the county has adopted a land-use plan to revitalize Columbia Pike and approved redevelopment in anticipation of the streetcar system. Supporters of the plan say delaying the investment will add to the tax burden on the existing community because the demand for services will continue as future development fizzles. The Green Party candidate isn’t buying it.

“Arlington likes to bill itself as this great place for transit, but most of the county just isn’t walkable,” said Clement. “The county hasn’t invested in bus service in the north and west parts of Arlington.”

Hynes agrees, to an extent.

When asked about Clement’s criticism, she acknowledged that she would like to see increased bus service in parts of the county that are currently under-served or not on bus routes at all. But because those areas are largely suburban, she said, they don’t have the kind of density that could justify a county-subsidized bus service — especially considering the fact that the county already subsidizes existing bus service to the tune of about 80 percent.

“Much as I would like to see bus service expanded, the ridership would be very small,” said Hynes. “The question is do we want to subsidize that?”

FOR NOW, Hynes said, she feels the responsible course of action is to maintain the course of action with the streetcar system. Although the initial capital investment is far more than purchasing buses, she said that the county could potentially save money in the long run because more than one car can be operated by a single driver, saving on labor costs. And county leaders are expecting the sys-



tem to lure additional development to the corridor, creating more tax revenue to fill county coffers. Clement isn't so sure this is working.

"Our schools are already overcrowded and our roads are clogged," said Clement. "I'm also not sure that it's the best idea to add streetcars to streets that are already clogged with traffic."

This issue isn't academic. Every year, \$24 million of revenue is collected from the add-on tax that charges more for commercial property than residential property. Hynes and Tejada would like to see that money go to the streetcar system while Clement said she would work to divert those resources toward expanding bus service to other parts of the county. Although both of the Democratic incumbents acknowledged they would also like to see expanded bus service, they said that abandoning the streetcar system now would be the wrong move for Arlington.

"We're trying to push the envelope with this," said Tejada. "We really see this as the next phase of public transportation, something beyond Metro and light rail."

Hynes and Tejada also agreed that setting money aside for the Metro system must have seemed questionable, although today the rewards are clear.

General Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 8, 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Early voting is still available.

It's just a local election, why does it matter? Every member of the Virginia House of Delegates and Virginia Senate is up for reelection, with some significant open seats in Northern Virginia.

The Virginia General Assembly decides what to do with the state income tax and other revenue, most of it generated here in Northern Virginia, most of it spent elsewhere. It's fair for wealthier parts of the state to help pay for services in poorer parts of the state, but the Virginia General Assembly denies localities in Northern Virginia the

right to make most decisions that affect residents here. In Virginia, local government has only exactly the power given to it by the General Assembly. The right to open schools when it makes sense for each locality? No. The right to regulate safety, like where guns can be carried? No. The right to choose to raise revenue locally through taxes other than real estate and property taxes? Not really.

Since 1993, WRAP's SoberRide program has provided 52,376 free cab rides home to would-be drunk drivers in the Greater Washington area. Through public education, innovative health education programs and advocacy, WRAP is credited with keeping the metro-Washington area's alcohol-related traffic deaths consistently lower than the national average.



Board OKs Boeing Regional HQ

The Arlington County Board approved a plan to build the Boeing Company's regional headquarters at a prime location on the north side of Crystal City, adjacent to Long Bridge Park. The board agreed to major changes to a previously approved site plan that will allow development of a single-use office building, rather than the originally planned mixed-use development. W-L Beats Mount Vernon for District Field Hockey Title

Banchoff's penalty corner goal proves difference for Generals.

Washington-Lee senior Emma Banchoff's role transitioned from catalyst to secondary scoring option to hero during a penalty corner in the second half of the National District field hockey tournament final.

The Generals had been the aggressor for most of the first 40 minutes against two-time defending district champion Mount Vernon, but didn't have a lead to show for it. The teams were locked in a scoreless tie when W-L lined up for a corner with 20 minutes and change remaining in regulation.

"I felt like we were dominating," W-L head coach Beth Prange said, "and we just weren't scoring."

Banchoff provided the only offense W-L needed, deflecting a teammate's shot attempt into the goal, as the Generals defeated the Majors, 1-0, on Oct. 21 at Washington-Lee High School. Mount Vernon knocked W-L out of each of the last two district tournaments, including beating the Generals in the 2009 championship game. On Friday, W-L earned a form of pay-

back by winning its first district title in seven years.

"It feels amazing," Banchoff said. "Being a senior this year, we worked really hard the whole season. Two years ago we were in the finals, last year the semifinals and we got knocked out by [Mount Vernon], so to do it against them is an incredible experience. We've worked so

hard. The team is really cohesive, we work well together and we wanted this from the

beginning and we got it."

Banchoff set the deciding corner in motion, passing the ball from the end line to the intended target, senior Samantha Brothers, at the top of the circle. The play called for Brothers to shoot, and the team's leading goal scorer smacked an attempt that missed to the left. Banchoff, who had positioned herself next to the goal, was there to deflect Brothers' attempt into the goal.

"It's a special play we do," Banchoff said. "I hit it to Sam, who is our center, and she hits it to the far post and sometimes it goes in, but I have to be there to deflect it. That

time it was wide, so I just deflected it in. It was a beautiful shot by her. It was genius and I was just there. Really, all the credit to her. ...

"When the goal happened, I knew that we had won."

W-L senior midfielder Adrianna Gorsky, a first-team all-district selection, played an important role in the Generals' victory, drawing post-game praise from Mount Vernon head coach Jessica Hebel. Gorsky celebrated her 18th birthday with a win on Friday, one year after losing to Mount Vernon in the semifinals on her 17th birthday.

"It's my senior year and we've been working on this for four years," Gorsky said. "... We got our name on the banner, and that's kind of awesome."

Senior goalkeeper Morgan Livezey earned the shutout for W-L.

Gorsky, Brothers, senior midfielder Emily Gorsky and senior defender Meredith Randle earned first-team all-district honors for the Generals. Banchoff, Livezey, senior midfielder Kirby Clark and sophomore forward Sarah Bauman received second-team accolades. Junior forward Katrina Cook and sophomore midfielder Sonia Lunn earned honorable mention.

Friday marked the third time in the last four years W-L reached the district tournament championship game. In 2008, the Generals lost to Yorktown. In 2009, they lost to Mount Vernon. In 2011, W-L got the job done.

"I think a lot of them have been on varsity for three years," Prange said. "They've been playing like a team. They trust each other; there's nobody trying to be a star."






