## The Price of Influence

People who have business before the Board of Supervisors contribute to incumbents.

**W**hy do people give money to candidates for the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors?

“People give money in politics to get what they want,” said Stephen Farnsworth, communications professor at George Mason University. “If they weren’t getting what they want they wouldn’t keep giving money.”

From developers to commercial real estate owners and property management companies, the roster of people who have given money to incumbent members of the Board of Supervisors reads like a Planning Commission docket. It’s all legal in Virginia, which has no restrictions on who can give or how much money they can contribute — as long as it’s disclosed. But following the money isn’t always easy.

“I think what voters are really interested in is transparency,” said Lincoln Park Civic Association President Loretta Prencipe. “We really want to understand who is donating. And when campaign contributions are made under entities that aren’t transparent. It raises questions for us.”

Take an entity known as Tysons West Assemblage LLC. The limited liability company is a group of commercial real-estate developers who own land near the new Tysons West Metro station. Providence District Supervisor Linda Smyth said that she did not accept campaign contributions when the plan for Tysons Corner was being crafted. But now that the only pending business before the Board of Supervisors is a series of rezoning decisions, all bets are off.

“What is going on at Tysons,” explained Smyth, “is that there are small land owners who consolidate and set up a partnership.”

**CAMPAIGN FINANCE RECORDS** show the limited liability company has given \$5,000 to Supervisor Smyth and \$30,000 to Chairwoman Sharon Bulova. Smyth accepted the money, but says her vote is not for sale.

“They do not get any special favors from me,” said Smyth. “Let me put it that way.”

Some argue that money does buy influence, or at least access. Sue Tolchin is author of *Pinstripe Patronage: Political Favoritism from the Clubhouse to*

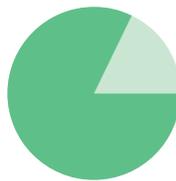

the White House and Beyond. She says it’s unethical for members of the Board of Supervisors to take money from people who have pending or future business in the county.

“On the face of it, it’s unethical,” said Tolchin. “They are paying in effect to get a certain decision.”

## Barry Faces Cooper for County Sheriff

Four-time incumbent Barry faces challenger Bill Cooper.

**F**airfax County Sheriff Stan Barry (D) will face Republican challenger Bill Cooper this November.

The Fairfax County Sheriff’s Office is responsible for maintaining the county’s Adult Detention Center, providing courthouse security and serving civil law process. The Fairfax County Sheriff’s Office is the largest in Virginia, with more than 600 employees.

**BARRY** was elected in 1999, and is completing his third term in office. He has been a member of the sheriff’s office for the past 32 years. Barry said over his past three terms, he has enacted a number of programs that save the county money.

“We save the county millions each year with labor programs that we created and are staffed by inmates,” Barry said. “We restructured our training and staffing to save the county more than a million dollars a year in overtime costs. We have had our budget reduced as a result of the recession and still returned \$1.5 million this year, and \$2.5 million last year by being very strict with spending.”

Barry says one of his goals if elected for another term would be to further save money by electronically serving certain kinds of civil process. “We have the technology to do it, we just need to get the courts to allow

us to do it,” he said. “We would still do some services in person, but many of them could be done electronically, with no deputy driving to a location and physically serving.”

Barry has been endorsed by the Virginia Coalition of Police, the Fairfax County Government Employees Union, the Fairfax Coalition of Police and the Fairfax County Deputy Sheriff’s Coalition, among others.

**COOPER** served with the Fairfax County Sheriff’s Office since 1988 until his retirement as a lieutenant in March of this year. During his time with the office, he worked in court security, the Adult Detention Center and the Criminal Justice Academy.

He said if elected, one of his first priorities would be to enforce the more than 4,000 outstanding warrants in the county.

“I would work in partnership with the Fairfax County Police Department to get these 4,000 criminals off the streets,” he said. “Because of budget issues, we’ll also work with the FBI, [Immigration and Customs Enforcement], the U.S. Marshals and combine resources to make it budget neutral.”

Cooper says he would make it a goal to increase cooperation with the Fairfax County Police Department to make sure re

# Filler-Corn Ready for Richmond

Roads, education top priority list.

“It was like drinking from a fire hose.” That’s how Del. Eileen Filler-Corn (D-41) describes her fast-and-furious special election campaign in 2010 that catapulted her into a seat in the Virginia General Assembly after a heated six-week campaign battle.

She won her seat in a special election to replace Sen. Dave Marsden (D-37), who had himself won a special election to the Virginia State Senate the month before. Marsden’s move created a vacuum in the 41st district, which represents Burke, Fairfax, and portions of West Springfield and Fairfax Station.

“As soon as Dave won, I started getting phone calls from people asking me to run. I had about a week to make up my mind,” she said.

“I started campaigning in the middle of Snowmageddon, so I was door-knocking in five feet of snow and there were times I couldn’t even find the door,” she said.

On March 3, the day after her narrow victory by 37 votes — or a margin of three-tenths of a percentage point — she drove to Richmond, was sworn in by noon and was voting 20 minutes later.

“I hit the ground running, but I was prepared to do that,” Filler-Corn said.

**FILLER-CORN** knew her way around state political circles. For 17 years, the Springfield PTA mom and attorney worked at all levels of governments. She served as senior adviser to Gov. Tim Kaine, and was deputy director of the state’s liaison office under Gov. Mark Warner.

Filler-Corn said many of the issues that voters told her were priorities in 2010 still top her legislative agenda, such as increased funding for education, transportation and public safety.

“Education is everyone’s number-one concern. That is why we all moved here, because we have a world-class school system. No one wants to see that put in jeopardy,” she said.

As a member of the legislature’s lower house, Filler-Corn is in the minority on several fronts — as a Democrat, a woman and a mother with children still in school. In this year’s partisan redistricting process, many political observers maintain swing districts across the state have been transformed into GOP safe havens, with increasingly hard-line, anti-tax Republican candidates.

Filler-Corn said she will continue to work with members of both parties to bring back more funding for Fairfax County’s schools and roads.

“People want a delegate who can work across party lines and build alliances, especially now,” she said.

“As a mother of two, I believe that just because times are tough, it doesn’t mean we should give up on the next generation. Some politicians are proposing a \$1.2 billion cut to our schools, which would mean packed classrooms and no personal attention for our students. I’ll strongly oppose any massive cuts...” she said.

Filler-Corn said she takes her role as the voice for her constituents seriously.

“I don’t go to Richmond for 45 to 60 days a year to spin my wheels. Voters want someone who can work well with others, and move the ball forward on issues that impact their lives,” she said.

**DURING HER FIRST TERM**, Filler-Corn introduced several bills, including a bill that expands the class of persons who may be issued a protective order from victims of stalking, sexual battery.

She said her hallmark as a legislator has been her responsiveness. She holds office hours once a month, communicates through e-newsletters, and will always return constituent’s calls.

“One of the things I love most about my job is working with constituents, and helping them problem-solve. I’ve always enjoyed helping people and feeling like I’m making a difference,” she said.

She said she was inspired to go into public service by her parents who taught her to be active in community service.

“I think it’s essential that anyone, especially women, get involved and stay involved with whatever their passion is. You need to have a voice on those things that are important to you,” she said.

### Guinea Road Closure Friday

On Friday, Oct. 28 at 10 p.m., Guinea Road will be closed in the vicinity of Rutherford Park for on-going repair work to the Guinea Road bridge. Flippo Construction will be installing a new storm drain across Guinea Road. During this time there will also be a crew working on the installation of an 18-inch sanitary sewer pipe across the road. All work is scheduled to be complete by 5 a.m. Monday, Oct. 31. This closure will impact thru traffic travelling between Braddock Road and Little River Turnpike. This work is being undertaken in connection with the emergency repair of the bridge over the Long Branch Stream. VDOT has determined that the culverts supporting this bridge are structurally unsound.

Message boards are in place, and will display a three-panel message

indicating the closure and alerting travelers to a detour route. This will be the first of a total of four such closures over the next nine months, according to VDOT.

### Have a Safe Halloween

Fairfax County police are advising parents how to keep their children safe, Monday night, Oct. 31, while they’re out trick-or-treating on Halloween. Make sure children cross the street with an adult, walk on sidewalks or paths, cross the street at corners, obey traffic signals and crosswalk signs, and watch for cars that may be turning or backing up.

Children should also wear reflective costumes or carry lights to make sure motorists can see them. Motorists should drive slowly, stay alert and remember that neighborhoods will be full of young children in both large and small groups.

## ‘Steel Magnolias’ at Lord of Life

**B**efore “Steel Magnolias” became a hit movie, it was a play, and the Lord of Life Players are bringing it to local audiences.

It’ll be performed Friday-Saturday, Nov. 4-5, at 7:30 p.m.; and Sunday, Nov. 6, at 3 p.m., at Lord of Life Lutheran Church, 13421 Twin Lakes Drive (off Union Mill Road) in Clifton. Tickets are \$10 at 703-425-1306 and at the door, if any are left. Homemade refreshments will be served during intermission.

“This play takes you on a rollercoaster between tears and gut-wrenching laughter,” said Director Paul Denfeld. “Because playwright Robert Harling based his brilliantly written script on his sister’s experience and involves the whole gamut of emotion, it’s incumbent upon the actors to portray that genuinely and realistically.”

And with the six actresses in this show, he said, it’s no problem. “They’re a talented group that’s made my job easy,” said Denfeld. “They’re not amateurs. The other night, I got goose bumps listening to them rehearse.”

**THE PLAY** is set in 1980s Louisiana and takes place in Truvy’s Beauty Spot over a span of two years. “Lots of people know the movie, so they’ll be able to relate to it,” said Denfeld.

“They’ll see these six women grow, develop and each conquer their own, personal issue. Through birth, death and their friendship with each other, the audience will see them support each other through life.”

Little Rocky Run’s Suzy McCarthy portrays Truvy. “She’s a beauty-shop philosopher,” said McCarthy. “She knows everybody in town and their business, and she dispenses advice to everyone. Her husband enclosed their carport so she could run her beauty shop and support him. She’s the eternal optimist and romantic, and she’s the glue that holds everyone together.”

McCarthy’s enjoying her role and “working with all these wonderful people. It’s challenging because I have a lot of lines and I really have to focus. But Truvy’s just a happy person and an interesting character. She’s full of fun and likes to see the good in everyone.”

The play differs from the movie in that the husbands and boyfriends aren’t in this version. Instead, the women talk about them. “We have to paint the picture of them through the dialogue,” said McCarthy. “It’s a beloved story that touches everyone’s hearts; it’s a slice of life about ‘steel magnolias’ who find the strength they need through friends and family.”

Amanda Harvey of Herndon plays Annelle, Truvy’s young assistant. “She’s been through some tough things and goes through an extraordinary transformation, over the course of the play, in an attempt to deal with them,” said Harvey. “She comes off as sub-

missive and skittish, but has a definite strength that comes out when necessary. And it does so in such a way as to really change the course of things for her.”

Harvey likes how Annelle goes from “being twitchy and anxious to comfortable with herself to pregnant and preoccupied with her religion.” She said the audience will like the fact that, “even in the depth of despair, the characters are able to find levity in their situation.”

Portraying Shelby is Herndon’s Catherine Kyriakakis. “She’s bright, sassy and fiercely independent, but extremely close to her mother and longs for her approval and support,” said Kyriakakis. “She has diabetes, but longs to be a mother and is willing to risk her life to give birth, despite her doctor’s warning.”

“I love this part; it’s been such a fun experience,” said Kyriakakis. “Working with Ruth, who plays Shelby’s mother, has really helped me grow as an actor. And because of that, we’ll portray a genuine mother-daughter relationship.”

Ruth MacBean of Burke plays Shelby’s mother, M’Lynn. “She’s a professional business woman, very together, and protective of her daughter,” said MacBean. “She holds her feelings in and is always worrying about her daughter’s health.”

**OF ALL THE CHARACTERS**, said MacBean, “M’Lynn gets to go really deep into her emotions.

And it’s great doing an ensemble like this with six people; it’s rewarding because you get to know them and the characters so well.”

Portraying Ouiser (Weezer), the town grump, is Springfield’s Kate Ives. “She’s in her late 60s and wealthy, and she’s known her best friend, Clairee, her whole life,” said Ives. “She’s had ‘two worthless husbands and the three most ungrateful children ever conceived.’ Like many crusty people, deep down she’s got a soft heart and will do anything for the people she loves.”

Ives is enjoying playing her because “she has some of the best lines in the play. She says things that others are thinking, but are too polite to say. She’s also not a fashion plate, so I’ve had fun putting together gloriously frumpy outfits.”

Kathy Young of Little Rocky Run plays Clairee. “She’s the smart aleck of the bunch,” said Young. “She’s the wealthy, eccentric widow of the mayor, and she loved being the mayor’s wife. But when she was, she had to hold her tongue; but now, she doesn’t have to. She’s warm and goodhearted, and she and Ouiser have a lovely friendship.”

Young loves playing Clairee because of her witty lines. For example, said Young, “At one point Clairee says, ‘The only thing that separates us from the animals is our ability to accessorize.’ When things get too serious, she’s the comic relief. Paul [Denfeld] put so much thought into the characters, and I love working with these fantastic women.”



## Research, Think, Vote

General Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 8, 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Early voting is still available.

It's just a local election, why does it matter?

Every member of the Virginia House of Delegates and Virginia Senate is up for reelection, with some significant open seats in Northern Virginia.

The Virginia General Assembly decides what to do with the state income tax and other revenue, most of it generated here in Northern Virginia, most of it spent elsewhere. It's fair for wealthier parts of the state to help pay for services in poorer parts of the state, but the Virginia General Assembly denies localities in Northern Virginia the right to make most decisions that affect residents here. In Virginia, local government has only exactly the power given to it by the General Assembly. The right to open schools when it makes sense for each locality? No. The right to regulate safety, like where guns can be carried? No. The right to choose to raise revenue locally through taxes other than real estate and property taxes? Not really.

How about School Board? You say you don't have children in the schools, so why bother to figure out what all the strident posturing and dozens of candidates are talking about? Consider that in Fairfax County, the school system spends about \$2 billion (with a B) a year, more than half of the revenue collected by Fairfax County government overall. Also consider that Fairfax County's reputation for excellent schools is no small factor in its more-vibrant-than-national-average economy.

## Inspired and Ready to Lead

### GIRL holds STEM Conference for Young Women.

**G**irls Inspired and Ready to Lead (GIRL) is a nonprofit organization for fifth-twelfth grade girls in Fairfax County. Their motto is “empowering girls to lead extraordinary lives.” They hold regular events focusing on community service, academics and well being.

Founder and director Danielle Blunt, who went to Robinson, said she always had a passion for mentoring young women. She started GIRL in 2009 with a group of girls meeting Fridays at the PINN Center for GIRL Talk.

“We had a couple girls talk and share what they were going through at school, with teachers and friends, sharing their stories and talking about issues,” said Blunt. “Me and two other girls that worked at the PINN Center would listen, share advice and encouragement.”

GIRL is based in Fairfax and was incorporated as a 501 (c)(3) nonprofit in December 2010.

**ON SATURDAY**, Oct. 15, GIRL held a career conference with a spotlight on science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

Female representatives from George Mason College of Science, National Institute of Health, U.S. Fish and Wildlife, Defense Information Systems Agency, NASA, SI, BAE Systems, Exxon Mobile and women in engineering from the University of Maryland were present. Lunch was provided for by the U.S. Coast Guard.

“I wanted to do a program to get girls interested in those fields,” said Blunt. “Show them the requirements, learn the type of degree they need, share with them all the possibilities for their futures.”

“I think we continue to be underrepresented in these fields,” said panelist from SI Zalenda Cyrille. “It’s a growing marketplace. We’re not getting that same number of people coming out of college. I would like to continue to encourage young girls.”

Almost 100 girls were in attendance and about half as many parents.

“This is my first experience with GIRL,” said Cyrille.

“I was very impressed with fact that they were able to get over 100 young people grades 5-12 to come out on Saturday. They asked very intriguing questions. I think it’s a wonderful thing Danielle has been working on to try to create.”

“It was a great opportunity,” said Blunt. “The schools don’t do anything like it. Overall it gave them a chance to learn more about various careers. I hope they learned that anything is possible by seeing the options and hearing the stories and seeing that there are women in the community who are interested in their success and wanted to help them.”

GIRL has a wide variety of programs planned for the rest of the year ranging from a White House tour in December to a healthy self image and relationship seminar in February to an afternoon tea fundraiser in April.

“GIRL appears to be well run,” said Chandra Graham Parker, a gynecologist and obstetrician who was a panelist at the STEM conference. “Danielle has programs throughout the year for the girls which are specific to education excellence, self esteem, pursuing academic excellence. I think overall it’s a very good program.”

“It gives them an opportunity to do a lot of different things,” said Faith Levy, mother of two girls in the program. “I think they are really great programs and I wish I could see more of that, especially for young girls.”

# School Facility News from Fairfax County Public Schools

While the teaching and learning processes that take place in a classroom are vitally important, equally critical to the student's success is the learning environment. High performing learning environments are energy efficient, well lit, thermally comfortable, acoustically sound, safe and healthy. Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) builds and renovates its schools to ensure that students are learning in high performance environments.

FCPS maintains 194 schools and centers that serve more than 177,000 students. Just as clothing or equipment wear out over time, so too, do school buildings. Maintaining buildings are a constant challenge. FCPS estimates that it spends nearly 90 percent of its maintenance work order hours making repairs and 10 percent of work order hours on preventative maintenance.

"That's really not the optimum formula, as we should be spending most of our time on preventative maintenance and the

remaining time on repair work. However, that is our reality due to a lack of sufficient resources," said FCPS Chief Operating Officer Dean Tistadt.

As new schools are built and older schools renovated, FCPS expects its schools will be usable for 20 to 25 years from the date of construction. Renovations extend the useful life of a building another 20 years. Since 2007, FCPS has built three new schools, renovated 10 schools and completed three school building additions and eight modular additions. Currently, ten schools are being renovated and two new schools are under construction: a new elementary school at the former Lacey school site and the site of the new south county middle school.

A school bond referendum will be on the general election ballot Tuesday, November 8, 2011. The building and renovation of schools in Fairfax County are not financed through the school

system's operating funds, but through bonds. For a list of school improvement projects included in the 2011 bond please visit [www.fcps.edu](http://www.fcps.edu) and click on Bond Referendum.

FCPS facilities serve as an important community resource benefitting all county residents. FCPS works with the Fairfax County Office of Neighborhood and Community Services, the Fairfax County Park Authority and other groups to ensure that school facilities and athletic fields are available to the public during after school hours for educational, recreational, civic, and cultural activities. More than 2,000 organizations used school facilities in 2010 including athletic recreational leagues, homeowners associations, 4-H, scouting groups, county employee organizations, and religious, cultural, and civic groups.



## Getting To Know Us

### Capacity Architect Susy Lee

FCPS student enrollment increased by more than 2,300 students in 2010. That means more desks, more teachers, and more classroom space to accommodate the additional students.

How does a school system make plans to accommodate more students?

For Susy Lee, capacity architect for FCPS, it is an ongoing challenge for one of the largest school districts in the country.

Lee uses data from an annual survey of schools and then factors in additional data she receives on projected enrollment. From there, she comes up with a ranked list of schools likely to need more space.

"I focus on the schools where interior modifications or additional trailers are the options," said Lee. "Sometimes a minor modification is all that's needed. But an extensive or more costly modification requires me to scrutinize data further to determine an ongoing need, in order to justify the expense. Sometimes trailers can possibly be a more cost- or time-effective option."

Not only does she plan for more students, but she also receives requests from FCPS departments to add programs at schools.

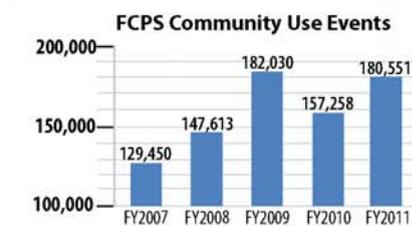
"I try to find schools that have available space and are not projected to have significant enrollment increases. But often those schools aren't in the vicinity of where the programs are needed, so modifications or trailers must be considered."

Lee has a degree in architecture that she says is important for her position. "I have to solve space-related problems and I need to know that an option is feasible to construct and is building code compliant."

"With enrollment and additional program needs increasing, finding capacity solutions will become more of a challenge every year," she said.

### This Just In

The Virginia Department of Education says **91.4 percent** of Fairfax County Public Schools students from the class of 2011 graduated on time. This figure **exceeds the state average of 86.6 percent by 4.8 percentage points** and is up slightly from 91.2 percent for the class of 2010.



## FCPS Goes Green for Environmental Efficiency and Energy Savings

FCPS has had an active and aggressive energy management program since 1978, focusing on minimizing the use and cost of energy. FCPS has been able to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) each of the last three years, despite a growing student enrollment, heating and cooling more building space,

and adding more buses to the fleet. Reducing GHG emissions was achieved in many different ways including using more energy efficient equipment, computerizing heating and air conditioning systems, and using bus route optimization software.

Computers, office equipment, and information technology

are a growing component of the educational process for teachers and students. However, electronic equipment consumes electricity and contributes to GHG emissions. FCPS is working to reduce GHG even more by reducing vehicle travel when employees work collaboratively via email and participate in meetings and training remotely.



## Robinson Football Team Getting Untracked

Rams, following 1-5 start, have now won two straight.

In what has been a frustrating, transition season, it appears the Robinson Rams are beginning to gain some continuity and putting things together under head coach Trey Taylor.

Robinson, boosted by an outstanding first half of football, won its Concorde District game at Herndon High last Saturday afternoon, 56-38. The victory was the Rams' second in a row and improved their season record to 3-5. It also put a damper on the host Hornets (2-6), who were celebrating their homecoming.

"It's about execution," said Taylor, in his first season as Robinson's coach, following the game. "That's been our battle all year long. Against Centreville we had five turnovers."

Taylor was referring to the Rams' week six, 41-14 district loss at Centreville in which the Rams struggled to hold onto the ball.

But that was not a problem in Saturday's win. The Rams, with senior Patrick Baker at quarterback, were as efficient as they have been all season. They did not turn the ball over and had success moving the football both on the ground and through the air.

Baker, an All-District wide receiver for Robinson last year, was not tabbed to play quarterback this season. But through circumstances and time over the course of the season, he was eventually named starting QB last month prior to the Rams' district game at South County. Robinson lost that week six outing, 13-10 in overtime, as well as the following week's game against Centreville. But the Rams have since won games over Lake Braddock and now the

Hornets.

"We knew he could throw the football a little bit," said Taylor, of Baker. "He can run the ball and has a great arm. The big thing is he's a senior and has been in big games and knows how to make plays."

Baker, who has now started four straight games behind center, said the Rams are making fewer mistakes and protecting the ball better.

"We're really gaining momentum," said Baker, who is getting more and more confident at signal caller with each passing game. "The last two games we've been really focused and eliminated the mistakes and turnovers. We're feeling confident and feel we can beat anybody."

Baker, who is Robinson's third starting quarterback this season, is not new to the position. Prior to last year, he was a varsity backup as a sophomore and saw a little bit of game action that season.

Robinson still has hopes of qualifying for the eight-team Div. 6 Northern Region playoffs. The Rams have two tough district games remaining in the regular season — a home game versus 7-1 Oakton this Friday night, and a road game at 5-3 Chantilly on Nov. 4.

"I think we've just got to continue to get better," said Taylor. "We've got two more Concorde teams to play."

**THE FIRST HALF** of Saturday's game was a highlight reel for Robinson, which scored touchdowns on four of its five first half possessions. The first two touchdowns came on short yardage runs by running back Tyrek Worrell, who would also score second half touchdowns on runs of 65 and 55 yards and finish the game with 203 yards.

Joe Wilson (115 yards, 2 TDs) scored on a 14-yard run for Robinson's third touchdown of the game. Robinson's final touchdown of the first half came on a play action, 24-yard touchdown pass from Baker to David Cook, who caught the ball in the end zone with 2 minutes, 10 seconds remaining. The Rams went into the locker room ahead 28-3.

Robinson broke the game wide open by scoring touchdowns on its first two possessions of the second half on the long runs by Worrell. On the third quarter's first play from scrimmage, he broke free of tackle for the 65-yard touchdown run, to the groans of the home crowd. Later, on the Rams' next possession, Worrell, on a second down play, broke free again into the Herndon secondary and on to the end zone for a 55-yard scoring jaunt. Just like that in the second half, it was 42-3 Robinson.

For the game, Robinson rushed the football for 418 yards. Baker had 100 of those yards on the ground, including a late game, 25-yard scoring run. He also completed all five of his passes for 93 yards.

**WHILE HERNDON**, which trailed by the 42-3 margin in the third quarter, never truly got into striking range to win, the Hornets did give their fans a riveting 20 minutes or so of exciting, big play football in the second half. But in the end, it was another setback for a struggling Herndon team, which fell to 2-6 on the season.

"It was heart-breaking," said Herndon junior quarterback Ky Gilmore-Parrott, of the huge halftime and early third quarter

### Woodson Football Falls Short Against West Potomac

After back-to-back wins, the Woodson football team lost to West Potomac, 31-21, on Oct. 21. The Cavaliers had 21-17 halftime lead but the Wolverines scored a pair of second-half touchdowns to win.

deficit his team faced. "We come out to play on homecoming and the whole town is here. We wanted to represent the town of Herndon better than that." The Hornet signal caller said Herndon head coach Joe Sheaffer "lit a fire under us at halftime."

"We took it upon ourselves to play better," said Gilmore-Parrott, of Herndon's mentality going into the third quarter.

The Herndon coaching staff, as it had been doing all game, continued to encourage the Hornet players to stay mentally focused and to hang in there despite the score. And the team did. What could have been a game that continued to go downhill like a brakeless car on a steep downward hill instead turned into a shocking turnaround in which the Hornets, over the final 20 minutes, outscored their guests, 35-14.

Supervisors disagree, saying that people contribute to campaigns because they agree with their values. Take developer Theodore Georgelas, who frequently has business before the county. In the last decade, he's contributed more than \$95,000 to a variety of political action committees and candidates. One of those is Braddock District Supervisor John Cook, who received \$1,000 from Georgelas.

"Look, Ted Georgelas as well as other people in the business community want a strong business environment," said Cook. "That's something I ran on."

**ACROSS FAIRFAX COUNTY**, supervisors have taken more than \$2 million this election cycle. Much of that money has come from the real-estate and construction industry, a group of people and businesses that often has business before the county. Some of them, such as Tysons West Assemblage, will have rezoning applications in the future. Others, such as developer Daniel Clemente have had business in the past. Campaign-finance records show that an entity called 8500 CDC LP, which has ties to Clemente, has given \$12,000 to incumbent Mason District Supervisor Penny Gross.

"I worked with Mr. Clemente and his organization on some developments of new housing in the Skyline area of Bailey's Crossroads," said Gross. "It's a wonderful new revitalization."

Her Republican challenger, David Feld has raised questions about Gross' fundraising. When asked

about fundraising numbers during a debate this month hosted by the League of Women Voters, Feld criticized Gross for taking money from people who have had businesses before the Board of Supervisors or will potentially have business in the future.

"I believe it's unethical to take contributions from anybody that you're doing business with," said Feld, who loaned his campaign \$27,000 to fund his race for the Mason District race.

**SOME HAVE CALLED** for reform, although nobody is expecting to see change anytime soon. Lee District Supervisor Jeff McKay said he supports imposing limits on how much people could donate, although he's not sure what the limits should be. He also supports some form of public financing for campaigns, although he acknowledged he's not sure how it should work or how much public money should be involved. Until then, he said, he's going to keep working the system.

"Until there's some reform in how you raise money, you would be a fool not to raise significant amounts of money," said McKay.

Not all the money comes from people who have direct businesses before the Board of Supervisors. Sometimes the relationships are indirect.

"The biggest contributor to my campaign was my husband," said Supervisor Smyth.

Was he trying to influence a decision?

"Well," said Smyth. "I'm hoping he'll take me to dinner."

sources are being maximized.

He also said he would institute a deadbeat parent program to track parents who are behind on child support payments. "I don't believe the burden of taking care of their children should fall on the taxpayer," he said.

Cooper said he also hopes to use increased partnerships to combat gang activity, especially in schools and neighborhoods.

Cooper has been endorsed by Governor Bob McDonnell, Del. Dave Albo (R-42), District Supervisor Pat Herrity (R-Springfield) and Fairfax County Clerk of the Court John Frey.

The Fairfax County Republican Committee has launched a website and campaign recently that takes issue with Barry entering the county's Deferred Re-

tirement Option Program, which allows workers at retirement age to defer retiring for three years and continue to earn salary and benefits.

The FCRC claims that since Barry enrolled in the program in 2009, another term would violate the program, resulting in financial gain for Barry.

Barry says the claims that he is abusing the system are factually incorrect. He says DROP is available to anyone in the county's retirement system, which he has been since he was 22 years old.

"[They say] I am getting a \$1 million payout, that is wrong. I am getting nothing if re-elected. No retirement benefits will be collected until I leave county service. The amount received then will be just over \$300,000," he said. "[They say] I am violating county law. That is wrong. I asked the county attorney to review the issue, which they did extensively, and I am in complete compliance with the law."

Cooper declined to comment on the controversy regarding Barry's retirement benefits.

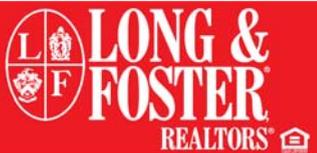
