

Walmart To Install Wheel Locks

After months of requests from neighborhood residents, big-box retailer yields to pressure.

fter months of hearing from neighborhood residents in Mount Vernon about Walmart carts ending up in Little Hunting Creek, officials from the big-box retailer have finally yielded to their demands. A spokeswoman for Walmart says the Arkansas bigbox retailer will install wheel locks on all of its carts at the Hybla Valley store by the end of the month. A spokeswoman for Walmart declined to be interviewed for this story, issuing a written statement instead.

"Back in February, I explained we were looking into adding wheel locks to this store to help alleviate this issue for local residents," said Kayla Whaling, spokeswoman for Walmart. "As a result, we will be installing a cart containment system that should be complete by the end of April 2013."

Many neighborhood activists see the move as a victory, especially volunteers who regularly organize cleanup operations to drag trash out of the creek. Participants who volunteer say they have found beer cans, syringes, Frisbees, bowling balls and dozens of shopping carts.

Robert O'Hanlon, a regular volunteer, says more than 90 percent of the carts he's pulled out of the creek have been from Walmart.

"People just take things and throw stuff in the creek. I mean, people don't take the time and effort to throw it into the dumpster," said O'Hanlon. "So this will stop most people from taking the stupid things home to their apart-

DURING THE GENERAL Assembly session this year, Del. Scott Surovell (D-44) introduced a bill he hoped would force Walmart to take action. House Bill 2012 would have given Fairfax County authority to go after owners of "dilapidated furniture, appliance, machinery, equipment, shopping cart, building material" that is "rusted, wrecked, junked, dismantled or inoperative." The bill was assigned to the House Committee on Counties, Cities and Towns, where it was killed in subcommittee. In an interview this week, Surovell says he's pleased Walmart has finally taken steps to address the issue.

"I think a lot of people will be really happy, pleased and excited that Walmart has chosen to be a leader in the Richmond Highway corridor to do something about this," said Surovell.

This weekend, Surovell is planning another cleanup of the creek.

"I went back and scouted it out last weekend, and I saw I think about two Walmart carts and about eight Home Depot," he said. "And so there's another 15 we are going to pull out this weekend and some tires and bikes and a whole bunch of trash."



Fairfax County's Homeless Population Declines 12 Percent

Emphasis on rapid re-housing, prevention keys to success.

espite the developing impact of across-the-board sequester cuts, and the rising cost of rental housing, the homeless population in Fairfax County declined 12 percent in the past year, and 26 percent 2007, we fully expected to have some sucsince 2007.

"It's a remarkable achievement," said Michael O'Reilly, chairman of the Fairfax-Falls Church Community Partnership to Prevent and End Homelessness, who released the figures Monday, April 1, along with Dean Klein, Fairfax County's director of the Office to Prevent and End Homelessness (OPEH).

According to Fairfax County's annual "point-in-time" survey, the umber of homeless individuals decreased by 184 people, from 1,534 in 2013 to 1,350 in 2013. Since 2007, the number of homeless individuals decreased by nearly 500 people or 26 percent—from 1,813 in 2007

The U.S. Department of Housing and Ur-

to 1,350 in 2013.

ban Development (HUD) requires that jurisdictions across the nation conduct a statistically reliable and unduplicated count of the homeless over the course of one day in January. The survey covers only those who are literally homeless—in shelters, in timelimited transitional housing or those who are unsheltered and living on the street.

THE GOAL of the count is to identify the number of homeless people at a given point in time and to collect demographic information about those who are homeless to provide direction for future development of housing and services. It is also a requirement to qualify for state and federal funds.

cess," O'Reilly said. What Fairfax County did not expect were economic hurdles such as the 2008 recession and this year's sequester. "I think with those challenges, if that number [1,813] had remained constant, and we managed to tread water, that would have been seen as a success. But we've

managed to reduce those numbers."

Klein said Fairfax County's key initiatives, such as rapid re-housing and expanding the range and availability of prevention services and resources contributed to the decline in homeless individuals.

"These numbers are very encouraging and energizing for our community of nonprofit, government, business and faith community partners who are working day-in and dayout on behalf of some of our most vulnerable citizens," Klein said. "I am pleased to see that the strategies embedded in our 10year plan are working."

O'Reilly said the OPEH's effective implementation of the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), which prioritizes transparency and allows the county to ana-

lyze data from a number of nonprofit service providers, is an "often overlooked indicator" that provides a valuable big picture of homelessness in the county.

"We also gained momentum from the recent 100,000 Homes Campaign, but we still need new resources, new part-

ners, ideas and affordable housing,' said.

"Affordable housing continues to be a challenge," O'Reilly said. "Although we have seen success in the past four years, we have significant challenges ahead with sequestration and the rising rental housing costs."

Highlights: 2013 Point-in-**Time Count of Homeless**

The PIT count was conducted on Jan. 30, 2013. ❖ Of the 1,350 people who were literally homeless in the Fairfax-Falls Church Community, 747 were people in families (55 percent of all homeless), and 603 were single.

* Thirty-three percent (452 people) of all persons who were homeless were children under the age of 18, the same percentage as last year.

* There were 19 fewer families who were homeless in 2013 compared to 2012, with 90 fewer people, including 53 fewer children and 37 fewer

Fifty-eight percent of adults in homeless families were employed. In 2012, 59 percent of adults in families were employed.

In 2013, 27 percent of all persons in families were homeless due to domestic violence, a decrease from 40 percent in 2012. Thirty percent of families identified domestic violence as the reason for homelessness


Single individuals account for 45 percent of all homeless persons counted, a total of 603 people.

Single adults decreased by 13 percent (94 adults) compared to 2012.

* Fifty-seven percent (341 people) of single adults who were homeless suffered from serious mental illness and/or substance abuse, a decrease from 64 percent in 2012, and many had chronic health problems and/or physical disabilities.

* Twenty-two percent (134 people) of single adults were employed, and nine percent (57 people) were identified as veterans.

Researchers Address 'Concussion Culture'

Education and proper health care are keys.

ith the impending warmer weather an in creased number of children participating in outdoor activities. Some local health care professionals and researchers are issuing words of caution.

"More children will be outside playing with friends, riding bicycles and engaging in contact sports. These activities and others where impact is a possibility place children at risk for a concussion," said Dr. Faith Claman, who holds a doctor of nursing practice and is an assistant professor in the Malek School of Health Professions at Arlington's Marymount University.

Local educators say it is important to know the facts. "A concussion is a brain injury, which often occurs as a result of a fall or blow to the head or body, said Dr. Dalila Birem, associate medical director of Molina Healthcare of Virginia and Fairfax Community Health Care Network. "Normally, the brain is cushioned by fluid, but when jolted violently, the brain crashes into the skull, resulting in damage to the soft tissue."

Birem says that while some people may lose consciousness, more common symptoms of a concussion include headache, blurred vision, fatigue or irritability.

most people fully recover from a concussion," said Birem. "However, severe concussions or repeated incidents may lead to more serious consequences, such as act concussion laws.

problems with speech, mobility or

Researchers at George Mason University in Fairfax are taking action. "Concussions are running rampant across the country right now and it seems that no one, from middle school student athletes to professional players, are exempt," said university spokeswoman Catherine J. Probst. "As a result, some states are enacting new laws to change this concussion culture. Virginia's General Assembly [passed legislation] that requires student athletes and their parents to receive annual concussion education. ... The law also states that schools form concussion management teams to provide and document concussion education for students, staff, coaches and parents."

Implementing the legislation presents challenges, however. "Many Virginia public schools lack the necessary resources to properly deliver concussion education," she continued.

To address the dearth of resources, researchers in Mason's College of Education and Human Development (CEHD) joined the Advancing Healthcare Initiatives Underserved Students (ACHIEVES) project to offer effective medical care and education.

"The project has already reached more than 80,000 student athletes, staff, coaches and parents to deliver more effective medical care and concussion education," Probst







SAR Presents Award to Kroesen

he George Washington Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) hosted a formal gala event at the Belle Haven Country Club on Jan. 26, 2013, to present the SAR's highest national award for public service to General Frederick J. Kroesen, Jr., U.S. Army (retired).

The SAR Gold Good Citizenship Medal is awarded for outstanding and unusual patriotic achievement and service of national importance. Included among past recipients of the medal are former Presidents Truman, Ford, Carter, Reagan, Bush, Secretary of Veterans Affairs General Eric Shinseki, former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs General Peter Pace, and former Attorney General Edwin Meese.

Kroesen commanded troops in World War II (France and Germany), the Korean War, and the Vietnam War, including 12 combat campaigns. He commanded an infantry rifle company in WWII, an airborne battalion in Korea, and both a brigade and then the 23rd Infantry Division in Vietnam.

Later he commanded the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg. Toward the end of his 40-year military career, he served as Commander-in-Chief, U.S. Army Europe and Seventh Army, and Commander, NATO Central Army Group (1979 to

1983), and Commanding General, United States Army Forces Command (1976 to 1978). He also served as Vice Chief of Staff of the Army from 1978 to 1979. During his final command in Europe, he was targeted for assassination by a faction of the Red Army and was injured when an anti-tank rocket hit his vehicle.

Kroesen is a native of Phillipsburg, N.J., and was raised in the Trenton area until enrolling in Rutgers University in 1940. His education was interrupted when the Army ROTC program was discontinued and all enrollees were inducted as privates. He resumed educational pursuits after World War II and earned a B.S. in agriculture from Rutgers and B.A. and M.A. degrees in international affairs from George Washington University.

Since retiring from the Army he has been an independent consultant offering observations and counsel concerning national and international military affairs. He is currently a Senior Fellow of the Institute of Land Warfare and a contributing editor of Army Magazine. He is a member of the board of directors of Net Talon Security Systems of Fredericksburg, vice president of the American Security Council Foundation and a member of the board of directors of the Army Historical Foundation.

Pitcher Arvo, Centreville Baseball Beat West Potomac

Wolverines' comeback attempt falls short.

he West Potomac baseball team trailed in four of its first five games yet entered Tuesday's contest against the Centreville Wildcats with a 4-1 record and the No. 8 ranking in the Northern Region coaches poll.

After quickly falling behind Centreville, the Wolverines started to forge another comeback, putting the tying run on deck in the seventh inning. This time, however, an eight-run deficit was too much to overcome.

Centreville defeated West Potomac 9-5 at Centreville High School. The Wildcats built a 9-1 lead and held on as West Potomac scored four runs in the sixth and put two runners on with one out in the seventh.

"Just like tonight, they never give up. They keep coming back," West Potomac head coach Jim Sullivan said. "... We've been behind in five of the six games we've played and we've won four of them. They don't

seem to get rattled. They play with good composure. If one guy is not getting it done, another one will."

While the Wolverines have been a resilient bunch, the Wildcats were too much, thanks in part to the performance of starting pitcher Brennan Arvo. The junior righthander allowed one unearned run and one hit through the first four innings.

"He really competed," Centreville head coach Scott Findley said. "He showed a lot of growth. ... He hits his spots."

After a two-run first inning, Centreville added four runs in the second; including an RBI single from first baseman Matt Whalen. Leading 6-1, the Wildcats scored two more runs in the fourth with a trio of two-out hits. After a single by third baseman Scott Walter, Whalen delivered a run-scoring double and designated hitter Daniel Drangstveit hit an RBI single.

Trailing 9-1, West Potomac started to chip away at the Centreville lead against the Wildcats' bullpen. The Wolverines scored four runs in the sixth, including a two-out, two-run single by junior A.J. Melvin, but their seventh-inning rally fell short.

"We didn't think the guy who started really had much," Sullivan said. "We only got one hit off him in four innings. I don't know what we were doing but it wasn't right."

Senior pitcher Alex Hauser took the loss

for West Potomac, allowing six earned runs in 1 1/3 innings. Sullivan said junior Billy Lescher pitched well in relief.

Whalen had two hits and two RBIs for Centreville. Drangstveit had two RBIs.

Melvin had two hits and two RBIs for West Potomac. Junior Michael Barnes had two hits, including a triple, and Hauser had two hits and an RBI.

Centreville (4-2) will host Robinson, ranked No. 2 in the latest coaches poll, at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, April 9. West Potomac faced Annandale on Wednesday, after The Gazette's OR Centre View's deadline. The Wolverines will travel to face T.C. Williams at 6:30 p.m. on Friday, April 5.




