Future Uncertain for WPHS Crew

Current practice space may be taken over by construction at National Harbor.

he summer's heavy rain storms have not given any favors to members of the West Potomac Crew team over the years.

In the past, their workout tent has been damaged by heavy winds. On June 19, during a heavy storm, boats were damaged when the boat trailer was knocked over. They've also had outboard motors stolen, making it somewhat remarkable that they've overcome these challenges and have won a number of regattas, sent seniors to college with full scholarships, and sent three boats to Nationals.

But now, the team faces another challenge: They have no landing site, which means they have no place to practice.

"It's even more than just the damage," said Danny Selnick, a parent of a student on the team. "We may not have a place to practice."

Previously, the team has been practicing at the National Harbor, but the use of the land is in question due to construction of the MGM Casino that was approved earlier this month.

The land they are currently using in Maryland may be used as a construction staging area, which could force the West Potomac team to leave the area.

"It's really sad what has happened to this team. The team's future is in jeopardy," Selnick said. "We

really need a home."

Crew is a very family participatory sport, Selnick said. West Potomac Crew does not receive any funding from the school or Fairfax County, and raises about \$100,000 each year.

The amount of space that the team needs is very small, Selnick said. They have asked the National Park Service for use of the Belle Haven Marina and the Washington Sailing Marina at Daingerfield Island, but received a response that there is no room for the team.

According to Selnick, the team is still looking to use Washington Sailing Marina.

"Within the last two years, our crew team has been trying to find park sites with a short distance of the high school. Of course it's not easy. We're running into some snags. That's still our hope. We would like to be able to have a place to return each year in a row," said Leslie Shinners, the head coach of the team.

David Bishop, the president of the team's booster club who has had two students on the team, said the long-term goal is for the team to secure a practice site in Virginia, closer to the school.

"Our long-term goal is to row on the west side of the Potomac versus the east side," Bishop said. "Parents have been looking at National Park Service land. Belle Haven is right down the hill from the school. They could essentially run down from the school and then row."

Although they're facing some difficulties, coaches and parents are optimistic that they'll be OK. Bishop says they have not heard a yes or no from National Harbor in Maryland.

"One way or another, we will find a place to row," Bishop said. "It's a fun sport, and I hate to see the kids not able to row."

Supervisors Deny Landfill Application

Board votes against plan to extend life of Lorton Landfill.

he Board of Supervisors voted late Tuesday to reject an EnviroSolutions application to extend the life of the Lorton construction debris landfill until 2034.

Supervisors voted 6-4 to deny the application, which in effect will require the landfill to close by the end of 2018.

The landfill, located near Interstate 95 in Lorton, is owned by Manassas-based EnviroSolutions. The company applied in fall 2013 to extend operations of the landfill until 2040.

A previous agreement in 2006 would require EnviroSolutions to build a park on top of the closed landfill after it closes in 2018.

Following attempted community compromise, including public hearings that went late into the night, the application was denied on Tuesday.

Citizen groups such as the South County Federation, a group of homeowner and civic associations in the Lorton area, opposed the application.

The Fairfax County Chamber of Commerce, the Mount Vernon-Lee Chamber of Commerce and several other groups supported the proposal, especially considering the green energy components.

"The Fairfax Chamber is disappointed with the decision by the Board of Supervisors to deny ESI's amended compromise proposal. By striking down this proposal, we fear that developers will see rising construction costs, which could eventually be passed on to real estate owners and tenants — and ultimately customers and cli-

ents. This compromise could have helped to advance the county's goals of enhancing sustainability initiatives by meeting long-term recycling goals for construction materials and supporting LEED attainment for new construction. This represents a missed opportunity by the Board to further grow and develop the county," said Jim Corcoran, CEO of the Fairfax County Chamber of Commerce.

EnviroSolutions planned to install solar panels at the landfill site, if the application was approved.

But many community members were opposed to the application, including the berm that would have been built around the landfill.

Mount Vernon District Supervisor Gerry Hyland was among the supervisors who voted to deny the application, calling it a difficult application.

"To say this application has given me some heartburn is an understatement," Hyland said at the meeting.

Sharon Bulova, chairman of the Board of Supervisors, was among the four who voted to approve the application.

"The extension of the life of the landfill helps Fairfax County meet its revitalization and redevelopment efforts, particularly in the Route 1 corridor. While developers are recycling more and more from their projects, we are not yet able to recycle all debris and close by landfill options, or this option, in my mind provides developers a low cost option for ways of disposal," Bulova said.

Several supervisors, including Jeff McKay and Pat Herrity, expressed concern that the application was not ready.





Foreign Nationals Immersed in Local Lifeguarding

For some, it starts out on two wheels.

very day, Vasyl Smolii uses two different routes when he bikes to and from work at the Belle View pool in Alexandria. Coming down the hill on Belle View Boulevard is an easy ride in the morning but going back up in the evening is not as easy on the bicycle Smolii rents from his sponsor High Sierra Pools, an Arlington-based pool management company.

"I must buy this bike for the summer," said 19-year-old Smolii from Ukraine.

For Martin Stefanov and Victoria Tshacheva, the bikes are their transportation this summer as well. In the evenings, six bikes are parked on the first floor patio of the apartment they share in Kingstowne with other lifeguards who are also from Europe.

This is Stefanov's second year lifeguarding; Tshacheva heard about his adventures last year while they were attending Sofia University in Sofia, Bulgaria. Tshacheva is studying public relations.

"This country is much different, you can see different cultures, a lot of people from the whole world, you can learn a lot of stuff," she said. Riding bikes to work was one of those things she is learning. Biking in Bulgaria "is not so popular," she said, but she may continue when she goes back. "I will ride the bike in my country, I think so," she said.

At the EOS Twenty One apartment complex in the Landmark area of Alexandria there are two pools, one manned by a pair of 20-somethings from Poland, and the other by twin sisters Irina and Olha Shemchuk, also from Ukraine. These lifeguards, who went through U.S. Aquatics for

their summer jobs, don't ride bikes to work. The pair from Poland are staying in an apartment with three other lifeguards close enough to EOS to walk to work, and for the Shumchuk sisters, "our driver picks us up every day," said Irina Shemchuk.

Transportation is one of the concerns of Doug Winkler, owner of Winkler Pool Management Inc., with an office in Springfield. They employed 260 lifeguards from various countries this year, such as Ukraine, Serbia, Turkey, Jordan, Bulgaria, Azerbaijan, Dominican Republic, China, Slovakia, Russia, Poland, Egypt and Kazakhstan. The Winkler lifeguards either walk, use public transportation, have drivers like the Shemchuk sisters, or use bikes that Winkler supplies for a deposit.

Winkler, who lifeguarded when he was a teen, remembered his years on the lifeguard chair as a "great job," but noted that "the desire is not there in American kids anymore, they don't want to work." Lifeguards from overseas want to travel and experience the United States as well as earn some money.

All of the lifeguards get training in their home countries and another course here before starting. According to High Sierra Pools, which has job fairs in the U.S. and internationally, "All of our representatives are former lifeguards to give you the inside scoop," on the job, according to its website. "High Sierra works with U.S. visa sponsors to promote our jobs with the help of partner agencies worldwide."

Communicating in English is key. For EOS lifeguards Weronica Mikoljczyk and Agnieszka Kaczmarek from Poland, this is their second summer lifeguarding in the U.S. Before starting, they were interviewed via Skype to get a sample of their dialect, and "the tests are in English," said Kaczmarek. Smolii's English has improved since Memorial Day, but "when I arrived, I had very bad English," he said.

Kaczmarek was a swimming coach in Poland, so she gives some of the children at

EOS swimming lessons "before it opens," in the morning. Mikoljczyk was a lifeguard on a lake close to Poznan, a city in Poland, and both know synchronized swimming which they also share with the children at the pool. "I love kids," said Kaczmarek, and the "kids love us," added Mikoljczyk.

Over at Belle View, Smolii had to rely on his training early on this summer, rescuing a resident in distress. "My first week, a woman at Belle View was swimming and got a cramp. I jumped in with my rescue tube, take her shoulder," he said, reenacting the procedure. Smolii is with High Sierra, and they check his lifeguarding skills every month, he said.

ALTHOUGH MOST of the lifeguards work long days that stretches to more than 40 hours a week, they do find time to enjoy their American experience. Smolii went to Ocean City, Md. with another lifeguard and experienced the ocean and eating crabs for

the first time. The crab mallet techniques were tough to master at first and he ended up splattering crab all over him until "waiters showed us the correct way," he said.

Stefanov took a day trip to New York City for a fellow lifeguard's birthday. "It was amazing," he said.

For another Ukrainian, Victoria Horbenko, a lifeguard in Ellipse at Government Center off Lee Highway, her summer at poolside is "like a student exchange, to get new experience," she said.

The lifeguards are hot and cold to American food. Stefanov and Tshacheva in Kingstowne try to eat healthy and "cook a lot in our apartment," said Tshacheva, noting that her father in Bulgaria "cooks, it's the most delicious food," she said. She's familiar with the obesity trend in this country. For the twin sisters, the "food here is very bad," said Olha Shemchuk, "too many sweets." Her sister Irina is not a fan of American bread. "Your bread is not bread," she said.

There are still community pools that only hire teenagers from the neighborhood for the lifeguard positions such as Hunt Valley pool in Springfield. According to manager Lauren Blackburn, "We all live right here."

Hunt Valley lifeguard Luke Chapman, 17, went to a class to become a pool operator and noticed "they were all Eastern European," he said.

Winkler noted that being in the community they grow up in has advantages, as when he was a teen and "many evenings, some of the pool patrons would bring me dinner." On the other hand, being in charge is a hard sell to friends. "It's tough for them to be disciplinary," he said.

The summer abroad is making an impression on Tshacheva. "Here we are so separate from our life in Bulgaria. It will be so different when we go back," she said.

For Olha Shemchuk, 19, she might give it another summer, after she turns 21 so she can go dancing and clubbing. "We are young," she said.

Finally, Marriage Rights Protected in Virginia

n July 28, 2014, in affirming that that 'all men' are created equal. Surely this tivities, events, organizations, volunteer op-Virginia's ban on same-sex mar riage is unconstitutional, Circuit Judge Henry F. Floyd writes:

"We recognize that same-sex marriage makes some people deeply uncomfortable. However, inertia and apprehension are not legitimate bases for denying same-sex couples due process and equal protection of the laws.

Civil marriage is one of the cornerstones of our way of life. It allows individuals to celebrate and publicly de-

clare their intentions to form lifelong partnerships, which provide unparalleled intimacy, companionship, emotional support, and security. The choice of whether and whom to marry is an intensely personal decision that alters the course of an individual's life. Denying samesex couples this choice prohibits them from participating fully in our society, which is precisely the type of segregation that the Fourteenth Amendment cannot countenance."

Judge Arenda Wright Allen, on Valentine's Day, 2014, ruled that Virginia's ban on samesex marriage is unconstitutional, writing:

"A spirited and controversial debate is underway regarding who may enjoy the right to marry in the United States of America. America has pursued a journey to make and keep our citizens free. This journey has never been easy, and at times has been painful and poignant. The ultimate exercise of our freedom is choice. Our Declaration of Independence recognizes

means all of us. While ever-vigilant for the wisdom that can come from the voices of our voting public, our courts have never long tolerated the perpetuation of laws rooted in unlawful prejudice. One of the judiciary's noblest endeavors is to scrutinize laws that emerge from such roots.

"Plaintiffs assert that the restriction on their freedom to choose to marry EDITORIAL the person they love infringes on the rights to due process and equal protection guaranteed to them under the Fourteenth Amendment of the United States Constitution.

> "The Court is compelled to conclude that Virginia's Marriage Laws unconstitutionally deny Virginia's gay and lesbian citizens the fundamental freedom to choose to marry."

Serving Families for 90 Years

Pushing the boundaries has led to success, says Northern Virginia Family Services CEO.

n organization does not thrive for 90 years by chance. Northern Virginia Family Services, a county institution, has impacted families throughout the region for nearly a century with no sign of slowing down.

CEO and President Mary Agee, who has been at the organization for 46 of those years, has seen the nonprofit flourish during her time there.

"In reading the history, there were a lot of passionate and smart people that were on the board in the '20s, '30s and '40s," she said. "Very adaptable and very principled. That's the other thing that struck me — that the decisions were based upon doing the right thing and never turning a child away."

She said that even today, her staff is willing to push boundaries while still adhering to the organization's mission

NVFS opened its doors in 1924 as a family counseling center; it was run by a single volunteer at the time.

Agee joined the 11 person staff in 1972. She just announced her retirement, effective next June, on Monday.

"The budget was \$182,000 at the time," she said. The budget is now \$32 million and staff count has soared to 150 people. One of those staff members is current Chief Operative Officer Cheri Villa who has been with the organization for five years.

"One of the reasons I came here was to work with Mary on her vision," she said.

Recently, the organization has helped families who have suffered during the recession to adapt to the change.

"I think one of the most interesting things is when you look at our history, it's a reflection of the region

as a whole," said Villa. "As community needs have emerged, Northern Virginia Family Services has stepped in."

In the last 20 years, affordable housing and mental health issues were added to the list of NVFS's concerns. However, Agee does not think they were ever a non-issue for the area.

"The needs in the community have absolutely not changed," said Agee. "The thing that has changed is the faces that use them."

She said that the organization had the chance to help its community during the response after a plane struck the Pentagon on Sept. 11, 2001.

"It was an honor to be asked by the Community Foundation of the National Capital Region to design a program that would support the families that were impacted by the attack on the Pentagon," she said. "What that taught was how to perfect a case management model — help them recover from trauma and bring in a number of resources."

She said the leadership the organization showed made NVFS a national leader in trauma response. It is currently poised to help the numbers of children that have crossed the border into Texas.

But it does not do the work alone. Many of the issues that leaders at NVFS are passionate about are also tackled with other local organizations.

"I think collaboration is a big part of our success," she said. "These issues are so big that you have to tackle them together."



LTA Stages 'Spamalot'

Musical comedy is based on "Monty Python and the Holy Grail."

he Little Theater of Alexandria is staging the musical comedy "Spamalot" Aug. 2-23. The irreverent play, which won three Tony Awards, including Best Musical in 2005, is adapted from the 1975 film "Monty Python and the Holy Grail." It originally starred Tim Curry as King Arthur, David Hyde Pierce as Sir Robin and Hank

Azaria as Sir Lancelot on Broadway. "It's 'Monty Python' with showgirls and dancing and musical tunes, and all the laughter of 50 years of 'Monty Python' condensed into one show," said director Wade Corder, 51, of Springfield. "It's just brilliant."

His biggest challenge was narrowing down the 100 people who auditioned to just 19 characters. "The most wonderful thing is that it worked," said Corder, a corporate accountant by day who is directing his first LTA show. "We have a fantastic cast."

He added, "I hope the audience will take away a memory and a good strong reminder to always dance and laugh and sing."

"For people who love to see spectacles, this is their show," said producer Rachel Alberts. "It will not disappoint."

"It's a parody of 'The Knights of the Roundtable.' And there's all sorts of songs, crazy characters, and Broadway theater parodies," Alberts said. "I think people will be interested because it's funny, silly and irreverent."

With a 14-piece orchestra, Alberts said LTA likes to do big musicals in the summer. "There's heavy and serious things going on in the world right now, and this provides a wonderful escape from it all."

The cast has been rehearsing for eight weeks, and more than 100 volunteers have been putting last-minute touches on the show. Alberts said that LTA's costume designer has been working on costumes for almost a year now.

"We have so many people working behind the scenes to make this happen," said Alberts. "All of the actors and crew are volunteers. They are willing to put the time in - it's very gratifying to see the work look so professional."

Alberts said the show is comical, cartoony, bright and colorful. "It's a very positive show; it's got an incredible soundtrack. It's a true audience experience," she said.

James Hotsko, 34, of Heatherlea in Arlington, plays the role of King Arthur, who goes out looking for men to join his Knights of the Roundtable and gets charged with the quest to find the Holy Grail.

The fun part has been getting to interact with everyone and seeing what they are bringing to their characters, said Hotsko, who studied aerospace and ocean engineering and works as a naval architect. That, plus riding a horse with coconuts during rehearsals.

It may be a little cliché, but the play may teach the audience to look at the bright side of things, he said, "Life is what you can make of it; there's always going to be a silver lining.'

He said one of the biggest challenges was trying to pick up the British accent. "We are trying to make sure that stays true," he said.

Ashlie-Amber Harris, 27, of Alexandria plays the role of Lady of the Lake. "She's a diva," she said. "She's beautiful, exotic and she brings a feminine aspect to the show.... Her character adds a different dynamic to the story."

"Spamalot" is not your typical theater show," said Harris, who works as a bar-

tender. "We kind of make fun of musical theater and we make fun of huge Broadway productions like 'Phantom of the Opera' and 'Singing in the Rain."

She says that one of her challenges, after watching Tony Award-winner Sara Ramirez play the same role, was to try to be original and stay true to the essence of the character and make it her own at the same time.

"It's hard to bring your own originality to the character because [Ramirez is] so fantastic, she's so spot-on with her choices," Harris said.

Nevertheless, "This is a great show because it's so much fun and it's based off an extremely iconic movie," said Harris. "I think people are going to leave with a smile and they're going to be happy and feel

Mitt Romney in 2012, McDonnell has fallen very far very fast. He's now engaged in the fight of his life, but not on the campaign trail. This time he and his wife are facing a 14-count indictment from federal prosecutors who the McDonnells were acting in secret to take money and gifts in exchange for taking action to benefit Jonnie Williams, who was trying to obtain scientific testing from state officials for his nutritional supplement made from tobacco.

"This case is about the

McDonnells lining their pockets with secret gifts and cash," said prosecutor Jessica Aber. "Bobs for Jobs — that's what he was supposed to do, just not in exchange for money."

THE CORRUPTION TRIAL of the former governor and his wife is unprecedented in Virginia politics, where commonwealth has enjoyed a reputation of relatively clean government. That is until recently. A grand

jury is currently investigating the circumstances surrounding the resignation of a Democratic state senator who was offered a job at the tobacco commission, the same organization that Williams was targeting in his effort to promote Anatabloc. In his opening statement for Maureen McDonnell, defense attorney Bill Burck said the first lady of Virginia was a "true believer" in nutraceuticals and became a "favorite playmate" for Williams as her marriage fell apart.

"You will even hear evidence that she had a crush on Mr. Williams," said Burck. "Jonnie Williams is very good at using people to get what he wants."

If opening statements this week are any indication, Williams will be at the center of the trail as each side presents evidence to the jury. For prosecutors, he's the star witness — the whistleblower who was given immunity from prosecution in exchange for

exposing how the governor and his wife accepted \$150,000 in exchange for using the power and prestige of the Governor's Mansion. For lawyers representing the McDonnells he was a scheming manipulator who turned state's evidence to keep himself out of jail. "He thought of himself as a big fish," said Burck. "But he knew Governor McDonnell was an even bigger fish."

OPENING STATEMENTS offered each side an opportunity to make an initial impression with members of the jury, a way to establish a connection and make promises about evidence to come. It was also an opportunity for some moments of high drama.

The lawyer for McDonnell played two videos of the governor engaged in economic development and quoted from a book titled "Once an Eagle." He outlined a case in which the governor's defense will be that

he was merely promoting Virginia products.

"He eats Virginia ham. He drinks Virginia wine," said Brownlee, who once ran for attorney general. "My guess is that if he smoked, he would smoke Virginia cigarettes."

The lawyer for Maureen McDonnell focused much of his opening statements to attacking Williams, who he said has changed his story several times. Burck compared it to an iPhone that keeps getting a new operating system. Version 1.0 was the original and unadulterated version, the one that denied wrongdoing and supposedly lied to prosecutors. Version 2.0 was when he struck a deal with prosecutors and told a different story. Even as the trial date approached, Burck said, Williams changed his story seven more times.

"That's nine different versions, and each one keeps getting better for the government," said Burck. "Which Jonnie Williams are you supposed to believe?"

PROSECUTORS SPENT their opening arguments laying out a timeline they say shows official actions were taken shortly after gifts were offered or loans were received. In one dramatic moment, for example, Williams shows up at the Governor's Mansion with a blank check. But Aber was also careful to manage expectations, acknowledging that prosecutors do not have one singular piece of evidence that shows the sweep of the conspiracy case. "No single witness will be able to tell you this entire story from soup to nuts," said Aber. "The defendants are way too sophisticated for that."

Legal experts say the opening statements play an important role in setting the tone for jurors and letting them know what to expect. "Opening statements are critical and the reason for that is it's kind of like a first date. You only get one chance to get it right," said Rich Kelsey, assistant dean of the George Mason School of Law. "It's about building a story that makes sense and answers their questions before they know they have questions."

Laurel Hill Master Plan Meets Final Approval

Construction expected to begin this fall.

he Fairfax County Board of Supervisors voted Tuesday to approve the plan to develop the site of the former Lorton prison.

When construction is completed, the mixed-used community will include 412 residential units at market rate, 110,000 square feet of office and retail space, and 20,000 feet of community space.

The residential units include 225 apartments in previously prison dorms and workshops, 157 new townhomes, six condos and

24 new homes.

According to a county press release, this was the final decision needed for construction to begin.

Groundbreaking for the first phase is expected to begin this fall, and will create 165 apartments and 107 new homes. The Alexander Company and Elm Street are the developers for the project.

Fairfax County will pay an estimated \$12.7 million of the \$188 million project. The second phase will begin in late 2016.

The development will take place on the site of the former Lorton prison, which Fairfax County bought the property of for \$4.2 million in 2002. It is expected to create 300 new jobs and generate \$2.5 million in tax revenue annually.

Housing and restaurants will bring revenue to the area, according to supervisors. The Lorton Workhouse Arts Center, located on the site of the former prison, was a topic of discussion in January when the Board of Supervisors voted to assume part of the workhouse's loan.

"I was pleased to support the re-planning and re-purposing of Laurel Hill," said Sharon Bulova, chairman of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors, in a statement in June. "Fairfax County's purchase of the former Lorton Prison has provided the opportunity to create a vibrant community in

Revisions to the master calendar for Fairfax County Public Schools were approved by the Fairfax County School Board on Thursday, July 24. The 2014-15 school year begins on Tuesday, Sept. 2, and ends on Friday, June 19, 2015. In total, the revised 2014-15 school year calendar includes seven teacher workdays to offer teachers time for staff meetings and professional development, as well as three teacher staff development days, four strategic planning days, and six days with a two-hour early release for teacher directed time. The length of the school year remains the same, but the number of days for students has been reduced from 183 days to 180 days. By eliminating the shortened Monday schedule for elementary schools, FCPS was able to make changes to the calendar that comply with state accreditation for 990 hours of instruction. 
