

The following detours will be in place during the closures:

❖ Detour 1: Fox Mill Road and Vale Road

back to Stuart Mill Road (Route 671)

❖ Detour 2: Fox Mill Road, Steeplechase Drive, Lawyers Road and Birdfoot Lane back to Stuart Mill Road. Residents within the closure area, emergency vehicles and school buses will continue to have access to Stuart Mill Road; however, they will not be able to go beyond the point of pipe replacement in either direction.

Church as a Family The First Baptist Church of Vienna celebrates 150th birthday this year.

f you've ever heard a powerful sermon, it would be inside a sleepy church on the corner of Nutley and Orchard St. NW neighborhood in Vienna.

The sign reads "Welcome: Sunday School 9 a.m., Sunday Services, 7:45 10 a.m., Midweek Worship Service, Bible Study, Dr. Vernon C. Walton."

However, what the sign doesn't say, is this church has a history of 150 years dating back to the Civil War.

It was founded as the oldest African American Baptist church in Vienna, Virginia in 1867.

Reverend Dr. Vernon C. Walton, 45, has been here for three years. But, his service is the combined legacy of the 17 ministers before him dating all the way back to the civil war.

"We have a longstanding history — 150 years — because of the faith and strength of our fore parents," he said.

THE REVEREND has a Bachelor of Arts in sociology and criminal justice from Virginia Union University in Richmond, a Masters from New York Theological Seminary, and a Doctorate from United Theological Seminary of Dayton, Ohio.

According to the church's pastoral history, the First Baptist Church of Vienna began as a body of baptized believers after the Civil War. With no designated place to meet, a group of former slaves in Vienna held religious meetings in groves. Major O.E. Hine, a Union Army Veteran gave the emancipated group a plot of land to use for educational and religious purposes.


With the major's help, the group obtained permission from the Freeman's bureau, and acquired lumber from a Civil War barracks to construct the church on Lawyers Road in Vienna

This was the church's original location at 214 Lawyers Road in an old whitewashed chapel, now home to the Knights of Columbus.

The first minister to this church was Cyrus Carter, who was in charge of the services for 13 years from 1867-1880.

Pastor Emeritus, Kenney Smith was the most recent pastor before Walton. He began in 1986.

However even with a rich history, this

church stays pertinent as a place of worship for so many families in the African American communities of Vienna and neighboring towns in northern Virginia.

Stacey Seay, 40, an administrative assistant at First Baptist grew up here. She was baptized at First Baptist in her youth.

"This building was smaller and has been renovated, we used to worship at Louise Archer, when it was undergoing construction," she said. The church for her has always been part of home, a family church, but for people who weren't blood relatives. There is a family feel. Black history month is especially important to members of this church in February, as they remember the

history of their own parish, how far they've come, and how they are looking forward to worship for years to come.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

festivities include an African American Historical Tour of Vienna, a Heritage Lecture series taking place each Wednesday of February at 7 p.m., and the Historically Black Colleges, Panhellenic and Heritage celebration, Sunday last weekend.

"The Heritage lecture series every Wednesday covers current topics like prison, mental health, and sex trafficking, issues that are impacting the communities that we are in," said Reverend Walton.

Even with such a long history, the church has evolved over the years. Now it houses a larger parking lot as Rev. Walton said many families used to walk. But now that old tradition has given way to people driving from further away to attend Sunday services. "At First Baptist we focus on head and heart worship. We have a great tra-

dition in sacred music, gospel music, and the worship experience," said Rev. Walton.

First Baptist also strives, in their mission statement and in person, to be a diverse church and welcoming congregation in the county. "We are mostly an African American church, but we welcome all types of people," said Walton.

"We are one big family," Seay said. "This church is loving and socially conscious, our history and culture and helping others outside of the church."

Services are at 7:45 and 10 a.m. Sunday mornings. And Wednesday service as part of the Heritage Lecture Series for Black History Month this February is at 7 p.m.

Red Galanga Served 'Modern Asian' Cuisine

Vienna restaurant owners get three cheers.

restaurant bombshell has struck the decorous town of Vienna, and its name is Red Galanga. For Asian foodies, the word "galanga" (or "galangal") has instant recognition: a root cousin of ginger, used often in Southeast Asian recipes. Its pronounced yet slightly gingery flavor adds great cheer to a host of dishes, and may be grated, sliced, diced, ground, or even left whole and fried. So, one might wonder, how does something like this turn up as a restaurant name? Note: the owners also call it "modern Asian."

The clever owners have assembled a setting to showcase the brilliant creations of its chefs, who have captured a diverse array of aromas and tastes in the menu that showcases both Japanese, Thai, (and at least one Singaporean dish) cuisines — but with a slightly modern twist. For example, Thai red duck curry is generally cubed duck meat in a coconut milk-rich curry. Here: it's called "duck confit."

The main problem is that so many dishes beckon, how to choose, you may wonder. As starters, you can't go wrong with the Tom Yum crispy calamari, a pile of deep-fried calamari slices sweetened and heated with dabs of a Thai sweet-sticky sauce. The Asian tacos include spiced tuna, spiced salmon, or spiced chicken, wrapped up in crispy (almost too crunchy) fried corn tortillas.

Though crunchy, these tacos are an interesting kickoff to an Asian meal. And then, if you are really experimental, you can begin lunch or dinner with an order of fried frog legs that have been marinated in spices — a bit unusual for an Asian restaurant.

Choosing entrées can take you from a Japanese bento box filled with sushi and sashimi or with shrimp and vegetable tempura paired with salmon teriyaki, plus other options. But if your tastes take you to spicier eats, to Thailand, you cannot miss the Massaman beef curry, a Southern Thai specialty wrought here to perfection. You would agree if you have traveled to that part of Thailand, and chances are, that will become your go-to main course at this restaurant. On the other hand, a lunch entrée can be simpler and smaller, especially if your job calls for afternoon hours. In that case, one of the all-rice or all-noodle dishes are great choices: nasi goreng (Malaysian rice dish), shrimp pad Thai, and the very popular Drunken Noodles all rate thumbs up. But for tamer flavors, scan the Japanese parts of the menu with choices of sushi, sashimi, and Japanese noodles dishes.

Besides the seductive flavors, the colorful décor, and the roomy dining areas, Red Galanga excels with its courteous, prompt service, an element that may be lacking at other restaurants. So to the owners of this interesting and daring enterprise: three cheers!

A Date With Destiny

I suppose, given that Feb. 27, 2017 is the eight-year anniversary of my original nonsmall cell lung cancer, stage IV diagnosis, followed up almost immediately with my "13 month to two-year" prognosis, I should make mention of it. Not that I need any reminding, but perhaps you regular readers who don't exactly know my history, might be curious as to how long I've been droning on about cancer. Strictly speaking, it was June 2009 when my first cancer-type (it was the diagnostic process, actually) column was published: "Dying to Find Out, Sort Of." And I've been self-indulging myself ever since save for the odd occasion when my mind wanders elsewhere and I'm able to write outside the cancer bubble.

Which is probably a good thing, as is venting every week about the good, bad and the ugly, concerning my having cancer and learning how to live with it. Not that the content is particularly informative, factually, but it is an honest description of the anxieties and fears a patient experiences. Occasionally, I will include a few facts, but as a sports- and chocolate-person, medicine/science and my knowledge and understanding, and ability to explain them are mutually exclusive at best and an oxymoron at worst, with yours truly being the moron. What kind of moron you ask? As Curly Howard of The Three Stooges answered in a long-ago "two-reeler:" "Why? Are there more than one kind?'

Nonetheless, in spite of myself, life has gone on as I'm proud and extremely fortunate to say. As to where I am in the cancer-survivor scheme of things? Somewhere between slim and none. When I was first diagnosed, my oncologist said the survival rate for similarly staged patients (stage IV) after five years was in the low single digits (as in 1 to 2 percent). When my wife, Dina, asked him why aren't there any parades for lung cancer survivors (as is so often the case with breast cancer survivors), he answered quite succinctly: "Because there aren't any," (survivors, that is). I appreciated his honesty and told him so. I was clueless however, as to what my immediate future would really be like. I would know soon enough as it was recommended that I start chemotherapy as soon as possible. I remember my brother, Richard, asking the oncologist what would he do if it was his brother diagnosed with lung cancer; his answer was to begin infusions without delay and so a week later, we began.

And so here I am, nearly eight years later, still minding my own business and sharing it with you all every week. My infusions now occur every five weeks, CT Scans every three months. My face-to-face appointments with my oncologist occur quarterly as well, a week or so after the scan to discuss the results. So far, mostly so good. Oh sure, I've had my moments (tumor growth, fluid build-up in both lungs followed by a week-long stay in the hospital, ongoing kidney concerns, no surgery though), but for the most part, I've been incredibly lucky (my oncologist calls me his "third miracle").

As to what I'm doing to help myself and hurt the cancer? Not nothing. In addition to the standard fare offered by my oncologist, I have supplemented my treatment with a variety of non-Western alternatives, many of which I've mentioned in previous columns. Are they working? They're not hurting, I can tell you that. Could I do more? Probably. Should I do more? Absolutely! Am I doing more or less than I used to? Less, I'm afraid. But as Popeye the Sailor Man said so ofte 'yam what I 'yam." And come Monday, Feb. 27, 2017, I'll have "yamed" myself into an eight-year lung cancer survivor. Do I hear nine? Hopefully, I hear a lot more than that. From my pen to God's ears.

A Record Year

Alzheimer's Association of the National Capital Region honors its supporters.

egan Newman told her story at the Alzheimer's Association "Wall of Hope" reception at Tyson's Corner on Feb. 9. She was only 18, a senior in high school, when her mother started to ask the same question more than once. They both attributed it to stress. They laughed about it. A few months later, it became clear to Meghan that what was wrong with her mother was more than stress. She convinced her to see a doctor, but it took many tests and many neurologists later before she was diagnosed with Alzheimer's.

It came at a difficult time for Megan, as she was headed off to college. She was supposed to be at the "best years of your life" stage. She laughs about it now, but switching roles with her parent at that point in her life was anything but funny. When she went to college, her mother went with her. When she moved off campus, she moved with her mother. The long days of caregiving, studying and managing the lives of two people took a toll on Megan. Her mother didn't really appreciate being told she had to brush her teeth or that she wasn't going to be able to drive her car any longer. Alzheimer's patients don't always exhibit a good-natured response to having children tell them what to do. Megan wasn't always patient and forebearing. And that bothered her. When it became time for her to hold down a job, Megan couldn't manage both tasks anymore. That is why she was so grateful to find the Alzheimer's Association, and why she will always give back to this organization: they helped her manage her mother and supported her, she said. The reception on Feb. 9 recognized event participants and supporters who distinguished themselves through leadership and exemplary fundraising during the year. Supporters were able to see the unveiling of new plaques on the Wall of Hope, which honors those who suffered from the disease and their friends and family who gave in their name. Attendees at the event made up 2 percent of the fundraisers and sponsors who raised over 45 percent of total funds from events. In 2016, 7,700 participants raised a record \$1.78 million. And they had a good time doing it. Chris Boullire, the CEO of the National Capital Area Alzheimer's Association chapter, honored the 29 cyclists who created the "Ride to Remember," riding 100 miles and raising more than \$20,000; the 260 Longest Day participants who raised over \$118,000 participating in creative activities; the "Blondes v. Brunettes" (a flag football game for women,) which had 80 participants and raised over \$85,173; and the biggest event for 2016 in this area: the Walk to End Alzheimer's had 7,300 participants at seven walks throughout the region who raised \$1.53 million.

lexandria and Arlington each have a meals tax, both enacted without a referendum because as urban forms of government in Virginia, their local elected bodies were authorized to enact the tax legislatively.

EDITORIAL Fairfax County Board of Supervisors had to put the meals tax on the ballot for voters to decide, and after a heated campaign, the tax was voted down decisively.

Elections have consequences, a fact being affirmed on every level right now.

In Fairfax County, this means a more difficult budget process going forward than might otherwise have been the case. The vast majority of Fairfax County's \$3.99 billion budget is financed by property taxes, and the proposed budget is based on no property tax increase.

The meals tax would have provided about \$80 million for the schools; the current budget falls \$61 million short of the FCPS request.

While County Executive Ed Long has said there can be no new programs in the budget defined by no tax increase, we all know that some things could be cut to make room for new, needed programs.
